HOME #1: The Spigarelli's
 (713 Highland Ave.)

Built in 1930 by Shine's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Edmiston, this special home was one of the first built in the Glendale Addition in the North part of Eldorado. Various members of the Edmiston family have lived in the home ever since. It was beyond belief when Shine and Rudy discovered that the home would be available for them when the time came for them to retire. It was just meant to be! Many changes have taken place, but Shine still remembers the home when it was new and the way life was when she was a young girl.

The home underwent extensive remodeling twice in the years since 1930. Eight years ago a large den was added to the back. Decorated in peach and green tones, it is the heart of the home where the family spends most of their time. Appropriately there is a Christmas tree decorated there for them. Beyond the den stands a pecan tree and a fig tree to shade the backyard. These trees were transplanted from the ranch by Shine's grandfather fifty-eight years ago. Both trees still producing fruits and nuts.

Another Christmas tree is featured in Shine's cozy kitchen as well as her special wooden Advent calendar with wooden painted ornaments.

In the children's room, among the toys, is the special dollhouse built by Rudy for the grandchildren. Shine helped and decorated it down to the miniature Christmas tree inside!

In the blue and mauve living area, visitors must see the grandfather clock handmade by Rudy's father and the "Gone with the Wind" dolls which were made and dressed by Rudy's mother. The mantel clock belonged to Shine's grandmother and has remained with the home for the enjoyment of each occupant through the years. The family Christmas tree and decorations are old-fashioned and assorted-with each piece lovingly placed-reminiscent of special times and fond memories of the past.

Shine and Rudy Spigarelli's home was built with love, and

they hope and pray that one of their children or grandchildren will continue to cherish the home, to enjoy and continue its comfort and relaxed life style, and to fill it with more love and laughter.

Home #2: The Sproul's
 (7 miles West on Mertzon Hwy. to the "Y" plus 3 miles SW on the FM 1828)

After experiencing the "fast lane" of city living in Duncan, Oklahoma, C.R. and Jo Ann chose to return to the quiet, slower paced life of the country upon C.R.'s "retirement" in 1981. They actually supervised the building of their home from Duncan, using their Duncan home as a model with a few minor changes for beauty and convenience.

The homesite is special to C.R. and Jo Ann as during their "courtship days" they hunted dove on the ranch near the windmill which was erected by Jo Ann's father 50 years ago. They are now the third generation to live on the ranch.

Nestled among the oak and plum trees, the large ranch style red and black brick home welcomes visitors to stroll down the patterned brick sidewalk to the Mexican tile porch. C.R. created these and planted many shrubs and plants throughout the native mesquite and buffalo grass lawn.

The home faces Southwest in an effort to keep the predominant Southern winds from the patio and pool area during the outdoor entertaining season.

The interior of the home is primarily traditional, containing memorabilia and artwork by family and friends. Their son, Mike, created stained glass, glass etches, pencil and water color drawings, and oil paintings throughout, including a picture of one of the many family pets. Other artwork was added by C.R.'s mother and uncle and Jo Ann's mother and cousin. Jo Ann has created many of the Christmas decorations throughout the home, including the unusual 8" nativity figures displayed in the entry. Both C.R.'s and Jo Ann's mothers' china is lovingly displayed within the formal dining room. Jan Fuessel created the kitchen tile and local artist, Vidette Sallee, painted the designed door off the master bedroom.

Jo Ann took an active part in decorating the home herself, and she and C.R. personalized the home with skylites and special ceiling treatments throughout the home, particularly the "pullman" ceiling in the living room, "box out" treatments in the dining area, and the "drop fir door" in the hallway. Eldorado's Eagles continued to play well this week, taking consolation honors in the Sonora Basketball Tournament and defeating Iraan Tuesday night.

The varsity boys opened the Sonora tournament with a tight, double-overtime win over Ozona, 73-69. Ozona led, 18-17, after one period, but the game was deadlocked at 30 when the first half curtain descended.

Eldorado won the third stanza, 16-13, but Ozona tied the game up, causing the overtime periods.

Jeff Patton paced EHS scoring with 28 points, while Carter Edmiston added 11 and Whitten added 10. Barton scored nine, Kotsch eight, Martinez four, Nolan two and Fuentes one point to round out the scoring.

In the second round of the

tourney the Eagles ran into one of the more powerful Class AAA squads in West Texas, losing to Ballinger, 46 to 29.

Eldorado jumped out to an early, 12-7, first period lead but the Bearcats took the next three periods by convincing margins to set up the victory.

Bush no-tax pledge deserves honest effort

"Read my lips: NO new taxes."

That was George Bush's promise at the Republican National Convention.

Three months later it appears the electorate was listening. The president-elect was virtually handed a mandate on those very words.

But, as we approach the 101st Congress, many here in Washington are crying foul. Many in the liberal leadership are asserting that the only way out of the current "budget crisis" is to impose a generous tax increase.

Well, I have read George Bush's lips and I have read the liberal leadership's lips as well. My conclusion? The argument that a tax increase is unavoidable is a hoax.

I use the word "hoax" purposely, because it is generally defined as a trick or a prank played on an unsuspecting party. This particular hoax may turn out to be at the expense of the taxpayers.

To start, let's look at some numbers. The most recent deficit estimates show the government between \$132 billion and \$160 billion in debt. Since the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings law requires Congress to reduce the federal deficit to \$100 billion by next fall, that means we have to come up with at least \$32 billion in savings or taxes.

So the choice is simple: Either we can cut federal spending or we can raise taxes.

Under President Reagan, federal revenue has actually been growing. So now it is up to Congress to do its part by ending its spending spree.

Congress' record during the Reagan era has been abominable with spending having increased \$473 billion. It is only fair and honorable for us to look at our own accounts before we ask the American taxpayers to bail out such a free-spending body. President-elect Bush has a plan called the "flexible freeze," designed to gradually stop the government from spending so much and to balance the budget by 1994.

With the flexible freeze, the House and Senate will be forced to face fiscal facts and do their part to address head-on a financial problem we have helped create.

I realize that numbers are not the only factor involved in solving such a large and controversial national problem. Politics itself must play-and has played-a part in attempts to cut the deficit.

The bottom line is that Members of Congress are chosen by thousands of voters and are expected to be responsive to them. When the people of San Antonio, the Hill Country and West Texas ask me-almost unanimously-to vote against any tax increase, I take their requests seriously. And literally.

Still, we all like to reap benefits from government, so there is a conflict between the public's desire for such programs and its desire for as much take-home pay as possible.

I believe that there is a way to meet citizen concerns in both areas and cut the federal deficit at the same time. Raising taxes just won't solve our problems.

The "nay-sayers" to our president-elect's program need to take a closer look.

The public does not deserve to be taken in by the tax-raisers' latest hoax.

Home #3 The Glidden's (110 W. Brooks Ave.)

Jim and Sue Glidden were charmed by their home. Although they looked at several other homes after moving to Eldorado in 1985, they were drawn back by the large inviting porch and all the possibilities within.

Built in 1938 by the Christian family, the home has been affectionately known as "The Christian Home". Beginning with the large, cool porch, complete with soft blue ceiling and stenciled porch swing, each room was given the "Glidden touch". Although the home was remodeled in the '70's, Jim and Sue set their priorities to include installation of central air and pulling up some of the carpet to reveal wooden floors over which they laid their Oriental rugs. They closed small windows around the fireplace and installed a new mantel and surround. French doors divide the living room and dining area, giving the feeling of openness. Colors move smoothly from one room to the next. The dining room was upholstered and matching drapes of cinnamon, wedgewood and navy were hung, thus creating an Oriental flavor.

The kitchen and utility rooms

were redesigned to create a country kitchen with breakfast area. New cabinets and island in white and blue and white wallpaper come alive with the morning sun - giving the room its cheery atmosphere. Sue shows off a collection of ducks above her authentic church pew. Completing the country look are an old clock, an old telephone, and Sue's toile paintings.

The master bedroom has been extended out onto the East porch. Again Sue upholstered a wall in mauve and rose and made drapes to match. The painted shutters on the windows serve as a headboard for the bed.

The bathroom has been restyled with a double lavatory and mauve, blue and peach floral wallpaper. Even the bathtub has been relocated!

A country air has been achieved in the guest room with a brass and white metal bed and pie safe. The chest once belonged to Sue's grandmother, and library table was in Jim's family. The crocheted table cloth is a memoir from Jim's and Sue's days in Germany. Old family pictures above the chair rail complete the coziness of the room.

The bright sitting room is enhanced by several windows. Previous visitors to the home may find that Sue walled in a few of the windows and used sheared fabric from ceiling to floor. She highlighted the room with stencils near the ceiling. Completing the room are patchwork pillows,

a quilt and a collection of carousel horses.

For Christmas, each room has been given a sprinkling of Christmas. The large Christmas tree sparkles with a thousand lights among the gold, silver and blue ornaments. The Glidden's invite you into their home to share the holiday season with them!

Home #4: The Freltags (5 miles East on Menard Hwy, right on Cooper Gas Road 3 miles and left .3 mile down caliche road)

At the entrance to the Freltag Ranch is a sign which reads "Liveoak Brangus" with cut-outs of Brangus cattle, deer, goats and Bill's favorite saddle horse - a 4-wheeler!

The home was built in San Angelo and moved to the Ranch August 1, 1977. Upon approaching the dark gray home, trimmed in white, there is an acre yard to mow and keep trimmed.

As you enter the home, you will know at a glance that blue is the owners' favorite color. To your left is an antique table Bill and Mabel found in three sections in a junk yard in Odessa. All the family has helped restore it. The hand-crocheted cloth covering the table was made by a Mexican woman in Mexico and sent to Mabel-as was the one on the dining table. Framed on the living room and dining room walls are hand-crocheted mats made approximately 40 years ago by Mabel's aunt. The pencil drawing over the loveseat is "Have You Heard About" by Duward Campbell of Lubbock. The 16x30 den and the 10x16 sewing room were added in 1978.

The two guest bedroom and baths are on the East wing. The

heavy brass bed was acquired through a house trade in Odessa and is approximately 60 years old. The ceramic "Thundar Jar" at the foot of the bed was purchased at an antique store in Alamogordo, N.M. and was presented to Mabel at the Roswell Livestock Company, with a capacity crowd watching. Be sure and ask her to tell you that funny story! The master bedroom and bath are off the kitchen.

The kitchen work table was used for many years by Mabel's mother on ranches in Crockett, Sterling, Tom Green, Schleicher and Real Counties, and is just one of their many treasures.

HOME #5: CASA CASINO (Freltag Ranch cabin located on left after crossing cattle guard)

Casa Casino was built in 1984 by Bill and a Mexican laborer. The only outside help was provided by Sid Rogge who did the electrical work. Mabel gave the builders moral support and a few pointers on the inside! The cabin was started in April and was completed in November, just in time for the Night Bridge Christmas party.

The Club helped name the cabin and gave the sign above the front gate as a housewarming gift. Not only is the cabin used for bridge parties and other gatherings, but the SCS has used it for their Headquarters during their Grass Judging Contest the past two years. They have a standing invitation for the future.

Inside there is a large 24x24 room with a 16x16 kitchen and a 8x10 bathroom. The various furnishings of the cabin were donated by friends and family. The coat rack and English card table were from Kathleen St.

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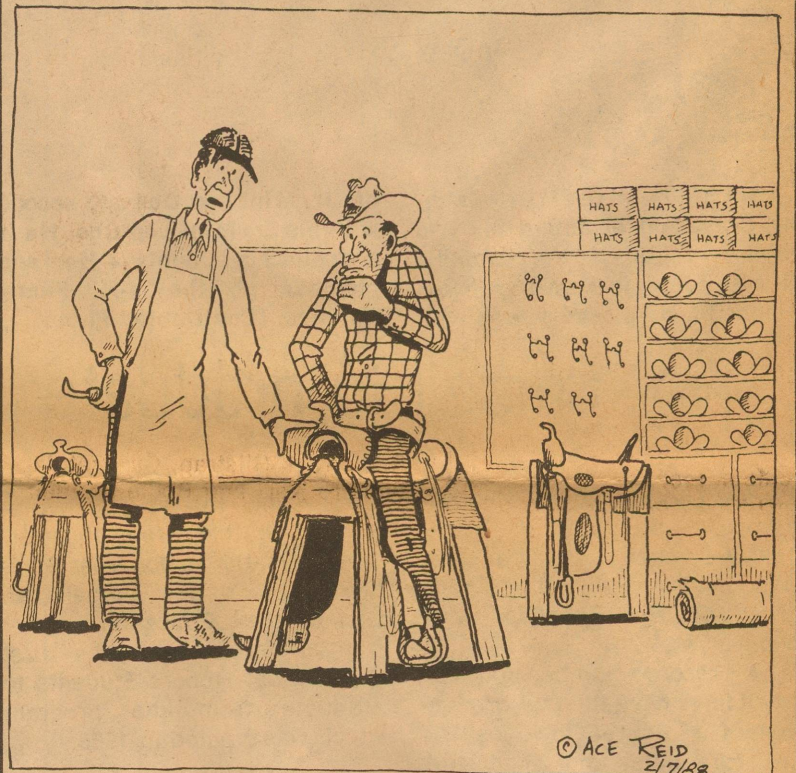


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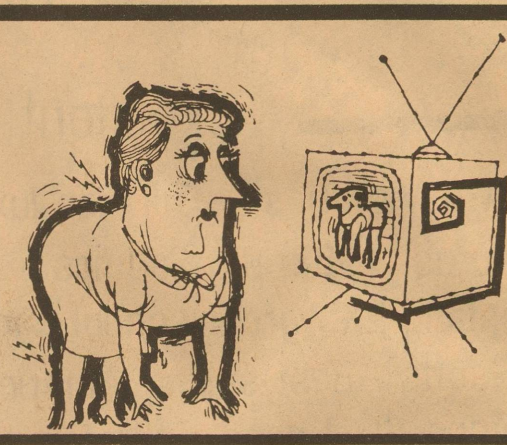

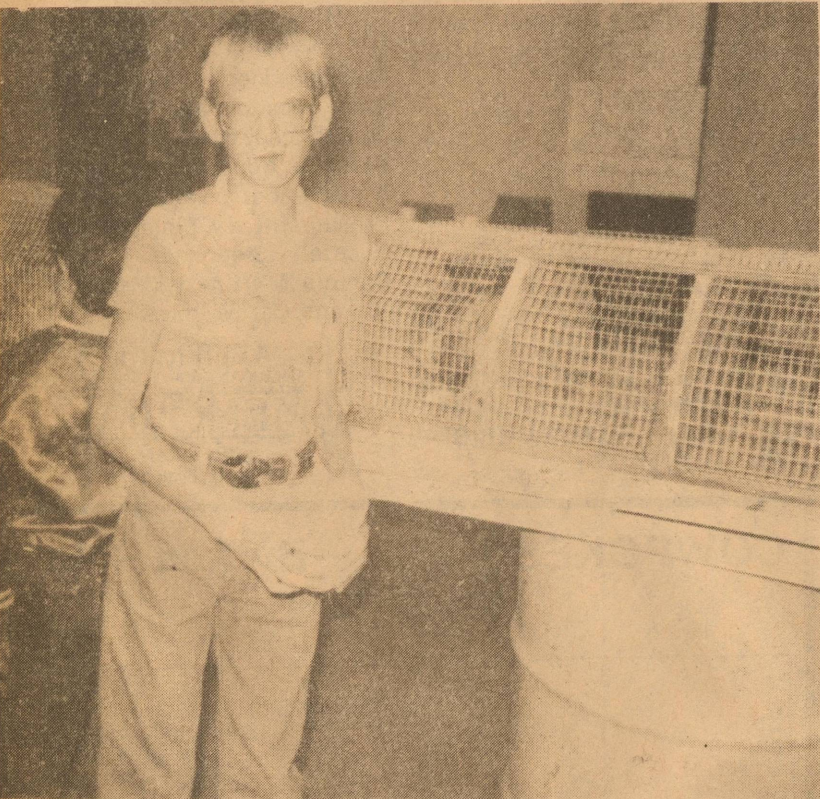
Children get their official collection envelope through the local fire department, then contact friends and neighbors for donations.

Family Medical Clinic News and Views

HOLIDAY SAFETY

The holidays are a time of joy and celebration, but accidents often mar the spirit of the season. Include precautions in your Christmas plans. The hustle and bustle and the changes in routine may lead to carelessness.

As the decorations are brought out, keep in mind who will be enjoying them. In addition to checking for defects in wiring of Christmas lights and locations of the tree and papers decoration away from sources of heat, if small children are present, extra measures are needed. Of course, careful supervision is important, but even young toddlers are excited to help arrange plastic, paper and edible ornaments on the tree's lower branches. Trees should be well anchored. (I speak from experience, as I climbed and turned over a very tall Christmas tree in my younger days!) It may be best to forego lights and icicles, in homes with very small children. Also beware of small decorations and wire hangers that present choking hazards. Some plants in homes for Christmas time are poisonous. Holly and mistletoe are toxic, as is the poinsettia plant at certain stages.

Gifts for children have the potential for injury by faulty designs, poor supervision, or by inappropriateness for age. Toys with small parts that may be loosened (plastic eyes of stuffed animals, truck wheels, doll bra-

celets, ect) present a choking hazards to toddlers, as do popped balloons and holiday nuts and candies. Sharp points and propelled objects turn playthings into dangerous weapons in young hands. Proper training and a safe location for play are necessary for new electric toys (such as trains) and riding toys. Plans to be available to enjoy playing with your child at this special time-it's fun and allows you to note potential dangers.

Travel to celebrate with family and friends often leads to rushed conditions on crowded roads. Allowing extra time, with frequent stops, especially if children are in the car, enhances driving safety. The driver should not be impaired by lack of rest, alcohol, or drugs (including many "over-the-counter" and prescription medicines). Seatbelts and infants or child car seats are a must. Dangers at your destination include medicines, chemicals, and cleaning supplies that children may ingest in homes of older people, who no longer keep these things out of reach. Elderly women often have bottles of pretty colored pills (sold to them without "childproof" caps) in their purses, which children delight to explore.

Not all holiday hazards can be avoided, but, by taking time to include safety in your planning, chances of injury are reduced. Have a safe and Merry Christmas!!

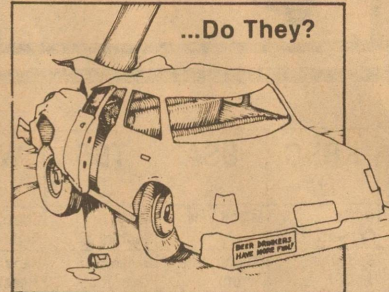

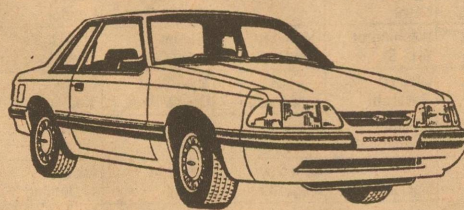

Christmas safety tips suggested

Displays in department store windows are the first sure sign that the holiday season is approaching. Soon, Christmas trees and decorations will be appearing in homes, and houses will be strung with colorful lights. While you are decoration your home, remember that festive decoration can be hazardous. Texas Safety Association warns that more residential fires occur during the holiday season than at any other time of the year. The following safety tips can help keep your holidays safer, healthier, and happier.

-If you buy a real Christmas tree, look for a fresh one with a strong pine scent and flexible branches. A tree can be a real fire hazard, especially if it has been allowed to dry out. Bounce the tree on the ground two or three times-if more than a few needles fall, it is too dry.

-Before you set up your tree, cut about two inches from the end of the trunk, place the tree in water, and stand it in a cool place. When you are ready to set it up, choose a location away from heat sources (fireplaces, heaters), and out of the normal foot traffic areas. Use a strong, waterholding tree stand and check the water supply each day.



-Try to place your tree near an electrical outlet-avoid using extension cords if possible. Use lights and electric cords that have the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) mark. Inspect them for bare wires, loose connections, broken sockets, and dead bulbs.

-When decorating, use a sturdy stepladder. Don't hang breakable ornaments on lower branches where children or pets might pull them off.

-Always unplug your lights before going to bed or leaving the house.

-Keep decorative seasonal candles away from flammable materials, and out of reach of children.

Don't place Christmas greenery on mantels over working fireplaces, and avoid hanging stockings too close to a fire.
