Councilmen okay '83 - '84 budget

Monday night Eldorado City Fathers approved a \$978,000 budget for the upcoming year, this figure falls short of last year's municipal budget by just over \$50,000. The Trash Budget has intended expenditures and revenues of \$77,200 this year as opposed to last year's figure of \$80,650. The Utility Fund which is set up for approximately \$707,000 is also down compared to last year's which rang in at \$753,000. A decline of \$1400 is also present in the General Fund when compared to last year's figures

The City Council placed the new tax rate at \$.48 per \$100 valuation on a motion from Ronnie Sauer with a second from Edwin Jackson, Jr.

Ray Lewis Ballew, the Chief Tax Assessor for the local taxing district was on hand at the Council meeting and informed those present that if so elected the City Council has the ability to attach an additional 15 percent on top of the uncollected deliquent taxes for fees to have a deliquent tax attorney to attempt to regain some of the lost revenues which are found in deliquent taxes. No action was taken on this particular matter and it was tabled for discussion later.

Federal Revenue Sharing monies was the next topic discussed by the Council and they elected to spend the \$12,000 on health services in the community.

The auditing firm of Everett, Ingram, Overman and Tinkler was selected by the Council to prepare an uncertified audit of the City's books. This decision came after the Council was informed that for a complete audit an additional \$1,000 would be necessary in the firm's fee.

The next topic discussed by the Council was the land fill and trash department. It was learned during this segment of the meeting that the land fill had a life expectancy of 5 years and had been prepared in mutual agreement with the county for a \$4500 - \$2200 split. No changes in the policies of the land fill or the trash department were forthcoming.

The Council then gave it's attention to the WTU rate increase and after some discussion they elected not to contest WTU's sought after rate hike.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo informed the City Fathers of changes at hand of the Texas Municipal League Workman's Compensation. The City Fathers learned that the company providing the coverage to the City as well as the Municipal League was being changed but the effect locally would be nil. At this time Mrs. Mayo informed the Council of the progress concerning the Community Development Block Grant and the sewer bond project. The Council then approved an easement for a sewer lift station in



the Willeke Development. All Councilmen were present with the exception of Gus Willeke.

The Council then retired into Executive Session to discuss personnel

Help at Last

During his speech Monday to the annual meeting of the West Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation District Directors in San Angelo, Congressman Tom Loeffler announced that the United States Department of Agriculture has designated three more counties in West Texas in the federal disaster area. Thos counties are Schleicher, Reeves and Loving. Furthermore Congressman Loeffler announced that the Small Business Association has informed him by letter that the Small Business Administration will designate as an economic injury disaster area all counties determined to be natural disaster areas by the U.S.D.A. This means that the small businesses in the now declared 23 West Texas counties could be eligible for economic injury disaster loans. These loans are available to small businesses unable to obtain credit in working capital from private sources. The loan can be equal to the amount of injury suffered during the drought. Loans are at 8 percent and the maximum amount available is \$500,000 per small business once the S.B.A. declaration becomes official. Small businesses can apply through the nearest S.B.A. office. S.B.A. office notification of intent regarding the pending declaration was in response to an August 3rd letter from Congressman Loeffler.

Said Congressman Loeffler of the announcement Monday, "This is further good news for those who have suffered economic and personal hardship due to this terrible drought.

However, I will continue to actively pursue all forms of federal relief which are available and will continue to work actively with the counties still awaiting a disaster declaration."

The Booster Club's "Meet the Eagles" BBQ held before last Friday's scrimmage with Mason was termed a huge success by club president, Bill Gentry.


