# Excitement in store for Eldorado

Make plans to be in Eldorado this coming Friday and Saturday for Eldorado's 14th Annual Open Rodeo August 12 - 13 and Schleicher County Day, Saturday August 13.

A parade will kick off the week-end festivities Friday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. Parade Chairman Bill Hodges is enthusiastic about the entries in the parade and it should prove to be a good one.

Friday and Saturday evenings at 8:00 p.m. will see the 14th Annual Eldorado Open Rodeo in full swing. Lester Meier is this year's stock producer and as usual it is expected to see a lot of local and surrounding area cowboys and cowgirls show how it is all done. At each night's performance 100 gallons of gasoline will be raffled off. Saturday night's performance will also see the crowning of the Rodeo Queen for this year. The contestants are Kim Thackerson, Charlotte Mobley and Janie Murph.

There will be bareback bronc riding, bull riding, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding, girls barrel racing, team roping and calf roping with each winner in the events winning a \$600 Skyline Trophy buckle. There will be a dance each night following the rodeo with music provided by Bo Hutto and Texas Pride. Tickets are \$3.50 in advance and can be purchased from any of the three queen contestants or can be purchased at the gate for \$4.00.

## County court meets

The Schleicher County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning.

The minutes from the last meeting were read and approved. Monthly bills were then approved for payment by the court.

A group of concerned citizens met with the court concerning the golf course budget. Recommendations were made but no action was taken at the time.

The commissioners then tackled the problem of where to place the office of the new probation officer, Vivian Sanchez. Judge Griffin was instructed to check with Sheriff Orville Edmiston on the prospect of placing Ms. Sanchez's office in the jail building.

The commissioners discussed the repair of the county lawn mower for repair.

Tax Attorney, Gilbert Bragg of Austin met with the county bosses on behalf of his firm of McCreary, Huey, and Veselka, concerning the contracting of collection of delinquent county taxes. The court voted to enter into a contract with the firm to collect the overdue taxes to begin September 1st.

The court then looked over the county's budgets for the upcoming year but no budgets were approved at this time.

The court then adjourned its meeting.

Fred Case, Vice President addressed the near 1000 group concerning how far the co-op had come in its 38 years and revealed some possible changes in the co-op's supplier in the future.

Elton McGinnes, General Manager reviewed the co-op's last year and reported that the increase this year was the first in the co-op's history. Mr. McGinnes also reported on how Pave Paws would prove to be quite an asset to the co-op in the near future.

A.T. Turner, Assistant Manager presented service awards to the following employees: Paul Rebeck, Lineman - 5 year pin; Henry Speck, Jr., Supervisor - 5 year pin; Lester Paul Nixon, Lineman - 5 year pin; W.W. Owens, Treasurer of the Board - 10 year pin; Fred Case, Vice President - 15 year pin; Donnie Danford, Secretary - 15 year pin; Ronnie Sauer, Assistant Superintendent - 20 year pin; J.D. Strauss, President of the Board - 25 year pin; Damon Wagoner, Manager - 25 year pin; and Louise Kuykendall, Receptionist-Cashier - 30 year pin.

After the election of directors (unknown at presstime) and the drawing for door prizes, the meeting was adjourned for another year.

## Open letter from Senator Tower

Dear Fellow Texan:

I wanted to share with you some information concerning the U.S. Air Force plan to locate the Southwest Pave Paws radar detection facility in Schleicher County. The Southwest site will be the home for one of four Pave Paws radars around the nation which will provide greatly enhanced detection and warning capabilities to our military commanders. Two sites are currently operating at Beale Air Force Base in California and at Otis Air National Guard Base in Massachusetts. A third site is planned for Robbins Air Force Base, Georgia.

The Pave Paws system represents an essential part of our national defense. This highly sophisticated radar system is designed to detect any effort to launch a ballistic missile attack from a hostile submarine, and as such, will add greatly to our capabilities to defend the continental United States against any would-be aggressor.

The Senate Armed Services Committee, which I chair, has underscored the importance attached to the expansion of this program by endorsing in full the request made for military construction funding to establish this site in Fiscal Year 1984. I understand that, with this funding, the Air Force expects to start construction on the Blaylock Ranch in mid-1984 and begin

operation of the system approximately three years later. Both Schleicher and Tom Green Counties are expected to benefit from this new mission in the Goodfellow Air Force Base area. The Air Force has advised me that, during construction, the favorable economic impact on the local area will be approximately \$25 million to be spent on labor, materials and construction of the site, access roads and technical facilities. Beyond these one-time costs, I am advised that the annual operation of the Goodfellow Pave Paws site will result in local expenditures of approximately \$7 million per year in payroll and local contracts.

In addition, I believe that the Air Force has an outstanding record of concern for the important issues of occupational and environmental safety associated with such major programs as Pave Paws. Consequently, I have every confidence in the Air Force's commitment to being a safe and good neighbor to Schleicher and Tom Green Counties. I heartily endorse the introduction of this new mission in Texas, and I hope you will feel free to contact me if I can provide you with any additional information concerning this important project.

Instruction services took the biggest hunk out of the money with a total of \$1,120,121.00 projected for

the upcoming year's expenditures on teachers salaries, books and supplies. The next largest output will be for maintenance of the school buildings, salaries of maintenance personnel, utilities and building improvements with a total of \$336,000.00. General Administration will need 1251,847.00; Co-Curricular Activities come next with \$202,528.00; Debt Service with \$158,015.00; Food Service is next with \$150,225.00; Pupil Transportation is in line for \$130,650.00; School Administration is next for \$90,268.00; Instructional Resources and Media amounts to \$46,649.00; Pupil Services comes to \$29,903.00; Health Services amount to \$25,040.00; Gifted and Talented is allotted \$16,609.00; Instructional Related Services amounts to \$13,000 and Community Service comes to \$2,000 bringing the total budget to \$2,572,855.00.

After the reading and approval of the last meeting's minutes, the trustees entertained Mr. Gilbert Bragg, Tax Attorney representing the Austin firm of McCreary, Huey and Veselka. Mr. Bragg approached the board about his firm handling the collection of the school's delinquent taxes. The board agreed to enter into a two year contract with the firm for the collection of said taxes.

The school board entered into an agreement with Region XV Media

Center to supply the school's needs (educational films, etc.) at a cost of \$1.50 per average daily attendance.

The 1st National Bank of Eldorado was chosen as the school's depository for state funds for 1983-85. The 1st National Bank of Sonora also submitted a bid for the depository.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker gave the trustees an update on the insurance coverage on students, football players, etc. including the premiums and 24 hour coverage on students.

The board agreed to continue in the Meals For Friends Program for 1983-84.

Griffin Oil was awarded the 1983-83 gasoline contract for the school district and Gandy's was awarded the 1983-84 contract for providing milk to S.C.I.S.D.

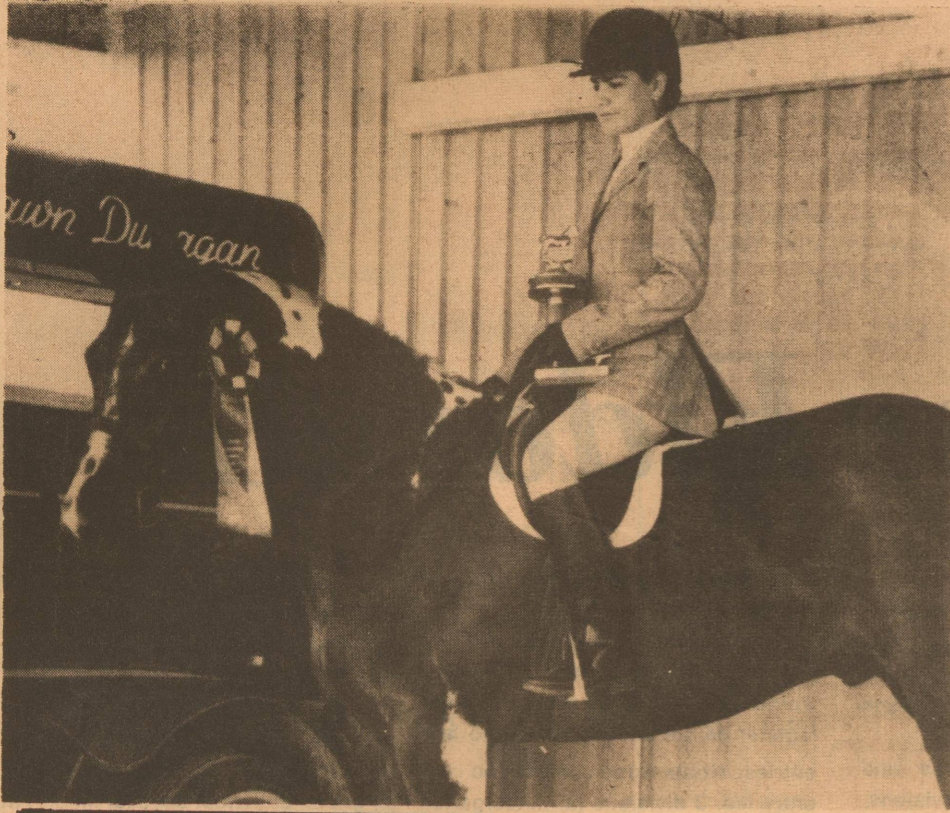
The tax rate for 1983-84 was set at \$.65 per \$100 value by the board.

The board then turned their attention to personnel. The following teachers were hired: Harvey Wink-Math; Sharilyn Wink - Kindergarten; Casey Robison - English and History; Micky McGregor - 1st Grade and Ernestine Moore - Special Education.

A budget amendment showed expenditures paid through August 31st of this year.

The board then paid July bills and adjourned the meeting.

## Loeffler presses Secretary Block

In an effort to obtain Federal assistance for West Texas ranchers impacted by very severe drought conditions, Congressman Tom Loeffler has written Agriculture Secretary John R. Block urging that the Secretary "immediately declare the area a disaster."

Such a declaration would enable affected ranchers to qualify for the Emergency Loan Program administered by the Farmers Home Administration, as well as other federal programs.

To further pursue available federal relief, the Congressman has also alerted Treasury Secretary Donald Regan and Small Business Administrator James Sanders, as both officials administer programs for which the affected ranchers as well as non-farm and ranch businesses, would become eligible following a federal disaster area declaration.

Such a declaration would enable ranchers to take advantage of a section in the U.S. tax code exempting them from federal tax liability due on revenue attributable to the emergency liquidation of livestock, and would allow ranchers to repurchase livestock rather than being subjected to artificially high tax liability due solely to the drought. All matters relating to taxation are the responsibility of the Treasury Secretary.

Also, non-farm and ranch small businesses which have experienced substantial economic injury due to their economic dependence upon the health of farms and ranches would become eligible for Small Business Administration disaster loans.

Loeffler, who has been working closely with local officials, as well as those directly affected, will travel to several of the impacted counties. On August 10-12, the Congressman will visit Crane, Upton, Reagan, Menard, Sutton, Pecos and Brewster Counties, and he plans to be in other West Texas Counties early in the fall.

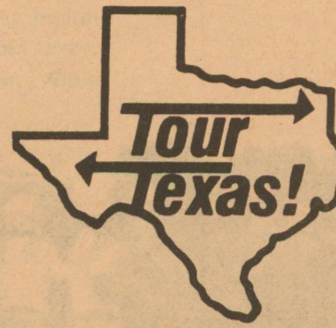

## Your dog & heartworms

The Texas Veterinary Medical Association states that canine heartworms are still being diagnosed in the area. These worms, which are transmitted from dog to dog by mosquitos, travel to the heart over a period of 6 to 9 months and grow to adult size where they can eventually lead to death for the dog.

Symptoms of heartworm disease are often not readily apparent until the disease has reached the advanced stages, and may include frequent coughing, rapid tiring and labored breathing.

Heartworm disease can be detected by a simple blood test conducted by a veterinarian. Also, fortunately, research has resulted in a medication which will prevent heartworms, but certain precautions must be taken before the preventative may be safely started:

1. The adult dog must be checked for heartworms and certified negative. Dogs that already have heartworms and are given the preventative may have serious reactions, possibly fatal.

2. Once your dog is on the medication, he/she must receive this medication continually if prevention is to be effective.

3. Have your dog checked annually or semi-annually for heartworms. Don't wait until your dog has symptoms. If he does not have heartworms, he

can be given the preventative. If he does have heartworms and is fairly young and in good health, they can be successfully treated.

No dog is immune or completely safe from contracting heartworms. Cases are reported from dogs that stay indoors but those most susceptible are outside dogs.

The Texas Veterinary Medical Association recommends that you call your veterinarian to ask about his or her recommendations concerning heartworm disease and prevention.

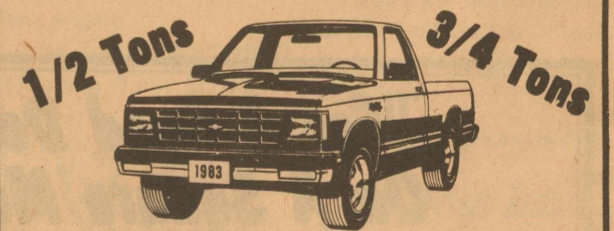
