

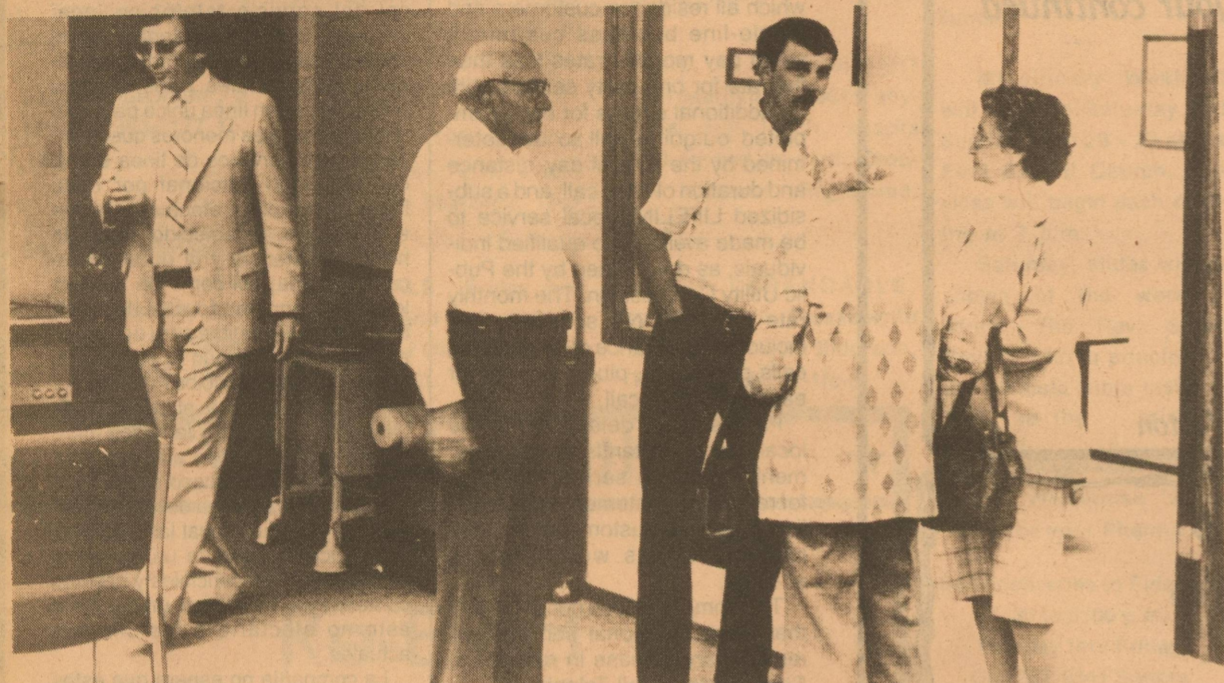

Bevy of bikers bivouac

Last Thursday night marked a decade for an annual over-night stop in Eldorado. It was time for the luxury liners of the motorcycle kingdom to make their annual rest over on the way to Big Bend for their Easter Rally, and it was once again time for Floyd West to host the Austin group of big bike riders. This year the group was comprised of thirteen riders although twenty-four were in the rally run. The group that pitched their tents at the Eldorado Airport were comprised of all men that came from various walks of life. They ranged from a machinist to an Austin policeman to a motorcycle distributor and accessory dealer. Their ages were just as drastic in contrast to each others life style but they all had one thing in common, a love for the open road and the glory to be only found in a big touring bike.

Twelve of the (scooters) that stopped over in Eldorado were Honda Gold Wings accompanied by a single 1984 Harley Davidson FLH Electra Glide 80. These motorcycles were equipped with every possible luxury item known to the motorcycle world and cost in the range of \$8,000 and upward by the time they were equipped. Their riders carried with them the necessities in life for camping out as well as everything else they could possibly need on a four day run. Some even pulled trailers behind them in order to carry even more essentials necessary to life in the rough.

Larry Roberson, the 31 year old Austin motorcycle patrolman, sported a custom license plate on the trailer he pulled which stated "Im 10-96" which in police "10 code" means a mentally ill person, told the Leader that he had been involved in motorcycling since age 14 and preferred to ride a vintage Gold Wing in immaculate condition. This is the seventh trip for Larry who considers his father as his riding partner. His dad has never missed an Easter Rally. His father was riding a 1982 model Gold Wing that was considered by other bikers to be relatively close to stock. The retired Colonel Roberson trades motorcycles nearly on an annual basis.

The major emphasis of these motorcycle connoisseurs is on luxury and safety but Larry admitted that there was a certain amount of ego involved in riding what was considered in the old days, a full dresser. Hundreds of dollars are invested in these machines to insure the ultimate in comfort and flash. Several of the bikes had every conceivable piece of

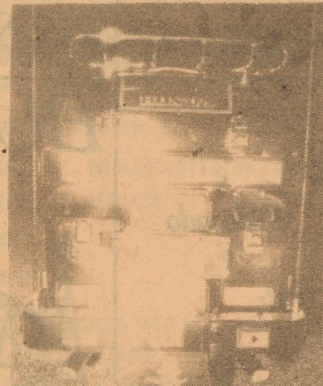
metal work chrome plated while other enthusiasts preferred a large amount of lights to bring attention to their motorcycle. All were equipped with CB's as well as am-fm radios and electronic helmets.

Papa Jim Davis, a veteran biker and a recipient of the Medal of Honor took the brunt of the good-hearted kidding from his cohorts simply because he was riding the lone Harley-Davidson (perhaps one of the most expensive machines present). It appears that the Harley Davidson has fallen from graces of the luxury

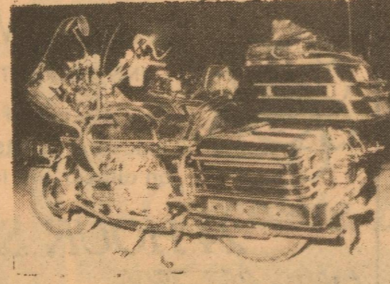
through their community including how the group met up with its local host, Floyd West. It involved a rainy evening when the group was attempting to encamp at the roadside park on the San Angelo highway. Sheriff Orval Edmiston was located by a member of the group and asked where they might stay other than on the side of the highway. With typical Eldorado hospitality, Orval offered them the courthouse lawn which they rejected because of the possible clamor they might cause in the community and were honestly seeking

The major complaint primarily coming from the Honda riders was that the bike was not dependable even though it was the one and only studded motorcycle in the beginning of touring bike pleasure. Now the Harley is best identified as being ridden by the one-centers, commonly known as

No bid on plant usable!

The Eldorado City Council met in an afternoon session Monday April 23rd.

Lee Head and Ms. Robin Hendricks, of Freese and Nichols and Larry Skiles, representative of the bonding firm of Rauscher, Pierce and Refenes appeared before the Council concerning the wastewater lines in the Christian Addition. The Council accepted the recommendation of Freese and Nichols to award the bid for the installation of sewer lines to Pinetree Utilities, Waxahachie, Texas for \$131,663.00. Work is expected to begin in the later part of May if all goes as planned.

Where all the bids on the sewer

line project were lower than expected, the bids on the treatment plant were higher than expected. This was due in part to the expense of installing the 24" clay liner in the ponds. Several councilmen are planning to travel to Austin to meet with the Department of Water Resources to request an exemption from this requirement due to Eldorado's abundance of rock and caliche. The health department expressed their support for the exemption. Skiles advised the Council that the city could issue Certificates of Obligation to cover the extra expense if the D.W.R. does not waive the rule concerning the liner. Therefore because of the question concerning the extra expense for the

liner all the bids were rejected.

The Council okayed the preliminary deed from Atchison, Santa Fe and Topeka for the land in the Christian Addition.

In other action the Council decided to waive hiring youth for summer help. The Peddlers Permit was discussed due to the fact that several persons who solicit were requesting that the \$5 per day charge be changed in some way to cover a longer period of time. No action was taken on this matter.

The Council also discussed the proposed water well on Jim Hardy's property but, no action was taken.

With no further business the Council adjourned.

Eldorado tracksters take second

Reagan County came away in the number one slot at the District 8-2A Boys Track Championship here last Thursday by tallying 133 points.

Eldorado's Varsity Eagles came in second with their efforts which gained them 121 points. The JV won the meet with a total of 196 points as did the seventh graders with 147 points. The eighth grade came in third with 71 points.

The Eagles broke three records, two of which they had set, at the meet. The Eagles broke Stanton's 1983 record of 43.47 in the 400 Relay with a time of 43.33. The team consists of Robledo, Cathey, Ussery and Gutierrez.

After that period in his life he retired to his stock farm and his first love for some fifteen years when he sold his holdings and moved into the city of Eldorado where he resided until his death. Ben served his community by being on the school board for several years by being a member of the Soil Conservation Board, a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star as well as a member of the First Baptist Church in an active role for the past several years. He was civic minded and took an interest in local, state and national politics.

Mr. Hext is survived by his widow, Ruth and one son, Joe Turner of Pasadena, Texas. Many out of town friends and relatives

were in attendance at the funeral which reflected the long life of association with people in all walks of life.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, in accordance with rules and orders promulgated by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of a public hearing to begin at 10 a.m. on Monday, May 14, 1984, in the offices of the Public Utility Commission, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Austin, Texas, concerning proposals made by the company to add three optional services and delete two services from the list of local exchange services available to its Texas customers.

Proposed additions to the local exchange tariffs include an optional Local Measured Service under which all residence customers and single-line business customers could pay monthly rates less than flat rate for one-party service, with an additional charge for each completed outgoing call to be determined by the time of day, distance and duration of each call; and a subsidized LIFELINE local service to be made available to qualified individuals, as determined by the Public Utility Commission. The monthly rate for LIFELINE service would include an allowance of 25 outgoing calls per month, plus a charge for each additional call.

Proposed for deletion from the local exchange tariffs are one-element measured service offerings for residence customers and single-line business customers, but current customers would not be affected.

The company does not anticipate that these additional services will result in an increase in revenue to Southwestern Bell Telephone.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Se propone suprimir del arancel del servicio telefónico local las opciones de servicio medido de un elemento para clientes residenciales y clientes comerciales con línea única, pero esto no afectaría a los clientes actuales.

La compañía no espera que estos servicios adicionales produzcan un aumento de ingresos para Southwestern Bell Telephone.
