Junior High Eaglettes Win First In Eldorado Track Meet Friday

The Eldorado junior high girls took the top trophy during the junior high track meet held here last week, with the seventh grade boys winning third and the eighth grade boys winning fifth.

In girls competition, Eldorado scored a total of 94 points, followed by Junction with 89 for a second, Reagan County with 86 for a third, Mason with 70 for fourth, Irion County with 50 for fifth and Wall with 46 for sixth place.

Mason took the eighth grade boys division with 86 points. Second went to Sonora with 80 points, third went to Winters with 71 points, fourth to Wall with 66 1/2 points, fifth to Eldorado with 59 points, and sixth to Junction with 57 1/2 points.

The Sonora boys took first in the seventh grade boys contest with a

whopping 160 1/3 points. Mason took second with 151 points, Eldorado had 54 points for third, Junction had 46 1/3 points for fourth, Reagan County took fifth with 28 1/3 points and Wall won sixth with 27 points.

The Eaglettes were helped with a fourth place in the triple jump by Rita Adame and a fourth in the shot put by Margaret Turner. Gina Patton won fifth in the high jump and Rita Adame won fourth in the long jump.

Jennifer Willoughby, Laura Lozano, Charlotte Mobley and Gina Patton took a fourth in the 400 meter relay while Rita Adame won first in the 600 meter run. The same relay team won first in the 800 meter relays.

In the 300 meter dash, Tammy Farries won fifth, Gina Patton won fifth in the 100 meter hurdles and Jennifer Willoughby won third in the 100 meter dash.

In the 200 meter dash, Laura Lozano and Rita Adame won third and fourth, respectively. Likewise, Debbie Sutto and Della Heffernan took fourth and fifth in the 1200 meter run. In the 1200 meter relay, Stephanie Field, Vicki Cavaness, Barbara Clinton and Rita Adame won second.

EIGHTH GRADE BOYS

The eighth grade boys got several points for a first place win by Wendall Yarborough in the high jump and a second place by Michael Phillips in the pole vault. Also in the field events, John Dean won sixth in the discus.

In the 400 meter relays, Adon Santellano, Douglas Ussery, Wendall Yarborough and Sammy Santellano won a first place. Yarborough also won a fourth in the 100 meter hurdles and Ussery won first in the 200 meter low hurdles. Sammy Santellano won a second in the 100 meter dash to also help the team.

In the 1200 meter relay, Adon Santellano, Sammy Santellano, Douglas Ussery and Richard Gibson placed sixth.

SEVENTH GRADE BOYS

Seventh grader Brett Nikolauk won a third place in the shot put for the Eagles and Chris Woodward won a third in the high jump, with Tim McAngus winning fifth in the same contest.

In the running events, Tim McAngus, Chris Woodward, Brett Nikolauk and Bobby Williams won third in the 400 meter relays. McAngus, Mark Nikolauk, Williams and Woodward teamed up to take a fourth in the 1200 meter relays later.

In the 100 meter hurdles, Victor Gutierrez won fourth and in the 200 meter low hurdles, Bobby Williams won second and Gutierrez won fifth.

McAngus won third in the 200 meter dash.

COC Sets New Goals

Several possible goals for the newly reorganized Chamber of Commerce were discussed during a meeting of the group last Thursday. Consensus of the group was to clean up and make improvements in the downtown section of Eldorado, having a hunter's ball in the fall and sponsoring the Santa Claus Celebration in December.

The group also discussed ways to bring in recreational activities for youngsters and promoting existing businesses here.

The group was outlining possible goals to put before businessmen before beginning a membership drive in the near future.

Another meeting will be held at noon March 20 in the club room of the Dairy Mart. Lunch will be a dutch treat.

City Council Begins Paving Project

Several items were discussed during the regular meeting of the Eldorado City Council during its regular meeting last week. Several of the items were tabled until a meeting last Tuesday, which will be reported at a later date.

The council heard a report on street paving from Mayor Jimmy Doyle. Caliche work on alleys and streets has begun and paving caliche streets will begin in the near future.

The council appointed Billie Porter as presiding election judge in the April election.

Council members compared gas rates from other surrounding cities and discussed revising and equalizing gas rates in the city. Further discussion was to take place at the next meeting.

Also tabled until the next meeting was personnel policies which the council discussed at the meeting.

Bob Lester and Rusty Meador gave the council a demonstration on ambulance service and equipment. The emergency service is asking the council for assistance in paying for the ambulance, a request which was also tabled until the next

meeting.

The council was advised that some of the fencing project has been completed and more would be done soon.

Several items were sold during the meeting including a propane tank sold to E.H. Topliffe, a water tank sold to DMF Enterprises, and a calculator, typewriter and two adding machines sold to Bill Radle.

The council made plans during the meeting to pull well number one behind city hall as it has not been pulled for over 30 years and was out of operation.

New Ambulance Gives Residents Better Care

Schleicher County now has a new ambulance for emergency service which arrived about ten days ago and has already been used several times.

The new ambulance, a Superior brand, is especially designed for emergency care, complete with enough headroom for attendants, easy access to oxygen, the capacity to handle more than one patient and a special suspension system.

The purchase of the new emergency vehicle came after personnel from Schleicher County Emergency Service were faced with continuous repairs on the old ambulance. The old vehicle was actually a recreational van revamped into an ambulance. It was small and not well equipped for emergency care.

In addition, the old ambulance failed to be up to par with the extensive training service's person-

nel, which now number over 20, had completed within the previous year.

The new ambulance now gives Eldorado double ambulance coverage, as the old ambulance will be used for non-urgent transfers and as a back-up unit. The new vehicle will then be used only in true emergency situations.

Even though the service did not have enough funds to pay for the new vehicle at first, they decided to purchase the van with money received from the county commissioners court and the hospital board for fear of having to pay double the money for a van next year because of rising inflation costs. Also this ambulance was available immediately.

The cause was aided by the county court who donated \$7,000 and the hospital board which donated \$3,000 for the vehicle and \$2,500

for additional radio equipment and secretarial services. That leaves the service with a balance of just over \$8,000 which it borrowed. The SCMS has approached both the city council and the school board for their support, with the school board adding \$2,000 Monday night. Also,

several businesses have been contacted for their support.

An open house in which local townspeople can see the ambulance is being planned for the next few weeks.

Members of the service will meet at 7 p.m. tonight for an orientation program on the new ambulance. The meeting will be in the Lions Club room of the Memorial Building. All members and prospective members are urged to attend. Discussion will be about the new vehicle and its uses.

Eldorado Teachers Ask Board For Salary Increases Monday

About 35 teachers, representing about half of the faculty of the Eldorado school system, met with the school board Monday night to present a program on salaries, requesting the board to consider pay increases.

Teachers Billie Jones, Bobby Helmers, Melonie Reynolds, Jill Preston, Shirley Jackson, Linda Thomas and Shannon Harbor presented the program and compared salaries of the local school system with the state base pay.

They also presented facts pertaining to the inflation rate as compared to salary increases, the cost of attending school in the summer, cost of living increases and the average number of years of experience of the faculty which is 11 years.

The board took no official action, as board members are uncertain as to the district's evaluation and other factors affecting its budget.

Gary Donaldson, San Angelo architect, reported that the building program was progressing at a good rate of speed. The board approved paying about \$175,000 for expenses in the program incurred during the last two months.

Teachers from grades four through sixth discussed the reading program with the board. The board had filed plans to implement individualized reading into those grades during a self-evaluation program five years ago. However, the teachers told the board they are satisfied

with the present program.

The board also agreed to enter into an agreement with the federal government by which the government would hire an architect and engineer to determine if the old elementary school building is energy sufficient.

The board also agreed to donate \$2,000 to Schleicher County Emergency Service for the operation and/or service of a new ambulance.

In other business, the board:

1. Approved new qualifications for band twirlers.
2. Agreed to permit teachers to attend workshops during the summer and on Saturdays to substitute up to two days of inservice training.

3. Approved the city's request for an easement to service a water line which was moved on the south side of the old elementary building.

4. Approved an attendance policy as submitted by high school principal Richard McCarron.

5. Approved a report from the textbook committee.

6. Approved contracts for all high school and elementary school teachers except for grade school, principal Walter Wallis and accepted the resignation of first grade teacher Donna Mikeska.

Commissioners Shave Jail Bond Indebtness

The building of the new law enforcement center was the major core of the meeting of the Schleicher County Commissioners Court Monday morning. The court met with architect Atmar Atkinson and signed a contract with him.

The court also reduced the county's indebtedness for the building from \$900,000 to \$765,000 because bids on the building were lower than expected. The reduced price was

because of the change from native stone to brick on the outside of the building and taking away the living quarters out of the building.

The court also agreed to let Gynna Jay Harlin operate the county swimming pool this summer.

The court will advertise for bids on the used deputy car and new radio equipment for Department of Public Safety Patrolman Buster Lamb.

operated as a unit of the U.S. 7th Fleet.

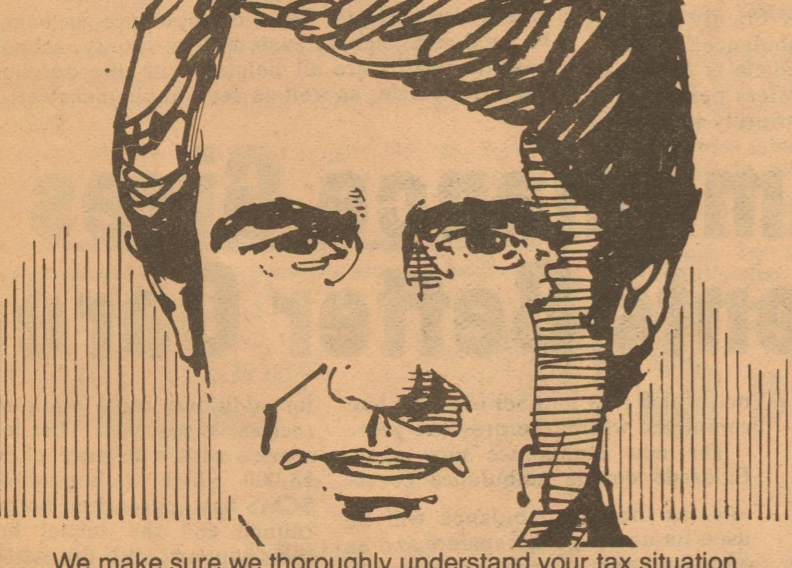

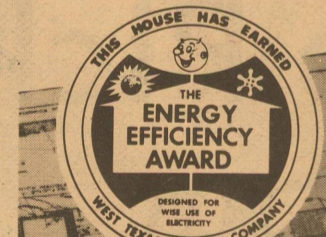

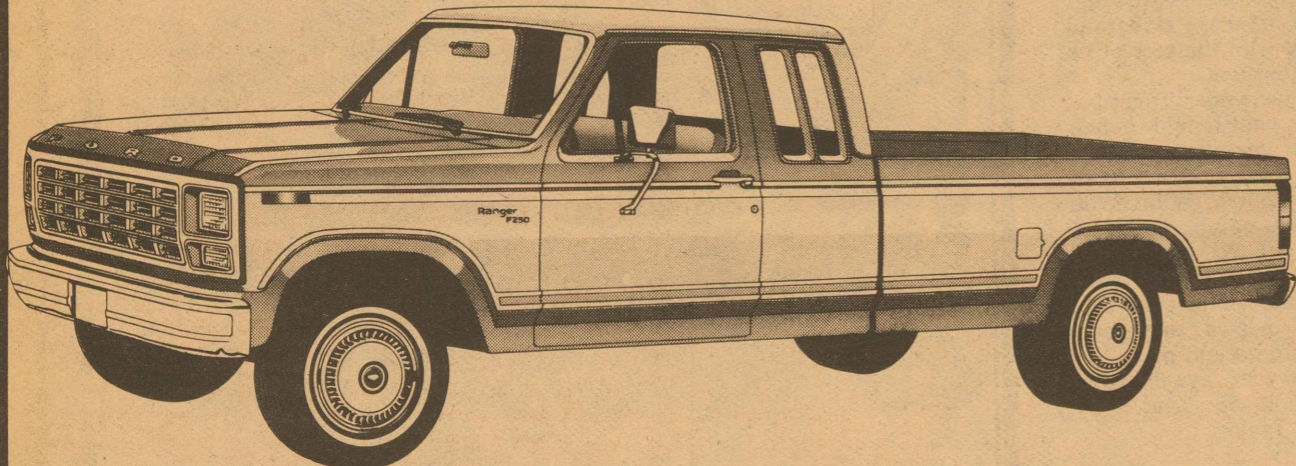

There will be a new feature to the baseball season this year, namely a Pee-Ball division if there are enough interested youngsters to play.

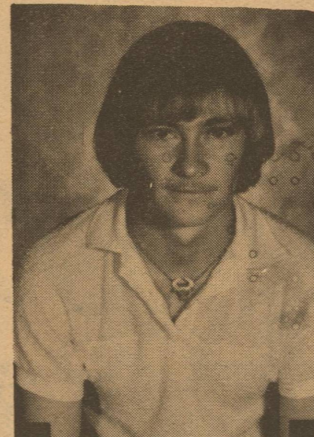

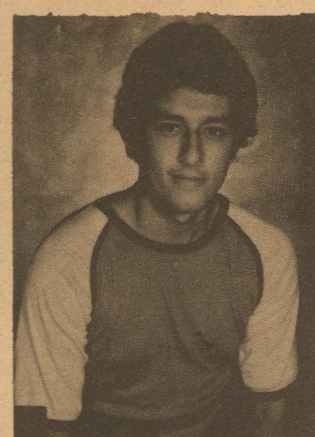

A screening blood test for diabetes is also available for those who wish to have this done. Persons 40 years and over who are not known diabetics are encouraged to take it.

The public is invited to attend and there will be no charge for these services.

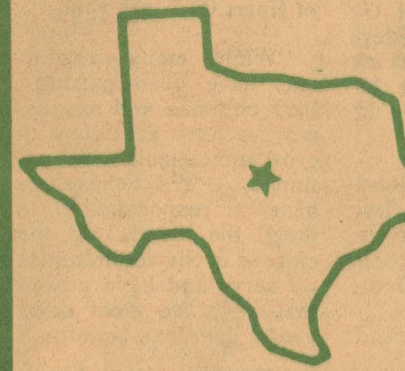

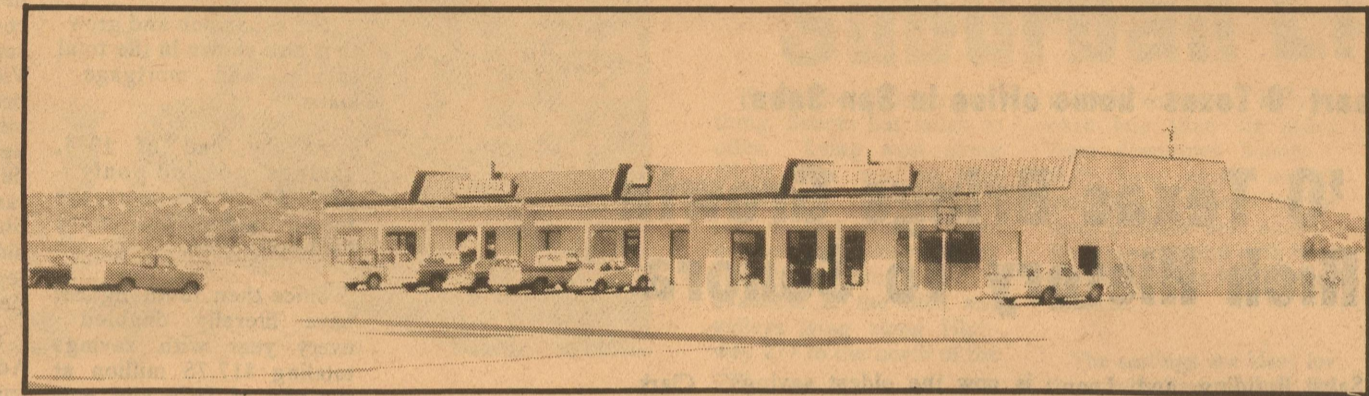

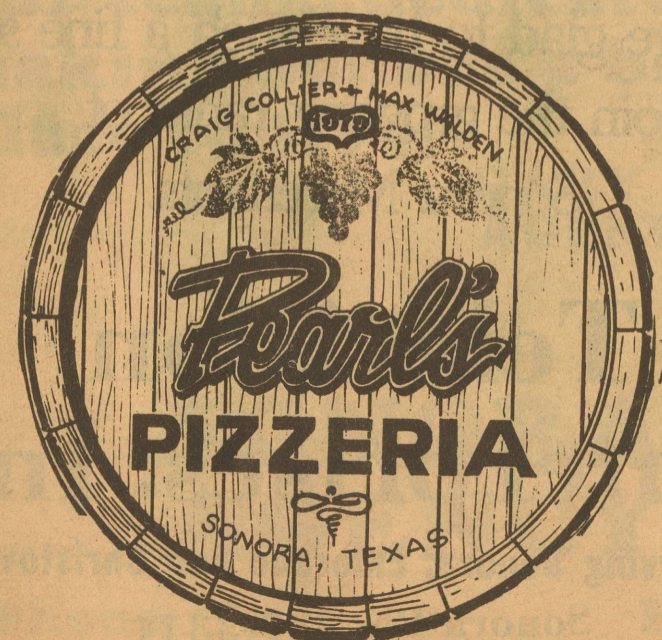

Heart 'O' Texas Brings Growth And Rich History To Sonora

As Heart O' Texas Association opens its new branch office in Sonora, it brings with it a history of strength and one of the most phenomenal growth stories in the industry. Chartered in 1890 as San

Sonora's Housing Shortage End Not In Sight

In the mid-seventies, Sonora was faced with an extraordinary demand for housing. With the influx of people from all over Texas coming to work in the Sonora oil and gas related fields, housing demands were at an all time high. Rental units were completely filled, and families were living in local motels.

With the formation of Mobile Home parks, part of the problem has been solved. Sonora has a total of ten trailer parks located within the city limits. One city official estimated in

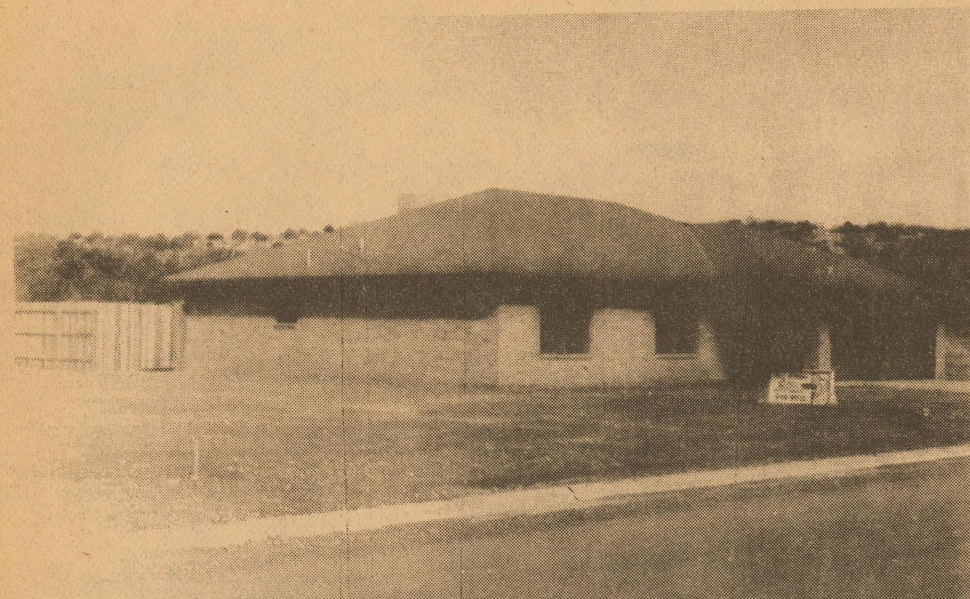
1979 that approximately 450 mobile homes were located within the city limits. This means that on a national average of 3.2 persons per family, that 1,400 Sonora residents or 25 percent of the Sonora population live in these temporary structures.

The need for more and better housing is a constant one. Various efforts are underway to alleviate this problem by the construction of low and medium cost homes in Sonora.

Some Sonora landowners have indicated an interest

to make property available for the construction of 150 homes. Progress on this project is being held up pending the results of a survey made by the Corps of Engineers in September of 1979. Efforts are currently being made by City Manager Jim Dover, to have the results of the survey made available at an early date.

It is hoped that data gained from this survey will enable the city planners, builders, and investors to begin this project that will improve the housing situation in Sonora.



Liveoak Valley, Enterprise Of Charlie Graves, Tommy Thorp

Liveoak Valley is the newest subdivision in Sonora. It is characterized by large lots, all utilities, paved and one-piece rolled curb and gutters. This subdivision is part of the land purchased some three years ago by Houston Natural Gas to provide additional housing locations for their own employees and other citizens of Sonora.

In 1978, an eleven-acre

portion of the HNG property was purchased by a partnership of Charles Graves and Tommy Thorp. The Graves-Thorp partnership then subdivided the land into lots and engineered the surface for proper drainage and installed the paving and utilities.


One home has been built for sale in this development by Bill Wynne Homes, Inc. This home is a modified contemporary design and

has been designed to meet the high standards of energy efficiency dictated by the currently high costs of cooling and heating.


The subdivision is restricted to the construction of homes with a minimum of 1200 square feet of floor space and must be a minimum of 75 percent masonry construction on exterior walls, excluding eaves and entry ways.
