Dry, windy weather keeps fire crew busy

Area Remains Under Critical Fire Condition

Eldorado firefighters, joined others across West Texas this in battling a series of grass fires whipped by 50-mph winds. Dry conditions also contributed to the wildfires.

Most of the fires were scattered across counties north and west of Schleicher. But there were fires within the county, including one on the C.R. Sproul Ranch, and a grass fire in town that threatened the Buzz McCormick home. (see photo at right)

Local firefighters were dispatched to assist Crockett County firefighters Monday night as fires spared in Crockett, Upton, Reagan, Irion, Glasscock, Sterling, Tom Green and Coke counties.

The gusty and dry conditions were so bad that the National Weather Service Storm Prediction Center on Monday issued an "Extremely Critical" fire weather warning for the second time this year.

At one point Monday night, the citizens of Robert Lee in Coke County were ordered to evacuate their homes. Hundreds of Robert Lee residents were directed to Bronte where shelters had been prepared. Later that night the townspeople were allowed to return to Robert Lee, but

homeowners living around Lake Spence were not allowed to return.

"Evacuations may be a tactic today," said Les Rogers, assistant chief regional fire coordinator with Texas Forest Service said on Monday. "Conditions similar to those we are facing today have directly impacted, threatened and caused the loss of whole communities in the past three years' fire seasons. We will see California Santa Ana-like winds in part of the state today.

West Texas grasses and vegetation are extremely dry. With the gusty winds predicted through Thursday, any fire that starts can travel up to 1,000 acres in 30 minutes – equal to a football field per minute.

"Citizens must be aware that they may have to self-evacuate to a safe area if a wildfire threatens. This is a dangerous situation and fires burning in these conditions will progress faster than a human can possibly run," said Mark Stanford, chief of fire operations for Texas Forest Service.

Jeffs taken to Arizona to face second round of charges

Warren Jeffs, the jailed prophet of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints is now in the custody of Arizona officials. He was picked up in Utah on Tuesday by authorities from Mohave County Arizona and transported to Kingman, Arizona where he is due to stand trial on charges of arranging the marriage of two underage girls to older men, similar to the charges for which he was convicted in Utah last year.

Jeffs was due to make his first Arizona court appearance on Wednesday, some 2 1/2 years after he was first charged. The charges sent Jeffs into hiding and eventually landed him on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted List.

He was apprehended near Nevada in 2006 and convicted in Utah last year on two charges of rape as and accomplice. He received two consecutive 5 year to life prison sentences for those two convictions.

Now comes Arizona's turn. Jeffs was indicted there last year on four counts of incest and four counts of sexual contact with a minor.

Jeffs' attorney Mike Piccarreta has already announced his plans to ask for a change of venue in hopes of having the trial moved away from Kingman. And... it's not surprise that Mohave County Attorney Matt Smith is opposed to moving the trial.

If Jeffs is convicted of the Arizona charges he will most likely finish serving his time in Utah before finishing his sentence in Arizona.

County purchases truck, eyes funding needs at golf course

Nancy Lester and Oscar Martinez met with the Schleicher County Commissioners court Monday, February 25, 2008, to speak on behalf of the Eldorado Golf Club. They asked the commissioners for a \$6,000 increase in the county's contribution to the golf course so that the grounds keeper's salary could be increased.

Commissioner Lynn Meador asked about other pending expenditures, such as the club's riding mower. Oscar Martinez responded that the current mower is worn out and would need to be replaced.

Commissioner Matt Brown explained that the county's budget is already set and suggested they should have made their request when the budget was being worked on. The Commissioner Court said they would consider the requested and asked for prices on a new mower, but took no action the matter.

The court then proceeded to open two sealed bids for a new dump truck for the road department. One bid was rejected because it did not meet the bid specifications on the truck's gear reduction rear axle. The court accepted the second bid in the amount of \$113,755 for a Mack truck with a 16 ft. bed from Bruckner's Truck Sales.

The commissioners then tabled several agenda items. Items tabled were the ambulance bid, stray dog issue and purchase of a backhoe and tractor for county use. The court did approved purchasing a two year old 10 ft. Bush Hog shredder in the amount of \$4,500.00.

Re-Liberators

BAGHDAD, IRAQ--"Greeted as liberators" has become one of the most scoffed-at phrases of the Iraq War. But a top U.S. general here plays on the phrase in describing security gains during the past year. "In some ways," he says, "our soldiers have come to be seen as re-liberators."

The neologism seems apt in the crisp, cool dusk of a Saturday evening in a Sunni neighborhood here in the Dora section of

this city.



American soldiers, who a few months ago couldn't venture here without being shot at, are mobbed by clamoring children as soon as they

leave their vehicles. Stores are open on a street that was deserted just months ago. An American captain -- "the mayor" of the neighborhood -- is greeted by name by an Iraqi boy who runs up to shake his hand, and two women approach him to ask about being hired by the Iraqi government as teachers.

The neighborhood is a showcase of a counterinsurgency campaign that has emphasized securing the population and getting to know local players. "We live in the neighborhood," explains Col. Ricky Gibbs. "How did we get there? We moved to the sound of the guns." It took months of combat for his troops to roust al-Qaida and establish outposts in his section of the city. Once it became clear that the Americans weren't going anywhere, "the people came out in droves."

The Army has contracted with an influential (and very brave) local doctor-turned-businessman in the neighborhood for road repairs, trash pickup and electricity generation. All of which means local jobs.

The question now is whether the enhanced security will harden into -- in a phrase the U.S. military uses often now -- "irreversible momentum" that will make the second liberation more enduring than the first, even as the U.S. begins to draw down the additional brigades of the surge.

It should be the Shia-dominated Iraqi central government contracting with people like the doctor. It can't (out of incompetence) or won't (out of sectarian motives). "We've had an American awakening and a Sunni awakening," he says, referring to the surge and the Sunni turn away from the insurgency. "Now we need a government awakening."

The central government hasn't attempted to consolidate change bubbling from below. There are 80,000 mostly Sunni security volunteers seeking integration into official security forces or transition into civilian jobs. There are volunteer teachers -- like those petitioning the American captain -- who await government salaries. Yet the government has left billions of dollars in revenue unspent.

In the meantime, we fill the gap, in keeping with the military's axiom that "money is ammunition." Commanders use discretionary funds at their disposal to contract for services and provide seed money for businesses.

"I can't spend it fast enough," Col. Gibbs says. This so-called CERP funding will run out in the summer, and Gen. Petraeus is asking for \$480 million more of it. Congress would be scandalously foolish to reject him.

Everyone acknowledges that Iraq's progress is fragile. The country is still violent, al-Qaida hasn't been totally vanquished, and the Shia south has its own alarming problems. But we have to try to capitalize on the opportunities created by the surge. There's not going to be a third liberation.




My old mamma's oft-repeated line comes to mind in these days of overbearing campaign coverage.

Clinton suggested her experience should make her the clear choice for Democratic voters. Obama asked for voters' help in his effort to change the nation's capital from a place "where good ideas go to die" and work with him to help America "live up to its promise" of liberty and justice for all.

Forty-thousand people applied to attend the debate in the UT recreation center, but admittance was limited to 1,000. Pro-Hillary and Pro-Barack crowds gathered outside the building and engaged in loud but peaceful volleys of chants.

Thousands more attended political rallies and debate watches were held at Sholz Garten, the Austin Music Hall and the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

To cap the debate, an Obama rally the following evening in downtown Austin drew a crowd estimated at 30,000. The city of Austin closed off streets near the rally to vehicular traffic.

Meanwhile, Republican candidates U.S. Sen. John McCain of Arizona, former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee, and U.S. Rep. Ron Paul of Clute scheduled appearances in various cities in advance of the Texas GOP primary.

Party primaries are set for March 4, and early voting ends Feb. 29.

SMU chosen as Bush library site

The future site of the George W. Bush Presidential Library will be Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

The SMU board of trustees announced Feb. 22 it had reached an agreement with the George W. Bush. Presidential Library Foundation.

SMU is first lady Laura Bush's alma mater. Yale University, President Bush's alma mater, was in the running among eight potential sites.

A "Presidential Center," to be built on SMU's main campus, will consist of the presidential library containing Bush administration documents and artifacts, a museum with permanent and traveling exhibits and an independent public policy institute.

The library and museum will be operated by the National Archives and Records Administration.


Bush was elected to two consecutive terms as governor of Texas and served from 1995 until 2000, when he resigned to run for president.
