# Evidence in motel room leads · to seizure of mobile meth lab

Marijuana and an assortment of drug paraphernalia left in a local motel room led to the arrest of five individuals Tuesday morning and the seizure of a mobile methamphetamine lab.

Sheriff's department personnel received a call Tuesday morning from Janet Marlow, the owner of Shaw's Motel, reporting that five subjects had just checked out of their two rooms and that a suspicious substance had been found in one of the rooms.

A description of the suspect vehicle, a 2002 Mazda Tribute, was obtained from the motel records and Deputy Jason Chatham quickly intercepted it some 13 miles west of Eldorado on U.S. 190.

When Chatham pulled the Mazda over, he noticed at least one open bottle of beer, a violation of the state's open container law.

Chatham called for backup and was soon joined by Sheriff David Doran and Chief Deputy George Arispe. After briefly questioning the five occupants. of the vehicle, a search soon turned up a mobile methamphetamine lab, as well as a undisclosed quantity of methamphetamine and assorted drug parapher-

Christopher Barrandey, 33; Malachi David Wren, 33; Jeffery Austin Jordan,

20; Samantha Ann Freeman, 19; and Jessica Louise Nichols, 18; all of Odessa, were each booked into the Schleicher County Jail and charged with possession of a chemical with intent to manufacture a controlled substance. The three men were also charged with possession of marijuana. Additionally, Barrandey was charged with possession of a controlled substance while Jordan and Freeman were charged with possession of drug paraphernalia.

As the five were being processed at the jail, a hazardous materials team from the Rio Concho Multi-Agency Drug Task Force was called to the scene. The team took possession of the mobile lab, including highly volatile chemicals used to manufacture methamphetamine. Among those chemicals is anhydrous ammonia, a substance that is widely used as a crop fertilizer, and a potent

Meanwhile, a further search of the two motel rooms the group had stayed in the night before turned up more evidence, including a usable amount of marijuana.


Later in the afternoon, the 2002 Mazda Tribute was towed to town and impounded. Interestingly, the vehicle did not belong to any of the subjects involved. Wren, who was driving the Mazda when it was pulled over, said it belonged to an acquaintance. The vehicle is not listed as stolen and it is unclear at this time if Texas drug seizure laws will allow it to be confiscated.

All five of the subjects remain in jail at press time. According to Sheriff's Dept. personnel, Barrandey was recently released from the Texas Department of Corrections after completing a prison sentence for theft. Likewise, Jordan Jeffery Austin was recently released after doing time for burglary of a habitation.

Following the arrests, Sheriff David Doran praised the quick actions of his officers and thanked Janet Marlow for notifying his department so promptly. "This is how these types of cases are broken," Doran stated. "Someone calls in with a lead and it gets followed up. I'm just glad that we could wrap this one up so quickly."

Doran noted that the chemicals involved in the manufacture of methamphetamine are toxic and unstable.

He says anyone who believes they know the whereabouts of a methamphetamine lab, or the chemicals used in such a lab, should get as far away from the material as possible and notify the au-

## City eyes changes at old landfill

The Eldorado City Council voted Monday night to spend \$87,700.00 for engineering services at the city's old landfill. The council is looking to open a section of the facility, approximately seven acres in size, that has never been used. To do this, the city must amend the permit under which it operates the

Steve Dennis, an engineer with the firm of GSW&W in Midland, was on hand for the meeting. He and City Administrator Randy Mankin reviewed several concerns they had with the landfill, especially the need to utilize excess clay and topsoil that has accumulated on the site in the past three decades. Dennis explained that "aerial fill," the practice used at most municipal landfills, would allow the clay and topsoil to be used as daily cover while waste is encapsulated in a mound.

"It will allow you to optimize the remaining space and to extend the life of the landfill," Dennis told the coun-

Mankin explained that the landfill's existing permit requires that it be restored to its original contours. "I realize we're talking about a lot of money," Mankin said. "but, if we don't amend the permit, we will spend as much, if not more, to truck away the piles of clay and topsoil."

After a lengthy discussion, the council ultimately agreed to spend the money, but it wasn't unanimous. Council

member Robert Bybee, who expressed his concern that the permit amendment would prove to be even more costly than the proposed \$87,700.00, cast the only dissenting vote.

Work on the permit amendment will begin almost immediately. It is expected to take 18 months to 2 years to com-

The meeting was the council's firstever meeting in the new council chamber at City Hall, located in what used to be the building's front office. Mayor John Nikolauk called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. with council members Bybee, Tommy Minor, Juaquin Rojas, Richard Mendez and Toni Sudduth in attendance. Council member Dora Bosman was absent, due to being hospitalized in Ft. Worth.

In other business, Patsy Kellogg, representing the Concho Valley Community Action Council (CAC), met with the city council regarding the city's utility billing procedures. She noted that the CAC assists many citizens who are unable to pay their utility bills and asked that the city make allowances for those clients so that utilities won't be disconnected until payments are received.

City Administrator Randy Mankin told Kellogg that the city has a longstanding policy of cooperating with the CAC, but noted that recently the CAC has stopped notifying the city of the clients it will be assisting. City Secretary

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


Graveside services will be at 11:00 a.m. Thursday, May 15 in Eldorado Cemetery. Arrangements are by Kerbow Funeral Home.
