

Local Elections Saturday

Saturday, will be a big day for Eldorado, with local residents voting for members of the school board, city council and hospital board of directors.

Voting for the school board and hospital board will be in the high school building and voting for the city council will be at the fire hall. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Voters will have to choose between three candidates for two positions on the school board. Candidates are incumbents Billy Williams and Lynn Meador, plus Dan Griffin, who is a former member of the board. Terms

will be for three years.

Six persons will be vying for positions on the hospital board, which has four open places. Incumbents are Curtis Andrews, E.C. "Pete" Peters and Mike Moore filed for re-election as well as Dawn Meador, Joe Andrews and Sam Henderson Jr. Terms will be for two years.

For city council, there are also six persons, Nick Robledo, John Callison, Charlie Niblett, Rusty Meador, David Vannett and Bob Lester, running for three open positions.

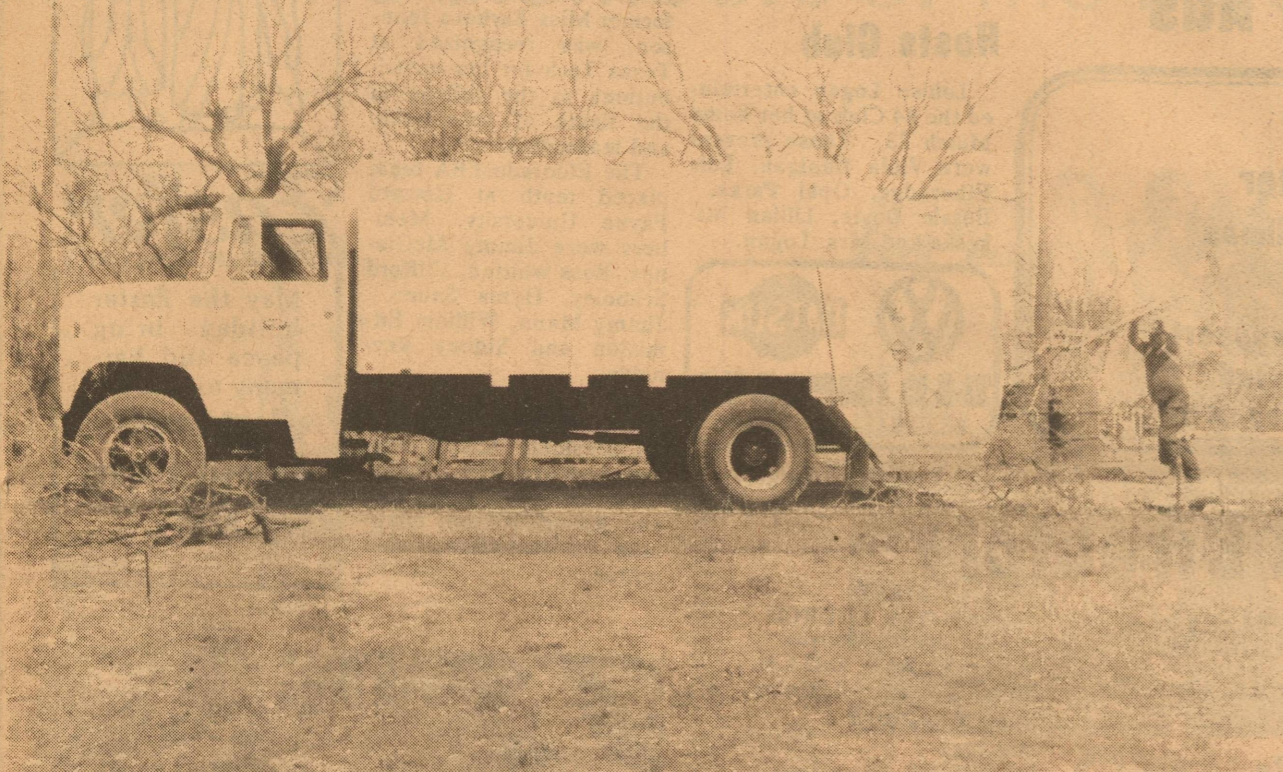

Auto Accident Claims The Life of Local Businessman, Deral Moody

A one vehicle accident early Monday morning 12 miles northeast of Sonora claimed the life of a local businessman, Deral Edwin Moody, 36. The accident happened about 12:30 a.m.

Services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the First Presbyterian Church of Eldorado with burial in Eldorado Cemetery.

Mr. Moody was born June 25, 1943 in Sulphur, Okla. He graduated from Sweetwater High School and married Pam Jones Feb. 15, 1964. They had lived on the Sam Jones ranch close to Fort Mckavett

for the past 12 years. A digger operator, he was owner of Buckhorn Drilling Company and a rancher.

Survivors include his wife, Pam; one son Duwain; a daughter, Melanie; one brother, David Moody of Eagle Pass; four sisters, Fern Brady of Boerne, Lilly Montgomery of Fargo, Okla., Rose Methlock of Pampa and Elene Porter of San Antonio; his mother, Violet Moodyham of Medicine Park, Okla.; his maternal grandmother, Sallie Williams of Medicine Park and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. C.C. Moody of Tishamingo, Okla.

Predators Are Still Present

When Schleicher County and the City of Eldorado were young, it was not uncommon to hear the yelp of a coyote just outside the city limits. Predators such as coyotes, red fox and bobcats were a tremendous threat to the ranchman.

They continued to be a threat and several years ago, several ranchmen here formed the Schleicher County Producers Association, which is a trapping club formed to pay for a county trapper. Members of the club paid a yearly fee of \$15 per section of land and the county paid \$200 a month as part of the trapper's salary. The rest of his salary was paid by state and local funds.

The trapper was put in charge of finding, tracking and trapping predators in the county, and submitting a written report to the county commissioners court each month.

However, several months ago, the county decided to discontinue its financial support of the program. Therefore, ranchmen are now paying \$20 a section fee to make up for

the slack.

Ronnie Mittel, secretary-treasurer of the group, noted that there are 1300 sections of land in Schleicher County and only 25-30 percent of the landowners participate in the program by paying their dues, which are payable now.

He also added that ranchers and agriculture leaders are finding an increase of predators in surrounding counties. "They are here, too, he added, saying that a male coyote

was run over on the old San Angelo highway and another was seen close to the same location.

Ranchers here are afraid that if the group folds from lack of support, predators will be a bigger than ever threat to the ranchmen even as much as when the county and city were young.

Dues for the organization should be paid to the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office, located behind Meadors-Peters Agency.

Voting Very Important!

Things are popping out all over and that doesn't mean that the weeds that will grow after that rain we got last week. That means new construction and new ideas for the betterment of our community. The school buildings have come quite a ways in the past few weeks, even to the point where you can visualize how large the new cafeteria, learning center and elementary wing will be.

The construction of the county's new law enforcement center has begun, too, with the hum of bulldozers and other machinery living up the courthouse square. And across the highway from there the bank is clearing off several old buildings, making room for a new building sometime in the future.

Although there are no bulldozers or cranes at the site yet, the hospital will also experience a new addition, with final plans to be announced later this year.

The city has begun work to rid the town of abandoned cars and trucks, some of which have been an eyesore for many a year. That agency has also begun plans for paving several streets and just recently purchased a new dump truck to facilitate easier pickup of garbage.

In the meantime, several persons have become very interested in the community and are running for positions on the four governmental agencies. In fact, it appears that this is the first time there has been this much competition in some of these races.

All this, of course, comes from the fact that this area is experiencing a new business and population growth and the fact that people here have realized that some of the facilities we had would not meet the demands of a growing population. So, they are taking the needed steps to fill these needs and keep up with the population.

Whether or not the community remains to grow in a reasonable fashion and keeps up with these demands is left up to the people on the governmental agencies. That is why it is so important for everyone to vote in Saturday's election for the school board, hospital board and city council.

In years gone by, the election turnout in this county was very poor, even to the point that only half of the voters cast a ballot.

There is no real reason why everyone cannot vote in a town this size and this is the one true way for everyone to show their interest in a growing community and support for the leaders of that community.

USDA's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) is currently making a study of alternative ways in which a National Plant Materials Centers Program can be conducted that responds to resource conservation needs. Fred Stumberg, SCS district conservationist at Eldorado, says his agency is asking for the public's views on alternatives under consideration and for other proposals. Stumberg says SCS, in cooperation with other Federal and State agencies

and through other arrangements, presently operates and maintains 22 plant materials centers (PMC's) in the United States. Each center develops new plants for conservation purposes in the geographic area it serves that are released jointly with the State's agricultural experiment station and other State and Federal agencies to commercial growers for production. The plant materials center serving Texas and Oklahoma is located at Knox

City, Texas. A key plant that has been released from the center in the past is Selection-75 kleingrass. "The range of alternatives being studied for conducting a National Plant Materials Centers Program vary from continuation of the program as is to transferring complete operations and management of the centers over to nonfederal entities," Stumberg said. "First, we need to know what the public needs and wants—and possible alternative ways nat-

ional conservation plant materials needs might be met." Additional information concerning the plant materials program may be obtained at the SCS office in Eldorado. Fred said that SCS would welcome concerned citizens inquiries and expressions of views.

Interested persons wishing to comment about the direction they think the future plant materials program should take are being encouraged to write letters by April 1 to George C. Marks, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76501.

Social Security Announces New Toll Free Number

There is a new toll-free telephone number for Schleicher County residents to call when they have social security questions according to Frank Upp, Social Security Manager, in San Angelo.

Residents of Schleicher County may simply dial direct 112-800-392-1603 and reach personnel who are specially trained to accept reports and answer social security questions by telephone.

Garland Gregg, social security representative from the San Angelo office, will continue to visit Eldorado monthly. Any residents may contact him at the County Courthouse. In the meantime, how-

ever, "many social security questions and reports can be handled by telephone, any weekday, at the caller's convenience," Upp said. "A few examples are questions about Medicare, requests for retirement benefit estimates, address changes from social security beneficiaries to insure prompt delivery of their monthly checks, beneficiaries' reports of earnings, questions about the disability provisions of the law, and inquiries about supplemental security income." The agency refers to this type of service as "Teleservice." Schleicher County area teleservice is available from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

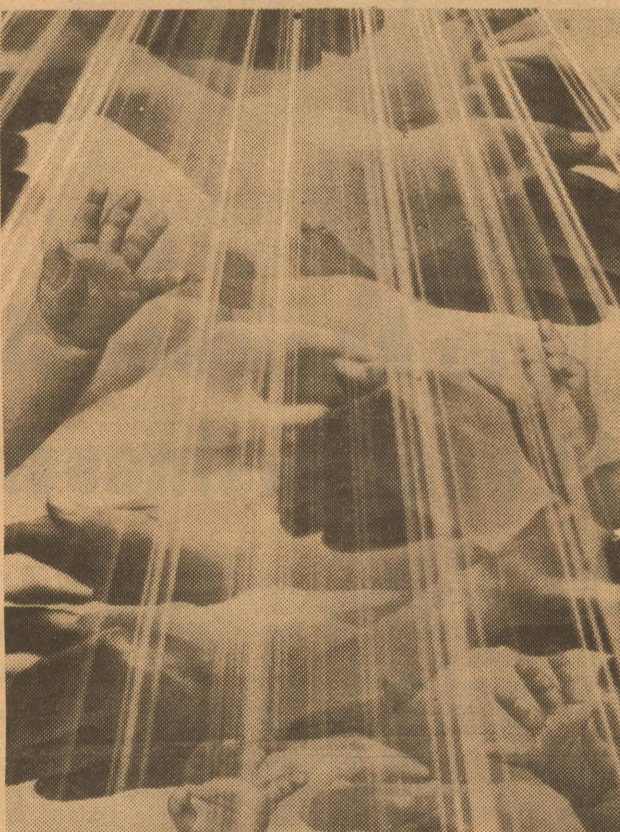

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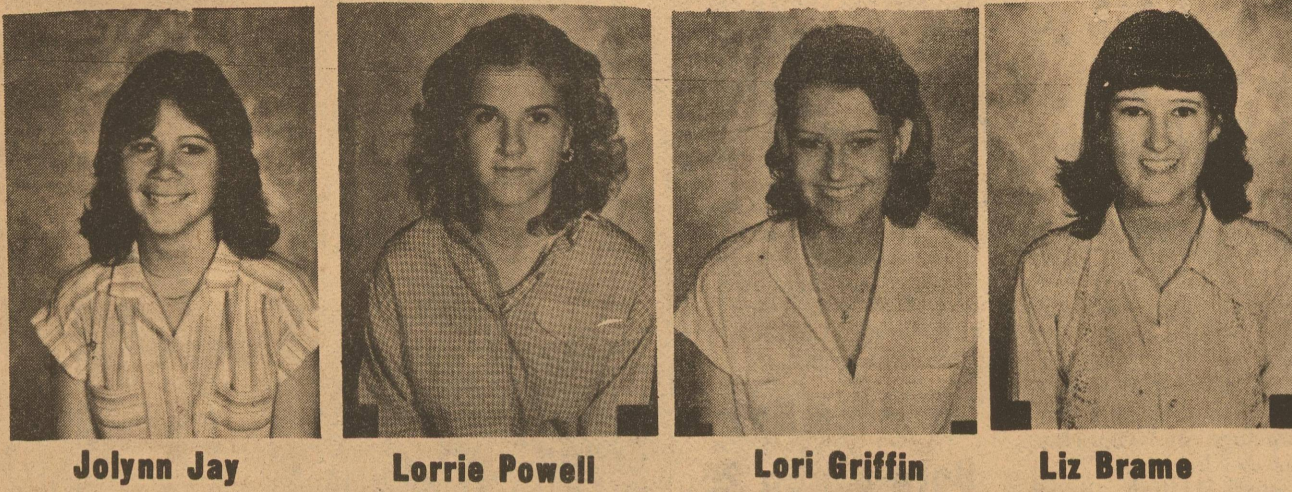

EHS Attendance Policy Revised

Two revisions have been added to the attendance policy at Eldorado High School. Added to the former policy is a provision for attending FFA and 4-H stock shows and for using discretionary days of absence per year.

Students who are enrolled in agriculture courses or who are members of 4-H

clubs will be excused to participate in stock shows with three provisions.

First of all, the agriculture teacher or 4-H club sponsor has to request in writing that the student be excused. The request should be given to the student's principal before the absence. Classwork should be made up in advance, if possible, which will be left to the discretion of the principal and teacher.

Secondly, 4-H club and FFA sponsors are requested to coordinate their requests for excused absences, if possible, to avoid confusion about hours or days missed. Purpose of the regulation is to insure that all excused absences are reasonable and necessary.

Third, all students must adhere to University of

Interscholastic League rules.

Students will be allowed two discretionary days per year to be absent. The days may be used for reasons deemed necessary by the parent and will be excused with make-up. The school has to receive written notification from the parent and/or guardian one week in advance. Parents are asked to use these days judiciously and only when there is no alternative. Senior students will be allowed one extra day for college visitation.

Remaining the same is the provision for excused absences with make-up allowed. Absence permits are allowed only for personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, dangerous travel conditions, or unusual causes acceptable

to the school. The causes must be rare and not set a precedent.

Student absence may occur with parental permission but may be classified by the principal as unexcused and will not be approved as eligible for makeup work.

Students may not leave the campus under any circumstances without written permission from the parent and/or the office. They must first check out through the office or school nurse. Leaving school without such permission will be considered truancy.

If a student is absent, he/she must bring a written and signed statement from the parent stating the reason for and the date of the absence.

The new revisions of the policy were accepted during the school board meeting two weeks ago.

F.F.A. Team Comes In First

Also, Brian Gawrychowski tied for first as high individual in beef cattle judging with a score of 198 out of a possible 200 points.

The junior wool judging team won third in the contest. Members are Mike Wilks, Clint Bumgardner and Kelly Kerr.

In the fleece judging, six of the top ten boys were from Eldorado, with Powell winning first, Griffith winning third, Wilks taking fourth, Bumgardner placing fifth, Sparks placing sixth and Ray placing ninth.

In grading fleeces, Pow-

ell, Sparks, Griffith, Ray, Bumgardner and Wilks were named in the top ten and in individual judging scores, Powell, Griffith, sparks, Wilks, ray and Bumgardner were in the top ten.

The livestock judging team of Kirk Griffin, Shane Wells, Jimmy Lloyd and Eddie Harris and the junior team of Gawrychowski, Nicky Dahlberg, Greg Garlitz and Gene Edmiston also took part in the meet. The junior team was fifth high in judging sheep and third high in judging beef cattle.

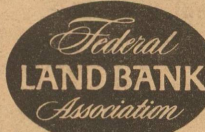
Neills Have Baby Boy

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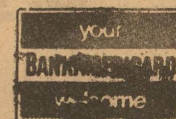
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Nixon Wins Again

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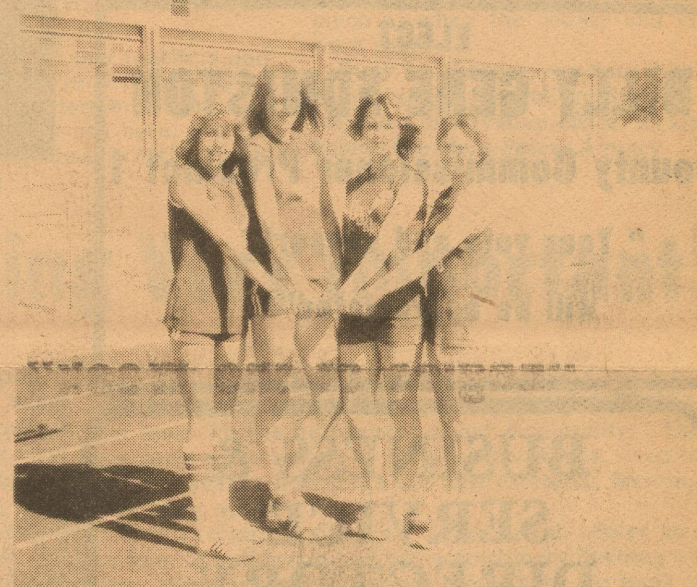
