Eldorado's Mikeska Gin was fired up Monday morning and processed about 25 bales, bringing their season's total to 1473.

This gin run represented cotton held over from Sunday, April 23. That night rain set in and continued throughout the week until Saturday noon when sunshine broke through clouds for the first time.

Total rainfall for the week is reported all the way from 21/2 and 3 inches and as high as 41/2 in

It has left fields extremely muddy and gin men estimate it will be late in this week before farmers will be able to resume stripping. One man stated it simply, cotton is dry enough, but the ground isn't.

Gin men are still expecting this year's crop to reach 2,000 bales, which makes it appear that 500plus bales are still in the field.



#### **Caution Urged In Graing Chemically Treated Cotton Fields**

College Station, Texas.—It is a well established fact that pesticides and other chemicals are essential for profitable cotton production in

Agricultural chemicals, points out John Thomas, Texas A&M University Extension entomologist, are commonly used as herbicides, insecticides, defoliants and dessicants. They are very effective, he adds, for the purposes intended but-producers should also be aware of certain limitations and hazards associated with their use.

Fields treated with most defoliants, dessicants and insecticides and some herbicides should not be grazed by livestock following the participates. harvest of the cotton crop, reminds

Some of these chemicals are highly toxic and death losses can occur when treated fields are grazed. Besides causing direct death of animals, chemical residues from treated fields may contaminate meat or milk making them subject to seizure under state and federal regulations, explains the entomologist.



Starting with the oatmeal and ending with the fruit mixture, alternate layers of oatmeal and fruit mixture in a greased 2-quart baking dish or casserole. Bake uncovered in preheated oven (350°F.) 20 to 25 minutes or until edges bubble vigorously. Serve warm with milk or cream.

\*The oatmeal may be cooked ahead of time, covered and refrigerated until used. If cold oatmeal is used, stir oatmeal before layering in casserole and bake 30 to 35 minutes.






