Opinions on the lake project

Local prominent businessmen and civic leaders were contacted this week by the Leader to get their feelings concerning the proposed lake and park facility. Several citizens expressed their opinions, negatively and positively but, wished to remain anonymous. These citizens brought out some points of concern and interest such as: what will happen if Eldorado receives a large rainfall and the lake overflows, will it flood surrounding homes? Who will be in charge of long range maintenance? Will it really be an asset to our community or will it become just another littered area?

Other Eldorado citizens who have allowed the Leader to publish their comments have also made interesting points.

Lynn Meador: I'm in favor of it as I can see several areas that will benefit, such as the city getting the dirt at a

good cost, the Boy Scouts and it will enhance that area of town and will increase property values. The only problems I can see would be the maintenance and policing of the lake and the long term upkeep of such facility by the city and/or county.

Floyd Butler: I am in favor of it, if it will benefit Eldorado without an excessive cost or maintenance problems.

Buddy White: I'm not against it if it will benefit Eldorado and if it is managed in the proper perspective. I can see no adverse things coming from it.

Bob Sykes: I'm against the idea of the lake, but in favor of the city getting their materials from the land. I'm against the lake because of the mosquito problem it would create but especially because of the excessive amount of water it would require to be

maintained. If we were to suffer another severe drought, our water supply would be limited. The water table has been dropping steadily over the years as it is and the lake would only add an extra burden.

Richard Kent: I'm in favor of it if it will help Eldorado in any way.

Jerry Jones: Well, if there's going to be a hole there anyway, why not use it? I'd be in favor of it.

Sonny Turner: I feel it would be an asset to the community if it is operated and managed as it should be. It would be very beneficial to the Boy Scouts, which in my opinion is one of the best organizations in the county, as it builds fine young men. The citizens of Eldorado and Schleicher County should have a say so in this project and not let a few people at City Hall make all the major decisions for us.

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State Finals

Two Eldorado Rodeo Team members qualified to participate in the Texas State High School Rodeo Finals which were held in Seguin, Tex. June 17 - 23. The top four contestants in each event from each Region qualified for the state competition.

Each contestant would perform in two go-rounds and if they performed well, they qualified for a 3rd and final go-round to determine state standings. Eldorado's Tony Diver, now a Lakeview transfer, qualified by being 2nd in Bareback Riding in Region II and Marty Wells for being 2nd in Saddle Bronc Riding and 4th in Cutting Horse competition.

Tony was injured in the first go-round and was unable to continue competition. Marty performed well and qualified for the finals but failed to get a score in the final go-round. He still finished 10th in the State Competition in Bronc Riding.

Region II won the team trophy easily with Jim Sharp of Region II winning the All Around title. He won a saddle, buckle and a Dodge dually crewcab with a two-horse trailer.

Other Region II contestants won six saddles. Each of the top 10 contestants received a Texas engraved plaque and a listing in the State Competition Records plus there were plenty of college representatives offering scholarships to seniors. Those receiving scholarships were: Tony Dunn, Andrews - Howard County College; Gary Dunda, Odessa - Howard County College; Jim Sharp, Kermit - Odessa Junior College; Todd Watkins, Odessa - Snyder College; Michael Phillips, Eldorado - Southwest Texas Junior College and Kelly Griffin, Eldorado - Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

According to reports, the competition and stock were very tough and impressive. Terry Walls and Roy Carter furnished the livestock for the competition. Kids to camp

A week of camping fun is planned for four Eldorado boys at the Salvation Army's big summer camp near Midlothian, Texas.

The youngsters will attend from July 16, 1984 to July 21, 1984, according to Orval Edmiston, the Salvation Army Service Unit Camp Chairman for Eldorado.

Selected for Camp Hoblitzelle this summer are: Tony Aycock, J.J. Martinez, Billy Wayne and Roger Johnson.

"We've been sending boys to the Salvation Army Camp for fifteen years, and it has always been a rewarding experience for us as well as for the kids," says camp chairman

Edmiston.

The campers will join nearly 700 others from across Texas. Each boy's trip is financed by private donations to the Salvation Army Service Unit committees in his city.

"Camp Hoblitzelle is built on 360 acres in wooded country surrounding a 27-acre lake, and is comparable in facilities to the most expensive summer camps," Edmiston said.

"They enjoy boating, hiking, archery, horseback riding, fishing, swimming, sports and crafts, as well as worship service and Bible study."

The boys will sleep in modern brick and redwood cabins. But on one night they will rough it at Fort Tejas,

which is built of logs like the old-time western forts that protected travelers from the wrath of the Comanches.

A total of over 4,000 people participate in a variety of camping sessions during an average summer at Camp Hoblitzelle, each session lasting from a few days to a week or more. Two weeks are reserved for boys from Service Unit cities throughout Texas.

The Service Unit camps have been conducted at Hoblitzelle every summer for 27 years.

"It's the donations from people here that make it all possible, and of course, the detailed work of the volunteers on the Service Unit Committee," Edmiston said.

The latest buzz around town these days is "the lake". I have heard a lot of negative comments, some positive comments, but mostly questions. It seems unanimous that everyone wants something for nothing - but is that the case about the lake? What will it really cost - initially and afterwards? Who will pay for it? What will we give up in order to have it? Do we really need another recreation facility? What will be included in this facility?

Last week's paper referred to "tentative agreement" by City and County officials. Is this true? Will the City and County jointly fund the initial setup of the lake which could run as high as \$60,000 or will some government agency hand us the money? Who will maintain and police the area? The sewer bond

funds have been discussed but the Attorney General will frown on that idea right away. We are taxed too much now and our utility rates are in line with surrounding communities, so where is the money to come from? What do we want most - a lake or something else? Paving or better airport?

Now that we have covered the monetary area briefly - let's look at the long range outlook. Here we are in the midst of a drought and some folks are talking about pumping as much as 70,000 gallons of water per day into a pond due to evaporation. What if it doesn't rain soon and we have to ration water due to decreased water supply. Some communities are looking at rationing right now. Eldorado has always had a good supply of water

but we might not for long! That seems mighty wasteful to me! Perhaps we take our water supply for granted. . . better think about it! Conservatively 50,000 to 70,000 gallons per day to keep the pond full of water, will keep 55 to 75 homes with a water supply during a dry summer month. Is the lake worth 55 to 75 families' water?

What sort of place will this be - a place where I can take my family and catch a fish? What kind of fish? How soon? Can I drink my cool beer? When? Who will be responsible if someone drowns? What about when it starts raining - where will the water go

since we will be disturbing a natural lake that collects excess rainwater from the surrounding area. . . Will water backup into homes around the perimeter? What about mosquitoes? Policing? Grounds maintenance? Swimming? Boating? Estimation of the pumping level too low? I've heard lots of questions. We need more time and more answers before I commit myself.

The idea of a community lake or pond is basically a good idea - but is the timing right? Is it a practical idea and is the location a good one which affords access to people in

the community? We need to take a long look at our priorities and determine what is best for our community - now and in the future.

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Oil production figures

Texas crude oil production averaged 2,309,296 barrels daily in April, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace.

This figure compares with March production of 2,331,651 barrels daily and April 1983 production of 2,370,169 barrels daily.

Texas oil production in April totaled 69,278,897 barrels, down from 72,281,184 barrels in March and down from 71,105,079

barrels in April 1983. The April production allowable totaled 90,826,654 barrels. Texas oil production was 23.72 percent under the allowable for the month.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by April production and followed by cumulative 1984 production, were: Pecos, 4,111,413 barrels; 16,910,339 barrels; Ector, 3,683,049 barrels; 14,784,762 barrels; Gaines, 3,491,941 barrels; 14,022,253 barrels; Yoakum, 3,322,606 barrels; 13,591,889 barrels; Andrews, 3,156,047 barrels; 12,670,495 barrels; Hockley, 3,121,791 barrels; 12,700,347 barrels; Gregg, 3,021,958 barrels; 12,259,951 barrels; Scurry, 2,311,437 barrels; 9,484,261 barrels; Crane, 2,099,162 barrels; 8,589,350 barrels; and Refugio, 1,809,305 barrels; 7,289,282 barrels.

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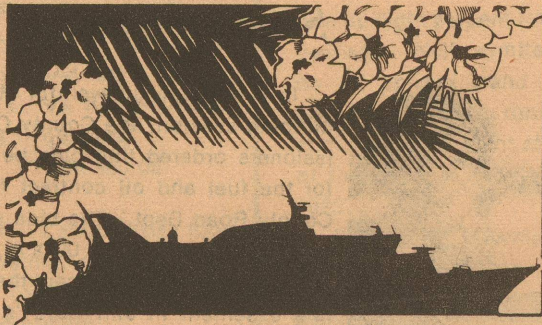
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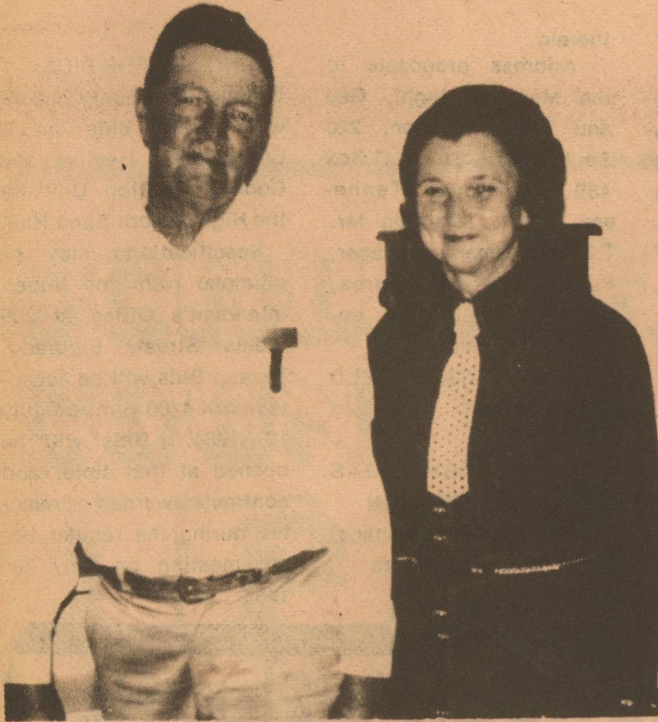
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50th celebration

In a major effort to prevent debt, Social Security is contacting people on the rolls studies show are likely to incur overpayments, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

These are people who were overpaid in the past, who estimated they would earn less this year than last, who plan to start getting retirement checks this year, who earn over the exempt amount but still get some benefits, or those dependents whose benefits ended this year.

People in these groups will receive a letter asking if their plans have changed since they last notified Social Security. Many of them estimated earlier what they expected to earn in 1984 and they will be asked if their estimate has changed.

Those whose plans have changed or who expect to earn more than they estimated will have their benefits adjusted so that they will not be overpaid.

Upp said it is very important for people getting benefits who work to notify Social Security if they expect to earn more than the annual exempt amount. In 1984, the annual exempt amount is \$5,160 for people under 65 all of the year and \$6,960 for people 65 through 69. There is no earnings limit for people 70 or older for all of 1984.

People who receive letters can make their report by completing a simple form enclosed with the letter. People who did not get a letter, but who want to make a report, can do so by calling or writing any Social Security Office.

The San Angelo Social Security Office is located at 2214 Sherwood Way, and the telephone number is 949-4608. The people there can provide more information about how work affects payment of benefits. A free leaflet, "How Work Affects Social Security Checks", is available.

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Exploration activity up nationwide
