Cemetery Will Be Fenced

The Eldorado Cemetery will be fenced, after a formal request was made in Commissioners Court Monday morning. Several local women met with the court and made request, reporting that someone had been having parties there, leaving trash, turning over tombstones and

driving across graves.

The court will survey the situation and decide at a later date as to what kind of fence and archway will be built. Work will probably begin at the first of the coming year because the court has to advertise for bids before a contractor can be hired.

Also meeting with the court were Golf Club representatives Pete Peters and John Callison. Under a new policy, the club will present the court with a yearly budget and be responsible for hiring and firing a custodian, plus maintenance for the golf course Little League field, city park and airport.

They presented a budget for \$24,000 which is about the same amount of money the county spent on the golf course last year, according to judge Johnny Griffin. This total includes the purchase of a large greens mower which Callison said would reduce the yearly budget because it would do the work of three pieces of equipment at a faster rate. Some of the golf club's old equipment will be sold to help pay for the mower. The club will receive a monthly payment from the county.

Callison told the court that if he was able to reduce the budget, the remaining amount of the allotted money would be used to build up the city park recreational area.

County officials believe this arrangement would be beneficial to both the county and the Golf Club because the custodian would be working for only one group of people, the Golf Club, instead of the club and the county judge. This arrangement is similar to that made with the Volunteer Firemen a few weeks ago.

The court also accepted a bid from James Davenport of Midland for 177.12 acres of school land in Gaines County for the sum of \$20,508. The money will go into the permanent school fund, from which interest is paid to the local school system.

Commissioners also voted on directors for the tax appraisal district. Their choices were for Floyd Butler, Jack Bebee and Steve Williams.

They discussed the city-county agreement and decided a written agreement between the two governing bodies was unnecessary.

Schleicher County Sheriff Receives Jail Certificate

Orval Edmiston, Jail Administrator for Schleicher County attended the 12th Jail Administrators' Conference at the Criminal Justice Center, Sam Houston State University,

Huntsville, and was presented a certificate of completion from Dean and Director of the College of Criminal Justice Victor G. Strecher, Ph.D.

Approximately 180 sheriffs, jailers, and other personnel in related fields were on hand for the keynote address by the President of the National Sheriff's Association, L.C. Bittick, Sheriff of Monroe County, Georgia.

Ten individual workshops were presented to the law enforcement constituency, plus a morning address by W.J. Estelle, Director of the Texas Department of Corrections; and a luncheon speech by Mike Morrow, Round Rock, Texas, a philosopher, humorist, and well-known after dinner speaker.

Another highlight to the conference was the presentation of two \$1,000 scholarships to outstanding students of criminal justice SHSU. Texas Sheriffs' President Kenneth Kelly made the presentation to Cay Cannon of Houston and Stephen Appelt of Hallettsville. The award was based on academic accomplishments, law enforcement ambitions, and the intent to complete graduation requirements in Criminal Justice.

Hospital Officials are Looking For Physician For Local Hospital

Several board members of the Schleicher County Medical Center were in San Antonio recently to attend a physician placement seminar. They were Mr. and Mrs. Rick Sterling, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Henderson Jr., Pete Peters and Curtis Andrews. They were among representatives of some 36 non-urban Texas cities facing a shortage of family doctors who met with 40 physicians engaged in family practice training.

Also attending were Dr. and Mrs. Jim Brame.

According to a spokesman for the sponsoring Texas Academy of Family Physicians, the seminar was held to match cities-in-need with physicians scheduled to complete their family practice training residencies and enter private practice within the next six to 18 months.

TAFP officials view the seminar as a step toward alleviating a statewide shortage of family and general practice physicians, a shortage which they say is compounded by a concentration of physicians in the metropolitan areas.

A recent survey indicates that nearly half of the family and general practitioners in Texas are located in the state's six largest cities--Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth, El Paso and Austin--while over one-fourth of Texas' 254 counties have fewer than three family and general practice physicians.

State Sen. Hector Uribe, Brownsville, told a seminar luncheon audience that physicians are drawn to the metropolitan areas by the social and technological resources big cities have to offer.

"The big cities get more because they have more, and they have more because they can get more," Uribe explained. He added, "The legislature needs your advice, your leadership and your expertise if we are to develop lasting improvements

in the delivery of health care."

Referring to the physician shortage, seminar chairman Everett Holt, M.D., Corpus Christi, said that the ideal ratio of family physicians to placement seminar conducted by the TAFP. Plans call for it to be held annually.

Family practice residency to provide comprehensive health care for a wide variety of medical problems.

Dr. Forlano Speaks At Seminar

Dr. Albert Forlano was invited to be a speaker at the seventh Regional Institute of Alcohol and Drug Abuse held at Hardin Simmons University in Abilene on Oct. 29. This program was sponsored by the West Central Texas Council of Governments and the Texas Commission on Alcoholism. He was also invited to be a speaker at the Concho Valley Regional Institute of Alcohol Studies at Angelo State University on October 28. This was sponsored by the Concho Valley COG. Texas Commission on Alcoholism, San Angelo Council on Alcoholism, and the ASU Dept. of Adult & Continuing Education.

Dr. Forlano's three hour lecture on both days was entitled "Alcohol, Drugs and the Elderly". It featured the drugs most commonly used by the elderly and how they can be abused. Dr. Forlano noted that abuse of drugs in the elderly is not the same as that in the younger person. It is common for drugs which are used for the heart, arthritis, diabetes, and high blood pressure to be used incorrectly because of redical changes which

occur in the body as a person grows older.

Older people react differently than the young to drugs which can cause adverse reactions. Such reactions may include drug-induced forgetfulness, weakness, confusion, and behavior which is frequently mistaken for senility or brain disease.

The effect which alcohol has on changes in the body of the young adult and the elderly was also discussed. This is important since excessive alcohol consumption accelerates the aging process.

Geistweidt Appointed

Texas State Representative Gerald Geistweidt of Mason has been appointed by House Speaker Bill Clayton to serve as vice-chairman of the Select Committee on Flood Control.

Clayton created the interim committee to study the problem of flooding in Texas. Particular emphasis will be placed by the committee in its work on developing new methods of flood control to prevent flooding disasters.

The committee is to take testimony, conduct research into past flooding problems, and make recommendations to the 68th legislature.

Geistweidt is serving his second term in the House of Representatives, is vice-chairman of the Committee on Natural Resources, chairman of budget and

oversight for the Committee on State Affairs and is a member of the Committee on Local and Consent Calendars.

Clayton stated: "Damaging flood water resulting in the loss of property and lives have ravaged many areas of our state. Moreover, the high cost of flooding disasters has become a serious burden on individuals and local governments."

"I believe it is time for state officials to investigate this situation and to seek improved methods of controlling flood waters."

"Rep. Geistweidt's legislative background provides him with a thorough knowledge of the various elements involved in flood control. He will be a valuable member of this committee."

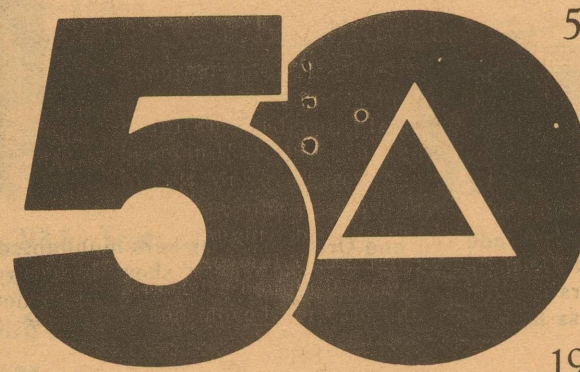

Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Gibson and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Morrison of Eldorado.

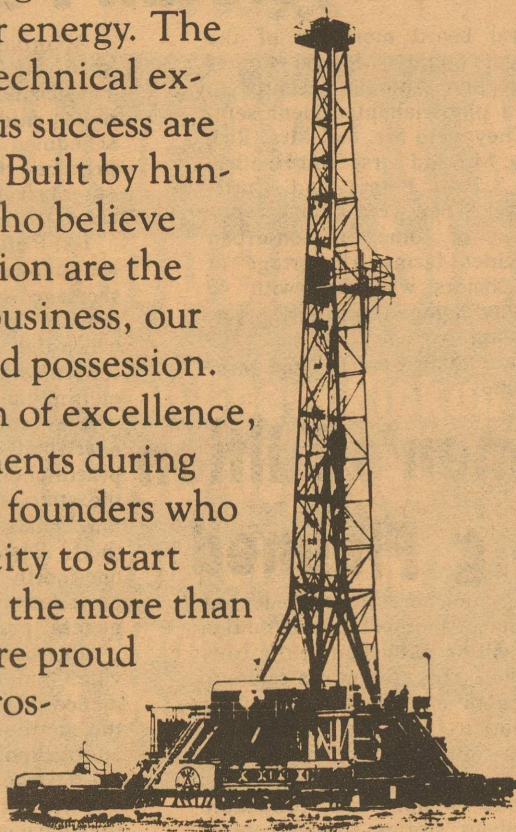

New Phones Installed Locally

New coin telephones have been installed in Eldorado and along with them comes a change in placing long-distance calls, according to Melvin Jennings, General Telephone's San Angelo division manager.

"The dialing instructions, which have been changed only slightly, will reduce the amount of time a customer spends placing a long-distance coin phone call," he said.

Under the new procedure and operator will request change from the caller while the long-distance call is being processed. If the called party is not available, the operator will refund the money.

Previously an operator was required to wait until the called party was on the line before requesting change from the caller.

Coin phone instructions for dialing local calls have not changed, Jennings noted.

Eldorado is one of 399 exchanges in General Telephone's four-state service area.

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Ask About Flu Shots

"Ask your doctor if you should have a flu shot this year," advises Dr. Stanton P. Fischer, president of the American Lung Association of Texas.

"The same advice goes for pneumococcal pneumonia," continues Fischer. "There are vaccines for both diseases. And a drug, amantadine hydrochloride, is available to lessen an attack of flu even after it has started."

During the period 1968 to 1980, more than 150,000 excess deaths are estimated to have occurred during flu epidemics in the U.S. It is also estimated that as many as 500,000 cases of pneumococcal pneumonia occur in the U.S. annually. Pneumococcal pneumonia has a fatality rate of 5 to 10 percent.

"Certain persons are more susceptible to both flu and pneumococcal pneumonia than others," continues Fischer. "Even though you may know if you fit into a broad category of the vulnerable, only your doctor can make an informed decision about you as an individual."

"We at the Lung Association are beginning our Christmas Seal Campaign," says Fischer, "but all year long we are concerned with out community's health, particularly lung health. Both influenza and pneumococcal pneumonia are certainly respiratory diseases."

Vaccination for both diseases is strongly recommended for all individuals at increased risk, according to the "Christmas Seal" People. Such persons include those over 65 years of age and anyone suffering from chronic pulmonary, heart or kidney disease. Individuals with diabetes and severe anemia probably should also be vaccinated for both.

Vaccination should be considered for persons who provide essential community services who may be at increased risk of exposure. Such individuals might include medical care personnel.

"But remember," says Fischer, "your own physician best knows your medical condition and the inherent risks involved. Consult him or her first."

Contributions to the Christmas Seal Campaign help the Lung Association fight emphysema, asthma, tuberculosis and many other lung diseases, in addition to influenza and pneumococcal pneumonia.

"So answer your Christmas Seal letter today," says Fischer, "and help us battle for good lung health."

Eldorado Native Honored In Vegas

Kaye Harkey Woodward, San Patricio and Aransas Counties Extension Agent (Home economics), has received the Distinguished Service Award for 1981 - the highest honor given by the National Association of Extension Home Economists.

One of six Texas County Extension Agents chosen for the honor, Woodward received the award during the national association's annual meeting last week (Oct. 11-16) in Las Vegas, Nev.

The award recognizes Woodward's creativity and outstanding leadership in educational programming on health education throughout San Patricio and Aransas Counties, according to Ilene Miller, Bell County Extension Agent (Home Economics), awards committee chairman for the Texas Association of Extension Home Economists which nominated the agent.

Extension educational programs created and implemented by Woodward and the San Patricio and Aransas Counties Family Living Committees have reached more than 11,000 individuals.

The major activity was a health fair at which participants were screened for diabetes, anemia, blood type, temperature, pulse rate and blood pressure, along with several others.

Participants saved about \$3,600 by taking advantage of the free screening.

One third of those screened were advised to see a doctor, and about 40 percent of that group did have a health problem, they said later in a follow-up.

The San Angelo office, headed by Bill Teaver, serves San Angelo and surrounding counties.

Other activities in health education included programs on coping with stress, a cardiopulmonary-resuscitation (CPR) workshop, first-aid series and tours of area health facilities.

In addition to serving as home economics program leader, Woodward also serves as Extension county chairman.

Woodward holds a bachelor's degree from Texas Tech University and a Master's degree from Sam Houston State University.

She is a member of the Texas and National Associations of Extension Home Economists, the Texas and National Associations of Extension 4-H Agents, the Texas and American Home Economics Associations and Epsilon Sigma Phi, national Extension fraternity.

In 1977, she was named to "Who's Who of American Women."

Notes From Nancy

CLOTHING Reduce Cost on New Clothes

Plan ahead. Pre-planning prevents impulse buying and lets you take advantage of special season-end sales.

At the start of each season, tour stores and compare prices of clothing so you will know when you are getting a bargain on sales.

Mix and match separates expand your wardrobe.

Look for clothing made of materials that can be worn through different seasons of the year.

Learn how to spot good (and bad) workmanship. Clothing that must be quickly replaced because it will not stand up to wear or will lose its shape is not a bargain, no matter what the price. Signs of good workmanship include:

1. Collars and lapels that stand up, roll or lie exactly right.
2. Undercollars that are completely hidden from view.
3. Matching of plaids, prints or other patterns, particularly at the back center, side and armhole seams.
4. Generous seam allowances and finished seams to prevent raveling.
5. Quality buttons that are sewn on tightly, are well-made buttonholes.
6. Even machine stitching.

The discount racks at the better stores often provide quality clothes at lower prices. Take advantage of factory outlet stores, bargain basements in department stores and secondhand or thrift shops. Some seconds, irregulars and even slightly soiled merchandise can be worthwhile buys.

Many clothing items available at lower prices in dime or variety stores are underwear, hats, costume jewelry, scarves, socks, pajamas, etc.

Before you go shopping, know exactly what you have and what you will need. Just remember that any garment, no matter how low the price, is not a bargain if it ends up hanging in the closet without being worn.

Slick Trix for Sewing

If you have trouble with fabric jamming your machine when you start stitching a seam, try grasping the upper and lower threads behind the needle, after you lower the presser foot. Pull the threads backward very gently as you start sewing. This helps the fabric move along.

When you're sewing a very thick seam on heavy fabric, fold another piece of material unit it's equally thick. Put it under the back part of the presser foot. Automatically, the back part of the foot will be raised to the correct level. Stitching will be easy.

Matching plaids or stripes when you're putting in a zipper can be a problem. Sew the first side of the zipper. Close it and let the unstitched side lay face down on the outside of the fabric. With a pencil or chalk, mark the zipper tape with the plaid or stripe when you're stitching the second side.

When making garments with yards of ruffles, hem on the machine with the rolled hem foot or attachment before gathering. To hem, press a small section of the hem into place, start fabric under the needle and make a few stitches to anchor. Then pull up the raw edge slightly and slide into the foot. Hold fabric taut while stitching.

For bulky fabrics or delicate fabrics that could be harmed by pins, consider using upholstery weights, masking tape, or aerosol pattern holder when cutting out your pattern.

A very thin or slippery fabric, such as chiffon or lightweight knit, will shift less if you pin it to tissue paper when cutting out pattern. Use serrated scissors for easier cutting.

To personalize a hand-me-down garment from an older sister, add a special applique pocket, or monogram.

Easy belt: Cut a piece of tape of cording about two inches longer than belt fabric. Place tape on right

side of material. Fold fabric over it and seam belt on wrong side catching tape in one end. Pull tape to turn belt. Clip off tape.

Fusible interfacing: To remove fusible interfacing or fusible web once it has been set in place, cover with a damp press cloth, steam for 10 seconds and carefully pull apart while still warm. If a residue remains on the fabric, remove by laying a damp cloth on top of the residue and repeatedly steam until the cloth has absorbed the residue.

Slightly dull scissors can be sharpened by cutting through very fine sandpaper. Very dull scissors should be taken to a professional for sharpening.

Ten Students Working As Office Aides

Ten students have the privilege of serving as office aides during the school day. Though they receive no academic credit, a notation of this work is placed on their permanent records.

Mrs. Jo Helen Kotsch, secretary, said she could not do without them. "Everyone of them does his or her work willingly which makes it easy for me."

An aide's daily routine might include filling the coffee machine in the teachers lounge, running errands for Mr. Newman, Mrs. Kotsch or Mr. McCarson. They place deficiency slips in alphabetical order and mail them out, answer the telephone, pick up ab-

sentee slips, and count money for the "E" Club. Aides also use the mimeograph machine when teachers need help. They help set up the concession stands for every home game.

Monotony is broken every so often. Gina Harris recalled being bombarded with tape balls when picking up slips. Hunting for absentee slips folded into very tiny squares and hidden in the door frame is Nancy Turbeville's pet peeve. Eddie Harris gets his rest while waiting for teachers hand over the absentee slips. Joan Schrier has to pick up the slips in outside buildings when it is cold and rainy in the morning.

Aides often get to hear all the gossip going around school. They play practical jokes on Mrs. Kotsch but not on Mr. McCarson, although they do snitch Mr. McCarson's jelly beans.

In general, Aides Eddie Harris, Nancy Turbeville, Eddy Montalvo, Silva Gauda, Joan Schrier, John Sparks, Angie Robles, Amy Lloyd, Gina Harris and Sarah Day do any job dished out.

Senior Joan Schrier said "I have worked in the office for two years and I have enjoyed it. I have also gotten close to some of the teachers. I have learned alot. I had no idea what a secretary did until I began to work with Mrs. Kotsch."

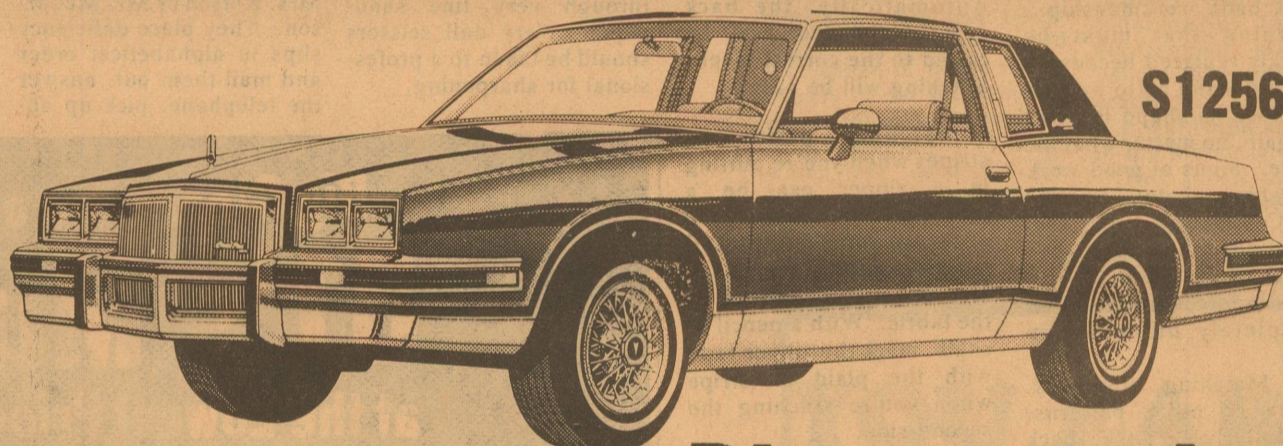
