One councilman adds details

I would like to propose to the interested citizens of Schleicher County the possibility of having a joint city/county recreational facility. It will consist of a five acre lake, Boy Scout Hall, and whatever other additions the financing will permit.

As most people know, the city is in the process of enlarging or reconstructing our sewer treatment plant. The lagoon ponds will cover approximately 10 acres in size and the Texas Department of Water Resources requires that these ponds be lined with 18" of clay to prevent the sewer water from seeping into the water table and contaminating our fresh water supply. (The Edwards Aquifer is replenished by water seeping through fractures in our limestone.) It will require approximately 25,000 yds. of clay to line the lagoon ponds. This will create a 5 acre hole 3 ft. deep.

The dry lake area south of the new fire station seemed suitable so soil samples were taken and test holes were dug on the 6.8 acres of this "playa" lake owned by Dr. Wayne Williams and 5 acres owned by the Boy Scouts. The soil samples were approved by TDWR and Dr. Williams has agreed to sell the 6.8 acres for \$1500 per acre, as opposed to purchasing soil for \$3.00 per yd. (\$75,000). Dr. Williams will reportedly stipulate in his contract for the land that it not be used as a dumping area or become an unsightly wasteland in the future.

The local Boy Scout board expresses willingness to sell their portion of excavated clay for a very nominal fee, if the excavated area is converted to a lake. These funds will be used to construct a new Boy Scout Hall on their property that was so graciously donated to the county by Dr. Wayne and Lynn Williams for use by the Boy Scouts.

The soil depth averaged 4" to 5.5" in the test area and 8" of clay

needs to be left in the bottom of the area so that it will continue to hold water. This requires that a 3' dam be constructed around the area to insure that the water depth be between 3.5' and 5' and maintain a 2' freeboard, as recommended by the district biologist with the Soil Conservation Service.

The evaporation was calculated by an evaporation table compiled in our area over a 25 year period from 1940 - 1965. The worst evaporation occurred in July 1956 during a severe drought. This is where the pumping figures of \$1800 estimated average annual and \$2800 for maximum evaporation years was calculated. The cost of filling the lake initially would be about the same as the average yearly pumping cost (\$1800). (This does not include water that is soaked into the soil).

Priority with everyone at this point would be - what will it cost?

This would be determined by how elaborate the taxpayers wish the facility to be. For example: how much landscaping is desired; what type public restrooms; what type water sprinkling system; how much lighting is desired; what type playground equipment; what type park tables and benches and what type fencing.

The main cost would be the excavation of the soil which would be funded by the sewer treatment plant. The engineering would be done by the SCS, at no charge.

The cost of initial fingerling fish 1500 channel cat and 1000 hybrid perch would be close to \$500. Fertilizer and fish food, according to Willard Richter, District Biologist for the SCS, would be insignificant. The cost we would be looking at would be the development of the remaining 6.8 acres of the 11.8 acre tract into a park area with parking and required facilities.

At this point we do not know if we will be able to get state or federal assistance funding.

Since the county commissioners have tentatively agreed, as have the city council, to support this project if costs are kept within reason, I feel the lake portion should be finished now and filled with water and stocked with fish. If this much is completed this summer, the rest could be decided and budgeted over the next year or two, and the fish would be growing and the lake area would not be filled with muddy water.

In my opinion, it would be a shame to let an opportunity for such a facility to slip away from us.

Please contact your county commissioner or city councilman and let your opinion be known.

Mias Amigas set for next weekend

The courthouse square will be the scene of the 53rd Annual Mias Amigas celebration on June 29 - 30.

The name Mias Amigas was decided to be used for a group of young women who decided they wanted to keep their high school days a memory for years to come. Mrs. J.E. Hill (Josephine Murchison), Mrs. J.L. Neill (Ida) and Mrs. E. H. Brooks (Lavita) were the organizers of the group. There were sixteen original members, eight of whom are still living.

The group organized on May 12, 1932. At first there were only women who were allowed to attend. The men

were a little jealous so later they were allowed to come to the meetings.

The meetings began to grow so that in 1938 a constitution was drawn up. In 1949 Lucile Hill Walder wrote a song to the tune of "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes" and called it "My Mias Amigas". It was adopted as the official song of the organization.

In 1966 it was decided to add more classes 1920-1929. Then in 1973 it was decided to add classes twenty years after their graduation. This year the fifty year class of 1934 and the twenty year class of 1964 will be added.

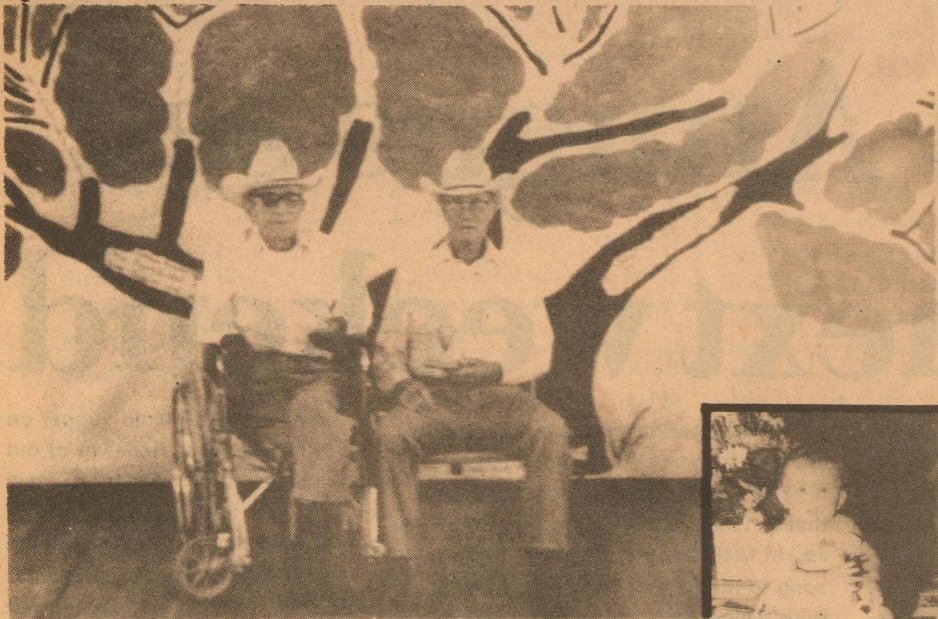
Yearling and Futurity Western Pleasure. He placed 6th in the Mares 5 and Over and 2nd in Futurity Fillies at the Abilene Show.

volunteers in the Little League program that have taken time for my child. Sherry Martin

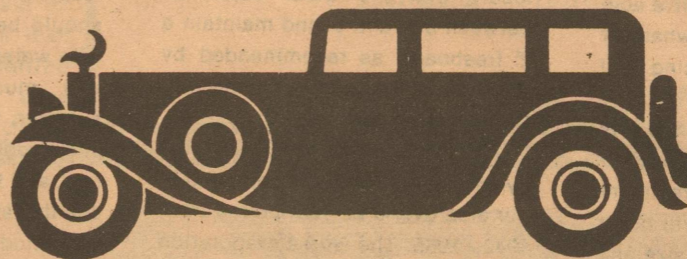
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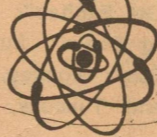
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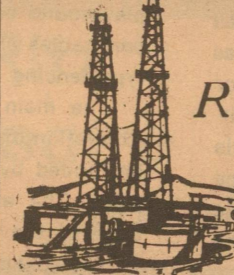
