## 80% Of Interstate Routes Are Now Open In Texas

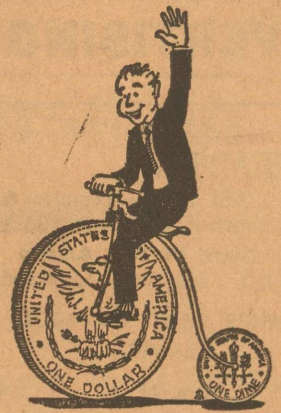
Austin, Tex.—More than 80% of Texas' 3,176 miles of designated Interstate Highways are improved and open to traffic.

According to a report by the Federal Highway Administration, Texas had 2,525 miles of the Interstate system under rubber on June 30. That is more miles than any other state will have when the system is completed in the late 1970's. California, the second state in designated mileage, had 1,941 miles of its 2,288 system completed.

The system already is paying big dividends. Travel is proving to be twice as safe on Interstate highways than the old travel facilities they replace.

While the benefits in safety and convenience derived from better highways are readily apparent, economic benefits often are overlooked. Economists estimate that the highway users will have saved \$37 billion more when finished.

Cut 'Invites Disaster'

Dallas (Spl.)—Sen. George McGovern is "inviting disaster" when he advocates cutting the nation's defense budget by 30%. Republican Congressional candidate Doug Harlan said here Monday. "Strong national defense is essential to peace," Harlan told Republican state convention delegates from the 21st District attending a reception in his honor at the Statler Hilton Hotel. "Those, like McGovern, who seek peace by reducing our military strength are inviting disaster," the 29-year-old San Antonio educator said. In addition to endangering our defense posture in the world, reductions as large as McGovern's could mean the firing of as many as 30% of all civilian employees at military installations in the 21st District, Harlan noted. "This would be a severe detriment to the economies of San Antonio, San Angelo and Del Rio," he said. Harlan said he is convinced that McGovern's defense proposals would weaken America's military strength to the point that we would no longer be a first-rate power. Regarding his campaign, Harlan said, "it is going well, especially in West Texas where many Democrats are in favor of making a change and they now feel they have someone to change to." Voters in the district realize the importance of re-electing President Nixon the candidate said "and they know that only half the job is done if they do not support Harlan, too." Harlan, who was in Dallas Monday and Tuesday attending the Republican state convention, is seeking the 21st District House seat currently held by Democrat Rep. Ovie Clark Fisher of San Angelo.

But the total look depends on the natural beauty of the hair itself. There are five points to remember in utilizing the most valuable accessory—your hair. The first has to do with the cut. Hair with a good cut holds its set longer and looks thicker. There is a need for a trim every few months in order to catch split ends. It's important to catch them early because split ends travel up the hair shaft much the same way a run does on a stocking. Both the frequency and the method of washing hair is important. Whenever hair loses its body and bounce, it's time to wash it. In general, you should wash your hair at least once a week, but if it's extra oily, even daily shampooing will not damage it. Work up the lather well, massage the scalp and rinse completely. Any residue left from improper rinsing can dull the hair. Conditioning is the third point to consider. There's a conditioner for every hair problem—dry, limp, dull, porous, brittle, over-permanented, over-bleached, over-straightened or any combination of these. Diagnose the problem and use the right conditioner regularly for best results. Next, stimulate the scalp with the fingertips to increase blood circulation and with a natural bristle brush to bring out the natural oils and prevent dryness and brittleness. And fifth, a well-balanced diet is needed to keep the shine in hair. Even if hair is damaged by summer sun and salt water, paying attention to these five points will gradually improve its health and appearance. ### Eldorado-Divide District News

"EFFECTIVE CONSERVATION"

The Great Plains Conservation Program is proving to be an added tool for effective conservation on farms and ranches in Schleicher county. Since the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District was activated into the Great Plains Conservation Program in 1962, 30 contracts on 74,074 acres have been prepared. All conservation practices planned on 14 contracts totaling 32,509 acres have been completed and the contracts have expired.

Reseeding rangeland and brush control have been two of the cost-share practices that have been used by all but a few producers. To date 22,413 acres of range seeding has been completed on 22 places. Brush control totaling 33,044 acres on 28 places has been completed.

Permanent fencing, another key to the proper management of grass, has been constructed on 13 places for a total of 87,068 feet. Fencing makes possible rotation grazing, which gives grass a chance to recover and to reseed. This means more forage can be produced for a more stable economic return for the producer. Fencing also permits deferred grazing while new grasses are being established.

Water for livestock use is essential to the proper distribution of grazing and the range resource. To date producers in the GPCP have installed 12 water storage tanks, nine wells for livestock water and

20,789 feet of pipeline for livestock water.

Dryland farmers have also taken advantage of the Great Plains Conservation Program to establish the needed conservation practices on their farms. Level terraces have been constructed on six farms totaling 81,135 feet. Diversion terraces amounting to 8894 feet have been constructed by four producers.

Land leveling and irrigation pipeline are two cost-share conservation practices used by irrigation farmers. Land leveling has been done on four farms totaling 161 acres. Since irrigation water is limited and sometimes costly, it is very important to install an efficient irrigation system to make efficient use of both water and soil.

Management type conservation practices as well as enduring type practices have been applied and maintained by all GPCP producers. Rangeland totaling 63,115 acres is deferred for at least three months during the growing season one year out of three. Following range seeding the pasture is deferred from the beginning of the growing season until after frost for two successive years. All the young grass seedlings that come up have an opportunity to become established and make seed. Grasses already

growing become more vigorous and more forage is produced for livestock and wildlife use.

Proper grazing use on the 63,115 acres of rangeland is applied each year. Grazing half and leaving half of each year's growth helps continue the range improvement until maximum potential production is reached. Growing more grass and then properly using it enables ranchers to attain maximum potential production.

Participation in the Great Plains Conservation Program is fully voluntary on the part of the individual farmer or rancher. However, to participate in the program farmers and ranchers are required to develop a complete long-range plan for making the needed changes in his land use or in his cropping system needed to conserve the soil and water resources. Then the farmer or rancher (producer) enters into an agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out the plan according to a schedule acceptable to the producer—but within 10 years. The cost share for the entire job is set aside when the agreement is signed. Cost sharing is paid as the producer completes each practice according to standards and specifications.
