

#### HIGHWAY WORK INITIATED

Austin, Tex.— Work totaling nearly \$6 million was initiated by the Texas Highway Department for highway safety improvement projects during the months of May, June and July. This brings to \$218 million the amount of purely safety oriented work since 1965.

These safety projects were selected for their potential to reduce accidents and the severity of accidents rather than to increase traffic capacity or general traffic serviceability. These projects are in addition to normal increased safety features involved in new construction and reconstruction.

During the three-month period, the Highway Department accepted bids on 14 contracts and initiated work on 68 projects involving departmental labor. In addition, bids were accepted on 14 Federal Aid projects which involved safety improvement work.

Of the total three-month figure for financing, the Federal government contributed \$580 thousand while Texas Highway Dept. provided \$5.3 million.

The rancher needs to know the problems that exist on his ranch. usually the most revealing deter- of "Ask, Seek, and Knock spells mination that can be made regarding problems. After determining that certain plants are the most desirable for his range, and that he wants to improve the range condition, he will then take steps necessary to get the job done.

By a range survey the amount of desirable plants helps determine the range condition of the site. This understanding of range condition helps the ranchman to know how much the range has deteriorated from what it was originally.


Condition class as used by the Soil Conservation Service is not only a measure of the kinds and amount of the plants that are on the range, but it is also a measure of the severity of range deterioration. The range in poor condition is a "sick range." The range is devoid of adequate cover and erosion is occurring as well as the loss of needed rainfall or by consumption of worthless weeds or

brush type plants. If the range is presently deteriorating, an immediate problem exists, and there is urgent need to make adjustments in the operations.

Range condition is primarily the result of the grazing use, past and present, made of the vegetation, associated with the environmental factors such as drought, fire and brush, and weed invasion An understanding of how grazing use affects the various plants on the range is essential to understand fully the problems.

How plants grow, their response to grazing, critical growth periods, and what these mean to the rancher in his use of the vegetation are the key points in conservation planning for rangeland. Plants grazed too close cannot continue vigorous growth and compete with plants ungrazed or lightly grazed. Due to ilvestock preferences, some climax plants are decreasers and others increasers. Continued grazing pressure may even cause the disappearance of increasers. As the better plants are grazed out, openings appear and then seed of weedy and woody invaders can germinate and become established.

In developing a conservation plan the possibility of a drought should be considered. Dry years have always been problems to contend with and always will be. How well the range manager prepares for a drought may determine how successful his conservation plan is, for it is during these times that the greatest amount of damage is done to grasslands. The maintenance of forage reserves in terms of stored feed or reserve pastures, but flexibility of the livestock should be the key.

"Carefully sight in all rifles and handguns," suggests Shult. "This will not only prevent disappointment over a missed shot but also will help the shooter get the 'feel' of his weapon again.

To sight in center-fire rifles, use the bullet weights and powder charges that you expect to use in the field. Determine sighting distances by the type of game to be hunted and the likely terrain. As a rule of thumb, shot groupings from 50, 100 and 200 yards will prepare the hunter for most situa-

The specialist suggests that handguns be sighted in for distances up to 60 yards. Accuracy is difficult at greater distances. Remember, range safety is of critical importance with all firearms but especially with handguns, cautions Shult. For the shotgun enthusiast, the specialist suggests getting in a little
