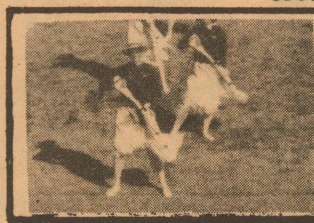

Memorial Day Plans

Memorial Day services to honor the ones who gave their lives during World War I, World War II, Korean War and Viet Nam will be held Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. in Eldorado Cemetery.

The idea of a memorial day is not new. It can be traced back thousands of years to the ancient Greeks who lauded the dead who had given their lives in defense of their country.

More than a hundred years ago, President Lincoln paid this nations most perfect tribute to America's war dead when he said at Gettysburg "in a larger sense, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add or to detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we do here; but can never forget what they did here."

These were but an echo of the words of Pericles, the Athenian statesman who said of the Athenian dead, "So they gave their bodies to the Commonwealth and received each for his own memory, praise that will never die, and with it the greatest of all sepulchres, not that in which their mortal bones are laid, but a home in the minds of men."

Our American National Cemetery sites, both foreign and domestic, have been chosen because of their historical locations. For example, the Normandy American Cemetery is located on top of a cliff overlooking famous Omaha Beach, which was the scene of the greatest amphibious troop landing in history. The official name, "Normandy," derived from the name of the province in which the cemetery is located.

The American Battle Monuments

Commission is responsible to the people of the United States for the construction and permanent maintenance of military cemeteries on foreign soil.

Each of these hallowed places are beautifully landscaped with gardens and well kept lawns. Every grave has either a cross or Star of David, according to the hero's religion. Those dead, who gave their lives in our country's service, came from every state in the Union and the District of Columbia. A few of them came from England, Scotland and Canada.

Many Medal of Honor recipients rest in foreign cemeteries. However, we must come to our own Arlington National Cemetery for the greatest number in any one place. Since the inception of Arlington, much water has flowed down the Potomac to the sea; many have died in defense of our commitments and ideals.

Today, 275 individuals who performed actions above and beyond the call of duty, rest in peace along the Potomac.

City Gives \$2,000.00 to Jaws of Life

A Regular Meeting of the Eldorado City Council was held Thursday, May 16, 1985, at 7:30 p.m. with all Councilmen in attendance with the exception of John Nikolauk. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Lester.

Bill Radle, Sidney Reynolds and Richard Harris, representing the Fire Department, presented Jaws of Life proposal, requesting the Council contribute \$2,800 to the fund. Questions were answered regarding storage of the Jaws, in-house training, and transportation of the unit. Total cost of the unit is \$7,850 with approximately \$2500 contribut-

ed from various organizations and individuals. Also, the Fireman requested funds from the Council in the amount of \$750 to assist in sending three firemen to A&M's fire training school July 21-26. As part of the 1985-86 budget the Firemen asked consideration to their request for 300 foot each of 1 1/4 inch and 2 1/4 inch hose (650 foot joints each) for the City truck, as well as repair of the City truck siren (\$300) and 2-3 additional pagers (\$300 each). The Eldorado Fire Department is hosting the Firemen's Convention October 5. After the Firemen were excused and discussion was held on status of

available funds, motion was made by Richard Preston and seconded by Richard Mendez that the City contribute \$2000 from Revenue Sharing funds to the Jaws of Life fund. Motion carried. Motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. and seconded by Richard Mendez that the City allocate \$750 to the firemen for the A&M school. Motion carried. With remaining budgeted Fire Department funds, the motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. and seconded by Bobbie Sanders that the siren box for the truck be replaced and that one pager (\$300) be purchased. Motion carried.

Mayor Lester appointed Edwin Jackson, Jr. Mayor Pro-Tem in his absence.

The Secretary and Superintendent brought the Council up to date on the C.D.B.G. and sewer plant projects. From Anglin and Freese & Nichols estimates of the clay used on the sewer plant job (27,500 yds. and 28,000 yds., respectively), Mr. Long requested the Council authorize funds for final payment on the clay at 28,000 yds. total. Motion was made by Bobbie Sanders and seconded by Richard Preston that Mr. Christian be paid for the 3000 yds. over initial estimate and that he be sent a bill for work done by City crew to enlarge and move irrigation pumphouse. Motion carried.

Mr. Long requested premission to hire two school boys to work for the summer at \$4.00 per hour. Motion was made by Richard Mendez and seconded by Bobbie Sanders. Motion Carried.

School Bond Approved

Schleicher County voters Saturday approved issuing \$2.2 million in bonds supported by a 15 cent tax increase for a new school building and renovations in the older buildings.

The residents approved the bonds 145-73 which was a very light vote according to the number of registered voters.

The money will build a new 14 classroom middle school to house

At 10 am the group will meet in general assembly. Special recognition will be given the Class of

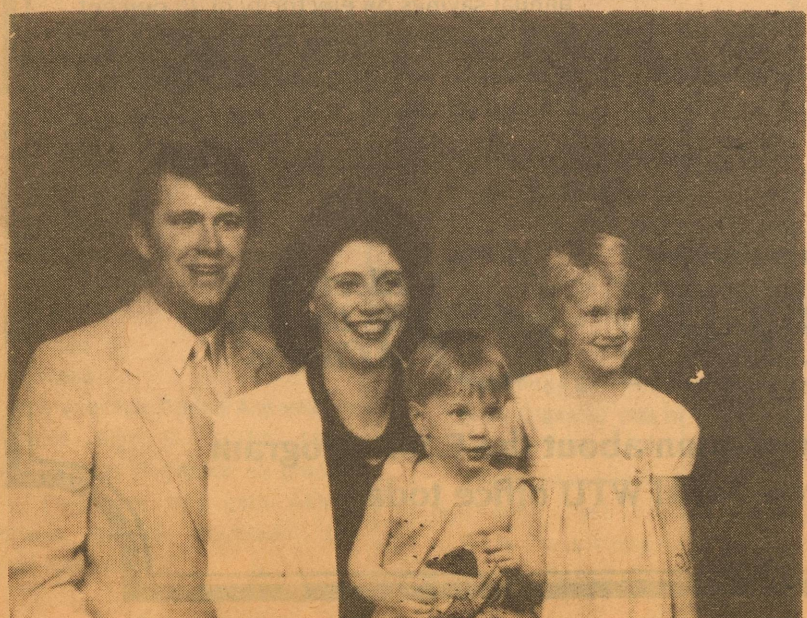
1934-1935 on their 50 graduation anniversary and to the class of 1964-65 on their 25th year and upon their eligibility for membership to the club.

First Baptist Gets New Pastor



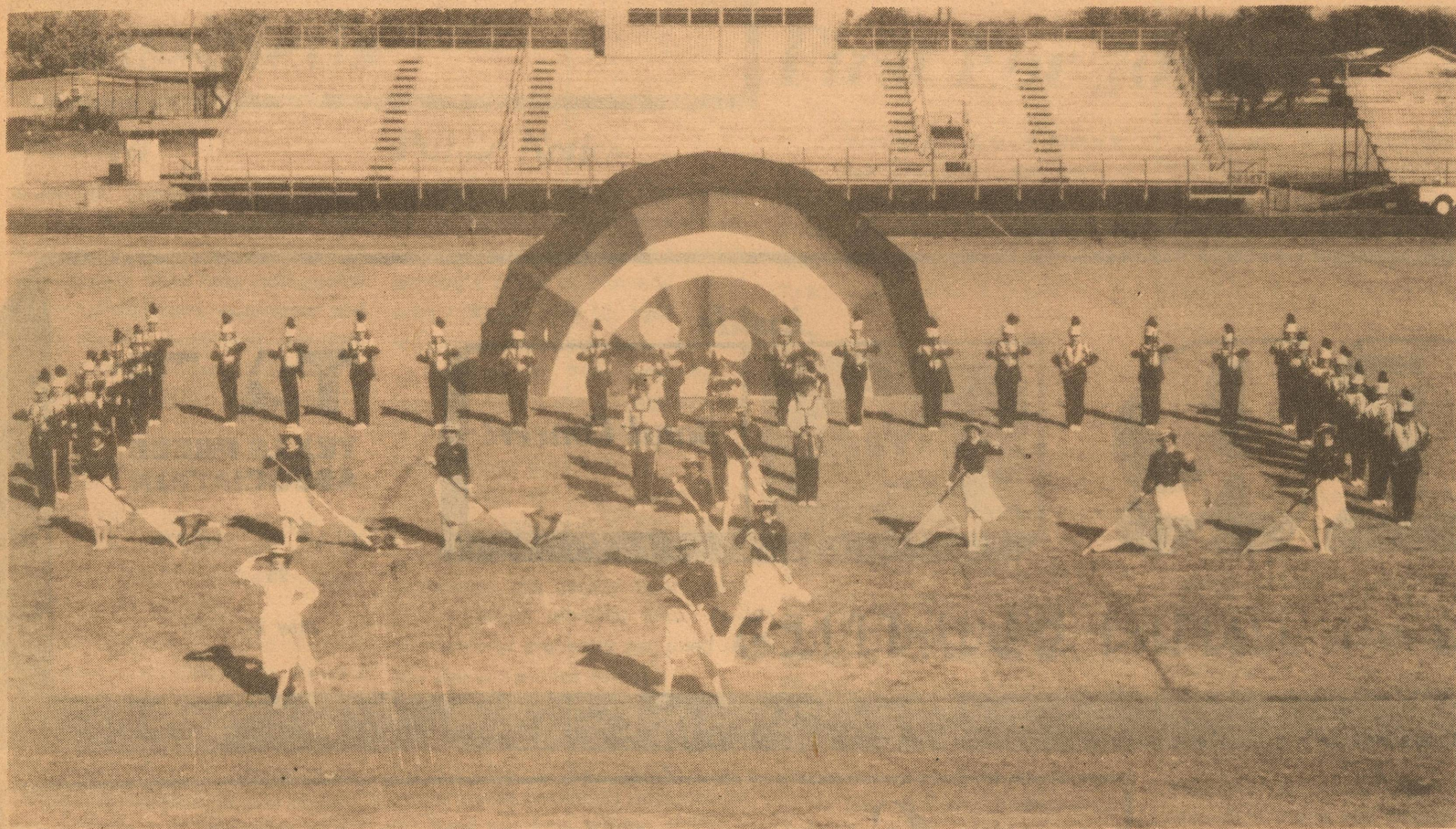

Cotton Outlook

There's both good and bad news regarding the 1985 cotton outlook, but the bad news outweighs the good.

First, the good news.

Recent reports by the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that cotton production last year was actually about 300,000 bales less than first estimated. At the same time, a lot of cotton farmers enrolled in the acreage reduction program this spring, so production should be a million or so bales less than the 13 million produced last year.

Now for the bad news.

This reduction in domestic cotton supplies may have little impact on market prices.

"Foreign production and the strong dollar abroad remain the culprits in our weak cotton market," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

"These two things are challenging the market for U.S. cotton," Anderson says. "China and other exporting countries--Pakistan, Australia and South America--have plenty of cotton to sell. And the strong dollar gives them a favorable price advantage."

Exporting countries can deliver cotton to foreign ports for some 10 to 12 cents a pound less than the same quality of U.S. cotton. "That's what's killing us," emphasizes Anderson. "Advanced export sales for 1985 cotton are lagging behind a year ago by more than 50 percent."

Unless American trade policies supporting cotton are strengthened, cotton exports will continue to fall, contends the economist. As a result, only a poor U.S. crop this year is likely to keep carryover supplies from growing and market prices from being much above the loan rate this fall.

Anderson encourages cotton producers to keep a sharp eye on the market situation in the coming months, to plot prices and to look for pricing opportunities during market rallies. In 1981 and '82, when cotton supplies were plentiful as they are now, December future contracts slipped sharply in August from earlier levels, he notes.

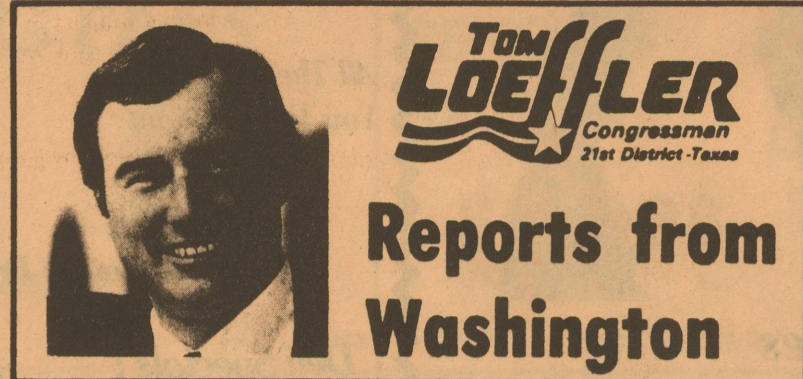

Memorial Day — 1985

Since the end of the Civil War, Memorial Day has been a time of patriotic reflection as we honor the American men and women who gave their lives on the field of battle. We do this in recognition of the ultimate sacrifice they made to preserve our liberty and, also, of the responsibility we bear to transmit liberty to future generations.

Many eloquent and moving speeches have been delivered since the first Memorial Day was observed 117 years ago, but no statement has captured the essence of sacrifice and devotion more succinctly than the Gettysburg Address of President Abraham Lincoln who said "... The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced."

When Lincoln spoke these immortal words, just four months had passed since the greatest battle before or since had taken place on the American continent. At Gettysburg, the armies of the North and South tore at each other with such ferocity that over 51,000 lives were lost.

Lincoln spoke for all of us in reminding us that mere words do not compensate for ultimate sacrifice. But, he asked us to remember, and he asked us to rededicate ourselves to freedom. In short, he pleaded with us never to allow those who paid the supreme sacrifice to have died in vain.

In our Nation's history, over one million, one thousand Americans have died in combat. Most Americans living today have a family member or a friend who was killed in action. From the Revolution to Vietnam, Americans have been willing to put their lives, fortunes and sacred honor on the line to block the path of tyranny. Their lives remind us that freedom always carries with it a high price. It has cost, it imposes a burden, and just as those whom we commemorate were willing to sacrifice, so, too, must we remain steadfast in working to assure that the precious freedoms for which they fought and died are preserved.

Memorial Day is an opportunity to remember that those who died in the defense of our country were serving an even higher cause. For all throughout our history, America has been a beacon to other peoples, serving as a source of political inspiration and as a haven to those escaping tyranny, oppression and hunger.

Today, just as in the past, we stand as a guarantor of peace — ready to work with other nations to help remove sources of conflict and insecurity and to build a firm foundation for the future. We must work to assure that peace by maintaining a strong national defense, by strengthening our alliances, and by actively pursuing every opportunity for fruitful negotiations with potential adversaries.

As we honor the memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice we must reaffirm that their lives and their sacrifices will be forever justified and remembered. Most importantly, we must do our utmost to assure that no other generation will ever have to share their experiences or repeat their sacrifice. Words cannot touch the gift that these fallen American heroes have provided their fellow Americans.

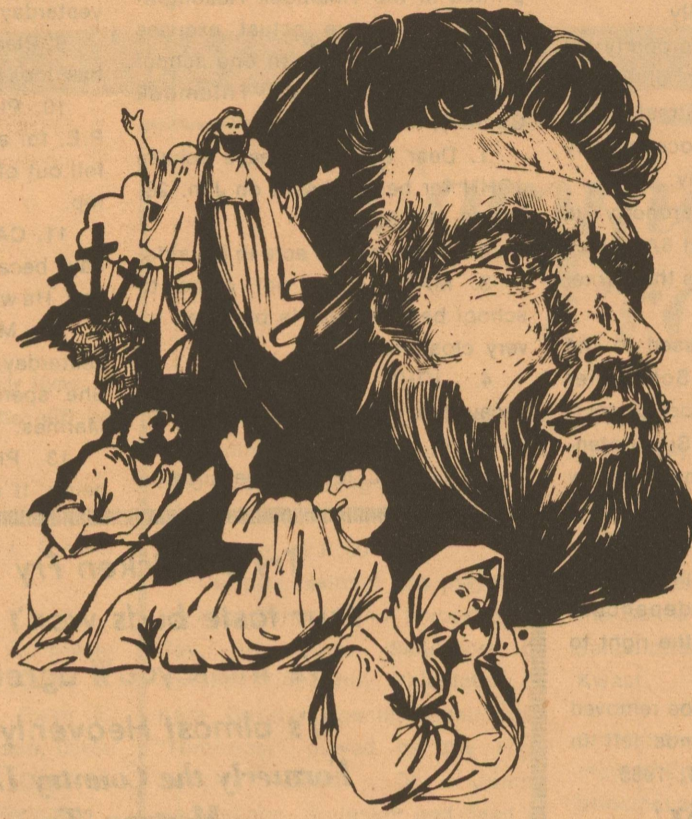

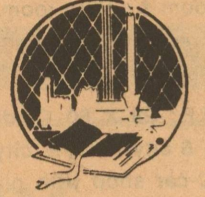

May 23-May 27 is the suggested spray date. You may want to use a follow up spray 7 to 10 days later.
