## Eagles, Lions deadlock

Like two exhausted prize fighters, hanging onto the ropes but refusing to fall down the Eldorado Eagles and Ozona Lions battled to a 19-19 deadlock in District 6-AA play last Friday night.

Eldorado, however, would be considered the loser if both teams finish tied for second in district play because Ozona managed one more penetration than the Eagles.

Carter Edmiston, who was recently moved to quarterback from fullback, played one of the finest games recorded by a West Texas athlete this year, looking

impressive when passing and turning in one of the best 20-yard touchdown runs seen all year.

The Eagles of Coach Armando San Miguel took the opening kickoff and charged downfield for their first touchdown, crossing the goal-line on a one-yard run by Juan Espinosa. Edmiston tacked on the PAT and EHS led a stunned Ozona squad, 7-0.

Ozona, picked by pigskin pickers all year to battle for second with Eldorado, came back, however, scoring with 3:01 left in the first period and knotting the score at seven.

Edmiston then drove the Eagles goalward and from the 20-yard line scored on a weaving ramble that included several missed tackles and Edmiston's use of key blocks by the offensive line. The PAT failed and Eldorado led, 13-7.

The Eagle defense was solid against the talented Lions all evening, with Scott Robinson and Company staying in the quarterback's face most of the game. However, on fourth down as the clock ticked away the final seconds of the first half, Ozona scored on a 20 yard pass to re-tie

the score at halftime, 13-13.

In the third period EHS scored its last points on a 22-yard pass from Edmiston to a falling Howard Ledbetter. Ledbetter was sliding to the turf when the pass came in from Edmiston, but the talented senior caught it anyway. The PAT was again wide and Eldorado led, 19-13.

Spurred on by a near capacity home crowd the Lions scored on a penalty aided drive with 8:28 remaining, missed the PAT and left the score deadlocked.

Eldorado fans and coaches were dismayed by the game's officiating which saw the visiting Eagles tagged for nine penalties for 67 yards, while the hosts were only flagged twice for 20 steps.

Ozona also won the battle of the first downs, 17-13, but the Eagles had more rushing yards, 127-105. The Eagles also amassed 167 yards throwing the ball while the Lions totaled 123. The Eagles were eight of 15 with one interception, while the Lions were nine of 21 with no thefts. EHS punted six times for 37 yards and the hosts kicked six times for 35 yards. EHS lost two fumbles and Ozona three.

The local defenders knew a pass was coming and all receivers were covered when Ozona's quarterback dropped back to throw.

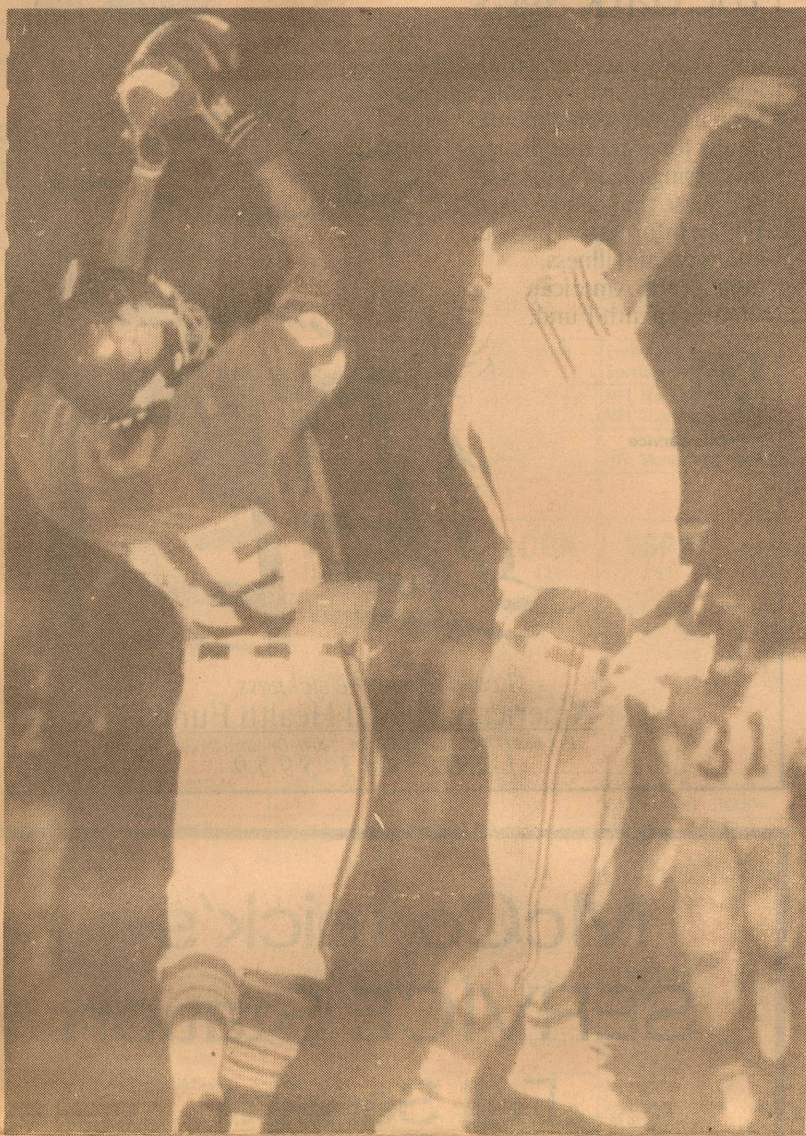
He looked all over the field, scrambled and tossed a desperation pass into the endzone, not 15 feet from where this photographer stood. The coverage was there, but the defender mistimed his leap and the Ozona receiver came down with the football.

Something had happened alright, but as usual it was not good news for Eagle fans. The team had worked itself to death trying to overcome Ozona and stay in the district race. They had played the best game of the year. But it was not enough. The big play had broken our back again.

There is little that separates Eldorado's football team from district leader Big Lake. The Eagles played the Owls tough this year and with a break or two could have pulled off the year's biggest upset. But again the big plays seem to belong to the other guys.

It has got to be hard to deal with. Work yourself to death and

## Doctors finish course

All Schleicher County residents should be pleased to know that their local doctors now have state of the art knowledge and skills concerning the initial assessment and primary management of victims of severe trauma.

The Advanced Trauma Life Support Course was attended and successfully completed by doctors Jim Brame, Pat Johnson and Debbie Peaslee in Dallas on October 13 and 14. This course was developed by the American Colleges of Surgeons and is targeted specifically for doctors

who see major trauma infrequently but, none the less, must move quickly and efficiently when it does occur in order to save lives. The faculty for the course was drawn from Parkland Hospital surgical trauma doctors who have vast experience in dealing with these types of injuries. The course content consisted of lectures, skill stations for hands-on experience and written and oral tests of proficiency.

"I believe that it is particularly important for us to have this course. We must apply and qualify for

Well, Tuesday night I was invited to eat dove. This little dove feast was put on by a trio of local game hunters. This was only the second time I've ever eaten any dove and I must admit they were pretty good.

I did ask one of the hosts if these were the same white birds that they let fly at the Olympic opening ceremonies, but he said he didn't think so. They were probably only distant relatives at best. He also indicated that none of the birds he shot was carrying an olive branch in his beak at the time.

Still it does seem a little cruel to me to kill some little bird, especially one that is the symbol of peace on earth and all that, but they were pretty good eating.

I did check with these three hunters and assured myself that they had complied with the game laws. It is sort of the duty of the County Attorney to check into that sort of thing, since it would not do to have him eating some illegal bird no matter how well prepared. I have to commend these guys for even being able to understand the laws regarding the hunting of game, especially such small game at that.

The bag limit on dove seems more than adequate even though it takes quite a few of the little critters to make a meal. On the other hand if they must be shot one at a time it must get pretty

tiring. These guys were very patient with me, since they knew that I probably did not really understand the thrill of the hunt. They are right. Where I grew up just getting to walk home through my neighborhood was thrill enough. In fact, I don't know if the dove feel hunted but you can on a city street after dark, if you're not used to it.

I always had a little trouble telling the difference between the pigeons and the turtle doves. They both did pretty much the same thing to statues and a person couldn't really shoot them in a crowded city anyway. The ones at City Hall in Philadelphia have become almost arrogant, not even moving for people to walk by until you nearly step on them. They also consume enormous amount of popcorn, which is okay if you sell popcorn.

We learned early not to wear light, especially blue, clothes. For some reason this type of clothing made a person a target for all the airborne pigeon.

I don't know maybe if I brought some of these fearless Texas dove hunters paraded them through City Hall plaza the pigeons would think twice about what they have been doing to William Penn. Then again the pigeons might really like camouflaged clothes better than light blue.

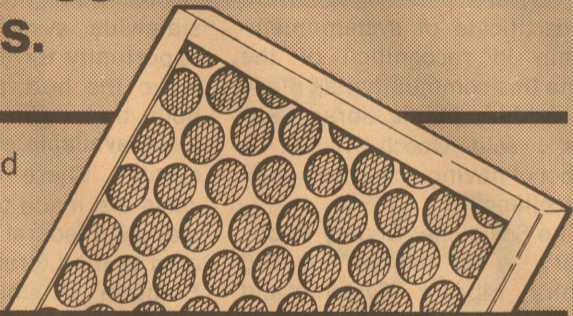
The late spring yearling heifer exhibited by Mark and Teresa McClintock was judged yearling division champion. ABC Encore 5107 sired the heifer.

## Family Medical Clinic News and Views

Schleicher County Medical Center and its associated Family Medical Clinic have introduced some new services and improvements over the past year in an attempt to better serve our community. We would like to keep you informed of changes as they occur.

The laboratory has added both equipment and staff to provide more rapid and complete testing. There are now four employees in the department with someone readily available 24 hours daily for x-rays and lab work.

The new COBRAS-MIRA random access chemistry analyzer's small size [It's about one-fifth the size of our old machine, thus freeing up needed space] is deceptive, for it has the capability of being programmed for over 100 blood chemistries including electrolytes, therapeutic drugs such as digoxin and theophylline, drugs of abuse and thyroid testing.

It has the advantage of requiring only a fraction of the blood specimen of our previous analyzer, a feature of particular importance to children and those needing frequent or numerous blood tests. Speed and accuracy improve patient care.

Less commonly needed tests still must be sent to an outside laboratory; however, as we increase demand, this analyzer is capable of further expansion. We hope to improve the microbiology section of the lab soon by incubating most cultures here rather than the more time consuming process of sending them to Pathlab. That process itself has been made more efficient, though, by a computer link for communication of results.

A quick screening test for streptococcal pharyngitis [strep throat] now leads us to a diagnosis in less than an hour, so that early treatment may prevent the spread of this contagious disease that may lead to serious

heart or kidney damage.

A vaccine has recently been found safe and effective for the prevention of Haemophilus Influenza Type b [HIB] in children from 18 months to five years of age and is available at the Family Medical Clinic. HIB causes meningitis and other life-threatening infections in infants and young children.

The new vaccine that is recommended for 18 to 24 month olds is not yet being given at the Texas Health Department Immunization Clinic, although a type for those 2 to five years of age is being offered. All other childhood immunizations may be obtained at either location, and Medicaid recipients may choose to receive theirs at our clinic as well. Screening examinations [routine well checks] for Medicaid qualified children are approved at the Family Medical Clinic.

Two specialists have provided services in our facilities for the convenience of Eldorado citizens. An ophthalmologist, Dr. Kirkland, examined the Schleicher County Nursing Home residents earlier this year and made treatment recommendations. His findings also helped certain patients qualify for cassette tapes from the Lighthouse for the Blind. Dr. Wimpee is in our clinic for orthopedic consultations every Wednesday afternoon.

With trauma being the leading cause of death in the United States in people under 40 years old, we felt it mandatory for our physicians to maintain competency in the management of victims of serious accidents. To further this goal, Dr. Brame, Dr. Johnson and I have completed the Advance Trauma Life Support Course at Southwestern Medical School in Dallas last week.

Schleicher County Medical Center is striving to make changes and improve health care in response to the needs of the community.

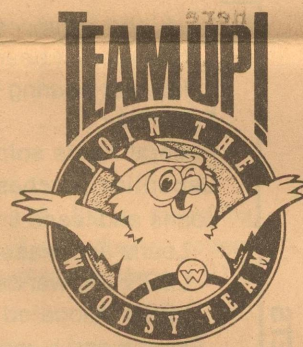
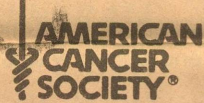

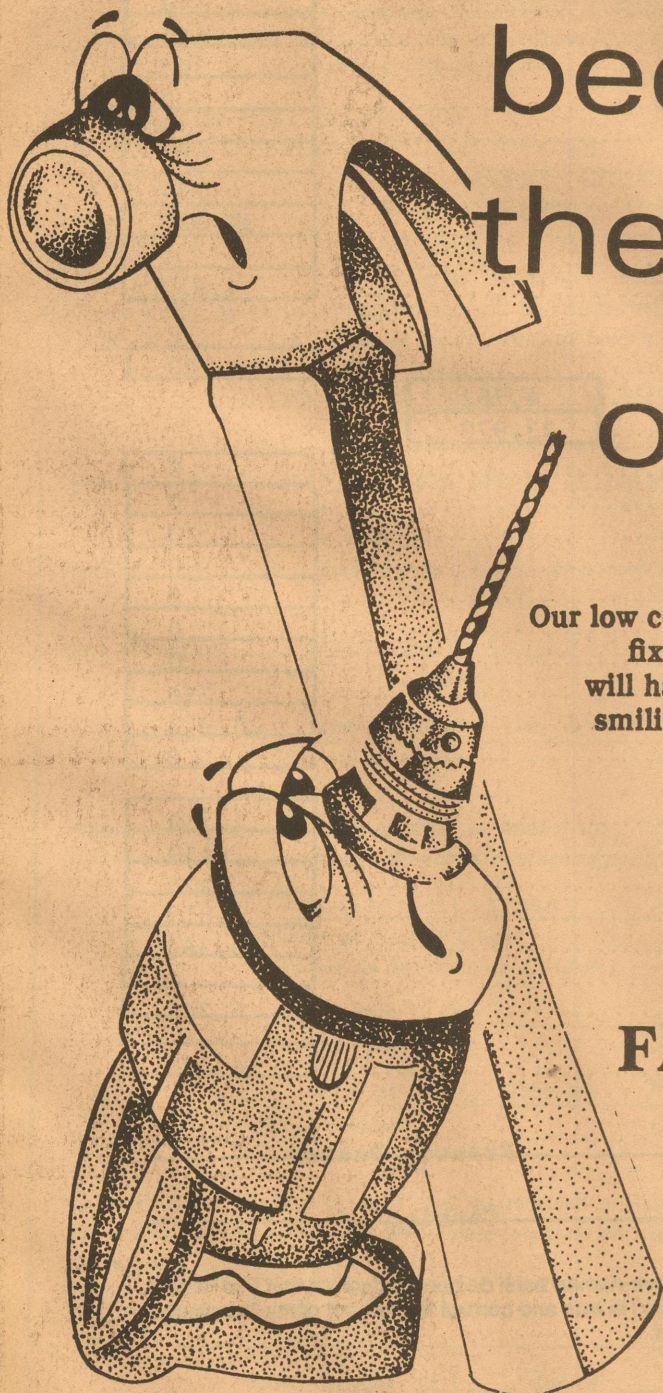

# Quilts patched America together

Like putting together the pieces of a quilt, it's time to take what's good from the old and the new in rural America and blend it into something beautiful and useful, a church leader said here today.

"This is the time to mend what is wrong in rural America," said Gary Farley with the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, Ga. Farley spoke at 43rd Annual Town and Country Church Conference at Texas A&M University conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Speaking on "Similarities Between Quilts and Our Lives," Farley described numerous quilt patterns and then said that rural America cannot adhere to any one pattern in its mending process. Instead, a mixture, or sampler, is the type of quilt pattern that is needed, he said.

"Many quilt patterns are

appropriate for our mending of rural America, but I think we need a sampler, one fashioned for a king-sized waterbed," Farley said. "In that way it will be large and cover something vital to our well-being."

Farley described a number of quilt patterns and how they relate to rural America.

"A crazy quilt is one that takes its own shape; I think such an approach to helping rural America is harmful.

"The flying geese pattern is one that might work because it show flexibility. But we must use it with care.

"Jacob's ladder advocates care and caution and trust in God. Certainly we can use some of that pattern.

"The Lone Star pattern shows individual initiative and leadership, which are important. But this pattern might serve us

better if it were a broken star depicting community rather than individual leadership.

"A wedding band pattern signifies a new marriage of rural and urban America.

"A drunkard's path pattern reminds us of the mistakes of the 1970s when we became 'drunk' on efficiency and progress.

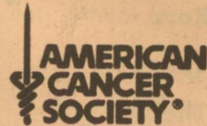
"The log cabin depicts a sense of community endeavor and independence and is a pattern that calls for a cooperative spirit.

"Then there is the rising star pattern which symbolizes that each day holds promise, the pineapple which is a New England pattern depicting a welcoming or homecoming, and the kaleidoscope pattern which shows diversification of function

"The fabric of rural America has been torn in recent years, and it is our challenge to take

some of the scraps of that fabric and put them together in a pattern that is useful and beautiful," Farley said. "We can salvage what's good in values, technology, people, organization and the environment to make our quilt one that will help bring rural America back together again."

Purpose of the annual conference is to help rural and small town ministers and laity better cope with problems in their communities and congregation, said Dr. Dave Ruesink, sociologist with the Extension Service and conference chairman.
