



Brown and Sauer claim Regional doubles title Redish and Wanoreck claim Silver for State tourney berth

Sending a girls doubles team to the State tennis tournament in Austin is nothing new for Eldorado High School. Neither is it new for Eldorado to send two girls doubles teams in the same year. What is new, however, is for a girl to make it to the tourney for a third straight year, and with three different partners. That's the story this year for Christina Redish, the EHS senior, who along with partner Chandra Wanoreck, claimed the silver medal at the Region 1-2A tennis tournament in Abilene last week. And, to the surprise of no one who has followed Eldorado tennis through the years, the girls only lost when they faced another team from Eldorado, that of Courtney Brown and Courtney Sauer, or as they are known to their fans, the two Courtneys.

Redish not only made history with her third straight trip to the State tennis tourney. She is also the first Eldorado athlete to ever qualify for the State in two sports. She placed 2nd at the Region 1-2A track meet in the Shot Put and will be competing in that event in Austin, as well.

Redish first made it to the State tennis tourney in 2001, when she and partner Lindsay Beach fell in the state final match to teammates Gentry Newman and Kayla McCravey. Redish teamed up with Newman in 2002 and together they won the State 2-2A doubles championship. This year, Redish returns to the State tourney with partner Chandra Wanoreck.

But, the two Courtneys will be there, too. After losing to Redish and Wanoreck several time during the season, including the match for the District 2-2A championship, Brown and Sauer turned their game up a notch, attacked the net relentlessly, and surprised their teammates in the Regional final match.. Brown and Sauer won the match and claimed the Region 1-2A gold medal 6-4, 6-3.

Brown and Sauer reached the final match by defeating the team of Lindsey and Dominguez of Fort Hancock 4-6, 60, 6-4 in the tournament's opening round. They next dispatched the team of Dunlap and Long from Floydada, 6-1, 6-1 in the quarterfinal and defeated the team of Goodheart and Short of Eula 6-2, 6-3 in the semifinal match.

Redish and Wanoreck advanced to the final round by eliminating the team of Lord and Robertson of Eastland 6-0, 6-1 in the first round. They then defeated Griffen and Reddy of Floydada, 6-2, 6-0 in the quarterfinal and held off the team of Isaacs and Gullett of Canadian 6-4, 2-6, 6-2 in the semifinal match.

The Eagles girls didn't have a monopoly on the tennis action, however as Quisto Gonzalez and Buddy Greer competed in the Boys doubles division. Gonzalez and Greer defeated the team of Carr and Estrada in first round and dropped the team of Esterling and Vickers of Post 6-3, 6-2 in the quarterfinal match. Gonzalez and Greer then fell 4-6, 0-6 to the team of Tjaden and Obrey of Olney. They then defeated Bennett **CONTINUED ON PAGE 4**

Sonora jail escapee caught in Tucson

Area law enforcement officers are such incident in 15 years. breathing a sigh of relief after an inmate, who escaped from the Sutton County Jail last Saturday, was apprehended Tuesday in Tucson, AZ. Philip Kenton Davis, 27, of Spring, TX, managed to escape from the Sonora lockup when he and two other inmates were allowed into the jail's "sally port" for a recreational break. That's when the other two prisoners lifted the sally port gate high enough for Davis to slide under and out to freedom. Sutton County Sheriff Joe Fincher believes the escape is the first

Some found it hard to believe that Davis simply vanished from the Sonora area. Standing 6 feet tall and weighing 175 lbs with a head shaved bald, Davis wasn't likely to fade into a crowd. Plus, the fact that he was wearing "jail shoes,"

Commissioners meet, discuss Civic Center and swimming pool

Schleicher County Commissioners met Monday, April 28, 2003, and among other items of business, discussed the need to connect the sewer at the county Civic Center to the City of Eldorado's sewer system. They also discussed the operation of the county swimming pool.

Commissioners Johnny Mayo, Bill Clark, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown were on hand for the meeting, as was County Judge Johnny Griffin. The men met briefly with Kevin Stanford about fencing the livestock feeding area near the Civic Center. After looking over Stanford's quote on materal and labor, the men decided to table the issue without further discussion.

Coach Rene Valeriano then met with the commissioners to discuss the swimming pool. Valeriano, who will be operating the pool this summer was seeking permission to paint the inside walls of the pool. He was also needing a key to the pump and valve room. After okaying the work Valeriano requested, the commissioners heard that life guards will soon be certified and the pool will soon be open for school parties. The pool will open to the public on May 17. It will be closed each Monday but will be open Tuesday through Sunday from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Valeriano said he would be offering swimming lessons and would schedule 1 night a week for ladies night out. Valeriano noted that there have been some inquiries about family passes, however, for now, admission at the pool will be \$1 per child.

Voters to decide school board seat


Voters in Schleicher County ISD Single Member District #2 will go to the polls on Saturday to decide the race between incumbent school trustee Phil McCormick and challenger Jan Wanoreck. The race is the only contested election in the county this election cycle. Voting will begin at 7:00 a.m. in the Schleicher County Memorial Building and will continue through 7:00 p.m.

As word of the escape was relayed to area law enforcement agencies, manpower and equipment were quickly shifted to Sutton County where a manhunt was quickly organized. Texas Ranger Sgt. Brooks Long of Ozona was called in, as were DPS officers and a helicopter from Midland and the Schleicher County Sheriff's Department. Road blocks were hastily thrown up on all roads leading into and out of Sonora. The officers manned the roadblocks from 4:30 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. the following morning. Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran provided night vision equipment for the hunt, but tracking dogs were not brought in due to the difficulty of the using the animals in town. There were several sightings of Davis, in and around the area of the Sonora Golf Course.

A witness later reported making contact with Davis west of Sonora where he was attempting to get a ride and jail clothing was found not far from there at a roadside park. Officials concluded that Davis, originally from Arizona, was attempting to get back there in order to hide out with friends or family.

A self-avowed "white supremacist," Davis has a long rap sheet, including 63 arrests and 4 prison sentences. Among his previous convictions was one for aggravated assault with a deadly weapCONTINUED ON PAGE 6

Sloan lawsuit against Hospital District delayed

The long awaited trail between Dr. Randall Sloan and the Schleicher County Hospital District was derailed Monday before it could begin when lawyers for the two sides failed to agree on a jury. The names of one hundred local citizens were randomly selected a month earlier by 51st District Judge Barbara Walther and Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran. That number dwindled to less than 40 by the time the case was


called on Monday.

Routine questioning of the jury pool members ended with enough of them being eliminated that it became impossible to seat a 12-person jury to hear the case. At that point, Judge Walther dismissed the jury pool and thanked them for their service.

The next opportunity for the court to hear the case in Schleicher County appears to be in October. Due to the

lack of air conditioning in the court room, the judge usually schedules jury trials in the months of April or October.

The lawsuit brought by Dr. Sloan against the hospital district alleges that the district violated the terms of a contract when he was discharged on Dec. 31, 2000. The hospital district denies the allegation and has asked for a jury trial.

Van Zandt chased Davis on foot, but momentarily lost him in the darkness. Just then, the trooper found the fugitive hiding under a cedar bush. Davis was arrested and booked into the Sutton County Jail and charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, evading arrest and DWI.

Now, Davis also faces charges for escape, a 3rd degree felon that carries a penalty of 2-10 years in prison and a fine not to exceed until proven guilty in a court of law. \$10,000.


Sutton County Sheriff Joe Fincher noted Davis' long criminal record made it unlikely that he would remain free for long. "Guys like him can't stay out of trouble," Fincher told the Success. "We were sure we would be seeing him again."




