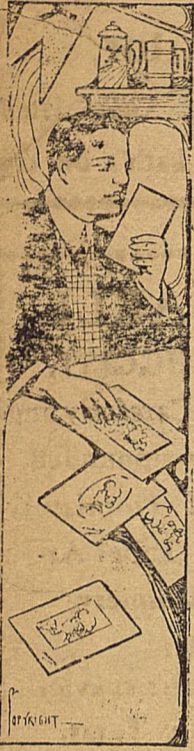

HON. W. B. SILLIMAN

Makes Short But Pointed
Talk to Commissioners
COURT.

Hon. W. B. Silliman the man who always looks after the interest of Schleicher County citizens made a short but pointed talk to the Commissioners Court Wednesday morning after he saw that the court was going to receive bids on the Schleicher County School Land, with out advertising it. He tried to impress upon the courts mind that if this land was worth \$5 or \$6 per acre with out advertising, and to sell in a body, it would probably double this price should they cut it up in small tracts an sell it to men wanting homes, he also explained that the county would not have had any more trouble in keeping up with its sales than they would to sell it to an individual and resume the payments, which they would do if any body bought it, for no person or persons would buy lands at this price unless they wanted to retail it out in small tracts He also told the court that he had made a visit to this land and found while there that you couldn't get a man in Lameea in the land business to show you a piece of land for less than \$7.50 per acre, and stated that there was five or six men present in the court room who had been to Lameea and that any of them would bear him out in this statement, and his statement was left uncontradicted, (and we think this talk made the county something like \$28,000, and had the commissioners sold the land in small tracts and it even brought \$8 per acre, it would have beat the present sale \$26,526,) he futhr stated to the court that he did not think there was a single, tax pay

er in the county that would object to the court paying out \$500 or even a \$1,000 to advertise this land and make it bring the school children \$30,000 or \$40,000 more school money.

How Schleicher County SOLD HER SCHOOL LAND

As we are interested in Schleicher County and the good people who live within her boundaries, we submit the following. Now good people as we stated some few weeks ago, that we were going to give the news as we saw fit and to what we thought would be to the best interest of the citizens of our town and county. So we will relate the sale of the Schleicher County School Land as we partially saw it. On Wednesday March 25th 1908 the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County met in call session for the purpose of hearing the report of E. M. Barbee, as he had been previously sent to Gains County for the purpose of looking at the Schleicher County School Land situated in that county, and to make a report in writing as to what he thought to be a valuable market price, after court was called. Mr. Barbee made a verbal report and said that he thought the land to be worth from \$3 to \$6 per acre. Now we were informed by Judge J. A. Whitten presiding officer over the court, in the evening after the court adjourned that the court did not know the land was going to be offered for sale until the morning of the 25th after court met. But on the arrival of W. L. Says from Comanche, on the stage Tuesday March 24th, some of our citizens were informed that the land was going to and would be sold on the following day, as he told several parties that he came for that purpose, and that he was going to give the court \$5 per acre for this land, saying that this was all it was worth. Now just how Mr. Says found out how the court was going to sell the land, is something we have failed to find out. But he must have known as he already had the deed prepared before he came, for these special tracts of land. And sure enough he bought it, over home men bidding \$1,771.20 more than he did, the terms of the home men being considered better, as they were willing for the whole value of the land to run 40 years at five per cent, interest yearly and to be paid in advance. While Mr. Says has the privilege to pay the whole thing out with in five years, the only difference was about \$600 to be paid now and the home men were not even told that, that would have to come. It seems to us that the home bidders had the best bid by odds, but wise men will differ. We noticed in reading over the deed that has been recorded in this county that these words, (which matter had been duly advertised and published) were inserted. These words have reference to the Schleicher County School Land, and this deed was signed under oath by every member of the court. Now as to what this honorable court

calls advertising, we do not know, we have never seen nor heard of any advertising of any kind done as to these lands selling on this particular day, and the deed says "duly advertised and published," now where and when was this matter ever published or advertised. The minutes of the court doesn't show that there was ever an order passed for this land to be advertised and doesn't show that it was ever advertised or published, and we are of the opinion that it was not, but how ever we are subject to mistakes. Not only did the court err by not advertising this land for sale for sixty days, but in our judgement they made an error when they sold the land to W. L. Says of Comanche when R. A. Evans, E. P. Sweat and M. M. Beavers of their own city had offered \$1,771.20 more than Mr. Says and on what we consider better terms, another error was when they refused to accept any bid for less than \$7 per acre, and then receded their actions by sending a runner after Mr. Says and bringing him back to the court and closing the deal with him with out notifying Ears, Beavers and Sweat that they were going to sell for less than \$7 per acre and that their bid was not satisfactory to the court; the bids up to this time were put in open in the presents of 20 or 30 men who had gathered to witness the proceedings of the court. We were present during the bidding on this land, until the court said they would not sell this land for less than \$7 per acre. We was present when W. L. Says put in his first bid and if any thing definite had been decided on by the court in regard to the selling of the land we had failed to catch it, Says shoved in his bid at \$5 per acre and said that was all it was worth, and all he would give, and after making a talk took his seat, then Hon. W. B. Silliman ask permission from the court to speak in behalf of the school children of this county which was granted and the contents of his speech will be found in another column. But Mr. Says changed his mind and afterwards bought the land at \$6.50. It look like Mr. Says had the inside tract, he must have been informed when he was out here about three week ago, to return at this date, or had recently been notified as to the date of sale. It doesn't look reasonable that Mr. Says would come from Comanche to this city with a deed already drawn for the Schleicher County School Land with out he knew something about this sale previous to his coming. If any member of the court thinks we have left any false impression upon the proceedings of this term of court, we will gladly furnish space in our columns for his reply with out charge.

TOLIE MILLS KILLED A MEXICAN.

In Crockett county last week a Mexican was killed by Tolie Mills a well known ranchman. Mr. Mills had discharged the herder before the fuss came up, after being discharged the Mexican went to Ozona and secured a Winchester and on returning to the Mills sheep camp attempted to shoot Mr. Mills. Mr. Mills got the first shot and made good aim, as he only had the one cartridge in his gun, another Mexican made an attack on Mills and caused him up with a hatchet. Mills once lived here and has friends who does hate to see his trouble, but glad that he himself escaped bed. Mr. Mills was known as a quite steady fellow and were confident that the trouble

was forced on him in self defence.
