Joiner & **Kotsch win** school board election

John Paul Joiner and Jo Helen Kotsch were selected by local voters Saturday from a field of five candidates to fill two seats of the Schleicher County ISD board of

Joiner was the top vote getter, with 230 votes. Kotsch received 166 while Lee Ann Higgins polled 138 votes. Victor Belman received 49 votes and Timothy Vasquez received 25. In the at-large format, the two candidates with the mostvotes are elected. In all, 319 voters cast ballots in the election with 145 of those coming during the Early Voting period. 174 individuals voted during Election Day voting on Saturday. Complete election results are listed below

This will be Joiner's first term on the board. Kotsch, was the only incumbent.

Interestingly, one of the candidates, Victor Belman, is a plaintiff in a lawsuit brought against the school district, challenging the legality of the two at-large seats on the seven member board.

A settlement in that lawsuit appears to be in the works. If and when it is finalized, the school district will go through the redistricting process again and abandon the 5-2 (five single-member district, two at-large) voting scheme in favor of a 6-1 plan.





Under a 1944 treaty, Mexico is supposed to allow 350,000 acre-Perry said that down the road feet of water (one acre-foot desalinated water could be carried amounts to 325,851 gallons) into the Rio Grande each year.

The U.S., in turn, must allow 1.5 million acre-feet from the Colorado into the international river.

This country has been providing its share, but Mexico, blaming a persistent drought, has not.

Bottom line: Water is a big issue in Texas and it will continue to become more important as the state population grows.


TXU Lone Star Pipeline (TXU LSP), a division of TXU Gas Company, hereby gives notice of intent to establish a supplemental firm transportation rate and an interruptible transportation rate designed to recover the costs of constructing and operating a 76.5-mile, 24-inch pipeline extending from the Bridgeport area in Wise County to the junction of Lines W and W7 in Denton County and then in an easterly direction to the junction of Lines D 17-9 and D9 in Collin County, hereinafter called the "Northside Project." The supplemental firm rate and interruptible rate are proposed to be charged upon the initiation of service on the Northside Project. The proposed supplemental firm rate constitutes a major change and will result in an annual increase in the revenues of TXU LSP of approximately \$9.8 million. These revenues will represent an 8% increase in the total revenues of TXU LSP.

The proposed supplemental firm transportation rate will be applicable to all firm transportation customers contracting for capacity on the Northside Project. The only current customer directly affected by the supplemental firm transportation rate will be TXU Gas Distribution. No other customer has agreed to contract for firm capacity on the Northside Project. The supplemental firm rate may, however, indirectly affect all residential and commercial customers served by TXU Gas Distribution in the state of Texas. The supplemental firm rate will be assessed to TXU Gas Distribution for its contracted capacity on the Northside Project in addition to the city gate rate approved in the Railroad Commission of Texas (Commission) Gas Utilities Docket (GUD) No. 8976. The supplemental firm rate may then be passed on to TXU Gas Distribution's residential and commercial customers. If any other transportation customers contract for firm capacity on the Northside Project, those customers may also pay the supplemental firm transportation rate in addition to any other applicable rates charged such customers.

TXU LSP also proposes an interruptible transportation rate for the use of the Northside Project. To the extent that shippers other than firm transportation customers use the Northside Project, they will be charged this interruptible rate. TXU LSP proposes to reduce the proposed supplemental firm transportation rate charged to firm customers on the Northside Project through an annual revenue crediting mechanism based on revenues from the interruptible rate approved in this proceeding.

Construction of the Northside Project is estimated to be completed in approximately 23 months after approval of this rate application. The proposed supplemental firm rate and interruptible rate will be effective on June 4, 2002, but will not be charged until the initiation of service on the Northside Project and will be charged for an initial seven year period. TXU LSP further proposes to reconcile the projected capital costs with those actually incurred and to adjust the supplemental firm transportation rate and interruptible transportation rate accordingly.


