

First case of Rabies confirmed

The first case of rabies in Schleicher County this year has been confirmed by Dr. William Edmiston, DVM. A dogie goat being raised by hand was confirmed as being rabid last week. The goat belonged to the Atkins family who live approximately 10 miles south of Eldorado. The goat was apparently sprayed in the face by a rabid skunk. Six people are having to take rabies shots as a result of the incident.

In animals rabies may be manifested in one of two forms: furious and dumb (paralytic). Furious rabies in animals is characterized by altered behaviour such as restlessness, depraved appetite, excitement, unprovoked biting, aimless wandering, excessive salivation, general paralysis and finally death. Death usually occurs within 3-4 days after the onset of the symptoms.

Rabies occurs throughout the

world. Rabies-free areas at present include Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Hawaii, Taiwan and other Pacific Islands, some of the West Indies, England, Ireland, Norway and Sweden. Urban rabies is a problem of dogs and occasionally other pets; rural rabies is a disease of wild carnivores and bats. In the U.S. wildlife rabies is increasing, especially in skunks, foxes, bats and raccoons. Rabies was once thought

to be more prevalent in late summer (dog days) but this is not true. In general, the highest incidence is in late winter or early spring. The disease occurs in all climates from tropic to frigid.

The transmission of rabies is almost invariably through the bite of an infected animal. The fact that the virus is eliminated in the saliva is of great significance, unless saliva is introduced beneath the skin's surface, the disease is seldom transmitted.

The vaccination of dogs and cats has become an important factor in the control of rabies. It is not economically feasible nor is it justified from a public health standpoint to vaccinate all livestock against rabies. If humans have been exposed to rabies, wounds should be cleansed and passive immunization begun. Passive immunization includes the use of anti-rabies serum (ARS) of equine origin or rabies immunoglobulin (RIG) of human origin and should be administered the day of exposure. Active immunization, using a vaccine is also necessary. When the vaccine and ARS and RIG are administered together at least 23 doses are recommended.

Dr. Edmiston will be conducting a Vaccination Clinic on May 21st at the Memorial Building from 2:00 - 5:30 p.m. for residents to have their animals vaccinated. Rabies shots will be \$6.00 each and DHSP Parvo will be \$14.00 each. Everyone is urged to take advantage of this service to prevent further outbreaks of rabies in the community.

Board ok's 6% raise for employees

The Schleicher County Independent School District Board of Trustees met in a lengthy session Monday night during which they approved a 6 percent raise for all school personnel.

Ron Sutto appeared before the Board on behalf of the Band Boosters to express their appreciation to the Board for all its support this past year.

Mr. Wells approached the Board with a request to form a Rodeo Club. The Rodeo Club was approved by the Board for this past year only and Mr. Wells was instructed to draw up guidelines and to present them at the next meeting to determine if the Rodeo Club would become a permanent school organization.

The resignations of teachers Jo Ann Edmiston and Vidette Sallee were accepted by the Board.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker was appointed by the Board to represent SCISD at the Region IX Educational Service Joint Committee.

The Board then discussed House Bill 246 concerning the freshman class of 1984-85. The class will be required to meet the requirements set up for their future graduation as set up in the house bill. This will be the standard in the future.

Joe Max Edmiston and Superintendent Whitaker were appointed by

the Board to look into the trouble of water pressure and discharge line of the septic tank at the Exhibit Building. They will take bids on having the repair work done.

The building needs for 1984-85 were discussed and the Board agreed to purchase a temporary building, 24 x 72 ft. which will house two classrooms with restrooms for the elementary school next year.

Mr. Moore, Elementary Principal made his recommendations to the Board concerning assignments for classrooms for the upcoming school year.

The Board approved the employment of Mrs. Spinks and Mrs. Homer in the elementary school for 1984-85.

The Board then turned their discussion to the need for more transportation. They agreed to lease another vehicle for school personnel.

The Facility Study, prepared by Dr. Hawkins was then discussed by the members. The architect will be invited to meet with the Board at the next meeting to make recommendations and to see how to implement any changes.

The Board approved the payment of monthly bills and retired into executive session to discuss personnel.

With no further business the Board then adjourned.

If you are delinquent on your county taxes, just get ready, the county commissioners voted unanimously to file suit on delinquent taxes owed the county with no exceptions.

In other action, Monday morning, the court met with De Lux who was representing the Eldorado Divide Soil and Water Conservation District. Mr. Lux approached the county bosses about contributing to the program which provides many services to the county. The court voted to contribute \$1,000.

Steve and Carolyn Whitten and Mr. and Mrs. George Spinks appeared before the court to ask for monetary support of the proposed teen center "Eagle Point". The county gave their nod to the support but specified that they felt that the school and city should contribute also. No specific amount for the contribution was set

by the court at that time.

The court approved the installation of an air conditioner in the office of the Probation Officer on the third floor of the courthouse.

Pre-payment of \$2500 was authorized to Thomas Y. Pickett for his preparation of the county's tax roll.

The court unanimously voted to pay the ambulance drivers' tuition of \$12.50 each to take CPR courses.

The commissioners voted 3-1 not to join the Texas Association of Counties' to charge the one cent fuel tax. The tax would be used in counties' Road & Bridge departments.

Payton Cain requested and received permission to purchase caliche from the county at the standard price.

The commissioners also paid monthly bills but did not approve the minutes as County Clerk Helen Bebee was absent from the meeting.

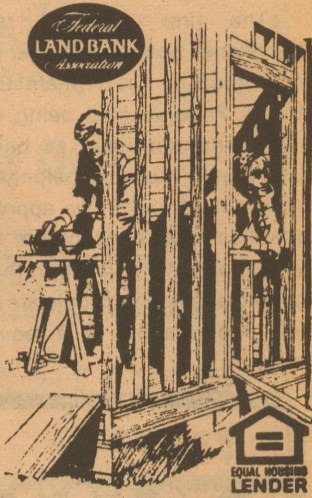

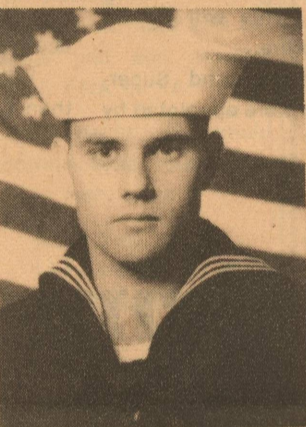
During the eight-week training cycle, trainees studied general military subjects designed to prepare them for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic occupational fields.
