The latest official records now show the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces acknowledge holding 457 American prisoners of war in Southeast Asia, some for as

long as 6½ years.
The 457 are known prisoners. In addition, 1,090 Americans are listed as missing, including some thought to be alive and in enemy hands. Hanoi, of course, makes no mention of these men and refuses to answer any Red Cross queries about their fate. Of the 457 known prisoners, 376 are held in North Vietnam, 78 in South Vietnam and 3 in Laos, according to the Pentagon.

As I noted in my Oct. 7 telegram to President Nixon, following his latest peace proposal: "Once again, you have struck to the heart of the agonizing situation in Vietnam and in all of Indochina. I am particularly concerned with the final key point of your peace plan—the position of forgotten men.
