City Secretary Phil Olson was present at the meeting to give the court an idea of the financial situation the county would inherit in the event that the unincorporation question passes
on the April 2 city election. County Judge Bob McWhorte informed the court of some information he had received from state and federal government offriais as to the impact provided by the city that the county might inherit. County Riley Fl .P. Ren Riley Fetcher of the Municipal League about the county
owning the utilities that are presently owned by the city. Mr
Fletcher replied that he knew of county could operate gas, water or sewerage utilities, similar reply was received from Mr Craig of the State Attorney Generals office.
The question was asked to what means would be made to provide these utilities if the city was unincorporated.
Judge McWhorter replied that 'from the information we have received, the utilities would nave to be handled by governing body apart from the county government. This
would probably mean setting up a small water district that would probably mean setting up a small water district that
would serve just the city of Eldorado.' McWhorter and Robinson cited the cities of Christoval and Ozona as esamples where this system works as far as water and
