Schleicher Included In Oil Production

Dallas, Tex.—In the face of unprecedented demand, Texas oil fields last year produced almost 1.3-billion barrels of crude oil, an all-time record for the state. This figure was tops among the nation's oil-producing states and represented some 38% of total U. S. production, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

These figures show an increase of more than 67.8-million barrels over production in 1971. They reflect that during the last nine months of the year, the Texas Railroad Commission maintained a maximum efficient production for Texas fields. This marked the first time Texas wells had produced all-out since 1948.

Last year's crude oil production, recorded in 203 of the state's 254 counties, was valued at some \$4.5 billion.

In 83 years of recorded production, Texas has produced nearly 37-billion barrels of oil, about 36% of total U. S. production.

Schleicher county, which has recorded production since 1937, last year produced 1,604,271 barrels of oil at the rate of 4,383 barrels a day. Production in 1972 boosted Schleicher's production total thru the end of the year to 58,942,691.

The clinic of Schleicher County Medical Center will be closed Monday, although the hospital will remain open to take care of emergencies.


Most retail stores, however, will remain open Monday.

Swimming Pool To Open

The county swimming pool is all set to open for the summer season tomorrow—Friday, May 25th—with Fred and Flora Riley as managers again this year.

The pool will be operated about the same as in the past. It will be open each afternoon except on Mondays when it is closed all day.

The Rileys ask that all bathers have regular swim suits rather than old clothing modified for swimwear. Such old clothing ravel off scraps of cloth and thread which clog the pool filtering system.



Austin, Tex.—The first overall revision of the Texas penal code in more than a century is nearing final passage as the legislature plows through its last full week of regular session duties.

House members promptly went to work on the bill after the Senate passed it last week.

The revision is the product of a seven-year study ramrodded by the State Bar of Texas.

Generally, the code pulls together the thousands of criminal laws scattered through the statute books.

It groups felonies and misdemeanors into classes, ranging from most severe to minor offenses and fixes a range of punishment for each.

Many separate statutes are consolidated into comprehensive sections, and laws covering a variety of attempted crimes are grouped under a general attempt provision.

The new code increases maximum penalties for certain crimes of violence. Murder without malice, for example, could carry a maximum term of 20 years compared to five under present law.

Penalties for some other crimes were lowered. Minimum, as well as maximum, punishment is provided in each category of felony.

One of the major changes in existing law is the definition of insanity as applied to defense in criminal cases. The new definition terms insanity as a mental disorder or defect that prevents one from conforming his conduct to requirements of the law. The old "M'Naghten rule" terms a person insane who does not know right from wrong or understand the nature and consequences of his acts.

Lawmakers went into Friday and Saturday sessions in an effort to reduce the tremendous pile of unfinished legislation. Much of it will remain unacted on.

Oil Allowable Retained

Texas Railroad Commission for the 15th straight month set the June oil allowable at 100%.

Commissioners responded to soaring, record demands for crude oil. Purchasers requested 3.8 million barrels a day for June, an increase of 33,931 over May.

Exceptions again were made for East Texas field 86%, Kelly-Snyder 76% and Tom O'Connor 70%. Several other fields were limited to 90%.

Exxon announced plans to increase refining capacity by 350,000 barrels daily, due mainly to additions to its Baytown refinery.

A former commissioner, William Murray, said the city of San Antonio may not be able to get thru the summer unless it can obtain additional oil for its electrical service.

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Texas Highways

Austin, Tex.—Highway rights of way are now blanketed with more gaudy color than ever before—thanks to a policy of late mowing that allows wildflower seeds to mature and, of course, a lot of help from Mother Nature.

As in the past, instructions have gone out to Highway Department maintenance forces to delay full-scale mowing operations until seed pods mature and the wild flowers can re-seed themselves as nature intended. As a direct result of this mowing policy in the past several years, Texas has the best stands of bluebonnets, indian paint brush and other wild flowers ever.

Although this results in some roadsides of the more than 70,000 miles of the State-maintained highway system looking a little shaggy late in the season, it does assure that there will be another magnificent display next spring, depending upon favorable growing conditions.

Highway officials point out that there will be some selective mowing of the right of way during the growing season. In areas where growth is particularly heavy, crews will mow along the pavement edge and at highway intersections as a safety measure.

In some areas, growth is so luxuriant that selective mowing is necessary to keep it from choking out all other vegetation. In the Coastal Bend region, for example, some heavy stands of clover have been mowed to prevent it from stifling protective grass cover.

Wildflowers are not "just pretty"—they are an important tool in the maintenance of the sprawling Texas highway system. The natural growth of wild flower and grass cover prevents erosion and deterioration of roadside slopes. Of course, this saves the public thousands of dollars each year in maintenance costs.

The Highway Department's concern with roadside environment is not just recent. It goes back beyond the early 1930's when the Department hired its first full-time landscape architect. Texas was among the first states, if not the very first state, to add professionally trained experts in this field to its permanent staff.

Today, in addition to its large staff of professional landscape architects, the Department depends upon the expertise of hundreds of maintenance men in every corner of the state with their years of practical experience in caring for roadside vegetation.

'Rare' Steaks, Indeed

College Station, Tex.—That next steak you eat may be "rarer" than you think.

"Regardless of the way you like your steak cooked, you're getting a 'rare' commodity," emphasizes Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Why is steak, or all beef for that matter, so rare?

"It's a simple matter of time," points out the Texas A&M University specialist. "It takes about 2½ years to produce a steak."

Uvacek explains it this way. A cow produces only one calf in 12 months. The calf is weaned at six months of age and turned to pasture for another four to six months. Then it goes to a feedlot for six months to be fattened on a high grain ration. Finally, at about 1,000 pounds of weight, the animal is sold to a packer for slaughter.

Well, at least that's a thousand pounds of beef, you say?

"Not by a long shot," Uvacek hastens to point out. "A lot of weight from the animal is lost in slaughtering and processing. A 1,000-pound animal produces only about 48 pounds of sirloin steaks."

A 1,000-pound steer that grades "choice" will produce about 600 pounds of carcass. Take away the fat, bone and waste and only about 444 pounds of edible beef remains.

The specialist is concerned that consumers today are not aware of the time and costs involved in beef production. "Increased production has made beef available to more consumers now than ever before. Back when only the wealthy could afford expensive cuts of beef, there was little concern over prices."

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

County Extension Agent's Column

Picnic Foods . . .

As sunny skies beckon you outside for a hike, swim or to exercise your green thumb, take along a picnic. The main ingredient for outdoor eating is planning. And planning means checking local markets for foods appropriate for picnics. Use foods that don't require heating or that you can heat from the can, and frozen foods that you can wrap and cook in aluminum foil. Before placing a can over hot coals, remove the paper label and open to allow for air expansion.

Barbecued spareribs, hot dogs, bologna, chicken and chuck steaks rate as favorites. Kabobs make one of the easiest and most decorative additions to your picnic tables. Food combinations for kabobs are almost numberless. Fresh pineapple chunks add delicious flavor to meat on skewers. Arrange them alternately with cubes of meat and grill until heated through. Or alternate cubes of cheese with chunks of fruit.

Salads also rank as picnic treats. Prepare kidney bean salad in advance or simply serve chilled tomatoes, crisp carrot and celery strips, apples, oranges or hard cooked or deviled eggs. Or try a cottage potato salad by adding two cups of the cheese to your favorite potato salad recipe. Never make a salad more than 24 hours before serving.

For bread eaters, cut a loaf of French bread into thick diagonal slices, leaving attached at bottom. Spread with a seasoned butter. Wrap loaf in foil and place over low heat for five to ten minutes or until heated through. Serve from foil.

Remember, use only quality foods carefully prepared and sensibly handled. Without exception, all cooked foods should be refrigerated, and never carry picnic foods in the car trunk; store only in insulated containers.

Feeding The Pre-Schooler

Don't smack a taboo on snacks for preschoolers. Snacks help the youngster last from meal to meal. Most children eat more than three meals a day because their stomachs are small. So they can't hold as much food as an adult. Children should eat snacks packed with nutrition. Serve them milk, carrot strips, fruit juice, fruit, crackers or toast.

Meal plans can also yield snacks, such as small sandwiches, peanut butter or oatmeal cookies, cheese cubes, dry cereal or ice cream. Children learn good eating habits from parents, brothers and sisters. Eat with your preschoolers and help make mealtime a pleasant, sociable occasion. Remember, food, rest, sleep, exercise and play all work together to promote the healthy physical growth of your child.

Parents who disobey speeding laws teach their children a lack of respect for the law. And the mother who sends her child to the salesman at the door to report that she isn't home has a difficult time convincing the child that lying is wrong. Children "catch" their education from their parents. Parents need to think ahead before acting in any situation. They should ask, "Will my actions help or hurt my child's growth?"

Parents who show concern for others, who discuss differences in opinion instead of shutting them out, and who respect the rights of all—both children and adults—are teaching important qualities in human relations to their children. Keep your eye on the future as you guide and discipline your child. After a struggle with another family member, ask what difference the problem will make in five years. Be firm only if the issue is really important.





Turkeys Still Bargain

College Station, Tex.—Turkeys generally don't fly very high, even in the wild. Likewise, turkey prices in the market place have climbed little, says Dr. David Mellor, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Turkeys are still one of the best buys available, both economically and nutritionally," points out the Texas A&M specialist.

Generally, turkey prices are lowest during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday. It is normal for the 50 cents per pound Thanksgiving turkey to sell for 60 to 65 cents a pound in the spring and summer.


Turkey prices rose from a national average of 49 cents a pound in 1965 to 55 cents a pound in '72.

Since 1969, turkey prices have risen only 19%, while medical care and services costs have gone up over 90%, transportation over 40% and housing about 51%, Mellor points out.


