As late sorghum begins to bloom, producers should consider the possibility of damage by the sorghum midge. This insect is one of the most damaging pests of grain sorghum in the state. Loss estimates have exceeded \$10 million in Texas several years since 1950.

Midge control is not required where early uniform planting of grain sorghum is carried out. Howver, when grain sorghum is planted late, control of the sorghum nidge is often needed. ghum midge attacks grain sorghum, weet sorghum, johnsongrass, su langrass, broomcorn and certain wild grasses. By mid-summer nidge populations begin to reach the levels that are capable of causng economic damage in late grain

Inspections should be made in sorghum fields as blooming begins. The female midge deposits eggs in individual florets during the blooming period. Once 5 or more sorghum midges are found per head, control measures are needed.

Control measures should be applied when about 50% of the heads have begun to bloom where adults are present in the field. If adults are present 3 to 5 days later, immediately apply a second treatment. Where the yield potential is high and midge are abundant, three applications may be justified at 3-day intervals.

Additional information is available at your county extension office on the sorghum midge in the form of a Fact Sheet, L 842, The Sorghum Mdge and Its Control, and MP-339, Texas Guide For Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghum and Small Grains.

### Gill Reports Fisher **Performance Record** Drops Again

San Antonio, Tex.—Republican Congressional candidate Dick Gill today released the second in a series of box score reports on the performance of his opponent, Ovie Clark Fisher, and noted that the report reflected an even further drop in Mr. Fisher's 28-year record of lack of accomplishment.

"At the date of my last report,"
Gill said, "Mr. Fisher had a career batting average of .023; that average has now dropped off to .022. Basically, this means that Mr. Fisher is becoming less effective the longer he stays in Congress. He can be expected to get his job done just over 2% of the time.

Gill also took the occasion to point out a number of inaccuracies in Mr. Fisher's own claims of accomplishment. Among them: —The Amistad Dam, for which Mr. Fisher takes credit, was authorized by legislation sponsored by former Texas Rep. Joe Kilgore.

-The San Angelo Reclamation Pro-iect, claimed by Mr. Fisher as being his work, was authorized by a bill sponsored by Sen. Lyndon Baines Johnson.

The National Wool Act of 1954 for which Mr. Fisher takes credit. was in fact part of the 1954 Agri culture Act which was sponsored by Kansas Rep. Clifford L. Hope. (Mr. Fisher did introduce one amendment to the section of the Act dealing with wool, but it was

passed by the House and claimed as his own by Mr. Fisher, was in reality a bi-partisan bill sponsored by 24 members of the House Post Office Committee—none of whom were named Fisher.






