## Sheriff announces storm warning procedures


Sheriff David Doran announced that procedures are in place to warn the public in the event that a tornado or a severe thunderstorm threatens Eldorado. He noted that the siren, which routinely sounds at noon each weekday, is also used to summon volunteer firefighters. However, tornado or severe weather warnings will be conducted as follows:

1. A one minute-long siren blast followed by a pause of 20 seconds;

2. A second one minute-long blast of the siren followed by a pause of 20-seconds;

3. A third one minute-long blast of the siren followed by a pause of 3 minutes.

4. At that time if the immediate Eldorado area is still threatened by a tornado the warning sequence will begin again.
