

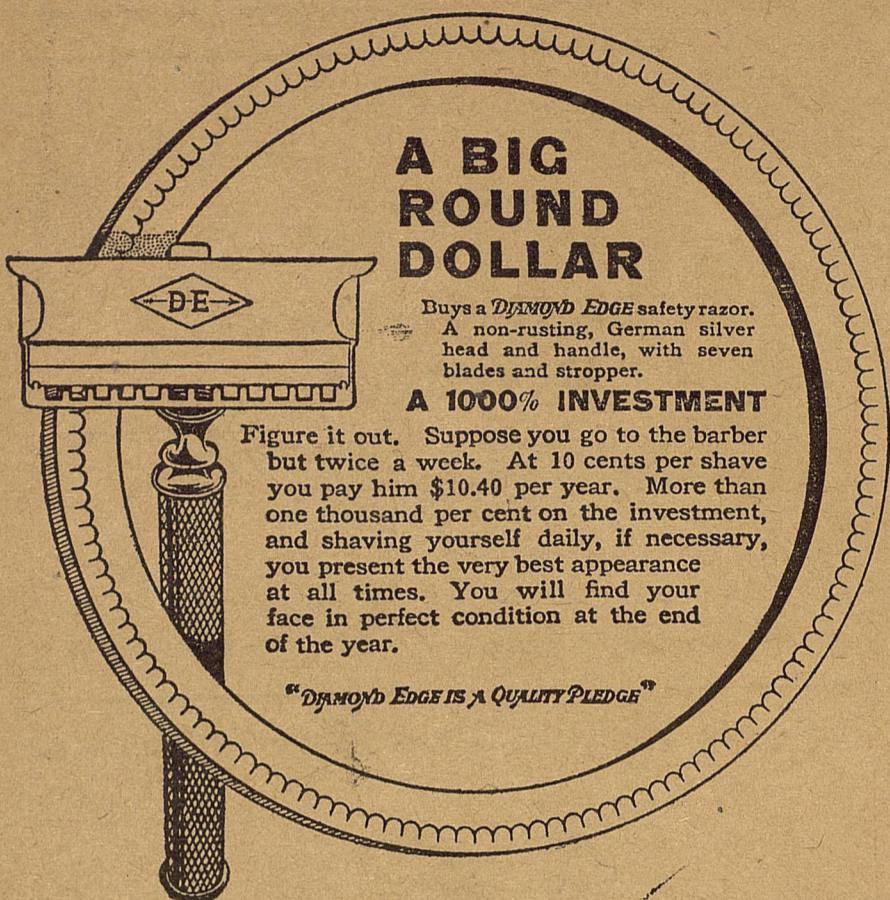

McCormick, lets have the number you intend to plant and let us say again that we believe that more money can be put in circulation in Schleicher county by the sale of 1000 bales of cotton raised ginned and sold here than they would the sale of 10,000 head of cattle, but others may differ from us.

TEXAS WELFARE COMMISSION

Commercial Secretaries Appointed Commission to Investigate Industrial Conditions.

The Welfare Commission which the Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association of Texas has organized will hold sessions in Dallas, Ft. Worth, San Antonio, Houston and other cities in Texas and hear the views of men of affairs on the needs of Texas. The following are a few of the questions which the Commission will undertake to answer:

Sixty-eight per cent of the farmers of Texas do not own their farms. WHY?

We need 50,000 miles more of railroads in Texas and there is not a mile of road under construction in the State today. WHY?

We have 140,000 miles of unimproved public highways and during the past ten years we have permanently improved only 2,900. WHY?

We have 1200 miles of navigable rivers but no steamboat lines ply our waters. WHY?

We buy from other States \$75,000,000 worth of feed stuff annually. WHY?

According to estimates of the Farmers' Union it costs 12 1/2 cents per pound to raise cotton and it sells for less price. WHY?

We owe \$1,100,000,000 to parties outside the State and will have to borrow ten billion more to develop our resources and yet large insurance companies and other sources of cheap money are not doing business in Texas. WHY?

The Farmers' Union report that they are paying 8 and 10 per cent for money loaned on cotton in their warehouses, although cotton is the best security in the world. WHY?

Texas cattle are rated by the Federal Agricultural Department at \$14.79 head and Illinois cattle at \$28.02 head. WHY?

There is shipped into Texas 100 car loads of cured meats per week. WHY?

Texas farmers haul \$1,200,000 material per day to the foreign market. WHY?

We raise between three and four billion of cotton annually and export only 40,000 bales. WHY?

Railroad Commission of Texas has the railroad property at \$210,000,000, the Tax Commission at \$429,000,000 and the Tax Assessor at \$1,000,000,000. WHY?

WEALTH OF FARMER GROWS THE FASTEST

RURAL INCREASE 117 PER CENT AGAINST CITY'S 59

121 NEW TOWNS IN TEXAS

During the past decade the value of our property assessed as town and city lots, which includes the lands and buildings within our city limits, has advanced in value from \$189,760,828 in 1900 to \$506,255,238 in 1910, making an increase of \$317,495,410 or 167 per cent, but city property not being rendered at its true value it is likely that its actual increase in value will exceed \$600,000,000. No attempt is made to separate the value of the buildings from the value of the land within our city limits by either the State Comptroller or the Federal Census Bureau and the information is therefore not available.

The Federal Census shows that we have built 121 new cities during the past decade, and our city population has increased from 559,872 in 1900 to 938,104 in 1910, making an increase of 378,232 or 67 per cent. We now have twenty cities with ten thousand population and over, and three cities that approximate 100,000 in population.

The per capita increase in wealth of city population, taking the assessed value of city lots and buildings as a basis, has advanced from \$339 in 1900 to \$540 in 1910, making an increase of \$201 per capita or 59 per cent.

Compare these figures with those of the per capita increase in farm wealth and we find the farmer has made an increase of 117 per cent against an increase of 59 per cent within our cities. These figures prove that we have greater opportunities on the farm for money making than in the city and if our citizenship could fully appreciate the force of this comparison it would turn the tide of our population back to the soil.

Texas has probably suffered less from the rush of its citizenship from the farm to the city than any other State in the Union. While our cities have shown a rapid increase in population our farms have considerably more than held their own. Our cities have been built up by immigration, inter-state and foreign, and have drawn very little from the farms.

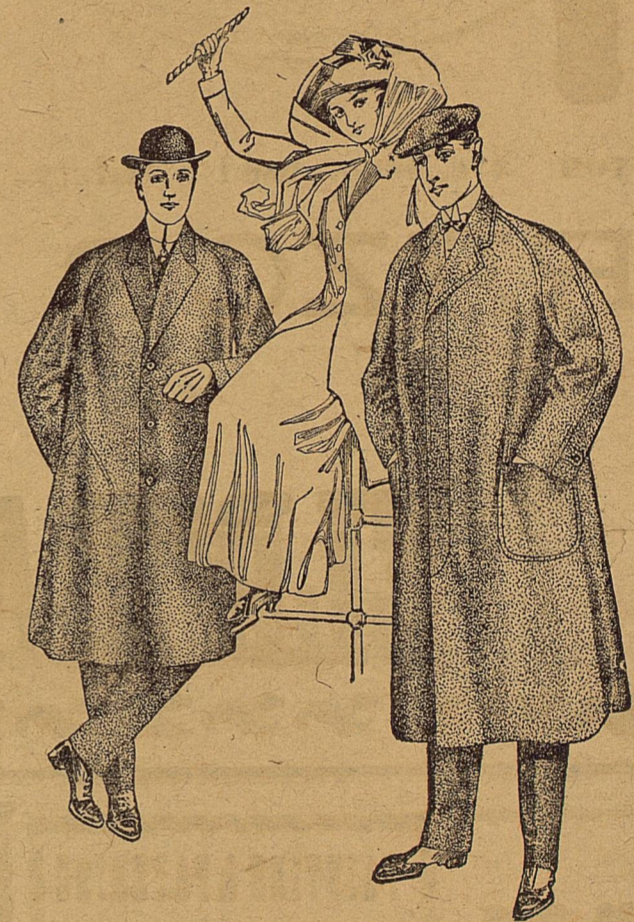

WHITES INCREASE FASTER THAN NEGROES.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 26—Director Durand of the Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce and Labor, has just issue a preliminary statement giving for each state and territory of continental United States the distribution of the population according to the elements of race, nativity and parentage, as by the returns of the Thirteenth Decennial Census taken as of April 15th, 1910.

The foreign element is proportionally greatest in the New England and Middle Atlantic divisions. On the contrary, in nearly all of the Southern states more than two thirds of the total population is native white of native birth.

In 1900 the total white population of the state was 73.8 per cent. This increased in 1910 to 76.1 per cent. On the other hand, the negroes, who represented 20.4 per cent of the entire population of the state in 1900, decreased in 1910 to 17.7 per cent.

W. B. Silliman Wants Demonstration Agent For Schleicher Co.

W. B. Silliman has been in correspondent with J. W. Butcher in regards to securing a Demonstration Agent for Schleicher county, and below is a letter received from Mr. Butcher.

Mr. W. B. Silliman, Eldorado, Texas.

Dear Sir;

In order to secure a Demonstration Agent for your county it will be necessary for your people to cooperate with the Department to the extent of standing half the expence of the agents salary, as others counties in the state are doing at this time. This fund may be secured through the County Commissioners or the Commercial organization. It is my understanding, the Department are placing new men, in new territories, at Eighty Dollars per month, ten months services in the season. If this is correct, it would only be necessary for your county to put up \$400, which would pay half the salary for agent the Department would place in charge of the work, and they would pay the remaining \$400, and look after the work of the Agent.

The matter should be taken up with Mr. Mm. Ganzer, Assistant State Agent, Denton, Texas, as he has charge of the work in this section of the state. If you are able to get the cooperation of your people necessary, I am sure Mr. Ganzer will be pleased to place the best man available in charge of the work at once. Assuring you I am pleased to render any futher service in the matter that may be at my command. Hoping to hear from you again at your convenience, I am,

Textile Mill For Post City.

Ft. Worth, Tex. Dec., 30—It is reported that C. W. Post millionaire food manufacturer and founder of Post City will establish a textile mill in Post City, construction to begin at once and the plant to be ready for the 1912 cotton crop. The mill will have 10,000 spindles, a capacity of about 2,000,000 yards of finished cloth annually and will give employment to about 200 men.



SAN ANTONIO TO BE CONNECTED WITH SAN ANGELO BY RAIL.

San Antonio, Texas, Dec. 30—Contracts have been signed and construction work will begin February 1st, 1912, on the proposed railroad which will extend from this city to San Angelo where it will connect with the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad and south to Crowther. In the northern part of McMullen county it will branch, one extending to Rockport and Aransas Harbor and the other to points in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

British capital is behind this project and purposes developing the Crowther oil and gas fields. The oil will be transporting to the seacoast and the gas will be used for manufacturing purposes and to light all trains running over the new road.

It is estimated that the whole project will cost approximately \$40,000,000.
