Light Voter Turnout Seen In State Constitutional Amendment Election

A light voter turnout is foreseen both locally and state-wide this coming Tuesday, November 4th, when Texans go to the polls to vote on eight proposed amendments to the state constitution. If all eight are approved, it will amount to substantially a new State Constitution which would replace the 1876 document.

Locally, there will be just one voting box, at the Memorial Building, and the polls will be open from

8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Tuesday morning of this week, there had been just four absentee votes cast in the County Clerk's office. Deadline for voting absentee is 5:00 p.m. this Friday.

Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe has come out publicly opposing the new proposed Constitution, but other high-level officials favor it. The Success is not running a Sample Ballot in this paper because the ballots were not printed in Eldorado.

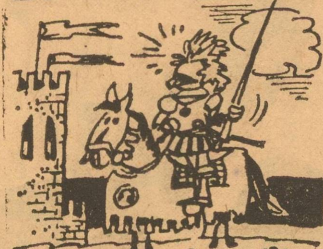

2 cups diced raw potatoes
1 can (16-ounce) stewed tomatoes
1-1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon white pepper
1/4 teaspoon ground thyme
1/4 cup unsifted flour
6 cups skim milk
2 cans (7-ounces each) tuna, well drained

2 tablespoons chopped parsley
Melt margarine in a large saucepot. Add onion and celery and saute over medium-high heat until tender, about 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add potatoes, tomatoes, salt, pepper and thyme. Cover and cook over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally, until potatoes are tender, about 20 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in flour. Add skim milk, tuna and parsley. Return to heat and heat until mixture thickens slightly, stirring constantly. Makes 10 servings.

Organic Matter Improves Soil

The soil's fertility and physical condition can be greatly improved by adding organic matter. Such matter includes lawn clippings, leaf rakings, and other plant material that is free of disease and nematodes.

The fall season is an excellent time to add such materials to the garden area. To aid decomposition, add about two pounds of a complete fertilizer per 100 square feet of bed area. This helps the bacteria and other organisms do a better job of decomposing the organic matter. During the decomposition process, nutrients and other elements vital for healthy plant life are released for use by new plants.

Composted vegetative matter is also high in organic matter and may be used when transplanting trees and bushes or as a topdressing in preparing garden beds.

Organic matter improves the soil's physical properties by causing better soil structure, increasing pore volume, increasing moisture retention, and allowing more efficient utilization of fertilizer applications. This means that sticky clay soils can be changed into a more manageable loamy soil. Adding organic matter to loose, droughty sand will help it hold plant nutrients and moisture, thus improving plant growth.

In both clay and sandy soils, organic matter keeps soil practices pore spaces also allow better air exchange, thus improving the oxygen supply in the soil—a vital factor for good plant root functions and growth.



Safety Around Farm And Ranch Buildings . . .


About 20% of the agricultural work injuries occur in farm and ranch buildings. The way to prevent these accidents is to spot and correct potential trouble situations before they develop.

Here are some general precautions to take when working around farm and ranch buildings:

1. Keep buildings clean and free of trash and litter that could cause falls or feed a fire.
 2. Keep buildings well lighted and supplied with fire extinguishers and lightning protection systems, and be sure the electrical wiring is sound.
 3. Make sure stairs and ladders are in good condition, dry and un-littered.
 4. Mark low ceilings, beams and passageways with warning signs, and close doors and gates to hazardous places to keep children out.
 5. Shield power equipment properly and be sure shields are in place when using the equipment.
 6. Post and enforce no smoking signs.
 7. Store flammable liquids in UL approved metal containers and keep toxic materials locked up and out of the reach of children.
- As far as animal facilities are concerned, we advise keeping gates closed and floors clean. Pens, gates, chutes and lot fences should all be sturdy and in good shape. Milk-room floors should be sloped to drain; outside ramps and steps should be protected from freezing rain. Vents and fans should be operating in confined areas, and portable heaters should be placed where they can't tip or cause fires.





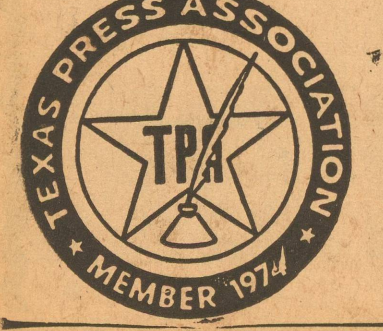

Highway and Sidelight FROM THE State CAPITOL
by Lyndell Williams
Texas Press Association
Austin, Tex.—The Texas Supreme Court has agreed to hear a case involving extent of the Governor's veto power and a multimillion dollar higher education program.
The High Court November 5 will listen to arguments in the suit brought by Austin architectural firm Jessen Associates Inc. against Comptroller Bob Bullock.
Bullock refused to approve payment of a \$2,590 fee to the architects for cost studies on a \$10 million addition to The University of Texas law school.
Gov. Dolph Briscoe this year vetoed riders to the new state appropriations bill which sought to give prior legislative authorization to millions of dollars in university construction.
Briscoe cited a 1975 law which required that such projects have approval of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.
Attorneys for Jessen said court guidance is necessary to settle the issues for state officials and governing boards of all state universities.
Debate Rages On
Voter interest in the great debate over a new state constitution doesn't match that of ardent proponents and opponents.
Checks with key election officials over the state indicate a low turnout in the November 4 constitutional revision election, unless there is a dramatic pickup in citizens' concern during the last week of the blistering campaign.

Oil Allowable Set
For the 44th month, the Texas Railroad Commission set the oil allowable for November at a wide-open 100%.
Production is running an average of 113,047 barrels daily less than in 1974. Imports averaged nearly 4.6 million barrels a day, during a recent four weeks' period, which amounts to an increase of 824,000 barrels from early this year.
As a waste control measure, allowable for the East Texas field was limited to 86% production.
