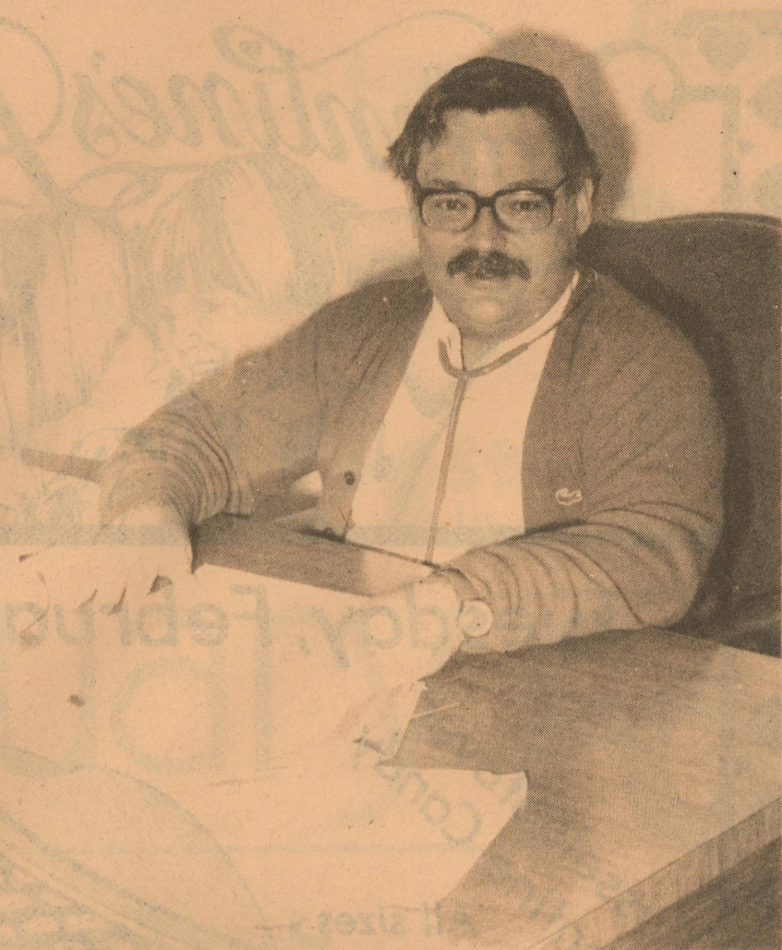


## Dr. Hermann now on staff

## Tax rebates still dropping

Bob Bullock State Comptroller mailed out checks to area cities for this period's sales tax allocation this week.

Eldorado's share of the money this period is \$7350.62 which is down from last year's payment for this period of \$12,872.44. 1984's payments to date total \$10,093.28, a 38.31 percent decrease from last year's "to date" payment of \$16,360.15.

Sonora's check also saw a decline from this time last year. Their check came to \$28,527.14, last year's check was \$44,436.71. Their payments to date total \$41,453.51 and when

compared to last year's total to date of \$55,929.27, they saw a 25.88 percent decline.

Menard is also showing a decrease in the amount they received in comparison to last year's payment. They received a check in the amount of \$5,329.31 which makes their payments for 1984 \$7825.33. Their payments up to date for 1983 totaled \$8533.69 which results in a decrease of 8.30 percent.

Mertzon shows a health increase of 14.94 percent for their period. Their check totaled \$5446.10. To date they have received \$9382.58. 1983's payments to date totaled \$8162.99.

## Phone system improvements

The 1984 telephone improvements in Eldorado include installation of a new downtown conduit system, said General Telephone's E.O. Cambern.

Coupled with adjacent manholes, the new conduit pipes will allow GTE to expand facilities as necessary, without having to dig up the road each time. It also means new cable can be kept underground, which contributes to community aesthetics.

"Another big job this year is to expand and upgrade our rural service

in areas around Eldorado," said Cambern. "Included in this are plans to extend local telephone service to the Air Force Pave Paws site." This project will allow residents nearby the option of upgrading from 8-party to 4-party or possibly 1-party service.

General Telephone of the Southwest currently serves about 1,100 business and residential customers in the Eldorado area, provides 9 public telephones and just over 1,000 telephone instruments.

## Political races intensify

Area elections are becoming more interesting as more candidates are casting their hats into the ring.

On the county level, two more Schleicher County residents have filed for the position of Commissioner of Precinct 1, Johnny Mayo and Phil McCormick. Jack Turner, the incumbent, has also filed for his seat again. Prissy Paxton has filed for her seat as Commissioner of Precinct 3. Incumbent Orval Edmiston has filed for position of Sheriff as has Dorothy Evans, Tax Assessor-Collector. T.P. Robinson did not file for his position of County Attorney.

Joe Max Edmiston, Phil Edmiston and Terry Green have placed their names before the voters for the upcoming school board elections.

They will be seeking the positions now held by Richard Kent, and Frankie Hardy who resigned earlier in the school year.

At presstime no one had officially filed for the positions opening up for the hospital board.

In other election related news, Janee Finley has been named Democratic County Chairman to fill the unexpired term of Jack Bebee. She was named to this position by the Executive Committee. The term will end in November after the general election.

Voters are reminded that they must be registered 30 days before an election to qualify to vote. Also, check you registration to verify your precinct, if you have moved you may be in a different precinct.

## TFU calls for changes

The president of the Texas Farmers Union today called for changes in the administration of the United States Department of Agriculture Economic Emergency Loan program.

Mike Moeller, of Man-

chaca in Hayes County, called for the U.S.D.A. to "stop subverting the intent of the program. Of the total \$600 million available nationwide, only \$50 million dollars was available as actual loan money. The rest (\$550 million), is to be used as guarantee money. That's fine and good, but unfortunately, in the three months that the program has been in affect, the \$50 million has been used up."

Moeller faults the "pointy-headed bureaucrats" in Washington that dictate the policy of U.S.D.A. in matters such as this.

"John Block (Secretary of Agriculture) didn't want to give us (the farmers) the money in the first place, and now the U.S.D.A. is trying to keep the money from doing any good out in the country-side. After the courts forced the U.S.D.A. in the fall to reactivate the loan system, we hoped that the program would be administered in good faith. Obviously we were wrong to trust U.S.D.A."

To illustrate his displeasure with the present administration of the program, Moeller has sent a letter to both Block and President Reagan, outlining the problems in the current situation, and asking for the release of the "captive" money, so that it

can be used to actually loan money to farmers and ranchers in hard hit areas.

"As I pointed out to both Reagan and Block, our membership is telling us that money just isn't available in the small rural banks. So, not only has the original \$50 million been used up, but the additional \$550 million in guarantee money isn't helping, since there isn't any money out there to guarantee."

The greatest demand for these loans comes from the drought plagued area of last year; the West Texas area. Sparse rainfall from last summer and killer cold in the recent past have devastated agriculture in the area. Many ranchers have been forced to sell off parts of their herds because of over-grazed pasture, land and no money for extra feed in hard winter that is now only half over.

"The focus of attention has been turned away from the problems of our farmers and ranchers in West Texas (and in the nation as a whole) recently, and we need to tell the public that just because some money became available to farmers for emergency loans, the problems just didn't go away. If others aren't aware of the

desperate situation that still exists, I guarantee that farmers and ranchers are. They are living it."

# Quarters of coverage

Both employees and self-employed people can earn Social Security credits, commonly referred to as quarters of coverage. A certain number of credits are needed for a person to qualify for Social Security benefits.

For 1984, a person who works in Social Security-covered employment earns one quarter of coverage for every \$390 of covered earnings, up to a maximum of four quarters for the year. The amount of covered earnings required for a quarter of coverage changes automatically each year in accordance with changes in the average wage levels.

Somewhat different rules apply to domestic workers and to farm workers. All of the earnings of a domestic employee who works in a

private household are covered for Social Security if he or she is paid at least \$50 in cash by a single employer during a 3-month calendar quarter.

All of the earnings of a person who works on a farm, including someone employed as a domestic, are covered for Social Security if he or she is paid at least \$150 in cash by a single employer during the year, or if the person is employed by the farmer at least 20 days during the year for cash pay figured on a time basis (hour, day, week, month, etc.), regardless of the amount of pay.

Domestic and farm workers also earn one quarter of coverage for each \$390 of covered annual earnings, up to a maximum of four quarters for the year.

Similarly, a self-employed person earns one quarter of coverage for every \$390 of net income for self-employment, also up to a maximum of four quarters for the year. In general, net earnings must be \$400 or more to be covered for Social Security. Information about exceptions to this rule may be

obtained from the San Angelo Social Security Office located at 2214 Sherwood Way. The telephone number is 949-44608.

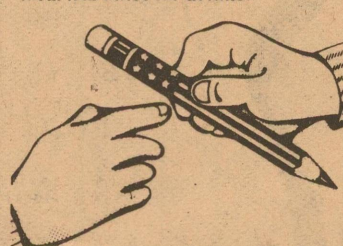

While we've been worrying about what Washington and OPEC might do to the domestic petroleum industry, state governments have been quietly building up their own bureaucratic domains, and starting to crack down hard, without too much input from industry.

A gigantic tax attack in New Mexico and Regulatory Changes in Texas have brought the industry up short. # New services for Senior Citizens

An information and referral service for Schleicher County residents, age 60 and over, has been established by the Concho Valley Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging. The Senior Citizen Information Service, located at 5002 Knickerbocker Road in San Angelo, may be reached by calling 112-800-592-4719, 8 am - 5 pm. Monday through Friday.

The purpose of the service is to provide information to older persons and their families concerning services that are currently available from local health and social

welfare agencies. The service will bridge the gap between older persons who do not know where to turn for help and these agencies which do exist and are able and willing to provide the help.

Many older people are unaware of the services available to them when they are in need of assistance. For example, the older person recently discharged from the hospital who has no friends or relatives may not know where to call for home health care. The service can provide the individual with current information

concerning home health care.

The service will link people with the community agency best suited to solve their problems. In addition, the service will assist those individuals who cannot make their own contacts with service providers by making calls and setting up appointments for them.

A comprehensive listing of current services and opportunities available to older persons will be maintained by the service to assist in responding to inquiries for help. All calls are confidential. Information and referral services

will be provided in areas such as education, employment, legal aid, nutrition, transportation, consumer information, health aid and housing.

The information and referral service is aimed at maintaining older people in their communities by connecting them with needed services and through informing unaware individuals of programs and services for which they are eligible. The service will provide a solution to the difficulties of negotiating the complex maze of social and health services for the older person.

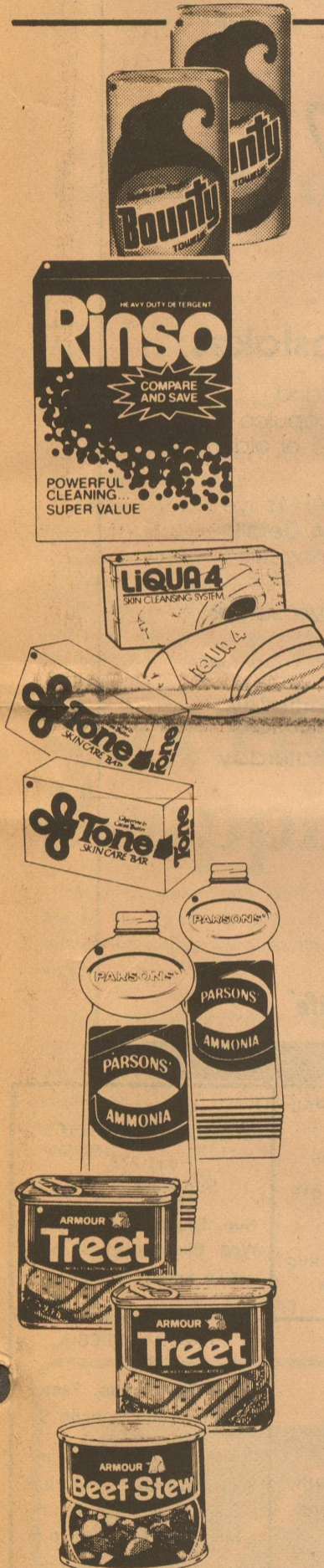

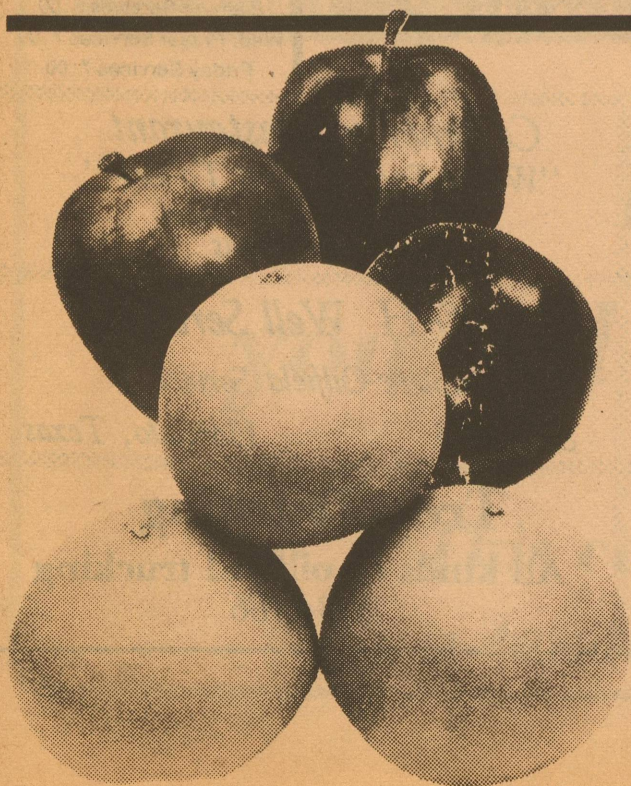

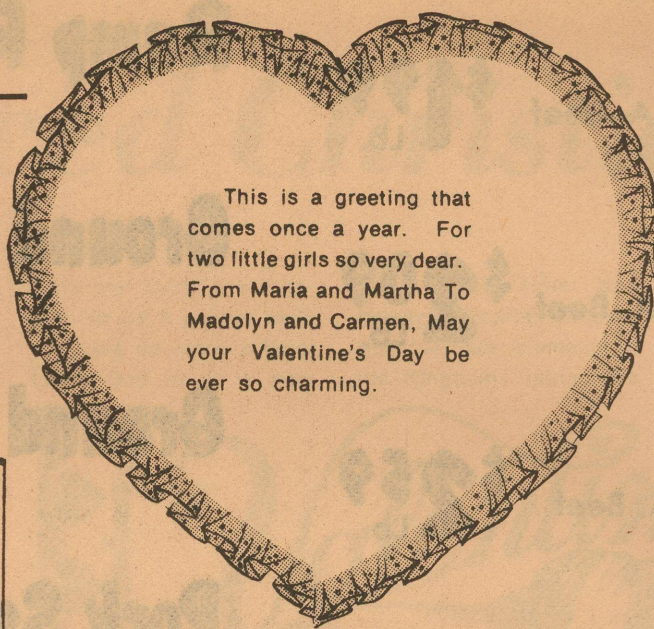
