Former Ag Secretary indicted A federal grand jury has indicted former Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy on charges of accepting gifts from companies that did business with his department The 39-count indictment says Espy accepted \$35,000 in gifts that included luggage and tickets to the Super Bowl, and also accuses him of lying to investigators and asking an Agriculture Department employee to falsify a document. Espy, the first black to hold the job of agriculture secretary. had denied the allegations and resigned his post in December 1994 to defend himself. The Mississippi Democrat served three terms in the House before joining the Clinton administration.

N. Korean talks stalled

A day after Washington announced asylum for two North Korean diplomats, the communist nation withdrew from arms proliferation talks with the United States. A statement by Pyongyang's deputy U.N. representative said "it does not make sense" to hold the missile discussions in light of the defections. The postponement came hours after North Korea demanded that Washington hand over its ambassador to Egypt and his brother, who analysts say may have crucial information about North Korean arms sales. North Korea says the two defected to avoid punishment for embezzling and leaking state se-

Post: Gore made 46 calls

The Washington Post reported resterday that Vice President Al Gore phoned at least 46 people from his White House office in 1995 and 1996 to solicit big donations to the Democratic National Committee. The newspaper, quoting documents made available by the White House and DNC officials to the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee, said Gore asked for contributions of between \$25,000 and \$100,000. No comment was immediately available from the White House. Gore has said his calls did not violate fundraising laws.

Fighting flares in Cambodia Fighting flared in northwestern Cambodia yesterday hours after ousted co-premier Prince Norodom Ranariddh called for a cease-fire and the opening of peace talks between the country's warring factions. Witnesses on the Thai-Cambodian border and Thai military sources say intermittent shelling through the morning was followed by heavy small arms fire and a 90-minute artillery barrage in the afternoon as government forces under strongman Hun Sen attacked royalist fighters loyal to Ranariddh, Ranariddh, toppled by Hun Sen on July 6, had called earlier for an immediate and unconditional ceasefire between his fighters and those under Hun Sen. But a government spokesman in Phnom Penh says royalist troops must lay down their arms before there can be peace.





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


