Schleicher gets it's needed rain

Schleicher County's much needed rain last week raised this year's total rainfall to 10.79 inches. This time last year records indicated a total amount of rainfall at 7.81 inches.

Mr. Pat Joiner, official weather recorder, reported to the Leader that

portions of the County were not as lucky as others with the west end of Schleicher County receiving only .3 inch. Locations out on the Mertzon Hwy. received approximately 4.50 inches as did the Mittel Ranch 3 miles west of Huldale.

City okays new trash collection system

The Eldorado City Council met Tuesday night in regular session and approved the purchase of a new refuse collection system. The unit came in at a grand total of \$136,772.00. A total of 180 three yard containers were purchased at a cost of \$230 per unit. Two hundred sixty 1 1/2 yard containers were also purchased at a cost of \$180 per unit. The old truck was allowed a trade in value of \$10,000.00 with monthly payments of approximately \$2,500 which will be handled on a 5 year lease purchase agreement. The financing is yet to be established. The motion to purchase the EMCO system came from Edwin Jackson, Jr. and was seconded by Bobbie Sanders.

Five bids were made on the city's CB system. The winning bid came from Fred Spinks and was made at \$78.50. The old front end loader saw three bids submitted to the City. The winning offer was made by Jim Tom Roach for \$500.

After a discussion of the WTU rate increase and other minor city matters.

[The Council entertained Jack Bebee who requested that when the Council discussed the Schleicher County Tax Appraisal District's annual budget that he would be placed on the agenda as a district board member and a concerned citizen.

The meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m. Two councilmen were not present for the meeting, Ronnie Sauer and Wayne McGinnes.

Cities tax rebates continue to fall

State Comptroller Bob Bullock issued city sales tax checks for the period ending June 7, 1983 this past week.

Eldorado's share of the money totaled \$2686.77 which is down from last year's payment for the same period which was \$4,467.30. The total payments for 1983 to Eldorado to date are \$38,300.62 which is down 30.86 percent from last year which was \$55,399.58.

Surrounding cities and their sales tax allocations are as follows:

Sonora - \$10,764.84, is down considerably from last year's payment of 123,295.92. Sonora's total for the year is down 36.84 percent from 1982's total of \$196,661.35 for this period to \$124,218.84 this year.

Menard - \$2130.49 is also smaller than last year's check which totaled \$1954.51. But overall, the total to date this year, \$20,684.87 is up 1.91 percent from last year's total to date of \$20,297.04.

San Angelo - \$282,773.74 which is up from last year's payment of \$262,046.36. 1983 payments to date total \$2,474,485.09 which is up 6.54 percent from last year's total at this time of \$2,322,496.68.

A history of C/M city government

[Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles presenting the various views concerning the city manager form of government. This article deals with the history of the city manager-council plan of government.]

It is too early to attempt a definitive interpretation of the contributions made by the council-manager plan, its advocates and its implementers, to the quality of urban life in the United States and Canada during the last 60 years. There is much research that needs to be done; there is much history that needs to be written before a firm conclusion can be reached.

It is reasonable to assume, however, from this vantage point, that the diligent historian of the near future will find the council-manager plan the most significant organizational invention for local governance during the first three-quarters of the twentieth century.

Council-manager government has grown from an experimental response by the bicameral council of Staunton, Va., in 1908, as it appointed a *general manager*, into its current status as the form of government most frequently found among cities with populations over 10,000.

The importance of the plan, however, is not limited to these statistics of adoptions nor to the numbers and percentages of urban populations governed by the plan, as impressive as these figures sound. The long-term significance of the plan is to be found, rather, in its impact upon the management of urban affairs in general in the United States and Canada.

This impact has resulted from an association with the plan of high expectations of quality and impartiality in the delivery of municipal services and of the ability of government under the plan to apply knowledge to the solution of urban problems. In a phrase, the council-manager plan has become a symbol for the appropriate application of professional management to urban affairs and its impact has extended to all forms of urban and local governance.

The vitality of the plan can be traced in the events of its development and in the conditions of its implementation. The plan today is clearly still the intellectual package put together by Richard S. Childs in the Lockport Plan for local government introduced into the New York Legislature in 1911.

The Lockport proposal contained the three elements that have remained an integral part of the council-manager plan since that time: the short ballot, the placing of all powers in the

hands of the council, and the concentration of administrative authority in one official responsible to and appointed by the council. Mr. Childs played the historical role of putting the parts in their place; but, the parts and the forces operating to bring them together were already in existence. In the cliché of the moment, it was "an idea whose time had come".

The forces conspiring toward the creation of council-manager government in the United States included: the rapid growth of urban areas in the time period from the Civil War to the second decade of this century; the impact of the new technologies of travel, communications, heating and lighting upon the qualities of urban living and the conditions of work and leisure; the failures of the traditional governmental arrangements to respond to these new conditions, and the inadequacies of the political party-urban boss machinery as a substitute *delivery system* of urban services for the faltering traditional government. The needs were great and the existing municipal systems largely were incapable of responding to these needs.

The urban needs conspired toward the development of the council-manager plan, and the intellectual commitments and models required for its completion were present in the intellectual life and governmental experiences of that age.

Three Eldorado youths participated in the Abilene Horse Show this past week end and came home with some impressive placings.

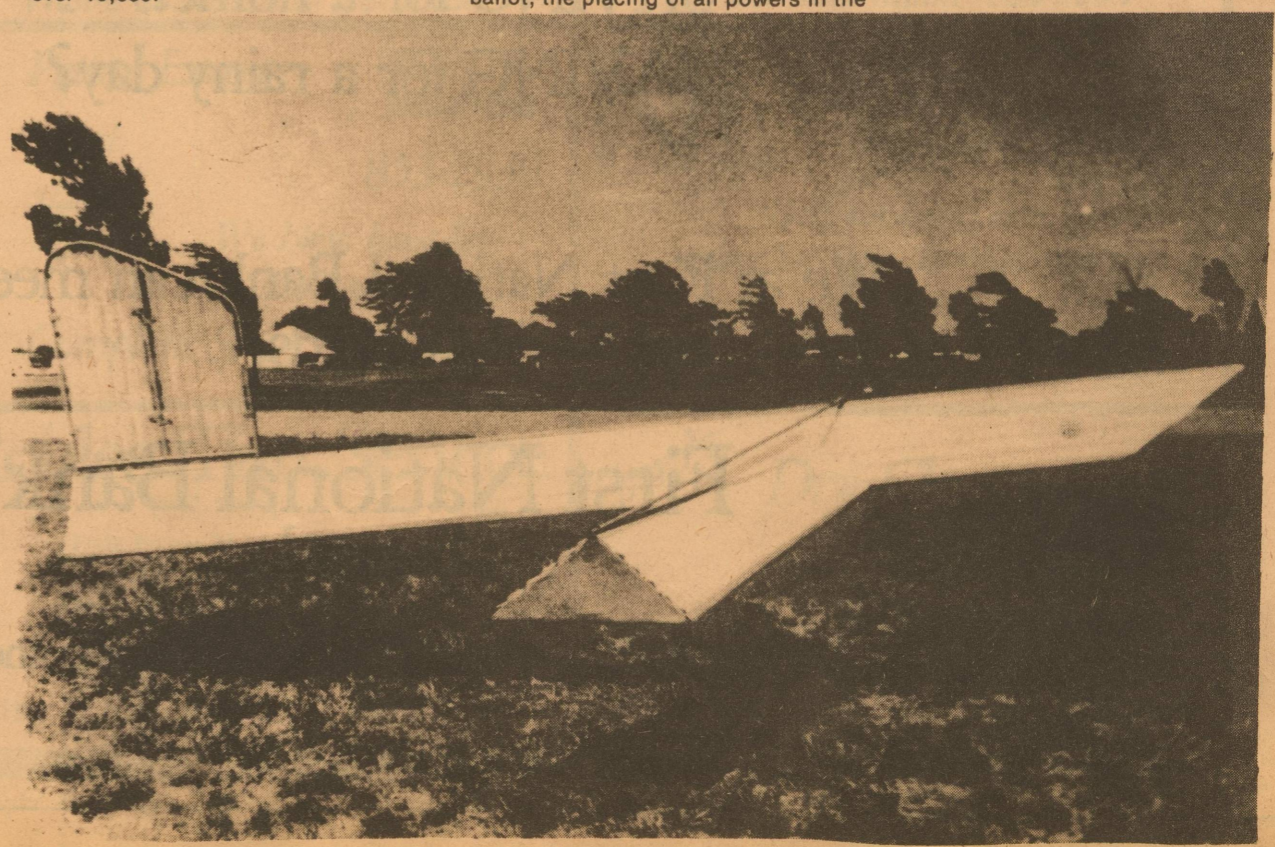
Shanna Swift, Jeffrey Hausenfluck and Wendi Dunagan traveled to Abilene to compete in the show.

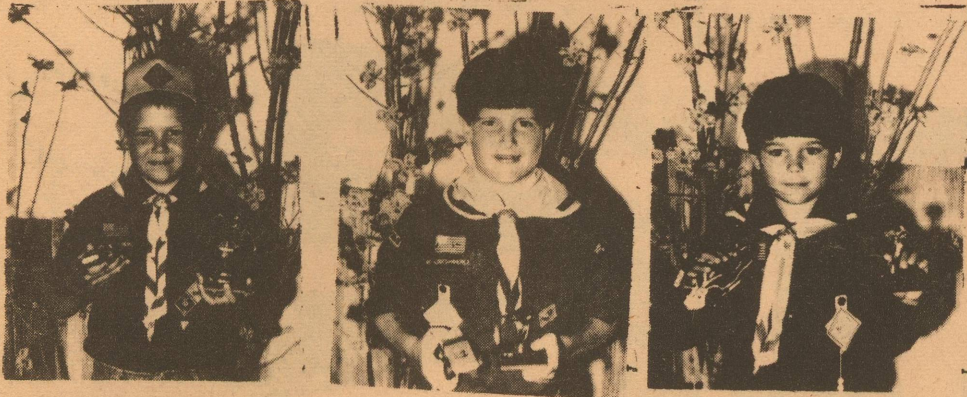
All three entered in Western Pleasure Class and Jeffrey placed in the finals.
