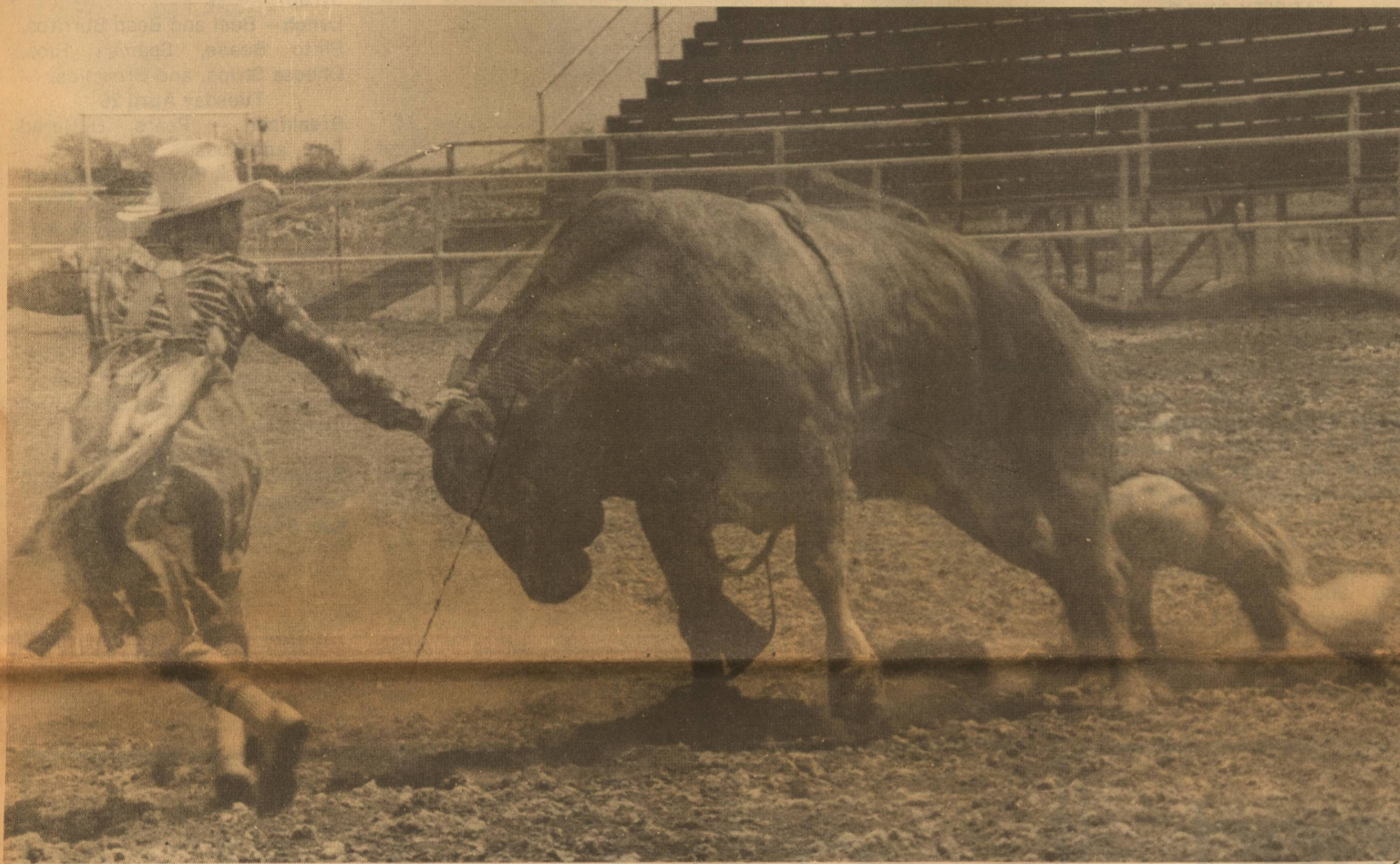

High-Flying Eagles win 6-AA track title

Eldorado High School utilized a first place finish by the sprint relay team and gutsy performances by Jeff Hausenfluck to score 127 points and win the District 6-AA Track Meet, held Friday in Big Lake.

Juan Espinosa, Richard Adame, Kevin Gerald and Cody Lozano did just what they had been doing all year, posting a 43.59 to win first place and set the tone for a successful afternoon for the Eagles.

Hausenfluck won the 800 meters turning in a 2:02.94, then finished second in the 1600

meters before anchoring Eldorado's second place 1600 meter relay team.

Hausenfluck took second behind Sanchez of Ozona in the 1600 meters, clocking a 4:51.68. Rodriguez of Eldorado was third in the 1600 meters, timing a 4:53.53.

The Eagles started the running events with only six points, trailing Ozona by more than 20 markers. David Rodriguez got Eldorado rolling in the first running event taking second in the 3200 meters behind Sanchez of Ozona. Rodriguez had a 10:40.53, and Dusty Barton

added points with a fifth place finish.

After the successful sprint relay and 800 meter races, EHS lit up the scoreboard as Cody Lozano and Kevin Gerald finished first and second in the 100 meters. Lozano had a 11.20 while Gerald had a 11.25.

Richard Adame took fifth and Neal Edmiston sixth in the 400 meters, while Jason Stensby added a fourth in the 300 meter hurdles.

In the 200 meters Lozano and Gerald finished first and second again timing 22.73 and 22.79.

With Ernest Espinosa's third

place points in the pole vault Eldorado clinched the 6-AA title before the mile relay, but still qualified for Regional with a 3:28.92 clocking. Making up the mile relay was Neal Edmiston, Adame, Joe Montalvo and Hausenfluck.

Rankin finished second with 96 points, followed by Ozona with 83, Stanton with 60, Forsan with 48, Iraan with 46, Reagan County with 38 and McCamey with 29.

All first and second place finishers qualified for the Regional Track Meet. Rodriguez in the 3200 meters, Lozano in the

100 meters, Stensby in the 300 meter hurdles, Lozano in the 200 meters, and Hausenfluck in the 1600 meters have all broken school records this year.

Eldorado athletes were propelled to victory by a large contingent of EHS fans, who made the trip to Big Lake.

CALORIES AND FAT--The way the cookie crumbles can give you a clue to the fat content of most "store-bought" cookies. "In general, the soft-style cookies have a higher fat content, because the extra fat is what creates the softer texture," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. She says regular-style ginger snaps, for example, have about 23 percent of their calories from fat and vanilla wafers about 28 percent.

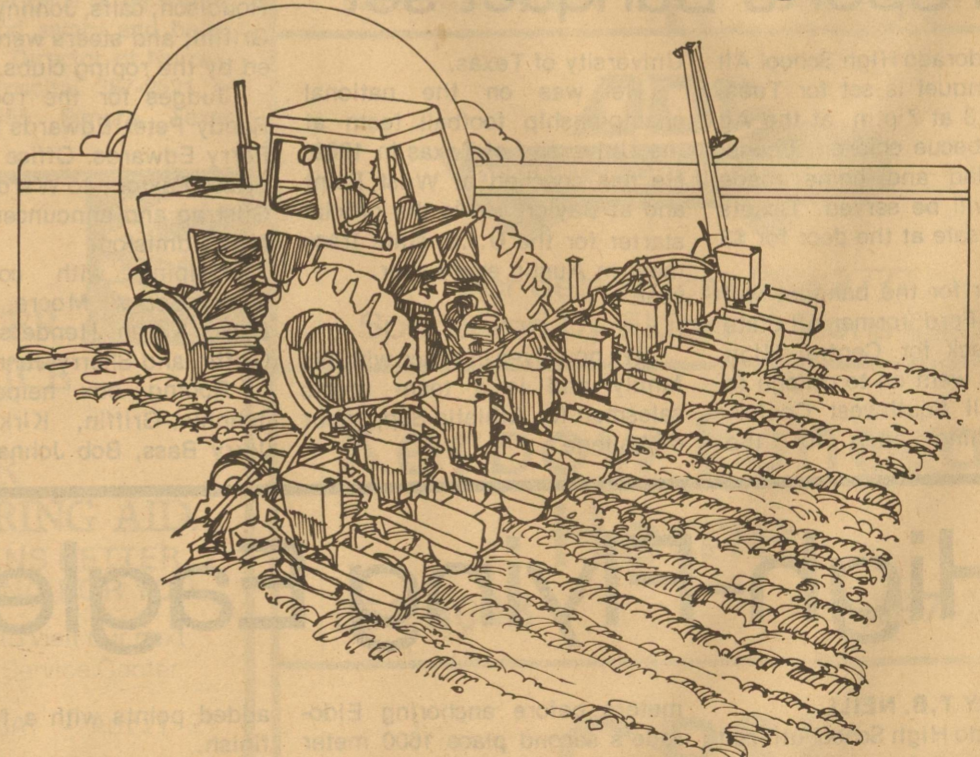

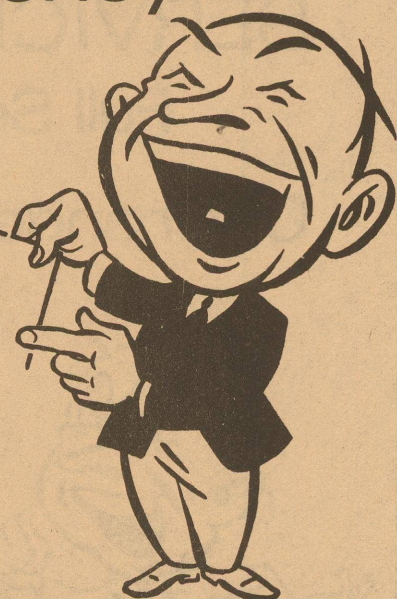

Charlene stressed how far women have come in their habits, work and dress in the last 100 years. She showed a number of pictures of the kind of dresses worn and showed one beaded dress that was worn many years ago and is very fashionable today.

She told of Jane McCallum who not only wanted to be a good wife and mother, she wanted to be a good citizen. She dared to enter the world of politics, which

meant life, health and safety to her. She tired of the ridicule which was shown to women and decided to use her every spare minute to help women win the right to vote in Texas and the nation. She encouraged women to hold lectures, put articles in newspapers and call on members of the Texas Legislature to try to persuade them to let women vote.

The goal was finally reached when, in the early 1920s the 19th amendment formally became a part of the United States Constitution that gave women the right to vote. In 1927 Governor Dan Moody appointed Jane McCallum Secretary of State.

After this achievement women became braver and dared to run for and win political offices in county and state. They also dared to cut their hair and wear shorter dresses. Women still have an important part in

schools, city, churches and even state governments.

Other phases of women's influence is in the field of aviation, women pilots. The first group to ever train in the military efforts were the WASPs--Women's Airforce Service Pilots. Then women entered the space program which is continuing to this day.

There are fields of medicine, law, accounting, engineering, computers and others too numerous to mention that show women are widening their horizons.

At the close of the program a plaque was presented to Terry Neill, editor and publisher of the Eldorado Success for his part in news reporting. The award, which won first place in News Reporting in the District, was presented to the president, Ora Deal, at the District TFWC meeting in Mason.

Dr. T.P. Robinson listened longingly of tales about Schleicher County, Texas from his home in Holbrook, Arizona in 1890. Views of green flowing grass, low rolling hills with a mantle of mesquite spread between the hills in lovely valleys, could be imagined by Dr. Robinson.

He could vision leaving the valleys, mounting the hills and looking across the finest plains on which the eyes of man had ever rested. The soil was deep, black and rich with occasional bunches of live oak spotting the plains. The character of this land could inspire both cattlemen and farmer, even a doctor, looking for a permanent home.

All the stories were not good, there was flash flooding, periods of drought, limited water and dust storms in this new country. There was very little industry, the people lived off the land depending on the weather to have grass and crops.

The country seemed to contain elements of the best and the worst that nature had to offer, but was inhabited by people of humble pride and self confidence

These stories about Schleicher County were told to Dr. Robinson by Mr. C.C. West and Mr. Robert Bailey, who were selling beef to the U.S. government. They were delivering them on hoof to Indian Reservations in Arizona and New Mexico.

Dr. T.P. Robinson was commissioned as an assistant surgeon of the First Infantry Regiment of the volunteer militia of the Territory of New Mexico in 1891. He was not a native of New Mexico. He was born September 15, 1858 in Kentucky. His home was in Iowa where he was educated and received his degree as a doctor from The Doctor of the Art of Medicine. The diploma presented to him in 1879 from the College of Physicians and

Surgeons of the Republic of Iowa was literally a "sheepskin".

Robinson had visited Texas as a child before the Civil War. He returned when he was a young adult. It was in Albany he met and married Kate Ewing.

Two children were born to the Robinsons, Kate (Girle) and T.P. Jr. (Payne). Payne was the father of Thomas Payne Robinson, Jr. who was county attorney for Schleicher County from 1953 until 1984.

It was 1902 when the Robinsons decided to make the move to Schleicher County. That summer Dr. T.P. Robinson recorded his physicians license in the office of the county clerk and began his practice of medicine in Eldorado. That same year the Robinson's built a general merchandise store. It was in continued opera-

tion for the next forty years in Eldorado. Kate Robinson ran the store with the help of her children.

Dr. Robinson died in 1904. His practice in Eldorado was limited but he had been able to find a permanent home for his family and family to come in the new land he had dreamed about.

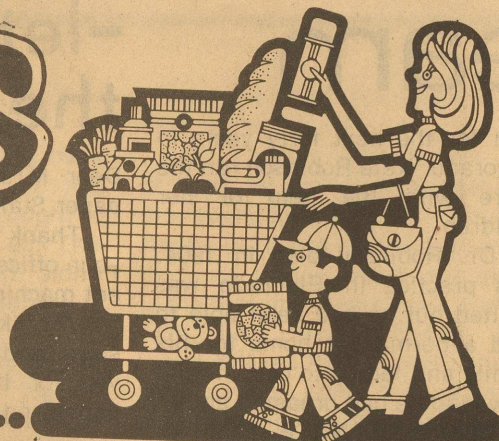
