School Board Grants Salary Raises

Faculty members and administration staff of Eldorado school system received a raise in salary during the school board meeting last week. They received approximately 10 percent of the base state salary.

Beginning salary for a teacher with a bachelors degree is \$1000 above base, and after two years of service will be increased to \$1250. \$1250 above base will be starting salary for a teacher with a masters degree, and after two years of service be increased to \$1500 above base. Other salary adjustments were made in all other areas.

New officers were elected for the coming year which are Dr. J.B. Brame, president, Billy Williams, vice-president, Lynn Meador, secretary, and Ray Ballew, tax assessor.

Gary Donaldson, San Angelo architect, presented an updated report on the building program and the remodeling of the elementary and high school buildings. He will give a more detailed report at the next meeting.

The board discussed the school insurance for students, athletes, and faculty and have received proposals from Keystone, Mutual, and Heritage Insurance Companies. No decision has been made yet as to what type of policy will be accepted,

but board members are leaning toward a "no excess" policy.

A request by Nathan's Jewelers of San Angelo to donate a new scoreboard for the football field was approved.

The bus route for 1980-81 school year was discussed and Superintendent Guy Whitaker was authorized to work out appropriate routes and make adjustments on special pick-up arrangements. The board

also approved the purchase of a new school bus.

The vocational travel budget for the homemaking and agriculture classes was approved along with the purchase of a new typewriter for the journalism department.

A school board workshop at Angelo State University today from 1-4 p.m. will be attended by several members.

Competing schools send six issues of their paper and individual articles to be judged by ILPC by February 1 each year.

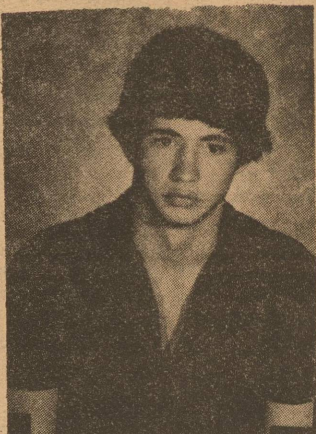
