

Commissioners approve remodeling bond issue

County Commissioners had a busy morning Monday during which they voted to put forth a \$200,000 bond issue before the citizens of Schleicher County for the remodeling of the Memorial Building. The court viewed the blueprints sent by architect Gary Donaldson for the top-to-bottom renovation of the 36 year old building. It will cost between \$175,000 and \$212,000 to complete the project. The date for the bond issue election will be announced at a later date.

The court read numerous letters from individuals who were thanking the county for their assistance in bringing PAVE PAWS to Schleicher County and for any part the county played in this action.

By order of the court the commissioners court will participate in the West Texas Association of County Judges and Commissioners Convention in San Angelo next year.

The court heard Beth Wallace, and attorney from Sonora, who has expressed an interest in the position of County Attorney in Schleicher County. The commissioners took no action on this matter.

A discussion was held concern-

ing the need for a building in which to house the county's emergency equipment. The present arrangement houses the equipment in an unsatisfactory building and the court discussed the possibility of locating another building for the equipment.

Chris McCravey was approved by the county as a County Weigher.

In other action the court joined the Texas Association of Counties for another year; approved Schleicher County's share of the 51st Juvenile Probation expenses; reviewed quarterly and monthly reports of the departments; approved the transfer of money to various funds from the General Fund and paid monthly bills.

School looks into building repairs

Schleicher County Independent School District's Board of Trustees handled their agenda with ease Monday evening in their regular session.

The board first agreed to pay for the expenses of the two buses that took the Eagle Band to Regional Competition in Temple recently.

High school principal Richard McC Carson and Elementary Principal Weldon Moore met with the board to offer their reviews of their respective tutorials. Each reported on how the tutorials were progressing, the results and made recommendations on how the programs might be improved.

The board then reviewed the school's insurance program. They compared the amount of premiums paid to the number of claims. December 1st will mark the renewal date of the school's insurance with Horace Mann and the board discussed checking into other insurance programs, however, no action was taken on the matter at this time.

The trustees were then briefed on the school's audit and the TEA's audit and it was reported that no major discrepancies were found.

The Textbook Committee's recommendations for the upcoming year was approved by the board.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker reported to the board on the status

of the employment of a Maintenance Foreman. Applications have been received from local citizens as well as from other cities. Whitaker reported that he was still in the process of reviewing the applications.

They then discussed the request for the construction of a handicap ramp on the east end of the elementary school. The trustees voted to wait until the upcoming renovation of the school began and to include the ramp in the necessary repair work at that time.

Concerning school building repairs, the board also met with architect Gary Donaldson about the roofing of the 1950 addition, gym, ag building and the possible renovation of the high school building, such as new doors and windows, revision of office space, updating of the electrical system and the possibility of air conditioning the auditorium. There was no action taken at this time only a general discussion.

Due to Superintendent Whitaker's absence next month on the regular meeting date, the board voted to meet December 6th and due to the fact that most of the bills won't be in by then they will then reconvene December 13th to pay bills.

The board then paid the monthly maintenance bills and adjourned the meeting.

Eldorado still on down side

State Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed out checks totaling \$99.5 million, last week, in local tax payments to the Texas cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"So far this year, we've sent 13 percent more money to these cities than we did last year," said Bullock. "And they can expect another increase next month as we begin sending them receipts we collect for the new items and services that became taxable October 2. We'll be getting this extra money later in November and sending it to the City halls in December."

Eldorado, still showing a 25.50 percent decrease from last year, received a check for \$6314.06. Last year's payment for the same period was \$9181.55 and last year's total for

the year at this time was \$66,037.39 as compared to 1984's payments of \$49,198.66

Mertzon is boasting a 40.51 percent increase for their 1984 total with their latest check of \$6490.40 making 1984's total to date come to \$51,650.47. 1983's total to date was \$36,901.25

Sonora received a hefty \$25,006.67 check but they still show a 6.03 percent decrease from this time last year. Their 1984 total to date is \$201,769.06 while 1983's total to date was \$214,705.86.

Our neighbors to the east in Menard are showing a slight .12 percent increase for the yearly total of \$38,151.28. Their latest check totaled \$4838.52. Their 1983 total to date was \$38,106.23.

Deer Season opens Saturday

With the kick-off of Deer and Turkey Season this coming Saturday November 17th, Schleicher County will once again see a bevy of sportsminded visitors. This year's deer population is estimated at approximately 54,000 head by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. This number is down some from last year's 72,000 but the deer in the county have fared better this past year and the quality of this year's deer crop should be superior in size and trophy when compared to the kills of last year. There are approximately 7,000 bucks in the county 28,000 doe and and somewhere around 18,000 fawn.

Due to the past two years drought conditions, the population may be down some in count, in that many of the does last year did not breed simply as a deterrent against unfavorable climatic conditions.

The turkey crop is basically in the same condition as the deer crop, there were fewer than average hatchings this year due to the weather and there will be less young birds seen. The majority of the birds taken will be an older and more mature bird than last year.

With the onset of the hunters to

our community and county we would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the residents of Schleicher County in welcoming our visitors and wishing them well in their hunt. May you have a safe and successful stay amongst us.

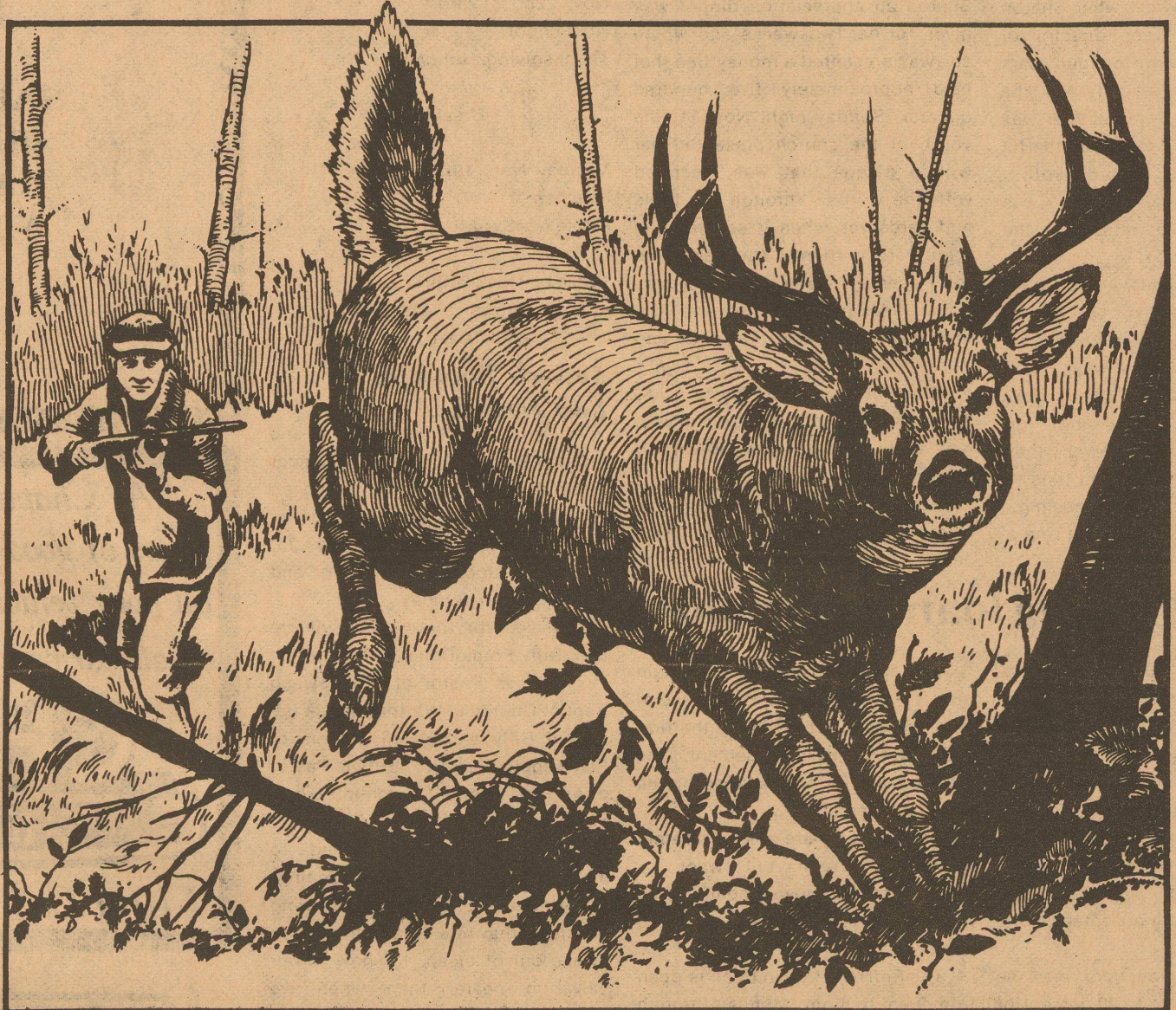

FHA accepting loan applications

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Eden can accept emergency loan applications until December 4, 1984, for losses caused by the 1983 drought in Schleicher County. Ben T. Rucker, Jr., County Supervisor said today. Schleicher County is serviced by the Eden FmHA office. Applications for 1984 losses will be accepted in the near future.

Farmers and ranchers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses.

For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5 percent. The interest rate for the balance of the loan is 8 percent.

Farmers who are able to obtain commercial credit but want to borrow from the government agency must pay an interest rate of 13.75 percent.

Eagles win District with tie

The action started early and stayed late Friday night as the Eldorado Eagles met the Midland-Greenwood Rangers for a 22 - 22 tie. The game played to a large Eldorado crowd at Midland.

Jimmy Turbeville received the beginning kick-off and brought the ball to the Eagles' 40 yard line and for the next nine plays another 60 yards were added to the Eagles early game total plus a touchdown when Steve Saldivar bullied his way through for the last two yards. Victor Gutierrez came out and added the PAT for the early Eagle score. Coach Larry Mitchel later stated that the opening drive of the game for 60 yards in nine plays was the best offensive drive he had seen Eldorado perform since he had been coaching here.

Greenwood brought the ball up to their 40 yard line and were forced to punt. The Eagles had just about the same luck on the next series of downs and eventually punted the ball back to the Rangers where their star running back, Roger Smith finally plow, d the ball through for a TD bringing the score to 8 - 7, with Greenwood's extra points added after the TD. The Eagles responded in the middle of the 2nd quarter with a pass from quarterback Tim McAngus to Victor Gutierrez. 55 yards were burned by the 155 lb. senior to light up the scoreboard once again. McAngus made a short pass to James Harlin for an additional point.

Greenwood once again made the scoreboard with only 24 seconds left in the second quarter on a pass to Tim Osteen which was successful on a valiant 4th down effort by the rangers. The second half started out with a heavy defensive fight in which both teams had possession of the ball but lacked the umph! to gain either yardage or a TD until a cross action was set up between Victor Gutierrez and Jimmy Turbeville in which 68 yards were expended for another Eldorado touchdown setting the board alight 22 - 16.

The fourth quarter saw basically the same action as the third quarter with hard hitting, futile efforts in the trenches until Greenwood's running back Smith broke loose from the Eagles for a 58 yard run, followed shortly by an effective PAT tying the score. The Eagles rushed 35 times for a total gain of 122 yards. The Rangers made 50 attempts on the ground for a total worth of 324 yards. Six of the 16 pass efforts were completed by the Eagles and five were completed of the 10 thrown by the Rangers. The Eagles netted 147 yards through the air as opposed to Greenwood's 56. The Eagles were in a punt situation six times for a total yardage of 220. Whereas the Rangers punted three times for net worth of 88 yards. The Eagles accumulated 13 first downs and the Rangers 15. One fumble was lost by the Eagles and the Rangers lost two. Six penalties were drawn by Eldorado for a grand total of 50 lost to the referees and the Rangers drew seven penalties for 85 yards. More penalties could have been attached to Greenwood's final tally had they been observed by more than the large Eldorado crowd. Each team received only minor injuries but due to the cold snap and the weather and the velocity of the contact, Eldorado saw several cramped muscles. Jay

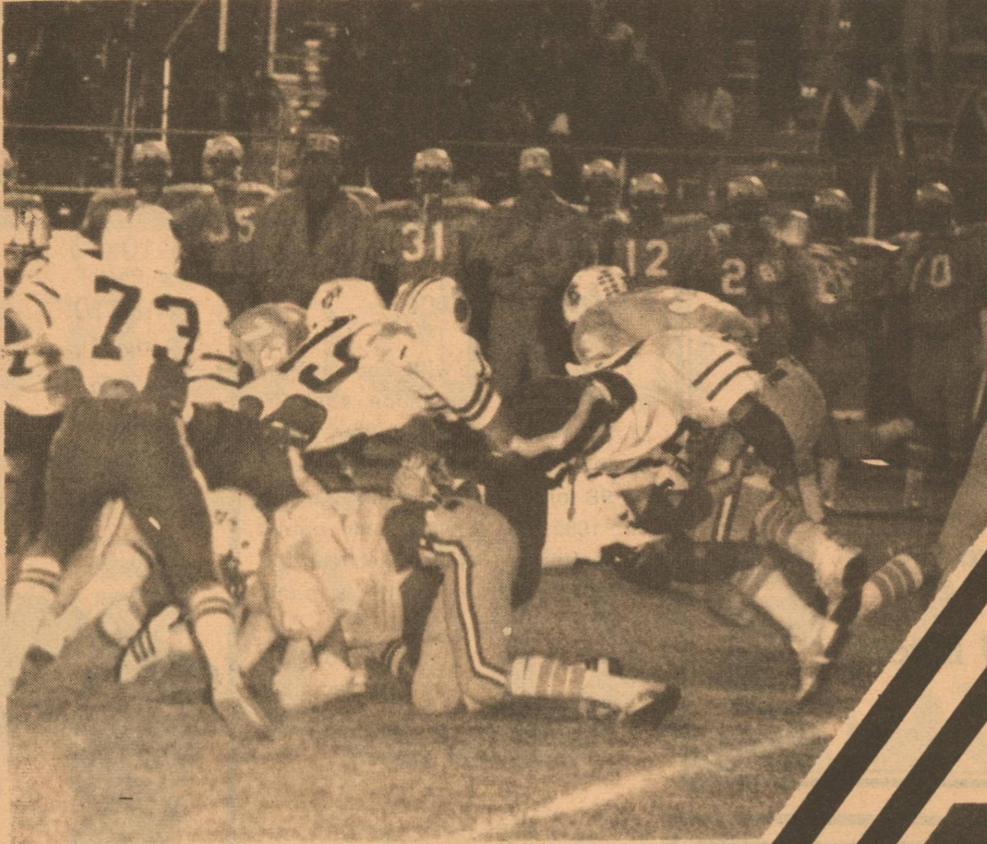
O'Harrow saw some defensive action but is not expected to play in the upcoming game against Van Horn.

Steve Saldivar racked up 49 yard for the Eagles with James Harlin running a close second totaling 48.

Larry Mitchel cited the powerful running of Steve Saldivar, Mike Moore and Victor Gutierrez as contributing factors to Eldorado's score. He cited the entire defensive line for holding the Rangers' explosive offensive to three touchdowns. Mitchel said that the Van Horn Eagles would show Eldorado a different type of formation and

he anticipated heavy blitzing action from the linebackers. The Van Horn game will be played at Crane Friday the 16th at 7:30 p.m. Eldorado will represent the hometeam and wear the home colors. The Eldorado seating will be on the west side of the field and the admission will be \$4.00 for adults and \$2.00 for students.

A large Pep Rally is planned for 11:45 a.m. Friday in the high school gym in order for the anticipated large crowd to be seated, it is essential that as many citizens as possible attend this Pep Rally if the Eagles are to know their community supports their efforts to the maximum.



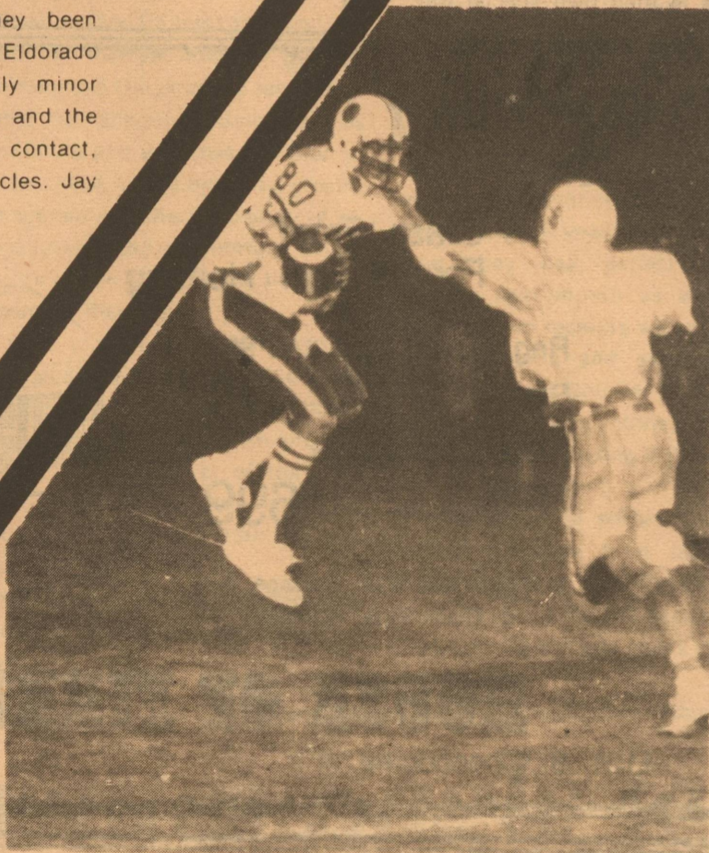

1 Cor. 10-16 The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? the bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ.

17 For we being many are one bread, and one body; for we are all partakers of that one bread.

21. Ye cannot drink the cup of the Lord and the cup of devils ye cannot be partakers of the Lord's table, and the table of devils.

1 Cor 11-16 for as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup ye do shew the Lord's death till he come.

27 Wherefore whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthy, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord.

28. But let a man examine himself and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup.

Every saint, by carefully judging himself and preparing his heart before God may take his rightful place at the table of the Lord and participate in the Lord's supper. The table of the Lord's supper is a literal table with literal bread and literal cup which represent the body and blood of Christ. As we partake of this we are.

participating with the total church in a unique way. The church is not made up only of those who are alive at this time. In order for the body of Christ to be complete, it will be necessary for the dead in Christ to be resurrected at the Rapture (I Thessalonians 4:13-18).

When we observe communion join not only with all the living saints, but also with the saints who have gone before - brothers and sisters who in ages past have lifted the cup to their lips and partaken of the broken bread.

While we certainly do not believe the bread and the cup are transformed literally into the body and blood of Christ, we do believe Christ is present with us as we take communion. He is present, for he promised to be in the midst of us, no matter how small the number. In a very real sense, though human

agents break the bread and pass the cup, it is as if we sit in the Upper Room with the Lord, receiving the elements from His hand. This is true because we are doing it in obedience to His command. There was no more blessing in the bread and cup received by disciples in the Upper Room than there is in the bread and cup received now by Christians around the world.

The keeping of the Lord's table is a carry over of the passover. The passover supper was started when God's people were to be delivered from Egypt. People went to Jerusalem to make a sacrifice and have the passover supper which was meat prepared like it was the night it was fixed when God's people left Egypt.

Jesus and the disciples at the last supper before the cross had went up to Jerusalem and Jesus instituted the Lord's supper or his table of the bread and the cup. They took of the bread that was to rember the broken body and the cup for the blood and the foot washing for love and unity. A lot of people take the supper every Sunday and leave off the foot washing but the foot washing is important. People that take the supper every Sunday it becomes old hat to them, just a part of Sunday's program, once a year brings one's self to deeper dedication.

If you do it every week why leave the foot washing off.
In the United Pentecostal Church we have it once a year, foot washing and all. Men wash the men's feet and ladies wash the ladies feet.
The Lord's supper separates the sinner from the Saints. We've had the Lord's supper and foot washing and people wouldn't come back to church as the spirit of God was with us they wasn't worthy to partake or be in a heavenly place with God's people.
