The Eldorado High School rodeo team traveled to El Paso this past weekend to attend the first Region II high school rodeo of the spring season, tuning up for Eldorado's High School Rodeo, set here Saturday and Sunday, April 16 and 17.

Performances will start at 2 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. on Sunday. The horse contest starts at 9 a.m. on Sunday.

"We would sure like for everyone to come out and watch these kids," a spokesman said.

'Gold' key to name

"Eldorado" is a Spanish word meaning "Land of Gold". This seems to be the appropriate name W.B. Silliman chose for his new town site in 1895.

Rich black soil, abundant water supply, and level prairie, perfect place to build houses. These were good reasons for the "Land of Gold" to be a place for families to settle in.

The elevation of Eldorado is high and the breezes would blow gently through the houses. Silliman planned the town to enable each house to avoid being directly hit by the wind on the west and north walls.

He did not use a due north and south in laying out the streets. The town was laid off around a 400 square on which the

courthouse is not located.

W.B. Silliman was a native Texan born in Austin County in 1865. He came to West Texas in 1890 after finishing college at Sam Houston State Teachers College. He taught school three years.

On May 15, 1895 an undivided half interest in section 49, on which Eldorado was to be located, was granted Silliman by Warner and Callender who had speculated in 100 sections of land in what is now Schleicher County. The grant was made with the understanding he would survey and lay out a townsite.

On August 9 of that year he deeded his interest in the section to a firm composed of himself, W.L. Gray and M.H. Murchison, which started the town lots and

established the first store.

Silliman offered free lots to the citizens of Verand who promptly moved to Eldorado. There were about 20 families at Verand at that time. The town of Eldorado had its beginning.

Rodeo slated

Eldorado's ever-popular Youth Rodeo will be held May 13 and 14, with several hundred entries expected. The local event is one of the most popular on the youth rodeo circuit among contestants.

The top all-around cowboy and cowgirl will be crowned in each of three divisions, with the winners getting championship buckles.

Girls and boys 12 and under will compete in barrel racing, pole bending, eight and under barrels, break-a-way roping, goat tying, calf riding (10 and under), and steer riding (11 and 12).

Girls and boys, 13-15, will be entered in barrel racing, pole bending, team roping, goat tying, tie-down calf roping, ribbon roping, and boys bull riding and saddle bronc riding.

Youth rodeos are open to any young man or woman who has not reached his or her 20th birthday by the show date.

Spring is not a good time for nostalgia. Even with this later cold spell the trees and other plants have already begun to leaf; the greenness is showing despite the lack of rain. This is a time to think of new things, not old.

There is one new thing this Spring that I feel is worth a mention. There is a black man running for the Democratic Party's nomination for President of the United States. Not only is Jesse Jackson running he is running well.

It amazes me how the press

has treated his success with such disbelief. It is not unlike the way the media treats all contenders they consider underdogs. The television and print media always treat certain underdogs as if they just cannot accomplish what they are trying to do.

Look at the way the commentators treated the Kansas University Basketball team. That team was not even supposed to be on the same court with their Big-8 rival, Oklahoma. Oklahoma was supposed to be that "Killer" team that would, as it had done on two previous occasions, run the Kansas boys into the ground. But, that is not what happened. Several years ago a fellow named Leon Spinks got into the ring with Mohamed Ali, supposedly Spinks had no chance. But he beat the aging champ. Just a few years back a Villanova team was not supposed to beat its rival, Georgetown for the National title, but they did.

What makes these supposed losers win? How is it that in a country where blacks are only about 10 percent of the population a black man can get between 20 percent and 40 percent of the vote in the states where he has entered the Democratic primaries? Are we a nation that has finally passed the color barrier forever? Sadly, I doubt it.

Jesse Jackson is for many voters an opportunity to register their discontent with the present government. He is a chance for all those people who feel disenfranchised to voice their complaint about being left out, not considered, or merely ignored. But Jesse is doing one other thing for all of us in this country; he is giving us the chance to come to grips with what we really feel, especially "non-black" people. (I think that is the first time that expression has ever been in print.)

Most of us can make great boasts about being free of those old prejudices as long as we don't have to face the prospect of some minority person attaining an important position in our government. I am sure all the Republicans feel they are above the fray.

The Democrats, especially the party leadership, are the

people most directly confronted with whether to show their true stripes or do the right thing. Even couched in terms of "he just could not win a National Election" is "racist" intrinsically.

There is no getting around it, if Jesse comes to the convention with the most delegates he should get the nomination. That is the right thing to do. And if the party leaders do the right thing then the party members need to vote for him, because that is the right thing to do. Think about it.

There will be a shotgun start both Saturday and Sunday (8:30 and 1:30). Entry fee is \$80 per team, which includes supper Saturday night.

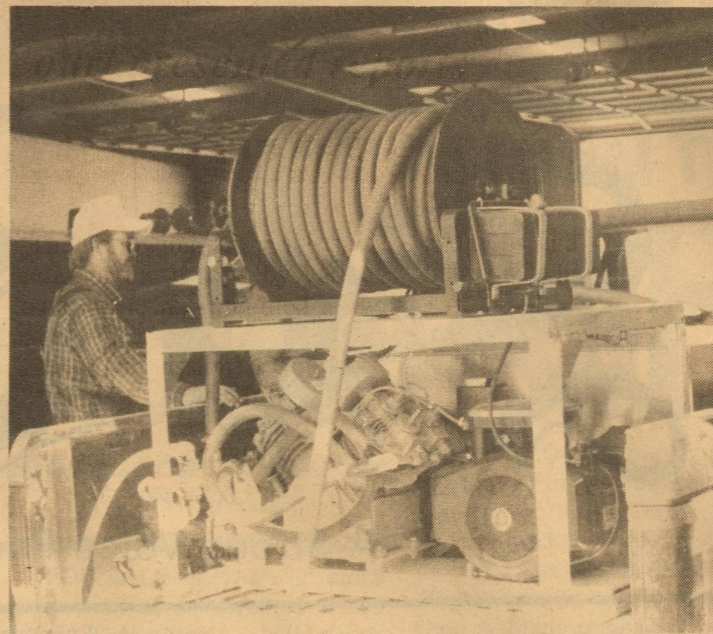

REMOVING ODOR -- There may be nothing more unappetizing than opening the refrigerator and being greeted by the odor of spoiled food, long after the food has been removed. This kind of odor problem can occur if you're away and the refrigerator goes off for several days. Even an empty refrigerator in a rental home, camper or cabin that wasn't thoroughly cleaned before being closed for several weeks may also have a strong odor. Removing the odor may not be easy. Most people know to put an open box or dish of baking soda in the refrigerator to absorb the odor, but that will not be sufficient in all cases. 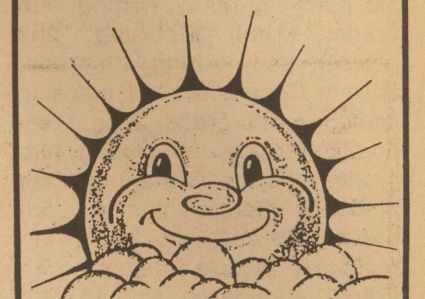

Although consumers have cultivated a taste for all sorts of convenience foods that require additives, they also wonder about the long-term health effects of the chemicals listed on the labels. The man-made chemicals added to foods are closely scrutinized and strictly regulated by the Food and Drug Administration.

ACNE MEDICATIONS -- Common acne medications will do more than clear up blemishes; they'll also remove color from clothes and other textiles. Acne preparations containing benzoyl peroxide will remove color from fabrics, bedspreads, towels, sweaters or carpets. It causes spots and discoloration on all textiles in time, with color change accelerated by moisture and heat. Spot removal and dry cleaning will not remove discoloration from benzoyl peroxide on clothing, although some fabrics can be dyed a darker color to cover it up. Teenagers should know that acne treatments have the potential for permanently spotting their clothes, so they can try to avoid contact between the medication and the fabrics.

Wanda Ruth Green, 56, of Georgetown, formerly of Fort Stockton, died Wednesday, April 6 at her home in Georgetown.

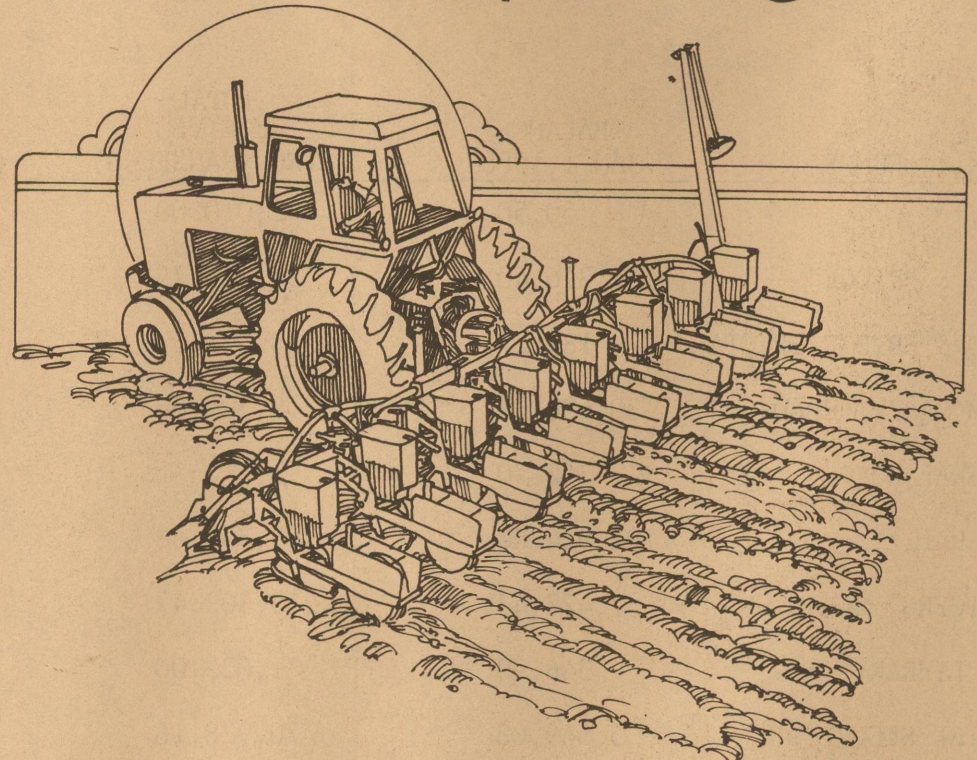
