

PAVE PAWS gets underway

The height of patriotism was displayed early Tuesday morning as approximately 450 people began arriving at the site of the ground breaking ceremonies for PAVE PAWS Southwest. Patriotic music was being played and streamers of red, white and blue were used to surround the seating area.

A platform had been erected on the large hill overlooking Hwy. 277 just 8 miles north of Eldorado for visiting military upper echelon, law makers and local dignitaries. Fifty flags representing the history of America were flown on the right side of the platform. The sides of the platform were covered with red, white and blue, which helped to create a patriotic atmosphere.

Invocation was given by Rev. Ron Sutto, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Eldorado. Ruffles and Flourishes followed where flags were brought in by the Air Force Color Guard. The National Anthem was played while people stood at attention.

Introductory remarks were made by Captain Haskell, who introduced Col. Chalmers R. "Hap" Carr, Wing Commander, 3480th Technical Training Wing, Goodfellow Air Force Base. He introduced platform guests, Eldorado City Council, Schleicher County Commissioners, San Angelo City Commissioners, Mayor of San Angelo, Tom Parrett, Col. Charles Powell and his wife, former Congressman O. C. Fisher, Eldorado Mayor Bob Lester and Jess Blaylock and his wife.

Colonel Carr was very complimentary in thanking the fine folks of Eldorado, Schleicher County, San Angelo, Tom Green County, Goodfellow AFB and West Texas. He stated that this day marked a new chapter in Goodfellow and West Texas. He also stated that just four years ago Goodfellow was a candidate for closure and is now in the forefront of national defense and host for a \$120 million radar tracking station. He stated that support of the community, the dedication to the flag and a strong sense of patriotism is what makes West Texas a great place to live.

Col. Carr then introduced Senator John Tower, who was the first speaker. In his opening remarks Senator Tower said it was an honor to be there on this auspicious occasion and that by the people's presence they have shown their dedication to the defense of the United States of America. Tower went on to state, "Today we take a significant step in the modernization of our strategic capability, without which none of our other systems can adequately function. Let it never be said that the U.S. cannot adequately defend itself. I cannot tell you how important this project is and how vital it is to your own security."

Tom Loeffler, U. S. Congressman of the 21st Congressional District was the next speaker. He thanked John Tower for what he had done the last 23 years and that he would be missed. He also stated, "This is a unique and very pleasant occasion in showing how people can work together, people who care about our national security. We have long awaited the day when groundbreaking would occur at this spot." He concluded by thanking all of the people for helping to make America a safer place in which to live.

Robert T. Herres, Commander in Chief of North American Aerospace Defense Command, the newest space center located in Colorado Springs, Colorado, was next to be introduced to the crowd. He stated that he had watched or been involved in the nurturing of this PAVE PAWS program from its earliest days of development through about a third of his career. He was particularly proud to be in attendance at the ceremony for this was the first opportunity he had had to attend a groundbreaking of one of these sites. He stated that because of the "foresight and support of men like Senator John Tower and Tom Loeffler, this fourth site of PAVE PAWS in the continental U.S. is about to begin. Rising above these ranch lands here in West Texas, a super structure which is a manifestation of technical capability, ingenuity and resourcefulness, it is going to be a technological marvel."

Brig. Gen. James E. Freytag, Deputy Commander for Strategic Systems said, "We believe you will find PAVE PAWS to be a good neighbor."

R.G. Shelley, Senior Vice President of Raytheon Equipment Division, is supervisor of the building of the installation and he explained that the tracking system "has a long range of vision - 240 degrees filling an area of about 3,000 miles - over waters of South and Central American and to Hawaii. It will be a 10 story, 57,000 sq. ft. triangular shaped building and will employ 240 military and civilian personnel."

Before Col. Carr introduced the Honorable Johnny Griffin, he stated, "Judge Griffin has made the Air Force welcome in this area and made us feel that we are a part of this community."

The Schleicher County Judge was then introduced and told why he was sitting on the platform with all the dignitaries, because as Col. Carr said, "We are in his county." Griffin stated, "These ol' rocks may not be pretty to you guys in North Carolina, but this is home and we want to protect it."

Twelve shovels and hard hats were presented to the dignitaries to shovel the first dirt to begin the construction of PAVE PAWS.

The crowd then adjourned to the courthouse lawn to enjoy a delicious barbecue lunch, prepared by Orland Harris and his family. Approximately 1250 persons attended the lunch where they were entertained by Eldorado's Sherry Belk and Leroy Marsden, of San Angelo. The Eldorado Town Band entertained after the meal.

Senator Tower spoke briefly to the crowd and again reiterated the patriotism and pride shown by West Texans concerning the PAVE PAWS installation.

Congressman Tom Loeffler then took to podium and gave an emotional speech on how Senator Tower, his mentor and boss, had helped and guided him through the years to "make Tom Loeffler what he is today." And expressed his hopes as seeing Tower being named as new Secretary of Defense.

The crowd then enjoyed the next hour or so visiting with each other and the visiting dignitaries and military personnel, before everyone went their separate ways.

Big turnout expected for elections

Next Tuesday it will finally be over, we will see some new faces in state, local and national offices and some familiar ones will be back for another term. Area voters will be going to the polls to elect the President, U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative and on the local level they will decide a hotly contested race between Jack Turner, write-in incumbent and Johnny Mayo, Jr. for the job of County Commissioner of Precinct #1. In Precinct #3, Prissy Paxton is running unopposed.

In other area races, Sheriff Orval Edmiston is running for another term as Sheriff and Dorothy Evans is seeking another term as County Tax-Assessor Collector. The seat of County Attorney, left vacant by the resignation of T.P. Robinson, will be filled by appointment since no one filed for the seat.

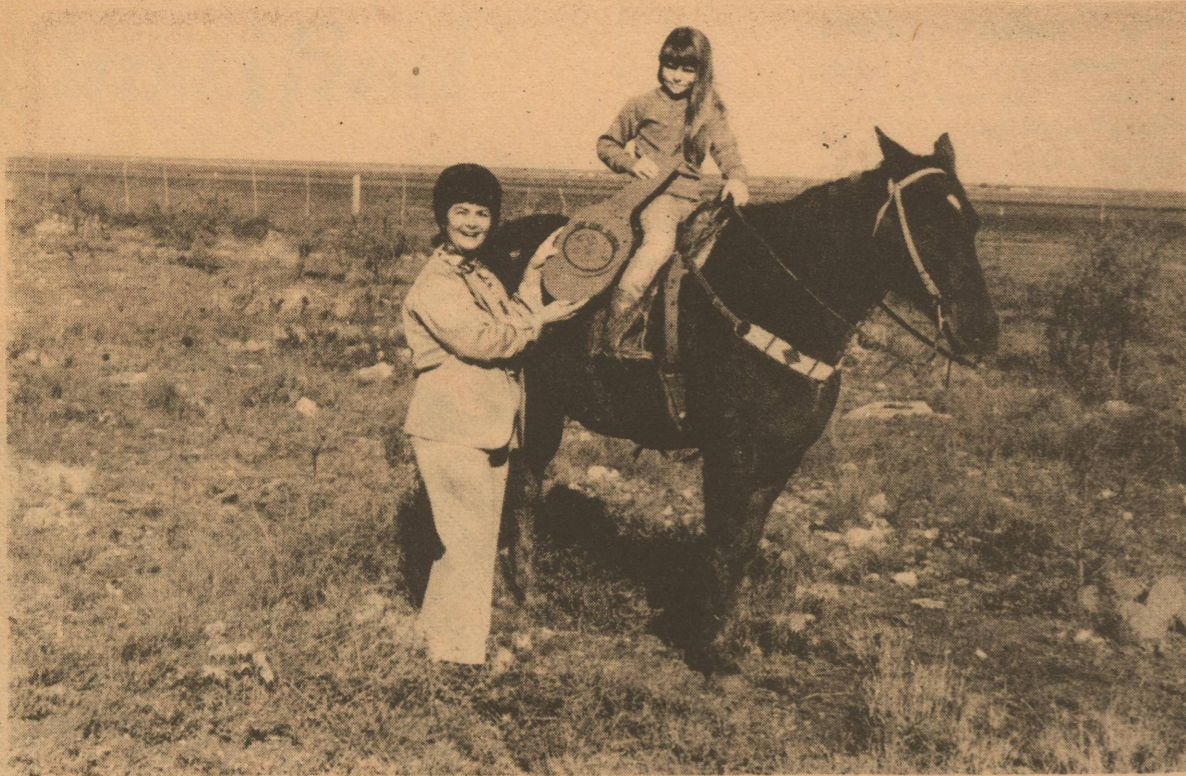

Methodist Church to feature Pony Express "Run" Sunday

A second "run" of the Pony Express will get under way this Sunday, Nov. 4, at the First United Methodist Church in Eldorado with a "trail boss" breakfast and worship service.

An estimated 20 church members acting as trail bosses and station agents are expected for the breakfast briefing.

The Rev. Fred H. Brown, pastor, said church families on the Pony Express "run" will again relay stewardship saddlebags to gather "estimate of giving" cards.

Saddlebags and run route lists

will be handed out at the breakfast by Jim Martin, general manager of the stewardship campaign.

The relay of saddlebags among church members will begin immediately after the morning worship service, he said.

Each saddlebag bears the names of 6 to 10 church families. Each family fills in a giving estimate card, seals it in an envelope and inserts it in the saddlebag pouch and then hand-carries the saddlebag to another of the families on the route. Children and youth will also have saddlebags.

"We're excited because of the enthusiastic reception the Pony Express received at our church last year," he said.

Senior Citizens to have party

All Senior Citizens are invited to a "Halloween Party" on Thursday, Nov. 1st at 2:00 pm in the Memorial Building.

Come in costume if you like. Games and entertainment will be provided. This party is being given by the Extension Homemakers Clubs in Schleicher Co.

"It's good, healthy competition for the Lord's work," he said.

He said the teamwork is similar to that of the Pony Express riders of a century ago, knowing they can count on the next rider to relay the mail to its next destination. Each trail boss is responsible for supervision of the relaying of one saddlebag to the 6 to 10 families.

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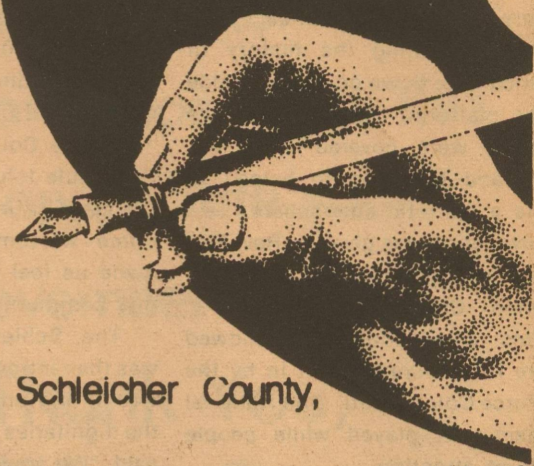

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Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I am writing this letter as neither Democrat or Republican - I've never voted a straight ticket. I'm writing as a concerned American - concerned about our leadership - concerned about inflation, interest rates, taxes, unemployment, crime, and national security.

I'm concerned when I hear things like "The Democrats are for the working class and the poor, while the Republicans favor the rich and the corporations". Also, "Soak the rich and tax the corporations". This sounds good, but even the most liberal Democrat knows corporations aren't really taxed. They merely pass those taxes on to the consumer - you and me - in the form of higher prices. Tax the rich and make their investments in businesses and factories a poor risk and they'll close up these businesses and factories creating unemployment. Who suffers? You guessed it - the poor working stiff.

Most West Texans realize this and vote conservatively, regardless of party affiliation. They know that taxes applied at the top eventually trickle down to those who can least afford to pay. These are the people the liberals say they're trying to protect. That kind of protection I don't need. I've heard that Reagan is anti social security, when he was elected the social security system was just about bankrupt. He approved a joint commission which not only rescued social security for present recipients, it insured those benefits will be there for future generations.

We're all concerned about crime and punishment. Our liberal judiciary has so deteriorated that the criminals have more rights than the victims. President Reagan has strengthened the code of law against federal crimes. Now we need to toughen our state and local laws to insure that crime does not pay.

Taxes are a genuine concern. Mondale said he'll increase them. President Reagan said he won't, and in fact has reduced personal income tax by 23%. A Democrat controlled Congress prevented him from reducing it further.

Interest rates were 21.5% at the prime rate when Reagan took over from Carter-Mondale. The prime rate is now down to 12 1/4% and dropping.

Inflation, which hovered at 12.8% in 1980 is now at 4.2%. This amounts to a 9.1% increase in real income since President Reagan took office.

Unemployment is lower now than when Carter-Mondale were in office.

Teenagers comprise the bulk of the unemployed - 19.3%. If Congress would approve a Reagan-proposed sub minimum wage for teenagers, more of them would be working now.

Defense, which suffered its worst setback since the end of World War II under the Carter-Mon-

dale administration has made a comeback under Reagan-Bush. Yes, we're spending a lot of money on defense and we still have a long way to go to assure adequate security. Systems which should have been funded during Carter-Mondale are now costing us a lot more. The Russians are our #1 adversary and they respect nothing but strength. Anyone who doesn't believe they'll attack if they think they can win is being naive. Reagan has turned our defense establishment around, providing our armed forces with personnel, modern equipment and an expanded research and development effort to maintain the edge needed to deter any aggressor.

Many of us pride ourselves in voting for the person and the issues, rather than along strict party lines.

As I look at what the candidates stand for and their records, my choices are clear:

MONDALE-FERRARO - For raising taxes, giveaway programs and weak on defense.

REAGAN-BUSH - For strong defense, lower taxes, lower interest rates, lower inflation, strong economy.

LOEFFLER - Strong on defense, for conservative fiscal policies, strongly opposed to windfall profit taxes on oil, for deregulation of gas, wants Tip O'Neill and company to pay at least the same for Texas gas as we do. Prime mover in saving Goodfellow and locating PAVE PAWS in Schleicher County. Always available and receptive to West Texans. Has a fine reputation in Washington for getting things done.

DOGGETT - Easy on crime. Supports gays, soft on defense, promises minorities anything to get their vote. (He'll be surprised, they're smarter than he thinks). Strongly supported by Kennedy, O'Neill and the Eastern liberal establishment.

GRAMM - Fired by Tip O'Neill for doing what his constituents in Texas wanted. Supported Reagan's successful economic program. For strong defense, fiscal responsibility and anti crime. Represents Texas views in Washington not intimidated by Washington politics.

Also, it will create a new dedicated fund for all colleges outside the UT and Texas A&M Systems.



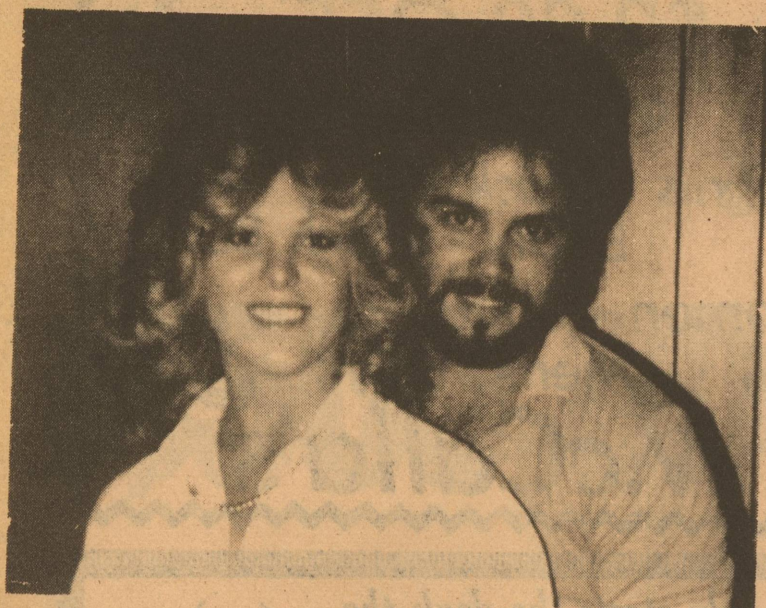

FLBA interest rates going up

The Federal Land Bank of Texas' variable interest rate will increase from 11.00 percent to 11.50 percent on Farm loans and from 11.50 percent to 12.00 percent on Rural Residence and Farm Related Business loans, effective November 1, 1984, said Michael W. Smith, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora.

The increase comes as an effort to narrow the widening gap between what the Land Bank pays for money on the financial market and what it charges borrowers under the variable interest rate plan. Over the last three years, the bank's average cost of funds outstanding has been in the 12 percent range, exceeding the loan

rate to borrowers.

At the bank's annual stockholders meeting in March, directors from the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora joined other association directors and voted to forego compensation for their local association in 1984, enabling the bank to postpone an interest rate increase at that time.

"It is imperative that the bank continue to post adequate earnings to ensure that our bonds can be sold in the financial markets at the lowest possible costs, which results in lower interest rate loans for our borrowers," said James A. Rogers, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas.
