Rock Church Of Christ Begins Marriage Enrichment Seminar

In a day and age where when the divorce rate is extremely high and there is so much pressure on married couples, there is a series of films that can help people face everyday pressures on their marriages.

The Rock Church of Christ will be sponsoring an eight part seminar focusing on the family and marriage beginning Sunday night. Each night there will be a 45 minute film presented by Dr. Carl Bre-

chen and Dr. Paul Faulkner. Dr. Brechen has taught courses on family relations for 19 years on the university level. He is a member of the National Council on Family Relations and serves on the staff of Power for today.

Dr. Faulkner is director for the Institute of Family Services in Abilene. He retains a private practice in marriage and family counseling. He is a clinical member and approved sup-

ervisor of the American Association of Marriage and Psychological Studies and the American Psychological Association.

The seminar will be at 6 p.m. each Sunday night for the next eight weeks.

Subject matter each night is: Made for Each Other, The Trouble With Us Is Me, What Husbands Need To Know, What Wives Need To Know, How To Kill Communication, The

Communication Lifeline, Speaking Frankly About Sex and Renewing Romance in Marriage.

The public is invited; the seminar is non-demonstrational. It is designed for engaged and newly-married couples, as well as those who have been married for many years. It is designed for stable marriages with a thrust in strengthening marriages to withstand the divisive pressures of modern society.

There is a beautiful tingling sound coming from the back of the P.S. Dudley home on Dixie Drive. The sound is from a long line of wind chimes Dudley has

made and hung on his carport.

"I was an oil field worker all of my life and never handled wood until I retired," says the 86 year

retiree. But a few years ago, he found he had a talent for working with wood and it has turned out to be a very productive hobby for him.

When he realized his talent, he bought a small portable building and put it in his back yard. Then he filled it full of carefully designed shelves and peg

board so that all of his tools had a special place. Everything is at a finger's touch thanks to some clever engineering on his part. He even made a three layered turntable which is full of baby food jars holding all of his nails, screws, nuts and bolts.

Dudley can be found in his shop almost everyday, especially during this time of the year when he is making special things for the Methodist Church bazaar in December.

Out of his miniature shop came hundreds of wind chimes, flower pots stools, thrivets, swing spool holders, which are all made completely out of pine wood. He turns out two or three of these items each day.

An avid dominoe player, he also makes dominoe counters and boxes for his favorite game. He also makes round table tops for the game which many of his friends have bought.

His storage room is also full of specially made cradles, dog houses and log cabins that are very unique.

Dudley has shown his creations in several arts and crafts shows especially the local show.

And even though the soft spoken man underwent an operation three weeks ago to have a pacemaker put into his chest, and his wife took a trip to Brady last week.

And immediately upon their return he was back in his shop, making more chimes and dominoe counters for the church bazaar. All of the proceeds from his items will go toward the church during the sale.

It just goes to show you that there is no stopping someone from working just because they are retired, especially when they have a very special talent such as the one Dudley possesses.

Voters Faced With Seven Items

Voters will go to the polls next Tuesday to vote on seven amendments to the state constitution. Voters here will vote in the following places: Precinct one, high school gymnasium; precinct two, Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative; precinct three, Memorial Building and Precinct four, high school band hall.

The amendments are as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

PROPOSITION NO. 2

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public school free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

PROPOSITION NO. 3

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

PROPOSITION NO. 4

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including ci-

ties, counties, and special districts.

PROPOSITION NO. 5

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

PROPOSITION NO. 6

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt farm taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40 percent for 1982-84; 30 percent for 1985-87; and 20 percent for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other momentary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require the notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

PROPOSITION NO. 7

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6 percent to 10 percent and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

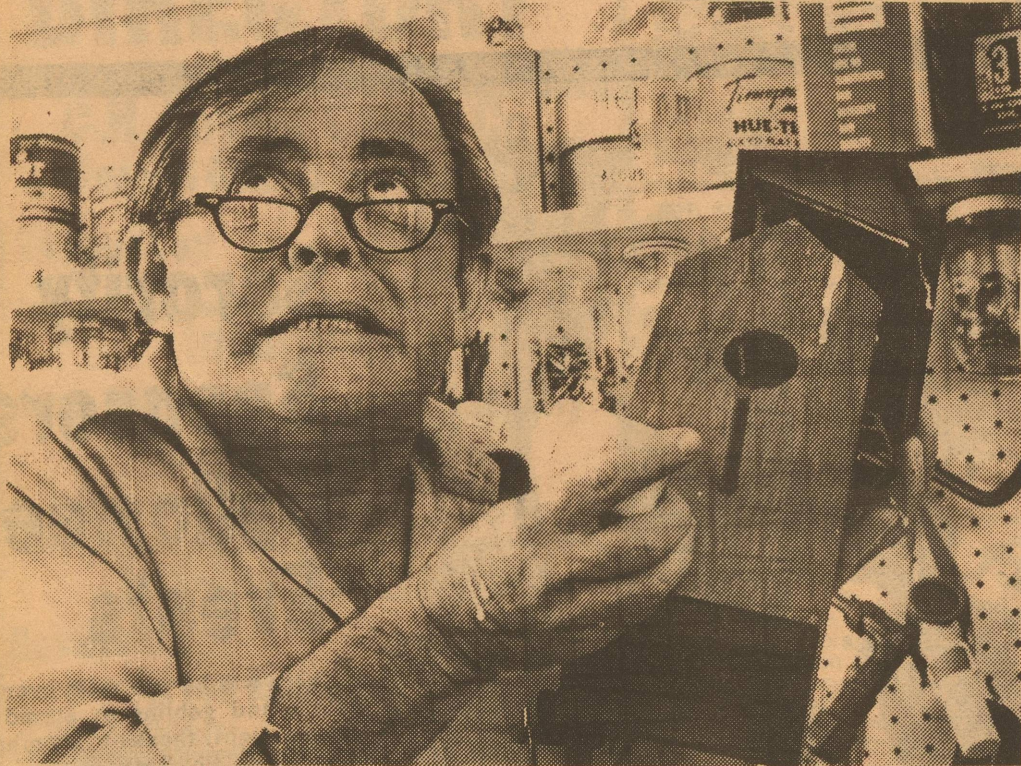

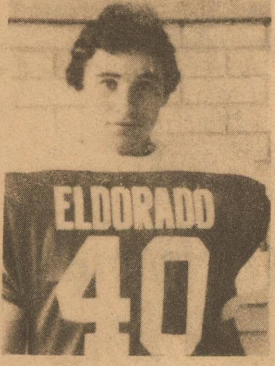

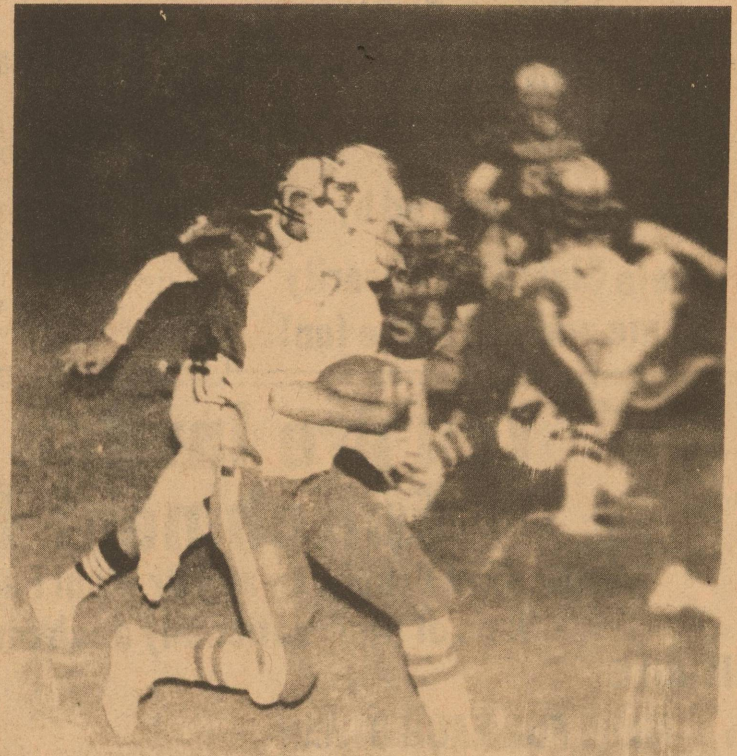

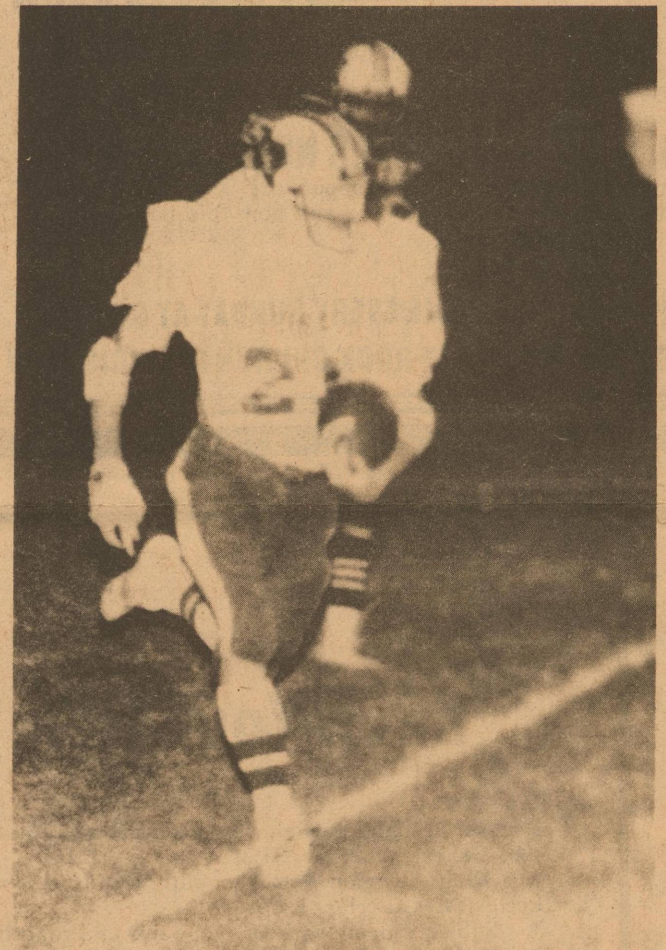

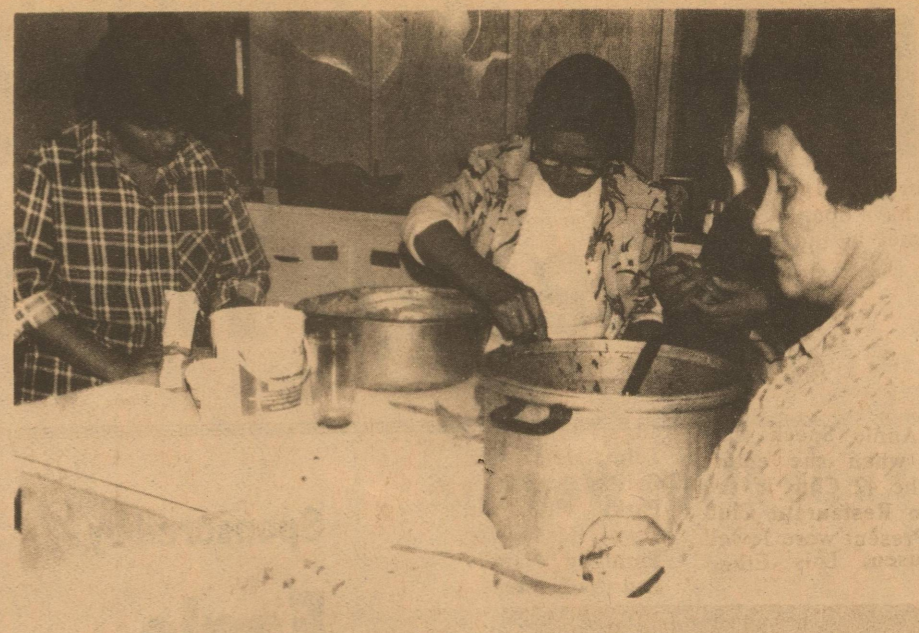

Brames Recognized By Pope

His Holiness, Pope John Paul II, has honored the Diocese of San Angelo by appointing seven Catholic laymen and eight Catholic laywomen to the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre.

The new Knights and Ladies from the Diocese of San Angelo are: Dr. and Mrs. Jim Bob Brame of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church, Eldorado; Mr. and Mrs. Pat Bunnell and Mrs. and Mrs. Omer Dreiling of Sacred Heart Cathedral, San Angelo; Mr. and Mrs. Charles George of St. Mary's Church, Odessa; Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Jacques of Sacred Heart Church, Abilene; Mr. and Mrs. Don O'Shaughnessy of St. Ann's Church, San Angelo; and Mrs. Eva Camunez Tucker of St. Ann's Church, Stamford.

The new Knights and Ladies of the Holy Sepulchre will be invested into the Order by His Eminence, Maximilian Cardinal de Furstenberg, Grandmaster of the Order, assisted by the Most Rever-

end John J. Cassada, D.D., Grand Prior of the Order's Southern Lieutenantancy of the United States. The Most Reverend Joseph A. Fiorenza, Bishop of San Angelo, and a number of other Texas Bishops, will attend the Investiture and concelebrate the Mass, to be held Sunday, November 1 at St. Michael's Church, Houston.

The Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre originated in Jerusalem during the time of the Crusades. Christian soldiers fighting in the Holy Land would ask to be invested as Knights of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem.

After the Crusades ended, the Franciscan Fathers who had charge of the shrines in the Holy Land were granted the privilege of naming and investing more Knights into the Order to honor noble persons distinguished for their loyalty to the Catholic Church.

In 1847, when Pope Pius IX re-established the Latin Patriarchate in Jerusalem, the Pontiff gave the Patriarch the right to confer the Knighthood. In 1868 membership in the Order was extended to women.

Later, Pope St. Pius X took up on himself the Grandmastership of the Order, as did several other popes. Since 1928 the Grandmastership has been

delegated to one of the Cardinals. Cardinal de Furstenberg is the current Grandmaster.

Knights and Ladies of the Holy Sepulchre have a special relationship to the Tomb of Christ in Jerusalem, which they are called upon to sustain. As modern Crusaders, today's Knights and Ladies are also honored for the leadership they exercise in their parishes and Diocese, and their main duty is to continue guarding and sustaining the Church.

Notes From Nancy

Flowerpot Barbecue

Hamburgers and hot dogs cooking on a flowerpot? As a matter of fact, your flowerpot can provide a convenient grill for balconies or patios, as well as for backyard dinners and parties.

To construct your grill, you'll need an 11-inch or larger unglazed clay flowerpot, dirt, some fireproof screening, charcoal briquets, and a cookie-cooling rack. Fill the flowerpot to within 4 to 5 inches of the top with dirt (sand or gravel will work also). Lay the screening in the dirt, then place the briquets on the screening so that the briquets don't sink into the dirt as they burn (thus smothering them). You may want to slip your hand into a sandwich bag "glove" to avoid a mess as you pile the briquets. Try to keep briquets away from the sides of the pot to prevent overheating. Light the briquets and let them heat. To make the grill, place the cookie-cooling rack across the top of the flowerpot when hot.

Any foods you can cook on an ordinary grill can be cooked on your flowerpot grill. The flowerpot can also be used for cooking on coals and stick cooking. Because the grill is small, if you're planning a large dinner or party, you'll want to construct a grill for each person (or couple).

One scrumptious, appealing menu for a family dinner or backyard party might include stuffed baco-cheese dogs or popsicle hot dogs.

inches of the stick protruding. Grill on rack, turning often. The sticks allow for easy turning on the grill (and for easy eating, if you have children in the crowd). Serve on buns with relishes and sauces.

BACO-CHEESE DOGS

5 slices cheddar cheese
10 frankfurters
1/2 pound bacon (10 slices)
toothpicks

Make a slit in the frankfurters lengthwise, taking care not to cut all the way through. It's a good idea to prepare franks, cheese, and bacon ahead of time. Slice cheese into 10 small slices, then place in sandwich bags to keep fresh until needed. Just before serving, place a slice of cheese in the slit in the frank, wrap in a slice of bacon, then secure with toothpicks. Place on grill to warm, turning often until bacon is cooked and cheese is melted. This adds a new and special taste to hot dogs.

New Ideas

If your souffle falls, ice cream melts, cake sinks or gelatin mold collapses, don't worry--just change the name of the dish you were attempting to prepare, says Entertaining at Home, a 128 page publication which is part of the 1981 Family Circle Great Ideas series.

A list of disasters and how to handle them include: If the souffle falls, serve it in individual portions as baked pudding. Add a cheese of tomato sauce topping to savory souffles and whipped cream to sweet ones; when your gelatin mold collapses, chop it into cubes and place on

individual lettuce-lined plates; The next time your ice cream melts, fold in fruits or nuts and use it as cake sauce; Don't scream if your cake sinks, simply cover the top with a center of fruit salad surrounded by rosettes of whipped cream. Remember, only you know what originally was on the menu!

Make Your Own Solar Food Dryer

If you have the usual assortment of homeowner hand tools and \$14 to buy materials, you have the basic necessities to build a solar fruit and vegetable dryer developed in cooperative USDA-Department of Energy research.

Construction materials include wood for the frame, string, aluminum foil, and glue. The dryer weighs less than 15 pounds, and is easy to put together with hand tools.

An unusual feature is a curved mirror that concentrates radiation from the sun just enough to dry fruits and vegetables but not enough to overheat or burn them. Peaches, mangoes, green peppers, onions, mushrooms, plantains, grapes, and other produce can be preserved. Some products need pretreatment such as blanching or slicing.

Free illustrated directions for constructing the solar dryer, along with information on pretreatment, are available from the United States Citrus and Subtropical Products Lab, SEA, USDA, P.O. Box 1909, Winterhaven, Florida, 33880. Source: Food News for Consumers 2/81.
