# Eldorado economy still on skids

The City of Eldorado received its monthly 1 percent sales tax rebate check last week in the amount of \$4037.44 to bring the year to date total rebates to \$16,469.52. This is a 38.08 percent decrease from last year which was \$4334.18. April's checks reflect sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller in late March.

Statewide the comptroller sent out rebate checks totaling \$46.3 million to 985 cities that levy the 1 percent city sales tax. These receipts were up 16 percent over last year. Houston received \$8.6 million up 9 percent over last year. Dallas received 15.6 million up 19 percent; San Antonio got \$2.7 million; Austin \$2.2 million, up 28 percent and El Paso \$1 million, 22 percent up from last year.

Miss Deborah Lorrie Powell will be presented as a Visiting Court Duchess to the Court of Shining Moments at the Coronation of the Queen of Fiesta presented by The Order of the Alamo in San Antonio, Texas on Wednesday April 25, 1984.



Miss Powell is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Powell of Ft. McKavett, Texas. She attended Eldorado High School and is currently studying at the University of Texas

where she is Pi Beta Pledge Trainer and Rush Chairman. She is also active in the Posse Service Club and Texas Relays Committee.

Miss Powell has been honored as a duchess at the Texas Rose Festival in Tyler, the Admiral's Club in Austin and during Buccaneer Days in Corpus Christi.

Her mother, the former Nancy Hunt, was honored by The Order of the Alamo as a duchess in a previous Coronation. Other relatives who have been duchesses are Mrs. Madolyn Powell Mertz and Suan Mertz Slaughter. Her escort at the Coronation will be Mr. Michael Mertz of Eldorado, Texas.

The Fiesta San Antonio is an annual ten day celebration for all of San Antonio and the many thousands of visitors who come to San Antonio each year for this exciting event. Fiesta was first held during the 1890's to commemorate the heroic struggle for Texas Independence from Mexico and to celebrate Texas' victory at the Battle of San Jacinto. Each year the celebration has grown larger and greater and this year's 89th annual

Fiesta promises to be the best ever.

There will be the breath-taking Fiesta River Parade (to be held on Monday night, April 23), at which time King Antonio makes his entrance into the city, leading the parade of gaily decorated barges, which wind their way up the beautiful San Antonio River, to open this week of merry-making; also, the gorgeous Battle of Flowers Parade (Friday, April 27), which was the first event ever presented at Fiesta and is the only major street parade in the world which is completely organized and presented by ladies, who are members of the Battle of Flowers Association; and the illuminated Fiesta Flambeau, America's greatest night parade (Saturday night, April 28), which is the grand finale of Fiesta Week. Fiesta also offers hundreds of other events, including Night in Old San Antonio, art shows, concerts, band festivals, parties, and other festive events which encompass the entire range of the many cultures which are blended together in the unique city of San Antonio.

One of the most spectacular

events of Fiesta Week is the Coronation of the Queen, which will be presented by the Order of the Alamo on Wednesday night, April 25th. This year, twelve Duchesses from San Antonio and twelve visiting Duchesses will make their bows at "The Court of Shining Moments" prior to the presentation of Her Royal Highness, the Princess, and the Coronation of the Queen. The Duchesses are chosen from prominent families of San Antonio and other cities throughout Texas and the United States. Many of the lovely young ladies to be presented will be second or third generation Duchesses, having been preceded by their mothers, grandmothers, and other relatives who were honored as Duchesses in previous courts. The magnificent gowns which the Duchesses wear are designed by the Mistress of the Robes and the Court Artist to depict the Court's theme and are meticulously hand sewn and lavishly jeweled by San Antonio dressmakers. The gowns are truly works of art.

The Order of the Alamo was formed by a group of prominent San

Antonio men in 1909, and the first Coronation, staged in Old Beethoven Hall that year, was warmly received by San Antonio's citizenry. In 1914, the Coronation was moved to the old Majestic Theatre, where, for the first time, the Queen was crowned on stage by the President of The Order. The Coronation "ritual" had evolved by that time and has remained largely unchanged through the years. Each Queen accepts her charge to "make each passing day brighter" for her thousands of subjects.

The 1926 Coronation was one of the first events held in the then, newly completed, Municipal Auditorium, and, at last, the thousands of San Antonians and visitors, attracted by the Coronation until its destruction by fire in 1979. Now the Coronation is staged in the Convention Center Arena. Tickets for the Coronation will be sold at the Theatre for the Performing Arts Box Office at the San Antonio Convention Center beginning April 2.

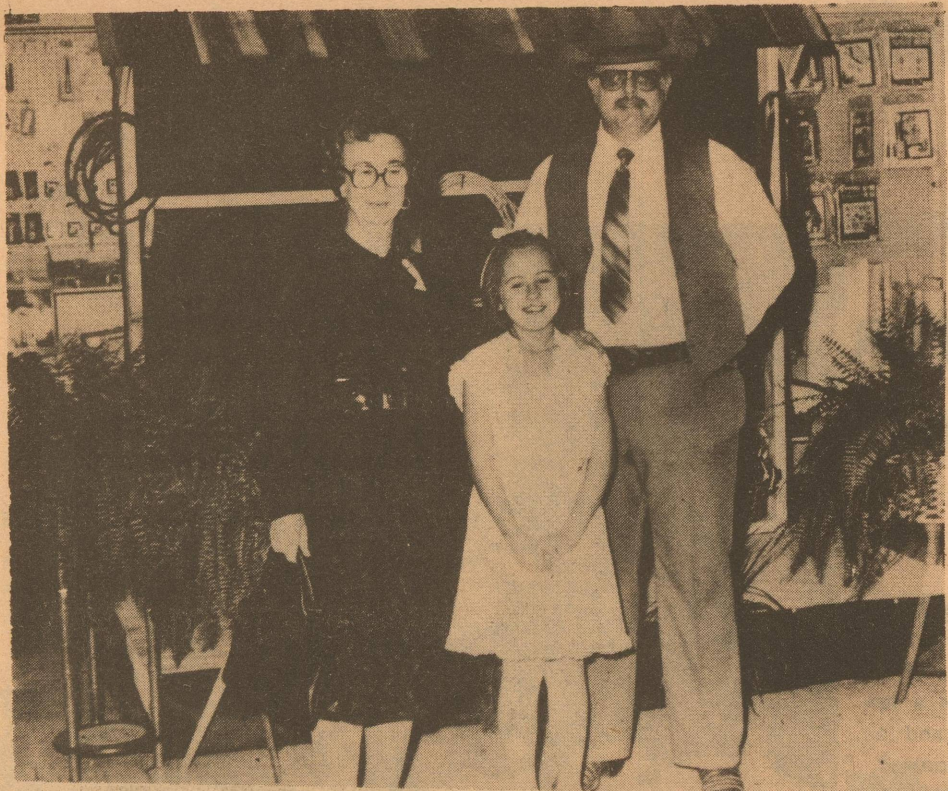
The Coronation is staged in a spectacular setting designed to carry out the Court's theme. Music for the

Coronation is played by the San Antonio Symphony, and special entertainment for the Court is provided by nationally acclaimed artists.

Selection of the Queen and Princess is accomplished by secret ballot of the membership of The Order of the Alamo. By tradition, candidates have been chosen from among the Duchesses of previous coronations. After the Coronation ceremony, the Queen, Princess, and King Antonio spend the remaining days of Fiesta visiting their subjects. Daily trips are scheduled to schools, hospitals, orphanages, and other places where their presence brings joy and the spirit of Fiesta.

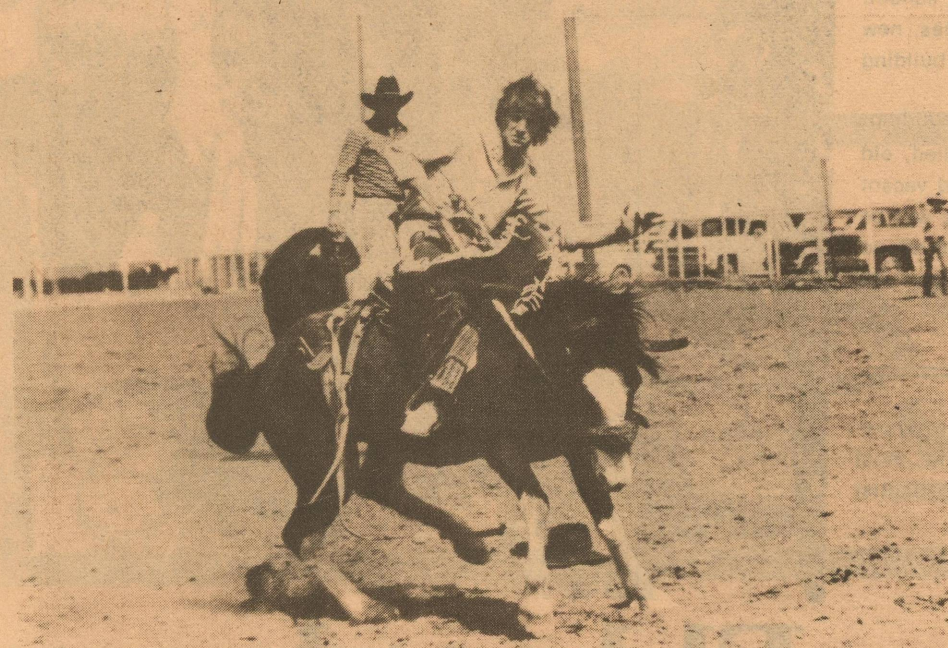
The evenings of Fiesta Week are filled with many gala affairs presented in honor of the Queen and Princess and their Court, including the Royal Garden Party, which is held this year on the beautiful oak and azalea lined lawns of the Sweeney home, and the lavish Queen's Ball is preceded by a "mini-coronation", at which time the Queen, Princess, and their Court are again presented to the members of The Order of the Alamo and their guests.

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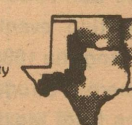
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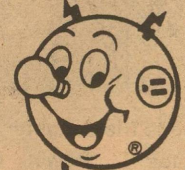
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### Nixon services Thursday

her life. Mrs. Nixon was a homemaker.

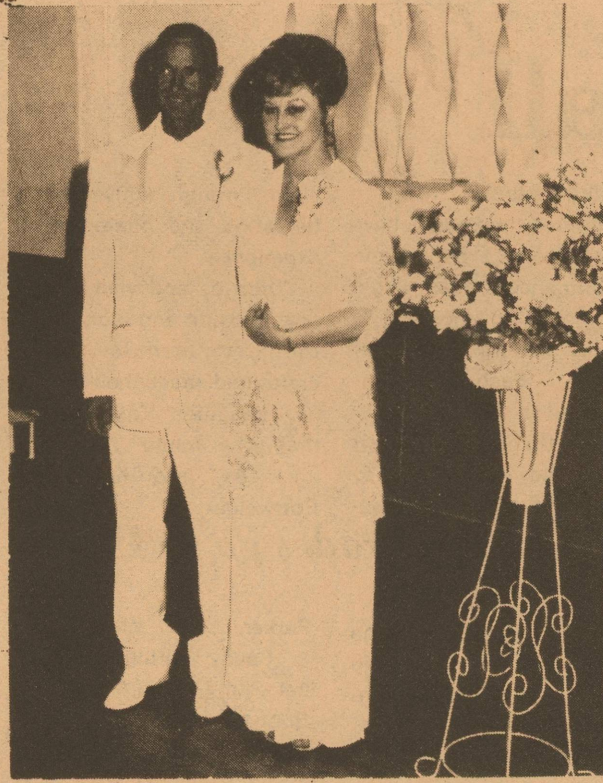

The hostesses, Mrs. Jack Griffin, Mrs. W. A. Van Dusen and Mrs. Albert Tisdale served delicious refreshments from a

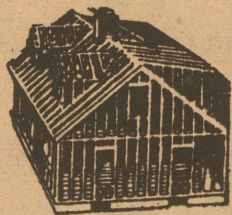
beautifully decorated table furnished by the hostess, Mrs. Mertz.

Proposed additions to the local exchange tariffs include an optional Local Measured Service under which all residence customers and single-line business customers could pay monthly rates less than flat rate for one-party service, with an additional charge for each completed outgoing call to be determined by the time of day, distance and duration of each call; and a subsidized LIFELINE local service to be made available to qualified individuals, as determined by the Public Utility Commission. The monthly rate for LIFELINE service would include an allowance of 25 outgoing calls per month, plus a charge for each additional call.

Proposed for deletion from the local exchange tariffs are one-element measured service offerings for residence customers and single-line business customers, but current customers would not be affected.

The company does not anticipate that these additional services will result in an increase in revenue to Southwestern Bell Telephone.

They went from here to Houston where they attended the wedding of Bennet Ratliff who is Tom's grandson.

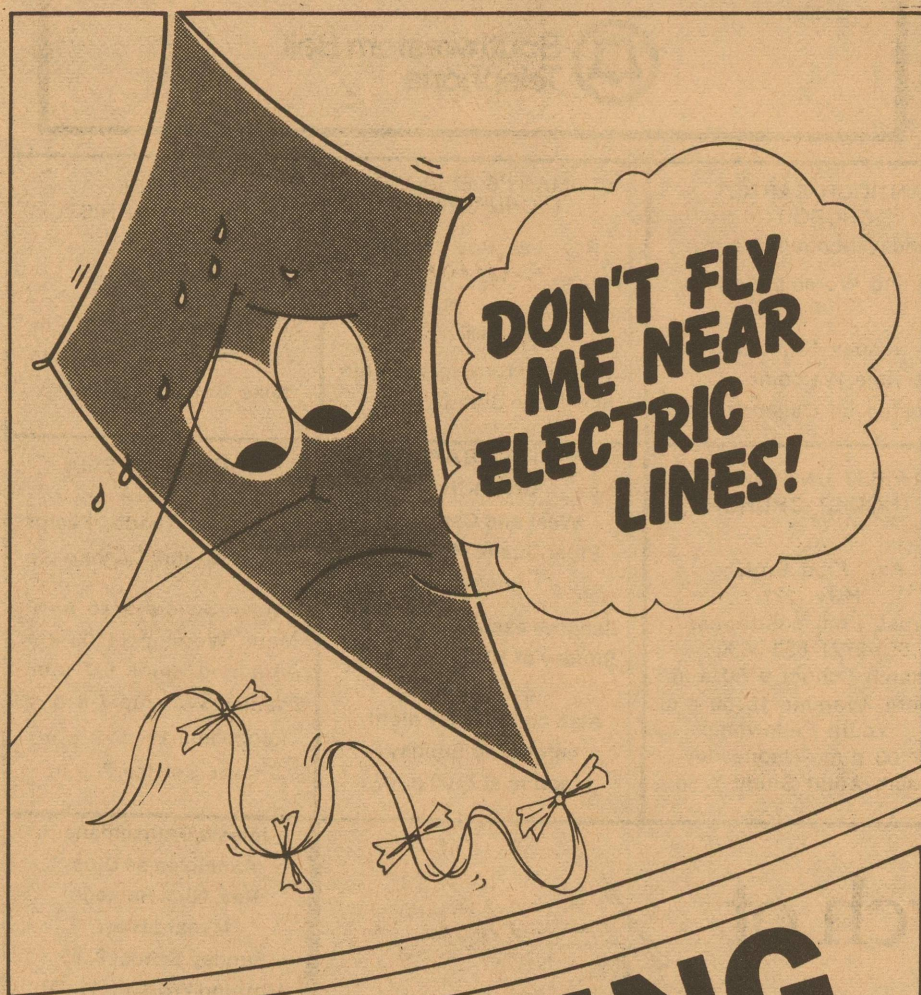
On the fourth of March they flew from Houston to England where they spent three weeks touring all parts of England. They went to the south coast of England by train and back to Canterbury, then to Dover

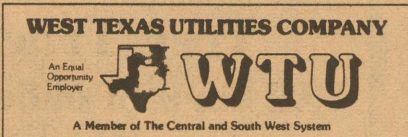
The Ratliffs had a most interesting and entertaining tour of the two countries but are glad to be back in Eldorado.





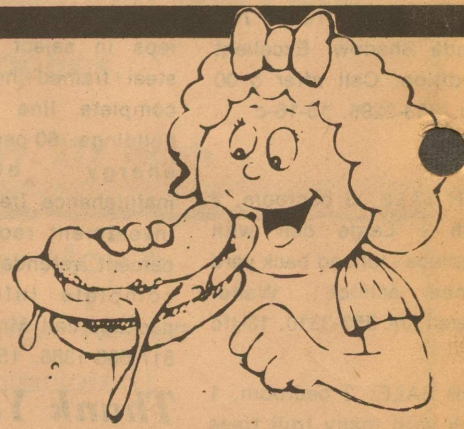
