Diana's funeral expanded

Buckingham Palace, responding to the national outpouring of grief over Princess Diana's death, yesterday expanded plans for her funeral to enable thousands more to share directly in Saturday's great act of national mourning. With more than a million people expected along the mile-long route to Westminster Abbey, two giant video screens are being set up in Hyde Park to enable another 100,000 people to watch the funeral. Diana's older son, Prince William, may walk behind his mother's coffin and Elton John may sing at the funeral of the 'People's Princess," who touched hearts around the world. In the first statement from Buckingham Palace since the tragedy, the royal family said it was getting comfort and strength from the outpouring of public grief.

Plane down in Cambodia

More than 60 people were killed when a Vietnam Airlines plane crashed near Phnom Penh airport Wednesday, aviation and hospital officials said. At least four people survived the crash. The plane crashed into a small house near Phnom Penh airport in heavy rain, and witnesses reported bodies and wreckage scattered over a wide area. Officials said the plane was coming in to land at Pochentong airport from Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon, in southern Vietnam.

Questions on Gore funds

The Washington Post reports today that more than \$120,000 in campaign contributions personally solicited in 1995-96 by Vice President Al Gore went into an account subject to federal election limits. The newspaper said the money came from donors Gore phoned from his White House office to ask for contributions to the Democratic National Committee. The contributions were meant to be "soft money," unlimited donations that are not intended to support individual candidates but to promote party-building activities. Instead, some of the money was used to fund the Clinton-Gore reelection effort. Under federal law, officials may not solicit such direct donations from federal build-

Bounty hunters sought

An intense manhunt is under way in Arizona for two bounty hunters who allegedly broke into the wrong house in a commandostyle raid looking for a bailjumper. The bounty hunters then shot and killed a young couple. Police say two men are in custody and another is under police guard in a hospital after the ski-masked group broke down the front door of the house, held young children at gunpoint and exchanged fire with the couple early Sunday. Police say the bounty hunters apparently were looking for a bail jumper who owed a bond company \$25,000.





Texas in risk of losing millions in federal funding

AUSTIN --- Texas may lose labels are put on ice cream, the millions of dollars in federal funding if it restricts minors' access to birth control and other prescription drugs, an official with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services warned in a letter presented at a hearing last week.

Federal regulations state that funding will be denied to programs that discriminate on the basis of age in providing services, wrote Dr. James Randolph Farris, regional administrator for the U.S. Health Department.

State District Judge Scott McCown took the case under advisement after listening to arguments from Planned Parenthood of Houston and Southwest Texas and the attorney general's office, the Dallas Morning News reported.

The state Legislature attached a rider to its 1997 budget stipulating that 'no state funds may be used to dispense prescription drugs to minors without parental consent." The rider was aimed primarily at the dispensation of birth control pills. Planned Parenthood filed suit, ask-Legislature's action.

Bryan, who sponsored the rider, about by the 1995 laws. attended the hearing. "As a matter of policy, I believe parents ought to always have an opportunity to consent on whether their children are receiving prescription drugs," he provided savings for Texans but are told the Morning News.
