Court kills religion law

A divided U.S. Supreme Court vesterday tossed out a 1993 law that was meant to give religious groups greater protection from government regulation. In a 6-3 ruling, the high court said Congress overstepped its authority when it passed the Religious Freedom Restoration Act which President Clinton strongly supported and signed into law. The law was aimed at encouraging governments to accommodate religious practices. But the standard it set created a much higher hurdle for government regulation than that set by the Supreme Court in a controversial 1990 ruling. The law "contradicts vital principles necessary to maintain separation of powers and the federal balance," Justice Anthony Kennedy wrote for the court majority.

Crew safe after Mir collision

There's been a close call in space. The Russian space station Mir yesterday collided with an unmanned 7-ton cargo ship during a docking maneuver. The two Russian cosmonauts and the American astronaut aboard Mir are reported safe. But the U.S. space agency, NASA, said the collision caused a loss of air pressure in one compartment and that module has been sealed off. The Russian space agency said Mir's air pressure is normal. A NASA spokesman says the seriousness of the situation is being evaluated, but he emphasizes 'there is no immediate plan for evacuation." A Soyuz escape craft remains docked to the space station at all times in case the crew needs to make an emergency return to

Explorer Jacques Cousteau dies

Jacques-Yves Cousteau, who spent a lifetime studying the mysteries of the ocean and revealing them to the world, is dead. He was 87. His foundation announced Cousteau's death in a statement that offered no details, saying simply, 'Captain Jacques-Yves Cousteau has gone to the Silent World this Wednesday, June 25, 1997." "The Silent World" was the title of Cousteau's winning documentary at the Cannes film festival in 1956. French president Jacques Chirac is mourning Cousteau's death by praising him for `a life and work in the service of a cause." Cousteau became a crusader against marine pollution and nuclear testing in the South Pacific and was regularly voted one of France's most popular men.

Senate votes to up Medicare age The Senate has approved legislation that would take politically tough steps to ensure the long-term solvency of the U.S. government's health care program for the elderly. On Tuesday, the Senate approved plans that would make affluent seniors pay more for Medicare and gradually raise the eligibility age. Senators supported a plan making single seniors with annual incomes of more than \$50,000 and couples making more than \$75,000 pay higher premiums for Medicare doctors' coverage. The Senate also voted to hike the Medicare eligibilty age to 67 from the current 65 by







State pays \$23 million to lottery lobbyists

AUSTIN --- The state paid lottery consultants Ben Barnes and Ricky Knox more than \$23 million to stop working for Texas Lottery operator GTECH.

Barnes and Knox had argued that the agreement was private business and not subject to disclosure. On June 18, the day after Attorney General Dan Morales said the agreement should be made public, the information was released.

Barnes, a former lieutenant governor, is getting \$168,328 a month for the next three years. Knox, a former member of the Texas Racing Commission and signed bills which give Texas long-time lobbyist, is getting \$58,752 a month for three years. Also, GTECH said Barnes and








BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 9, 1997**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons currently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation.'






