

One traffic accident right after another

An early morning traffic accident on U.S. 277 involving a single Ford pick-up truck, soon involved two other vehicles last Sunday when a van collided with a Game Warden's pickup while officers and wrecker personnel were attempting to clean up the first mishap.

Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. Game Warden Will Allison of Sonora was headed home early Sunday morning after spending most of the previous day assisting with boating safety and hunting related programs in San Angelo. That's when he came upon a 1999 Ford F-350 pickup that had crashed into the guard rail on the bridge over Finnegan Draw, some 4 miles north of Eldorado. The truck had been traveling north when it struck the guard rail on the east side of the Finnegan Draw bridge. The collision accordioned much of the rail while ripping out the truck's drive shaft and skewing the rear axle and wheels.

Warden Allison radioed for assistance and soon Deputy Kevin Herbert arrived to assist with the accident. The pickup's two occupants, Robert Gonzales and Blanca Valenzuela were taken by EMS ambulance to Schleicher County Medical Center where they were treated and hospitalized. By that time, Deputy David Olivan and Chief Deputy George Arispe had arrived to assist with the investigation and a wrecker was called to the scene.

After reporting the accident, Game Warden Allison activated his emergency lights and parked on the north end of the bridge in order to warn approaching

cars. As the officers continued to work the accident, many vehicles slowed and drove around the wreck. But, as wrecker driver Joe Key was attempting to hook up to Gonzales' Ford pickup, a 1987 Chevy Van, heading southbound, struck Warden Allison's 2001 Chevy pickup.

Allison, who was sitting in his truck said that as the van approached he could tell it wasn't slowing down. Fearing he was about to be hit head-on, Allison jumped from his pickup only seconds before it was struck by the van. Fortunately neither Allison nor the van's two occupants were injured. At that point, DPS trooper Donald Van Zandt was called in to investigate.

The van's driver, Ismael Mora, 55, of Lubbock, was arrested and charged with driving while intoxicated (1st offense), driving without liability insurance, and having an open container of alcohol in his vehicle. Mora was later released on \$1,000 surety bond.

Meanwhile, passenger Rodelfo Enrique Quintero, 31, of Lubbock was arrested and charged with public intoxication and having an open container of alcohol in a vehicle. He was later released on a citation.

Chief Deputy Arispe later explained that the wreck illustrates how dangerous accident scenes can be, not only for the officers who investigate, but also for EMS, Fire Department and wrecker crews who are called to the scenes and are expected to perform their duties on busy and congested roadways.



City considers hiring prosecutor for court

The Eldorado City Council met in regular session Monday night and continued working toward the establishment of a functioning municipal court. City Administrator Randy Mankin explained for the council the requirement that the city have a prosecuting attorney anytime a case goes to trial in municipal court. State ethics rules prohibit lawyers who practice criminal law, as well as any lawyers in their firm, from serving as a prosecuting attorney. That effectively ruled out every attorney in Eldorado, except for Marian Overstreet, who represents Schleicher County.

Mankin advised the council that he had met with Beth Wallace, an attorney from Sonora who serves as the City of Sonora's prosecuting attorney as well as representing the city in civil matters. Mankin suggested the council meet with Ms. Wallace and consider hiring her as prosecuting attorney. The council agreed and asked that Ms. Wallace meet with them at their next meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mayor John Nikolauk with council members Dora Bosmans, Robert Bybee, Richard Mendez and Tommy Minor. Council members Juaquin Rojas and Toni Sudduth joined the meeting in progress.

Rev. Andy Anderson, pastor of First Baptist Church, led the group in prayer as the meeting got underway.

Among other business the council heard updates from Utility Supt. Floyd Fay and City Administrator Randy Man-

kin. Fay advised the council about work that is ongoing in the various city departments, including painting at the city gas plant and repairs being made to the water system. Fay noted that water pressure is up around town due to the installation of an altitude valve on the water tower at City Hall. The valve holds pressure back on the water system, forcing the city's North water tower to fill.

For his part, Mankin updated the council on a request from the hospital's Maintenance Director Steve Minor for paving work and pothole patching in the hospital parking lot. Mankin noted he had declined to do the work since the hospital is a taxing entity and there it doesn't have an interlocal agreement with the city. The council agreed with Mankin's assessment. Mayor Nikolauk noted that an agreement could be worked out but the city would have to receive something in return.

While on the subject of interlocal agreements, the council discussed an agreement with the county. Mankin advised the council at a previous meeting that the Schleicher County Commissioners wanted the agreement to be broad in scope but vague on the details. That didn't' sit well with the city council, however. After discussing the issue at length, Mankin was directed to draw up an agreement whereby the city and the county would continue to exchange services but with a monthly accounting of the total cost to each entity. Council woman Toni Sudduth added that she didn't want the two governmental entities to bill one another for services, "I just want us to know where we stand," she said.

Mankin also advised the group that he is looking into options for replacing the city barn, the aging tin structure that CONTINUED ON PAGE 6

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo then updated the council on the city's financial picture and advised that auditors will be here this week to review the city's books. The city's fiscal year ended Aug. 31. Ms. Mayo also explained that the city's reserves are down to their lowest point since 1998.

Before adjourning the council reviewed and approved the payment of the monthly bills. They also agreed to allow Seidel Construction to close out the paving season under the existing contract. The city will call for bids on paving before work begins in the Spring of 2004.

The next City Council meeting is planned for Oct. 6, 2003.
