

Lawmakers, who report for the biennial session in January, must pass a \$51.4 million emergency finance measure to head off a 20% welfare cut in April, the Budget Board warned, And early approval of a constitutional amendment to raise the \$80 million welfare ceiling also will be necessary to avert eventual sharp reductions in aid to the needy.

Board stressed that its budget compilations allow for no new construction funds for any purpose (not even new colleges already authorized) and no money for state employee salary raises.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called the situation a "crisis." enate leaders turned down a no-

YOUR CHILD-HEADED FOR HIPPIE "HEAVEN"?

New York (NAPS)-A young man in the hippie section of New York's Greenwich Village has an unusual way of finding happiness and fulfillment. He finds a 14 or 15 year old hippie walking down the street alone, pounding face and body with both fists

A number of other young men do the same thing. Still others prefer rape, or

robbery, or both. Then there are the forceful homosexuals.

Why does a hippie subject himself to these hazards, often leaving behind a secure home and parents who lament, "we gave him everything'

Because they didn't give him everything. And because some of what they did give was wrong. And because the child got something from his peers that he didn't get from his parents—and he wanted more

And typically, say former hippies, social workers, hospital personnel and the police the hippie had no idea what he

was letting himself in for.

Do you ever wonder "what could possibly" make your child want to leave home and be a hippie? If you have ever felt like quitting your job or getting a divorce, you can stop wondering. You already know the feeling: a desire to be free. Free from criticism. Free from burdensome rules or responsibilities. Free to make a new start. When it gets to be "freedom now," the child leaves.

Who wants to return home by a fixed hour, or face the consequences, when everyone else at the party is free to remain? Who wants to have standards of dress and clothing imposed by parents while other kids are free to look as they

Isn't a totally free life more appealing than life with parents who give "everything" in the way of possessions, but who don't give freedom?

Some parents take a different tack. "You're an adult or practically an adult," they say, "and I intend to treat you like an adult." The daughter may come home whenever she pleases. The son may hang out with whomever he chooses. Both are given moneywhatever the parents can afford.

Many such parents are astounded when their unrestricted young elect to "cut out" (depart) and "groove" (experience enjoyment) in a 'pad" (apartment) where "it's at" (happiness is to be found). The reason is that a 14 or 15 year old really is not an adult, and one of the advantages of third alternative-negotiation- The horror lies in loss of poor place.



iving at home is the parental guidance there available, and if ou turn off all guidance you urn off one advantage of living at home!

If you provide a girl with all the money she could possibly need to live in the city (lest 'heaven only know what she'll do to get money") you turn off another advantage of staying home: freedom from having to do it.

But if strictness doesn't always work, and if total freedom doesn't always work, then what can you actually to? There are experts who'll disagree with one or more suggestions on almost any list, but better than fair number of experts would agree with the following.

1. Give reasons, not just rules. If you don't have reasons, why have the rule? And if you feel that you have reason; 'but can't quite put them into words," consider the possibility that they are not valid reasons—and that you "can't" express them because you really don't want to.

If you want a daughter home by an early hour during the week so she can be fresh in school the next day and improve her chance of getting into college, you have a valid reason. But if you want her home early Saturday night because you don't want the neighbors to see her coming home late, you don't have a reason valid to her unless she cares about the neighbors as much as you do.

2. Be willing to negotiate. You have the power and the money, so your child's only alternatives, if you issue "non-negotiable demands," (kids

if you are willing. This way, if your youngster can convince you that others in her class are staying up until 2:00 a.m. at a ance, you can bend. That's if she can convince you: negotiation doesn't mean backing away from a parental responsibility you utterly believe in. 3. Spend time with your

children. Answer their quesions. When they want to talk, isten. If a child doesn't have an adult to talk with comfortably and learn things from, the child may find someone only a few years older than himself and a youth is a less reliable instructor than a parent. Get ready to talk about sex and drugs-and to defend your views with facts-and to have facts meaningful to the child, not just to your sense of what

Peer approval is one thing a child needs and a parent can't give. A parent can help a child to get it, and he can cause a child to lose it. And it is so important, that if a child can't get it while living at home, he gives serious thought to getting it away from home.

They flock to the city in droves, when the weather is warm, yearning to break loose, to try things, to find the an-swer to what life is all about. But though they go to find

people with answers, they find only people with the same questions. They seek the security of belonging to a group, but find the insecurity of discovering that they are alone. They find it gets awfully wet outside when it rains, and that it's awfully dangerous inside whether it rains or not. Their flowers wilt, and also their anger. And when the weather gets cold, or they see too much brutality, or hear of yet an-other OD (drug overdose) death, the kids realize that peace and love and happiness do not abound in the hippie section, and they go home.

In many cases-indeed in most!--the parents are wise enough, or at least muddle through well enough, so that it all doesn't happen in the first

Winterize Irrigation Equipment

College Station, Texas.—A little effort in winterizing irrigation equipment can save problems and repairs next season, says Wayne Keese, Extension agricultural engineer at Texas A&M University.

He advises producers to cover the discharge pipe of turbine pumps to keep rodents out and store portable pumps with other machinery. Water should be drained from centrifugal pumps to prevent freezing and rusting; and the openings should be covered with canvas or burlap to keep out dirt and leaves.

Gearheads should be drained while warm and then refilled with rust-preventive turbine oil. Lubricate drive shafts and store drive belts in a cool, dry place.

Aluminum pipe should be stacked on inclined racks to prevent damage by high winds and also provide drainage and air circulation. If the pipe is left in the field for the winter be sure to have the




