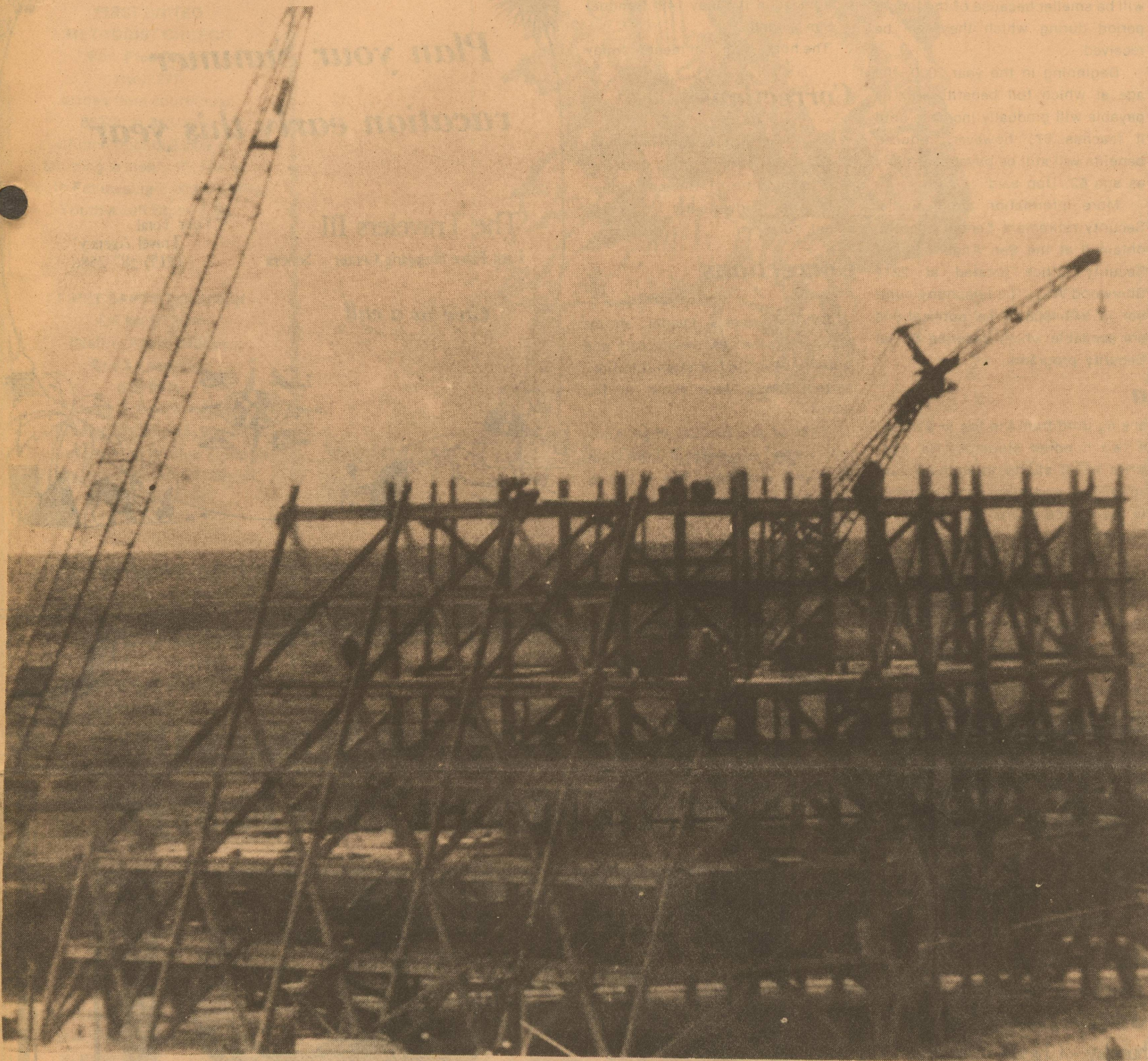

## Local races wrapping up

Interest seems to be picking up in the area elections with most of the filing deadlines falling on March 6th or 7th.

Two City Council seats and mayoral positions in both Eldorado and Mertz on are up for grabs in the April 6th election. As of Wednesday afternoon, Richard Mendez, John Nikolauk, and incumbent Mayor Bob Lester had filed to the seats in Eldorado. Mertz on's City Clerk reported at the same time that no one had filed as of yet but expected some filings at Wednesday night's council meeting.

The Schleicher County Independent School District's Board of Trustees will have the terms of Rick Sterling, Ronnie Mittel and the position vacated by John Nikolauk coming up for grabs. As of Wednesday noon only Ronnie Mittel and

Terry Green had filed for the positions. The Irion County I.S.D. has incumbents Pon Laudermilk, Harrel James, and Laurence Dannheim re-filing along with Joe Brooks and Peggy Thomas.

March 12th is the deadline for filing for a seat on the Schleicher County Medical Board and William Edmiston.

Schleicher County Clerk Helen Blakeway reports that only the incumbents have re-filed for their positions on the District Water Board. They are Ray Willoughby and Earl Lloyd. Filing deadline is March 11th for these positions.

## Bob gives Texans a report on County sales

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent out reports last week on Texas counties and comparisons from the third quarter of 1984 to the same quarter of 1983. Local counties, with a few exceptions all showed improvement.

Schleicher County's 57 reporting outlets turned in \$6,528,597.00 in gross sales during the third quarter of 1984 as compared to \$6,044,485 in 1983. This shows an 8% increase.

Irion County's 32 reporting outlets had gross sales of \$3,879,104 in the same quarter of 1984 which was a 21.7% increase over the \$3,186,137 reported in 1983.

Sutton County showed gross sales of \$12,956,908 in 1984 as compared to \$13,582,164 in 1983 which is a 4.6% increase over the \$3,186,137 reported in 1983.

Menard showed a 6.2% increase in the 1984 quarter with its 63 reporting outlets having \$5,347,924 in gross sales. In 1983 for the same period they showed \$5,035,185 in gross sales.

Tonj Green County showed a 7.3% decrease in gross sales in 1984 with its 2117 reporting outlets turning in \$485,798,558. In 1983 they turned in \$523,838,677.

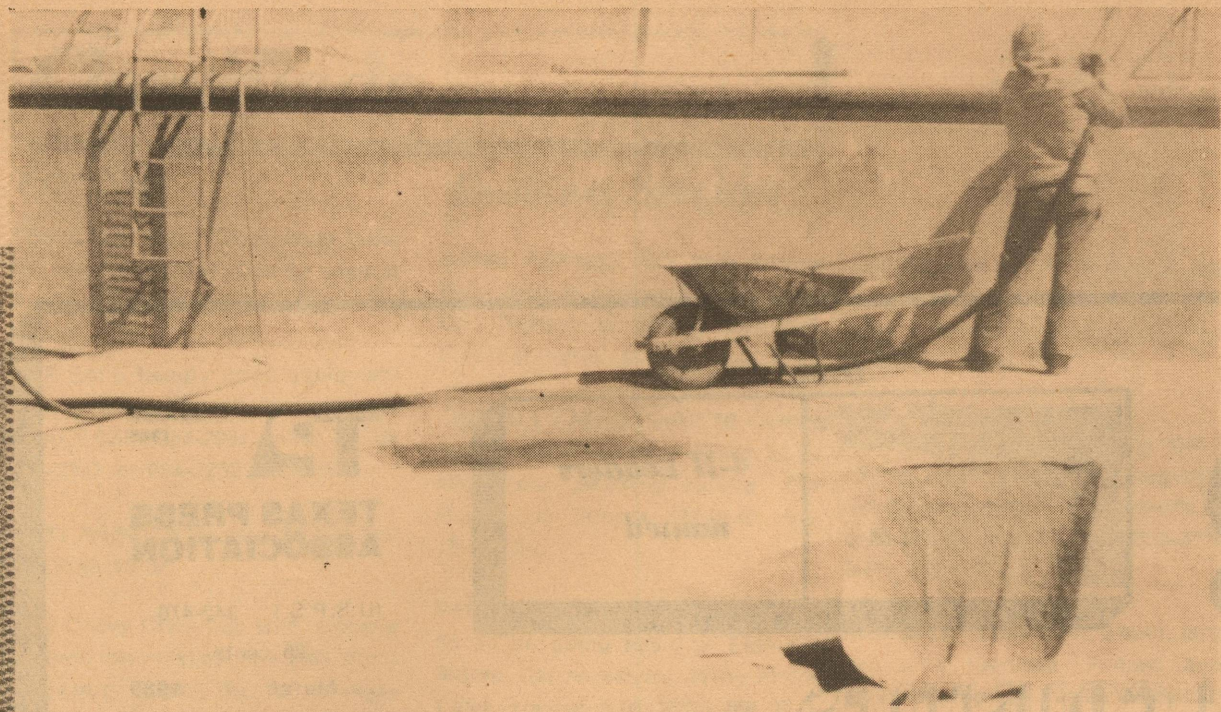

### Social Security report

The amount of each retirement check is permanently reduced if a person elects to retire under Social Security before age 65, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

Payments are also reduced if a spouse or a widow or widower begins receiving payments before 65.

The amount of the reduction will depend on the number of months the person receives checks before reaching 65. Those who start getting checks earlier will realize about the same total amount over the years; however, the amount of each check

will be smaller because of the longer period during which they will be received.

Beginning in the year 2000, the age at which full benefits will be payable will gradually increase until it reaches 67; however, reduced benefits will still be payable as early as age 62, Upp said.




### Sesquicentennial Celebration visitors

The Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration in 1986 will be by and for all Texans -- even temporary ones! And now, plans have been made to involve a very special group of "temporary" Texans, the Winter Texans from the northern United States who travel south to the Rio Grande Valley for the winter months.

The Winter Texan Sesquicentennial Association is a newly-created organization of such "snowbirds," and has planned some very exciting activities for 1986. The Association was officially sanctioned by the Sesquicentennial Commission on February 13, and is already encouraging Winter Texans to make their "temporary Texan" status more permanent -- by seceding from their home cities!

These Winter Texans will give their cities one "out" before breaking the home ties. They will ask their city governments to become affiliated with the Sesquicentennial as Texas Independence Communities.

If the cities refuse, the Winter Texans will "secede" from their home communities' "negative attitudes" and petition the Governor of Texas to be admitted as Texas citizens. If enough Winter Texans secede, they may organize as a collective Texas Independence Community.

Central to the Association's plans are two caravans which are expected to bring thousands of Winter Texans to the state in the fall and winter of 1985, one leaving in late October and the other leaving in December. Both will begin at three of the northernmost points in the United States -- Emerson, North Dakota; International Falls, Minnesota; and Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. The branches of each caravan will eventually join at the Alamo in San Antonio, and the combined group will continue down to the Rio Grande Valley in Texas.

"Any Winter Texan can participate in our caravans," said Rev.

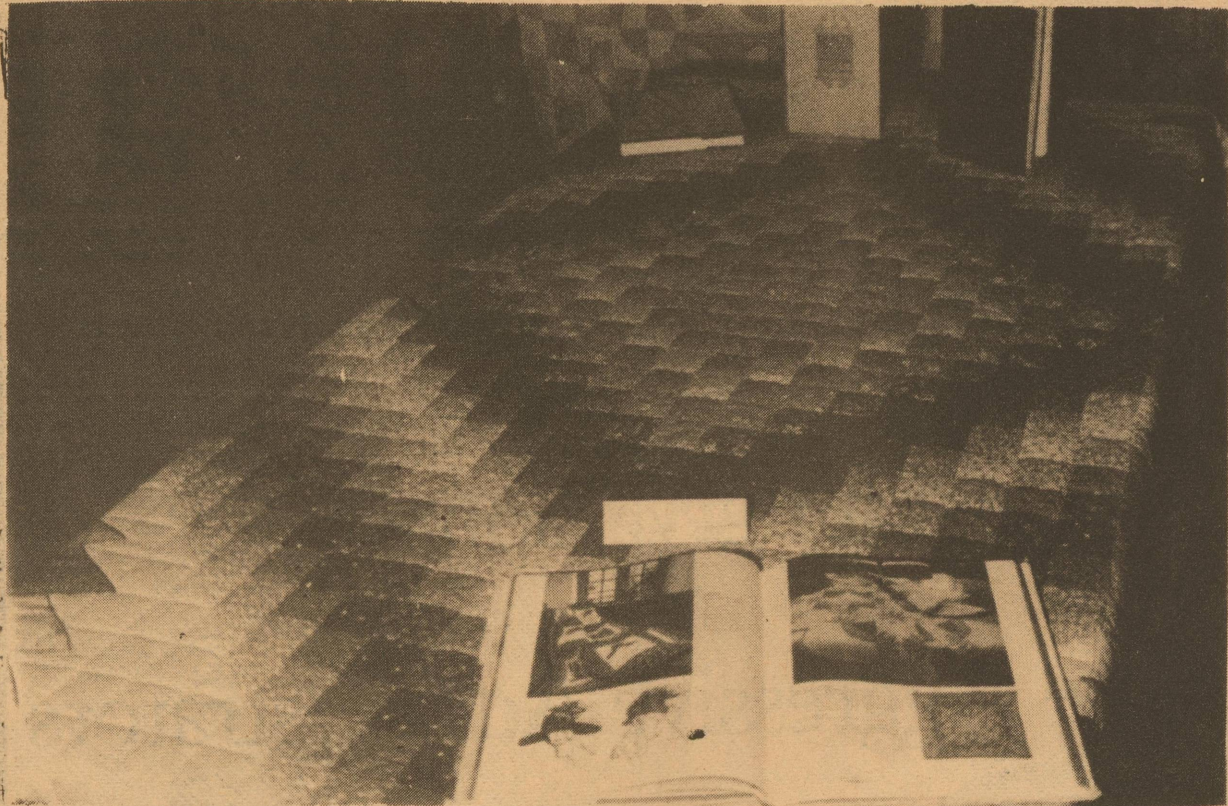

## Baptist News

Texas Baptists gained in 1984 in the number of churches and church members but showed a decline in the number of people baptized by the churches according to the denomination's statistical services department.

The number of churches increased by 39 during the year to a total of 4,056, and mission congregations increased from 781 to 805.

Totals were affected by the fact that the Minnesota-Wisconsin Southern Baptist Fellowship became a state convention, and its 76 churches are no longer included in the statistics of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, said Statistician W.E. Norman. Texas Baptists have helped support pioneer missions work in the two northern states since 1956.

Baptisms reported by the churches were down from 66,323 in 1983 to 62,581 in 1984.

Total membership of the 4,861 churches and missions grew by 39,000 to 2,361,089. Sunday School enrollment grew by more than 23,000 to 1,267,780.

Enrollment in Texas Baptist Membership increased by 533 to a total of 69,750 while Woman's Missionary Union decreased from 136,044 to 135,836.

Church Training Enrollment decreased from 255,828 to 244,835, but enrollment in church choirs and other music programs increased by about 3,500 to more than 232,000.

Substantial gains were recorded in stewardship as churches reported receipts in excess of \$714 million, more than \$70 million greater than the previous year.

Missions gifts by the churches through the Cooperative Program grew from \$50.4 million in 1983 to \$53.5 million in 1984, and total missions giving gained by about \$4 million to more than \$107 million.

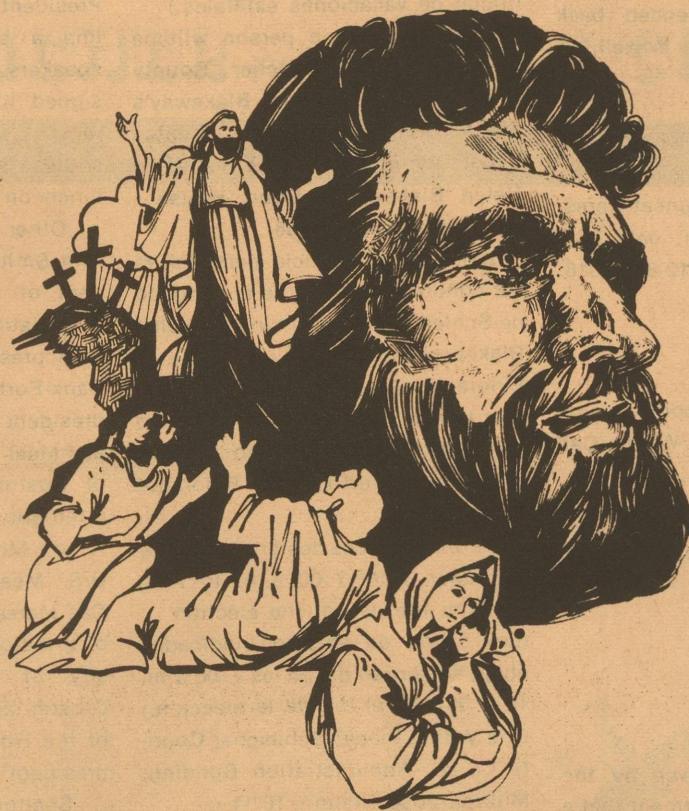

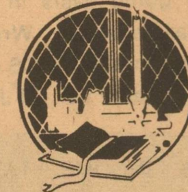

The convention will open Sunday, March 17, with a 175-exhibit trade show featuring the latest agricultural products and services from throughout the U.S. Several prominent Western artists and craftsmen will exhibit their works during the trade show's 10th annual, three-day run. Huggins and King will speak. TSCRA will elect a new board of directors and approve policy resolutions with adjournment at noon, Shelton said.


