Evans played a video tape for the men about progress the coalition has made in upgrading the corridor route, including U.S. 277 to a four-lane divided highway. Schleicher County and the City of Eldorado have been dues-paying members of the coalition in recent years. The commissioners briefly discussed paying dues for another year but took no action on the matter. Evans noted that he would be appearing at a meeting of the Eldorado City Council later that evening.

In other business the commissioners nero a public hearing regarding the closure of County Road 115, in the southwest portion of the county, as a public roadway. No citizens appeared to address the issue and the men voted unanimously to close the road. It was noted that the road currently only serves one residence.

Bids were then received for a transport load of diesel fuel with Griffin Fuels submitting the only bid, that of eighty three cents per gallon. The men awarded the bid to Griffin Fuels.

Next, it was noted that no bids had been received for repairing and painting the exterior of the Schleicher County Public Library.





He was a long-time resident of Eldorado and worked for many years in the oil field as a pumper.



Osteoporosis, a disease that gradually weakens bones until they become fragile and more likely to break; it is a silent but severely debilitating disease. It can lead to pain, height loss, "humped" back, disability and dependence. Calcium and exercise can help prevent osteoporosis. However, many women who take calcium still suffer from osteoporosis unknowingly-until a broken bone brings the disease to light. the bone already lost. After years of steady bone loss, a minor pull or even an ordinary step off a curb can lead to a broken wrist, ankle, or worse, a hip. Women who survived a broken hip often become permanently disabled.

### **Farm Service** Agency conservation funding

The ranking period for the 2002 Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) is scheduled to end March 29, 2002. Although applications can be made at any time, they must be filed by March 29th to be considered during this ranking period.

This program is designed to assist producers with environmental conservation practices such as brush control, pear control, livestock pipelines, concrete storage facilities, years with cost shares up to 75%. Applicants bid against other producers in our statewide area based on a environmental point system. If interested, please contact our USDA Service Center for an appointment to apply. Joint appointments will be set up with Farm Service Agency and Natural Resources Conservation Service, since both agencies administer the program.


