Schleicher County is expected May 12-13. The first significant nut entry is May 25. These are estimated dates, but they are not off but maybe one to two days.
May $20-23$ are the best dates to spray trees. If possible, two sprayings would be most beneficial with the first spraying around May 15 and the second spraying May 22-23.

Recommended sprays to use are as follows: Malathion 50
percent EC $2-1 / 2$
teaspoons per one gallon of water; Zolone 34.4 percent EC $1-1 / 4$ teaspoon per on gallon of water; Gathion 12 percent EC $1-1 / 3$ Tablespoon per one gallon of water; and Sevin 50

Two children were born to the Robinsons, Kate (Girlie) and T.P. Jr. (Payne). Payne was the father of Thomas Payne Robinson, Jr. who was county attorney
