## Kothmann Is World Champion Roper

Karl Kothmann of Fort McKavett won the goat ropers World Championship Saturday in the San Angelo Fairgrounds roping arena.

Kothmann is perhaps the first to win this title in nearly half a century as available records show the last major goat roping competition was held in the early 1930's. Goat roping contests lost in popularity when cowboys started competing in calf, steer, and team roping events.

Kothmann is a native of Schleicher County. He has been roping most of his life having been raised on the Whitehead Ranch where his father, C.E. "Nook" Kothmann has been a top hand for several decades. Karl works for Jimmy Powell on the

Bolin Ranch.

Kothmann, on his 16 year old horse named "Snip", set the pace for the final 12 goat ropers who made the finals after three go-rounds of roping on Friday.

When the dust settled Saturday, Kothmann had won \$6,680 in prize money and the sterling silver trophy buckle. Kothmann finished in the money in five out of seven go-rounds and his time of 119.43 seconds on seven goats was 4.81 seconds better than the second place finisher, Ed Hale, Jr. of Ozona. Kothmann's overall average on seven head was 17.06 seconds, and Hale's average on seven head was 17.74 seconds.

Marshall Millican of Robert Lee, who led after the Friday finals, took

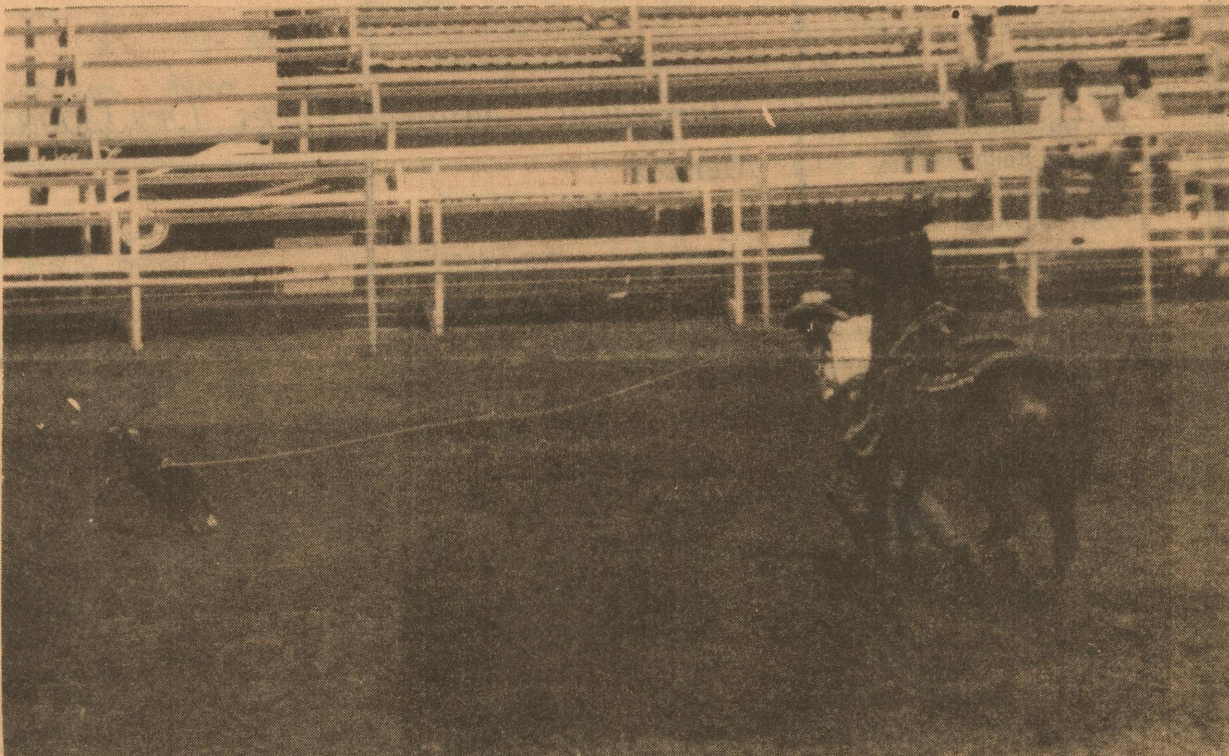
third in the overall average. Mark Tillman of Junction was fourth place overall winner.

A 15 year old mare named Juliette Leo was named the Champion goat roping horse. The horse is owned by George Spiller of Voca in McCulloch County.

There were 123 cowboys competing in the goat roping contest. Total purse was more than \$17,800.

Schleicher County's team consisted of John Ray Powell - coach, Bob Johnson, Jim Belk, Ross Whitten, Day Ray.

Irion County's team consisted of Terry Ford - Coach, John Manny, Jessie Whitlow, Mike Hamilton, Stanley Keene, Frank Lindley.



## City Can Pave Christian Addition

The regular meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Tuesday, June 11, 1985 at City Hall with all Councilmen in attendance.

The Secretary reported that her request for reimbursement of funds for the relocation of water and gas lines in the Christian Addition had been approved as well as an estimate for paving within Christian Addition pending the satisfaction of citizen participation and environmental assessment requirements. A hearing was called for Tuesday, June 18 at 7:30 p.m. for citizen participation. These funds will be drawn from C.D.B.G. grant from H.U.D.

Stormy Kimrey with SK Engineering of San Angelo was present to present 4 proposals to the Council in regard to mapping for the Council's review and selection.

Johnny Mayo, Jr., County Commissioner of Precinct 1 was present to explain that he will be completing approximately 4.5 miles of paving on rural county roads and asked permission to pave approximately 1/2 mile in the area of the County Park, Golfcourse and Airport. Edwin Jackson, Jr. made the motion and it was seconded by John Nikolauk that permission be granted. The motion was carried.

Rita Reeves and George Spinks reported on Eagles Point and presented their proposed budget for the upcoming year. They requested consideration and approval of their request for approximately \$6,834.00, the city's portion of the proposed budget, when the City prepares their new budget.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Bills were reviewed and paid.

There was further discussion concerning the mapping proposals from SK Engineering. The Secretary was asked to keep the proposals in mind when drafting the new budget and also to make further investigations into the costs involved.

An Amendment to the Utility Ordinance was read to the Council which requires steel riser on the customer side and is a requirement of the Railroad Commission. A Motion was made and passed that this Amendment be passed.

The Secretary reported problems with customers not following dumpster guidelines. Some of these guidelines include not putting dead animals and loose food in the dumpsters. Please bag all food or debris that will develop odors. Dead

animals should be disposed of by the customer at the landfill. Call the City Hall to pick up dead animals in alleys or streets. Trash left outside the dumpster will not be picked up. Limbs under 3 feet may be placed in the dumpster; however, bulky or large items are the responsibility of the customer to haul to the landfill. Do not at any time move your dumpster. If its location is not convenient, call the City Hall and someone will check the situation. Dumpsters moved by customers to where the City truck cannot pick them up will be left until the situation is remedied by the customer.

The annual report from the Eldorado Housing Authority was

circulated among the Council members for their review.

A financial report for nine months was reviewed along with a report for water well expenses and sales figures was explained. Requests for inclusion in the upcoming budget were discussed.

Superintendent Long reported on the status of outside work and requested that the Council consider purchasing a 6 yd. cement mixer for use on West Street drainage repair as well as other upcoming projects. A motion was made and seconded to pursue the purchase. The motion carried.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned.

## County Rejects Car Bid

The County Commissioners Court met Monday, June 10th. The minutes were read and all the bills were paid.

Bids were also opened concerning the new Sheriff's car. Fifteen bids were sent out. Jim Bass Ford was the only one to respond to this bid. Ross Whitten rejected and Johnny Mayo seconded it. This matter will be looked into at a later

date.

The Commissioners Court accepted bids on fuel for the County. Halbert got the bid on regular and unleaded gas. Griffin Oil got the diesel bid. Halbert Oil got the 30 series 3 oil. Griffin Oil also got the Hyd. oil, oil grease and the bid on propane. All low bids were accepted.

The Eagle's Point Board went before the Commissioners Court in regards to being on the 1986 budget.

The budget will not be discussed until August.

The J.P., Clerk and Sheriff reports were reviewed and recorded.

The Commissioners also discussed the boiler, and it was decided to buy a new one at the cost of \$4,800.

There was no other business to discuss so the Court was adjourned until the next session set for July seventh.

## Cotton Insurances

June 10 is the final planting date for insured cotton in Schleicher County, Texas, according to Dottie Sampley, District Representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured cotton planted by June 10 must be reported by June 30 in order to receive full crop insurance coverage. The acreage report reflects the actual acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

In order to provide some flexibility on planting dates, a late planting option may be exercised by farmers who find themselves unable to plant their crops on time due to adverse weather. The late planting option provides insurance coverage for the late planted crop, but at a lower

guarantee.

For insured farmers, "Entering into the late planting option is not automatic," Sampley said. "Farmers wishing to use the late planting option must sign an agreement prior to the final planting date in order to have coverage under the late planting option."

"Increasingly, our insured producers are discovering that with yield guarantees which reflect production capability, crop insurance establishes a farm income floor. Thus, cash flow and the ability to repay a loan can be more accurately projected," explained Sampley.

Farmers wishing to discuss local conditions that may affect planting should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.

## Bucks From Bob

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$58.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Irion County received a payment of \$3,563.21 for this period. This brings their 1985 payments to date to \$33,727.54, which is an increase of 23.46% over last year's total to date of \$27,317.97.

Menard's check for this period was \$2,352.03. They are showing a 10.59% decrease in total payments to date of \$18,869.90 compared to last years of \$21,105.32.

Schleicher County shows a slight 2.75% increase over last year in total payments. They received a check for

\$3,317.65 for this period. Their total payments to date are \$27,924.17 compared to last years of \$27,176.33.

Sutton County's check for this period was \$8,559.45. They show a 14.54% increase in total payments to date of \$124,229.82, last year's was \$108,460.57.

Tom Green County received a check for \$311,520.13 for this period. This brings their total payments to date to \$2,638,177.87. This is a 6.57% increase over last years total payments of \$1,475,474.33.

June checks represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

# Mias Amigas Gathering Nears

Past school days in Eldorado will be recalled Friday and Saturday, June 28 and 29 at the annual Mias Amigas reunion. Members of this organization are persons who were students and teachers of the Eldorado schools between 1907 and through the graduating class of 1964-65.

Subjects studied by the 1907 graduating class were writing, spelling, arithmetic, grammar, general history, physics, literature, Latin and composition.

The first building used as a school in Eldorado was owned by

W.B. Sillman, and he was paid \$12.00 per month for rent. The second building was built in 1901 and was located on the present school grounds. The third school building was a two-story red brick built in 1909.

The first Homecoming began on July 3, 1931 and was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C.C. Doty. The club was named Mias Amigas which means My Friends.

Mrs. Josephine Murchison Hill was elected president with Mrs. Ida Conner Neill being named secretary treasurer.

The Mias Amigas Club was organized so that those who attended school in Eldorado could keep that schoolday friendship and preserve through the crowding years the love and sentiment of our school days.

Eighteen members of Mias Amigas Club met June 25, 1932 for the second annual get-together in the J.A. Whitten home. Following the registration Thursday morning a "hub-bub" of conversation was held with talk ranging from politics to prohibition to the rearing of child-

ren. There were twenty-three members in the club.

Mr. J.B. Smith, Superintendent of Eldorado High School was the special guest for the Thursday, June 24, 1937 meeting of the Mias Amigas Club's annual get-together. The program that night was directed by "Professor Smith."

The old school bell that used to call the students to school was set in place on the courthouse lawn at the 1940 annual Mias Amigas get-together.

Special events of the 1948 Mias Amigas get-together was the getting together for the first time of all four members of the first graduating class of Eldorado High School in 1907. Those members were Dr. Clifford T. Womack, Mrs. J.A. (Pearl Bailey) Nixon, Mrs. P.L. (Minnie Strother) Gilbert, and Alvis M. Beavers. Lula Mae Womack, a class member who did not graduate that year, was also present. J.B. Smith, who came here in 1905 as the first school superintendent was also present.

Topics of conversation ranged from the rain at Sonora and Del Rio to "You remember when." Popular songs in 1948 were "Red Wing" and "Juanita."

On June 28, 1952, teachers and students came from all around. Classmates of the years between 1907 and 1919. The "kids" many of them grandmothers and granddads, celebrate June-with-a-no-school now just as they did 40 summers ago.

The 1907 graduating class and the first grade of the same year were represented. Now they call themselves "Mias Amigas" because in 1931 four former campus belles decided to keep school days more than just a memory.

On September 13, 1952, J.B. Smith, 82, formerly superintendent of schools at Ozona, Brady, Eldorado, and Christoval, died at his home.

The school job at Christoval paid \$75 per month and Mr. Smith kept books for the W.S. Crawford Grocery at that time, getting \$8 per month in addition. This was taken out in trade.

Mr. Smith became superintendent at Eldorado in 1905.
