## Walter N. Ramsay Dies At Age Of 90

Walter Newton Ramsay, son of the late J. W. Ramsay and Sue Matthews Ramsay of Gonzales, died by and browse around. Friday morning, Sept. 15th, at the age of 90 in the Schleicher County Medical Center after a short illness. Services were held at 4:00 p.m. Saturday in the First Baptist church with the pastor, the Rev. Kenneth Vaughan, officiating. Interment was made in the Eldorado cemetery under direction of Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home.

He was born November 1, 1881, in Gonzales, where he lived until he moved to Eldorado in October, 1911.

He was married to Miss Orlean Sample in Gonzales on Sept. 12, 1906. Their 66th wedding anniver- Fall. sary had just occurred at the time of his death. He was a member of the Baptist church here in Eldorado, and was a charter member of the Eldorado Lions Club when it was organized in May, 1928. He was on the Board of Trustees of the Eldorado schools and was active in the many civic undertakings of the community. He served as County and District Clerk clerk, and was postmaster in Eldorado for many years. He represented the Standard-Times here for a number of years.

#### Spray Cattle For Ticks

Livestockmen in Schleicher county should be on the lookout for ticks on cattle. Seasonal infestation is heavy in some coastal counties and is spreading into other areas of the state. The insect pests irritate livestock and reduce production efficiency. Another major problem with ticks this year is that they can cause secondary infestations of screwworms which are so numerous. The screwworm fly is readily attracted to any minor wound so all tick infestation should be treated as soon as detected. Numerous materials are avail-

able for use in controlling ticks.
