McCamey Wins 35-12

EHS Drops Homecoming Game

The McCamey Badgers put the first points on the scoreboard, and never trailed the Eldorado Eagles in their 35 to 12 victory over the Eagles in nondistrict play.

The Badgers took the opening kickoff and drove 83 yards in 12 plays for their initial score against the Eagles, with B.J. Terry scampering from the 14.

But the Eagles struck back quickly taking the ensuing kickoff 60 yards in 8 plays, with Keith McCormack dancing in from the 10 out of the fabled spread offense of the Eagles. The PAT attempt by Eddie Montalvo failed.

The Badgers advanced the ball down the field on their next several possessions in quite an unusual way.

Joel Robledo recovered a Badger miscue at their 40, only to have the Badgers retain possession in Eagle territory after an Eagle fumble. The ball exchanged hands three times before the Badgers struck paydirt for the second time of the evening, with Terry scoring on a five yard run. The PAT was added and the Eagles found themselves trailing 14-6.

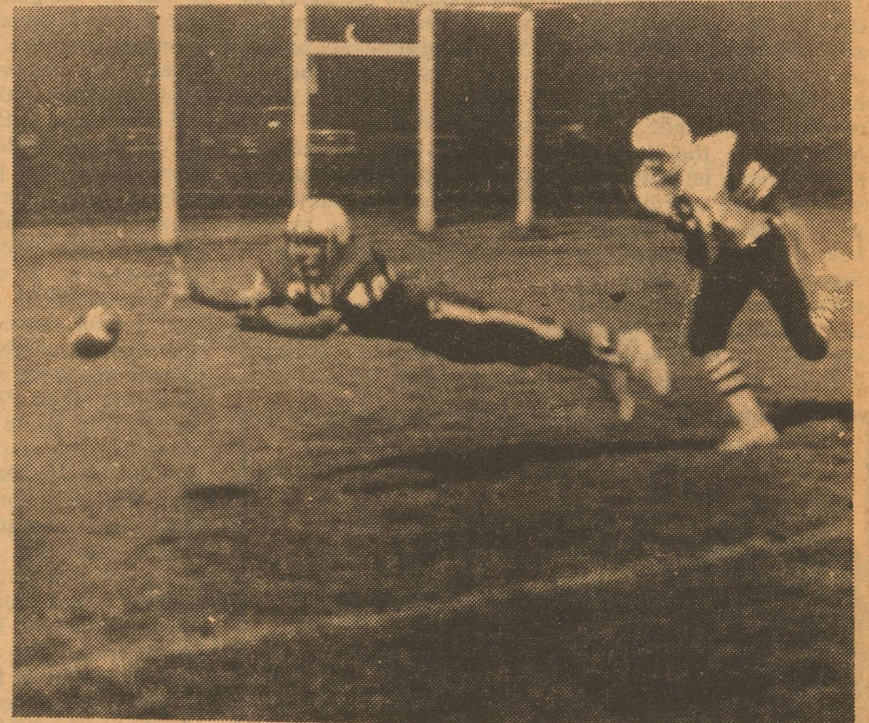
The Badgers then rolled up 21 unanswered points to almost totally put the game out of Eagle reach. Terry added another score in the second quarter, while fullback Ben Ferguson added 6 on a third stanza, 35-yard run. Quarterback Velasquez for the Badgers rounded out the scoring on a 1 yard run.

But Eldorado was by far not

finished for the evening, with a little under two minutes left in the game reserve quarterback Mike Griffith led the Eagles downfield for the final score of the evening. After a long gaining run by Montalvo, Griffith threw two passes to McCormack; one for 9 yard gain, and the other for a 11 yard touchdown. The PAT failed and the final score resembled a 35-12 loss for the Eagles on what was this years Homecoming game. The Eagles fell to 1-3 for the year and will open District 9-AA play this week hosting Mason in Eagle Stadium.

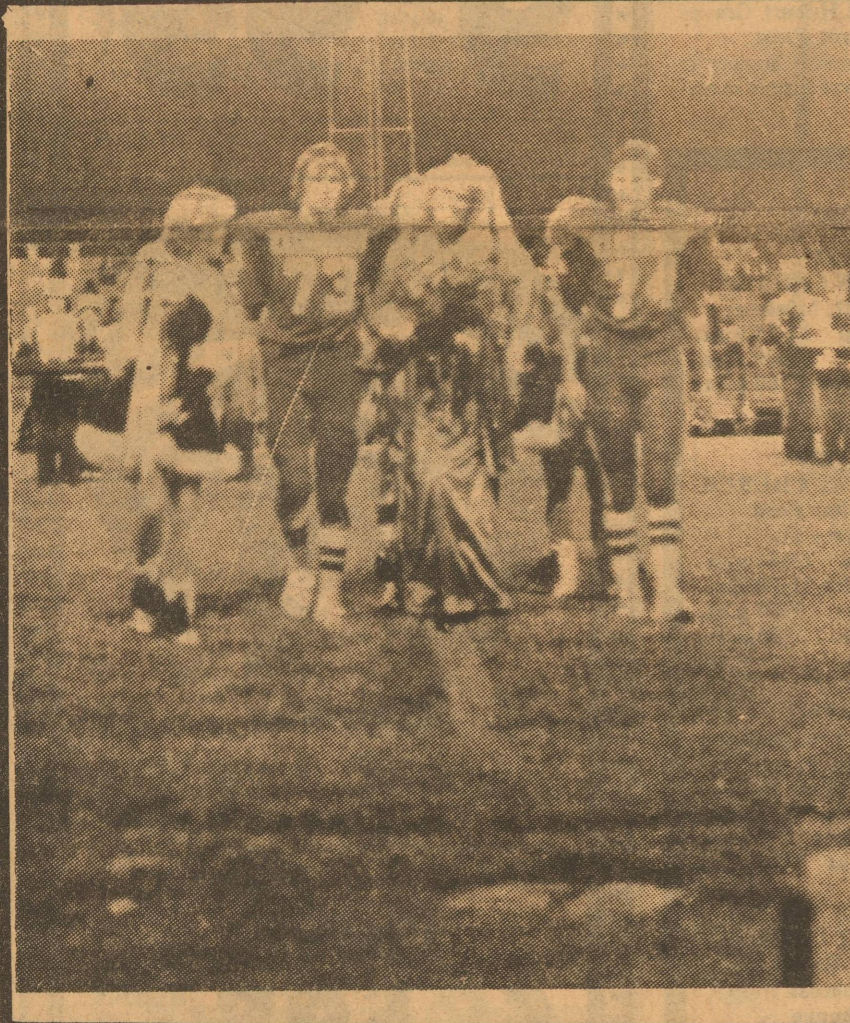

From City Hall

On the agenda this week at the City Council meeting, was the TV Franchise renewal agreement. Due to responses from the community on this matter, the Council feels it is in a good position to negotiate with the franchise personnel.

Also due to good response from you with regard to service from General Telephone, your complaints have been called in to the service department. The public Utility Commission has a monitor on all service calls, so it is important that the San Angelo service number be called in addition to City Hall if you continue to have problems. We have received a number of calls from you concerning the 2 percent City Gross Revenue tax on your bill. We have yet to hear from General Telephone and Public Utility Commission personnel with authorization to pass this charge along to their customers in our City. Our advice would be to hold payment of your bill until the due date or until you hear from us. We will try to get word to you through our column as soon as we feel satisfied as to the legality of charging you the additional 2 percent tax. Gross receipts tax is normally paid by a franchise company to the City for the use of streets and alleys and is not charged back. We were not notified of this charge until you called our attention to it.

Next week, there will be a public hearing on the W.T.U. requested rate increase. This would be the appropriate time to air your feelings in this matter.

Our trash collection personnel are taken for granted! They have a difficult task. Just an observation - you can do a lot to make the trash

pickup easier and better and also make it harder for the dogs to make a mess out of our alleys!

Eldorado does have a dog problem and the dogs are partially living off of garbage placed trashcans. To keep the barrels from being so easy to turn over, you can wire the barrels to the fence, slip a horseshoe over the edge of two barrels to keep the barrels together, or devise some method of keeping the barrels upright. The trash collection personnel would rather unchain, unhook, or unhook the barrels than pickup garbage from the ground. Actually, they should not be asked to pick up the garbage; the condition of the garbage is your responsibility. Garbage is certainly not pleasant!

With the rain many garbage cans are heavier than usual because the water will not drain out so they are making holes in the bottom of each barrels as time permits. Also, many of you are continuing to place rocks in the barrel and burning your trash. Barrels with evidence of rocks and recent burning will be left.

These men who work for our Sanitation Department are taken for granted. The next time you see them, tell them what a good job they are doing! They don't get many pats on the back for doing a job that is not only unpleasant but hard work. Whenever things are going well, few people give them credit. But just let it rain and they cannot get down the alleys and they get the brunt of it while trying to catch up! Let's try to help them as much as possible or we may find ourselves without them!

P.S. Thanks to whoever replaced the light on the water tower!!!

Firemen Get New Truck; Place High at Convention in Sonora

A lot can be said about the list of volunteers now serving in our volunteer fire department, but I am for certain that none of it is bad. We have quite a reputation built up over west Texas by our firemen, and it is something that each and every one of us as citizens should be proud of.

Last week, our firemen displayed their talents quite well in taking two first place finishes and a second place finish at the Hill Country Firemen's Assn. convention held in Sonora.

The only item that the firemen have raised their voice about in the past was the lack of new or 'Better' equipment supplied to them.

But the firemen have fell nowhere

short of this in initiative. After the city purchased a new pumper truck (see related photo in this issue), the firemen took it upon themselves to try to find some way to buy or build a newer piece of machinery to combat the many grass and range fires that occur inside the County. They have done just that.

With the help of the commissioners Court they have purchased a chassis so that they may very well replace at least one of the old, outdated fire units used to battle county fires.

For this, and many more notable reasons, I feel that we all should salute our firemen during National Fire Prevention Week, October 5-12.

EDITORIAL

Members of the Eldorado Community, it is time that each and every one of us should take action to resolve one of the many problems that has faced our community for years.

Most of you have probably already assumed that I am talking about the problems linked directly to the amount of stray dogs running loose inside our City limits. The time has come for each of us to take a stand. Recent incidents involving stray dogs have increased.

If the recent attack on a local child is not enough to want you to take action, maybe what has happened to two local farmers whose farms extend to the city limits. One farmer told me of what happened during the previous weekend.

"While out of town for the

weekend, a pack of stray dogs managed to enter my chicken house and kill every chicken I owned. Not a single chicken was left alive and the losses are substantial."

Yet another farmer reports that he has lost three sheep at the edge of the city limits in as many weeks. I feel that it is time that each and every one of us do something.

One might propose a leash law, but the city has neither funds personnel, or the ability of a city court to enforce such a proposal. In order to attain a leash law a lot of government red tape and cost would have to be met. But there is a low cost alternative that would somewhat help to mandate better care for our pets and protection of the individual taxpayer.

I wish not to advocate a leash law for Eldorado, but I suggest that the City Council take action and adopt a

proposition (ordinance that would establish a city law "that all dogs allowed to roam freely inside the city limits should be properly tagged as to who owns the dog, and said owner will be liable for all damages ascertained by their pet." I also propose that the Council adopt stringent penalties for failure to comply.

But one still questions as to where the case would be heard if a complaint against a dog were to be lodged? According to the Texas

Penal Code, a recent revision states that in all municipalities, where a municipal court has not been established, all complaints will be heard in the court of the Justice of the Peace.

We have the complaints, we have the means by which to help resolve part of the damage caused by stray dogs, but do we have enough citizens who are concerned enough to want to alleviate the problem? I stand on the issue and call for your help and support in doing something about the problem we now face.

Joe Sullivan, San Antonio, Democratic nominee for the 21st Congressional District representative seat, will meet with members of the Eldorado Community on Friday, October 17, at the Eldorado Restaurant. Democratic organizations from surrounding counties will also send delegations to the meeting, according to Dick Preston, County party chairman for Schleicher County. All interested parties are urged to attend.

Hospital Auxiliary Recaps History; Outlines Future Plans

In this area, the Schleicher County Hospital Auxiliary is recognized as one of the outstanding civic organizations. Though it has only been in existence since the fall of 1969, the list of accomplishments is quite impressive.

To assist in the formation of this club, several ladies came to Eldorado from the auxiliaries of the Hudspeth Hospital in Sonora and the Crockett County Hospital in Ozona. Mrs. W.G. Godwin was elected as the first auxiliary and is mainly to supplement the excellent facilities provided by the county and to offer whatever help possible to the doctors' and nurses' staff.

The first project of this group was in celebration of the first Christmas that the hospital and nursing home were in existence. A large mechanical Santa Claus was placed in one corner of the lobby. Santa has stood in that same place each Yuletide ever since. In the dining room was placed an artificial tree lavishly decorated. A nativity scene has been prominent just outside the entrance to the building. On the door of each patient in both the nursing home and the hospital, a seasonal poster has been placed. A real live Santa Claus has visited the nursing home each year at the Christmas party bringing a gift for each resident patient. Christmas is a

happy time for everyone.

Other social events are scheduled throughout the year. A birthday party is given each month honoring those patients having a birthday that month. Other activities include parties for other special occasions—Halloween, Valentine, Easter, etc.. Singing groups and square dances occasionally furnish entertainment. The auxiliary provides prizes for the Bingo games.

Our auxiliary members volunteer their services and talents out of a dedication for their fellow people. A few of such services include giving manicures, helping to feed patients, writing letters and providing transportation for church attendance.

Many items of equipment and expendables have been acquired through the efforts of the auxiliary. For the beauty shop, the auxiliary purchased the shampoo chair and the dryer as well as cosmetic supplies. Several local beauty operators have staffed the beauty parlor at specified times, often donating their services for a patient unable to pay. Other equipment for the comfort and enjoyment has been paid for by his loyal group, including a whirlpool bath, two wheel chairs and a commode chair. A stereo and record player as well as a Polaroid camera have been provided.

The piano was completely renovated, also.

In other areas of the hospital complex, there is evident the efforts of the auxiliary. New draperies and carpet for the dining room have been installed. Patio furniture, furniture for the sitting area, and a rocker for the nursery have been procured. Special equipment for the hospital secured through the auxiliary funds include an E.K.G. machine, I-Vac, mobile blood pressure machines, Life-Pack for the emergency room, and a heart monitor for the I.C.U. Funds were contributed to the purchase of a dry developer. In the year 1979-1980, the auxiliary purchased over \$5000.00 worth of equipment for the medical facility.

Scholarships have been made available to worthy high school students in their senior year who plan on studying nursing. Can you imagine how all the money to finance these ventures has been accumulated? To celebrate the tenth birthday of the medical installation in Eldorado, a community-wide reception was held. A plea was issued at this time asking financial help from local citizens. Nearly every organization in the community responded by sponsoring a fund raising affair, the proceeds of which were contributed to the auxiliary.

The Beta Sigma Phi held a dance. The Home Demonstration Club participated in a bake sale. The Tennis Club and the Eldorado Golf Club held tournaments at which times the auxiliary manned the concession stands. The Lions Club made a donation. The Duplicate Bridge Club contributed the proceeds from one of their tournaments. The auxiliary also sold singing valentines, held bake sales and participated in community "Arts and Crafts" fairs.

Another source of income is the living memorials made in honor of a loved one. This year's chair-j woman is Mrs. Arch Mittel.

If you wish to make such a remembrance, please send your contribution directly to Mrs. Mittel.

Each member pays dues of \$3.00 yearly, bakes cakes and makes other contributions during the year.

The gift shop is a source of additional income. It is staffed by members and is open each weekday afternoon. Articles sold are donated or purchased from wholesale houses. Take a look at the nice variety of items available in the lobby.

Special commendation is due the past presidents who have served so diligently. In order of office these include Mrs. W.G. Godwin, Mrs. Edna Watson (deceased), Mrs. Roll Ratliff, Mrs. Mittel and Mrs. Sykes.

The current president, Mrs. Sykes; Vice president, John Stigler; Treasurer, Mrs. Granville; and Secretary, Mrs. Arch Mittel, are all active in the auxiliary. Since the auxiliary has involved the efforts of more persons, the situation, an Oct. 6, 1980 hospital dinner for the Junior Hospital. Twenty three members attended, each with enthusiasm. A question was distributed among new projects were suggested among which would be the creation of a parking activity center, a new clinic and a park area outside the hospital where children could play during visitations and parents could sit.

New members are being solicited by each auxiliary. It is to be emphasized that any person of either group of the community is welcome at every meeting. The Senior Auxiliary meets the first Thursday of each month at 9:30 a.m. in the hospital dining room. The Monday following this meeting, the Junior auxiliary will meet in the same location at 7:30 p.m. It is
