

The local girls will go to Denton this week end for the Regional play-offs.





Comptroller Robert S. Calvert asked Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin for an official opinion on Secretary of State Bob Bullock's plan to pay for the party primaries with

Bullock forced the issue to a head last week by handing Comptroller Calvert \$73 worth of initial pre-primary bills and asking him

Calvert balked and took

matter to Martin for advice. "I will not pay anything out of a written opinion from the attorney general or an order of the court," said Calvert. He added he does not think Martin will advise him to pay the bills submitted by Bullock.

"If the vouchers are, for some reason, not approved, I intend to place this question before the Texas Supreme Court at the earliest possible moment so that the entire matter of primary financing can be adequately, equitably and finally resolved," Bullock stated.

He moved with court authority to formulate rules for the primaries after a three-judge federal court January 20 struck down the filing fee law relied on to finance the Goy Preston spring elections. Smith proposes to transfer to him more than \$1 million for paying primary bills if the plan is finally cleared by legal authorities.

Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine accused Smith and Bullock of preempting prerogatives of the legislature, and said the governor should call an immediate special session to give lawmakers another whack at resolving the problem. Reps. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty and Jim Nugent of Kerrville defended Smith and Bullock and charged Price was trying to further his House speakership campaign. Daniel and Nugent are also seeking the speakership.







## Rehabilitation Goal Of Easter Seal Drive

Because of the steady growth in numbers of crippled children and adults in Texas, the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas has stepped up its rehabilitation services.

According to Mr. Raymond Hall, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Schleicher County, over 22,000 handicapped Texans ceived Easter Seal treatments dur-

"Despite medical scientific advances," he explained, "the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in past years.'

Quoting the annual report of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, he said that 19 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas They include treatment and rehabilitation centers, sheltered work-shops, recreation and educational programs, and many others.

"Through these programs, persons with a wide variety of handicaps receive the help they need to live normal lives," Mr. Hall said.

The largest group includes those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple scelerosis and stroke. The Easter Seal Campaign, which provides funds for continuation of these services, begins February 28 and continues through Easter Sunday, April 2.

Garment Labeling

A new era in the care of wearing apparel will soon begin for consuners as a result of a permanent labling trade rule by the Federal Trade Commission.

Effective July 3, 1972, the rule will cover articles leaving manufacturing plants after that date. Manufacturers will be required to place permanent labels concerning care on most finished extisted that on most finished articles of clothing and certain textile products in the form of piece goods. Any textile product in the form of wearing apparel must have a label or tag permanently affixed which clearly gives instructions for care and maintenance of the article.

In addition, any textile product in the form of piece goods which will be used by the consumer to make an article of clothing, must be accompanied by a label or tag which clearly gives instructions for care and maintenance. The label must be in a form that can be permanently affixed to the finished article by the consumer by normal household methods.

The rulings by the FTC were based on technological advances Every article requires different care because of the large number of textile products on the market with a variety of fibers, combinations of fibers and special finishes. It has been almost impossible for the consumer to be informed or recall information about any one product.

Care labeling instructions must fully inform the buyer what regular care and maintenance is necessary for the ordinary use of the article. Washing, drying, ironing, bleaching and drycleaning instruc-tions must be included. Instructions should also warn which care and maintenance procedures will harm the product.
