

Rancher, Commissioner Buried Here Monday

A well-known Eldorado rancher and Schleicher County Commissioner, Billy Gene Edmiston, died about 12:55 p.m. Saturday from injuries he sustained in a freak pickup-truck accident.

The accident happened about 10:35 a.m. Saturday when Edmiston stopped at a stop sign at West Avenue and Highway 277 after taking his daughter to a friend's house. A truck being towed by another truck came loose when the chain holding it broke, causing the towed truck to hit Edmiston's pickup.

He was taken by ambulance to Schleicher County Medical Center

and immediately transferred to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where he died.

Born July 4, 1935 to long-time Schleicher County residents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene N. Edmiston, he attended schools here and graduated from Eldorado High School. On Aug. 26, 1956, he married Joann Clements. From 1958-1960, he served with the United States Army in post-conflict Korea. He graduated from A&I University in 1961 and taught high school from 1962-1967.

He then returned to Eldorado to the family ranching business. He also owned and operated a hardware store here for two years and served as president of the Elorado Chamber of Commerce. He has also managed the golf course and was elected commissioner of precinct one last summer, taking office last January. He and his family lived on the Bailey Ranch Road.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Jed Edmiston and Gene Edmiston, both of Eldorado; two brothers, Orval and W.F. Edmiston of Eldorado; two sisters, Mrs. Nell "Shine" Spigarelli of Shreveport, La., and Mrs. Mary Dell Baskin of Canton, Ohio; and many nieces and nephews.

Pallbearers were Jim Thornton of Houston and Edmiston's nephews, Bryan Edmiston of Hutto, Tim Edmiston of Midland, Dr. William Edmiston of San Angelo and Phil Edmiston, Joe Max Edmiston, Jim Bob Edmiston and Cris McCravey, all of Eldorado.

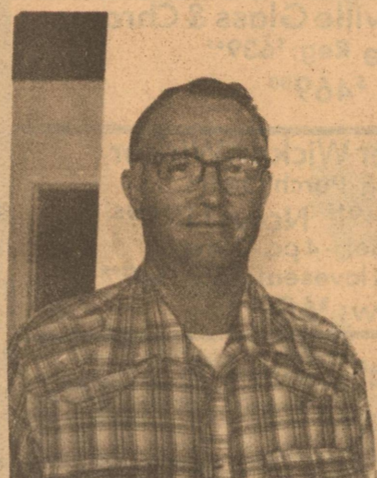

Four Local Elections Are Saturday

Saturday is election day and local voters will have four elections in which to cast their votes, the city, school, water board and hospital board.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The election for the city's mayor and two councilmen will be in the Firehall as will the election for the directors of the Schleicher County water district.

The hospital election will be in the school high school gymnasium and the school board election will be in the multi-purpose room of the school administration building.

School Board

Four persons, Frankie Hardy, Richard Kent, A.T. "Sonny" Turner and Gus Willeke are running for three positions on the Schleicher School Board.

Mrs. Hardy is the wife of Jim Hardy and the mother of three daughters, Katie, Lindy and Jamie. She was born and raised here and is a graduate of Baylor University where she received a bachelor of science degree. Mrs. Hardy taught junior high and high school at Troy and Lubbock. In Eldorado, she taught drivers education and was a substitute teacher. A member of the First Baptist Church and a housewife, she is running for her second term on the board.

"After serving on the board the past three years, I feel I have some understanding of the problems of our school system and have gained experience which will make me better able to contribute to the board and our school. As a mother of three young children, I am vitally concerned with having the best possible school here in Schleicher County," she commented.

Turner is a native of Roscoe and has lived in Eldorado for 16 years. He is assistant manager of Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative. He and his wife, Jo Ann, have four children, Margaret, Cole, Belinda and Lou Ann. A member of the First Baptist Church, he is also president of the Eldorado Lions Club. Turner attended business college in Abilene and graduated from an management internship at the University of Nebraska in 1973. In May of 1978, he completed four years of advanced management courses from UN.

He stated, "I believe I would be an asset to the board. With four children in the school system, I want to take an active interest in the school system."

Also a native of Eldorado, Richard Kent, is the owner of Kent's Automotive. He and his wife, Gloria, have two children, Mike and Michele. He is a member of the Church of Christ and Lions Club and is running for his second term.

"By serving on the board during this term, I have seen the problems the board faces. I am proud of the new school facilities and the improvement made in the school system in general during the past two years," Kent stated.

Willeke was born and raised in West Texas, living in San Angelo, Alpine, Marathon and San Angelo. A

pumper for Amoco in Sonora. Willeke and his wife, Vita, have five children, one in grade school, junior high school, high and two in college.

"I believe the school board and school system should prepare students for responsibility and crisis after they leave school as well as teaching them self-discipline and self-respect. Also, I think the school needs additional educational programs on the use and effects of alcohol and drugs," Willeke stated.

Hospital board

Three persons have refiled for their positions on the hospital board. They are Ruben Minor, Becky Sterling and Pat Sykes.

Mrs. Sykes, wife of rancher Bobby Sykes, has lived here since 1954. She was raised in Dallas and is a graduate of Southern Methodist University. She has two grown sons, Bobby and Steve. She was appointed to serve and unexpired term on the board and then ran for her first term in 1979.

"I am seeking re-election to the Schleicher County Hospital Board because I feel the medical facilities of this community to be of extreme importance. We are in the middle of an expansion program of the present facilities and in the procurement of additional physicians. It has been my privilege to serve on the hospital board for two and one half years and I ask your support in this election," she said.

Mrs. Sterling is a native of Crosbyton and attended Texas Tech University two years. Married to Rick Sterling, they have three daughters, Ginger, Jana and Andrea. She is a Girl Scout Leader and Known for her handicraft talents. She is seeking re-election for a second term.

"I am interested and concerned about the medical care for Eldorado and the surrounding communities," commented Mrs. Sterling.

Water Board

Retaining the high quality of water in Schleicher County is the primary concern voiced by the three men running for the Schleicher County water board. They are running unopposed for three positions on the board.

Mort Mertz, one of the board's charter members, said, "It is a good statute that we operate under, especially designed for us in this county. Now we are trying to look after the quality of water which is our primary concern at this time. We are a watchdog agency to maintain the high quality of underground water."

Martz is a native of San Angelo but was partly raised in this county. He and his family moved to San Angelo and then he moved back to Schleicher County in 1964. A rancher, he and his wife Madolyn have four children, Mort Jr., Len,

Susan and Michael. He has served on the local school board and is a member of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church. Running for re-election, he has served six years on the board.

Ray Willoughby Jr. is also running for re-election. He was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board and has been a resident of this county for three years. He grew up in San Angelo, but the Willoughby family has ranched in this county since 1909. He and his wife, Salene, have three children, Jennifer, Ed and Ray Willoughby III.

Minor is a farmer and cabinet maker. He was born in Eldorado and raised to Kingsville. He has also lived in San Angelo and moved back to Eldorado in 1971. A Baptist, he and his wife, Clementina, have five children, Tommy, Jaime, Ben, Steve and Homer.

After serving on the board, he says he is running because "I enjoy being on the board. I just hope I can be of service and will serve as best I can."

"The board acts in the capacity to see that the underground water supply in the county is protected from any pollution or misuse from drilling activity or surface activity," he explained. "Anyone in the county who is unhappy about something concerning the water supply can report to use and we report it to the railroad Commission. We would like to preserve the quality of water we have and see that it is protected from any problems. This county is unique in that it has ample underground water supply and we want to protect it."

Repeating the concern for protecting the high quality of water supply in Schleicher County was farmer-rancher Earl Lloyd. Born in Eden, he has lived here most of his life. He is a member of the Methodist Church and serves on the Agriculture Stabilization-Conservation board. He and his wife, Lora Mae, have four sons, Roy Gene, Mike, Leon and Jimmy.

"I am running for re-election to the board because I am very interested in keeping the quality of water in this county as good as it has always been," Lloyd commented.

Betty Groy Tries Resuscitation

CPR Course Conducted By Northern Employees

Bill Ray and Danny Curtis, employees of Northern Natural Co., are now conducting a cardio-pulmonary resuscitation course in the dining room of the Schleicher County Medical Center. About 11 persons are attending.

Both men are members of the Midland Chapter of the American Red Cross and have taught one other course here before.

Students learn resuscitation and the choking techniques that should be used in case of a heart attack, electrocution, car accident or other emergencies for both adults and children. They learn by working with dummies with monitors and watching films.

Fee for the course is \$2.50 to cover the cost of a Red Cross workbook.

The two teachers stressed that if there is enough interest in another course in the future, interested persons should contact the Schleicher County Leader, 853-2032. About 12 persons will be enrolled in each class.

Planting Your Seeds Is Fun Part For Gardeners

Proper planting depth will be, on the average, two to three times the widest measurement of the seed. Cover seed to the right depth and then firm the soil lightly over the seed. Ideally the soil moisture content should be sufficient for good seed germination and emergence. However, during extremely dry periods, it's a good idea to water to insure a good stand.

After vegetables come up remember that too many plants in an area are just as bad, if not worse, as too few. Thin vegetables to the proper distance between plants. Remember, it's for their good as well as yours.

To make the job of thinning less painful, thin plants periodically. For example, if snap beans are to be thinned to 4 inches between plants, thin small plants until they are about 2 inches apart. Then allow remaining plants to grow for a period of time until they begin to crowd together. At that point, complete thinning so plants are the recommended distance apart.

It's a good idea when removing larger plants to use a knife or clippers to cut the stem at the ground level. This will not damage the root systems of remaining vegetables as pulling out of unwanted plants might have done.

Remember that thinning your garden vegetables to the correct spacing is one of the most important "follow-up" activities after planting. Contact the county extension office for additional information on correct spacing for commonly-grown vegetable plants.

Next time I'll provide you with some important information on how to get those tomatoes, peppers and eggplants started off on the right foot.

Prejudice

His disciples came and begged him, saying, "Send her away, for she is crying after us." Matthew 15:23.

Prejudice is one of the common denominators of life. Whether it is the color of skin, place of birth, length of hair, style of dress, age, physical disability, or what ever, each of us can find something in ourselves that judges other people from shallow reasoning. In doing this, we exclude, we are sending away these people.

The disciples, and among them Simon Peter, asked Jesus to send the Canaanite woman away. They were prejudiced against her. Why? Maybe they were

desiring to be alone with their master. Maybe they, like so many others in that time, would not accept a person who was outside their religion; or maybe they were simply tired of her bothering them-she was being a nuisance!

But Jesus met the woman. His remarks would seem to indicate his own agreement with the disciples. I wonder, for whose benefit was that conversation? Was it for the woman's? Or for the disciples? It seems to me that Jesus took the prejudice of his own followers and used it to teach and to show them that his place is with all people.
