Cotton made big difference

The most significance change in Schleicher County came after the land law, "Landrushers," in 1901. This law made small tracts of land available to the farmers and small ranchers, many settlers moved into the area.

A covered wagon, wash pot underneath, stove pipe on the side, and every thing needed to set up camp was a common sight in Schleicher Co. after 1901. These covered wagons usually contained husband, wife, several children, and family dogs followed behind.

These farmers that came to settle homesteads had a different time. They sometimes rented farms or worked at other jobs until they were able to by their own land or homestead the government land.

These farmers endured many hazards. Grasshoppers, breaking new ground, or lack of rain were among the many problems. Breaking and clearing the land was

very difficult because of lack of equipment. The farm land was usually not productive until the third year.

The country contained good black, deep soil, and the farms land increased and farmers progressed.

Cotton seemed to be the most suitable crop, and one of the greatest needs was a cotton gin. It took a busy farmer several days to make a round trip, by wagon, to take their cotton to the nearest gin, fifty miles away.

This article appeared in the Eldorado paper January 29, 1904.

"Saturday afternoon at about 3:30 the mass meeting called for the purpose of discussing the proposition of building a cotton gin in Eldorado, was called to order, and F.C. Bates, Jr. elected secretary.

"After the election, the chair stated the purpose of the meeting and called for the velws of those present on the subject. Several responded and all expressed themselves favorable towards having a gin built here. It was then decided to organized a joint stock company with \$3000 capitol and divided into 3000 shares of \$10.00 each.

"Everyone present was requested to come forward and sign an agreement to take the amount of stock set opposite their names and in a few minutes stock to the amount of \$2,750 was taken.

"A committee composed of W.B. Silliman P.H. McCormick, and T.P. Dorris were elected to solicit further subscriptions and to call the next meeting.

"Now farmers of Schleicher Co. can go ahead and plant cotton with the assurance that a gin will be in operation here to handle this years crop, and save the expences and time of hauling their seed cotton to San Angelo

AN EDITORIAL Mc Callas, store will be missed

When McCallas closes its doors for the last time it will be Schleicher County's loss.

The store and its owners--Gene and Vernell McCalla will be missed a whole lot more than some might think.

Where will we run to pick up socks or tennis shoes or dresses or blouses at the last minute, not to mention the considerable inventory of Eldorado Eagle wear that the McCallas have always carried.

Think about it for minute... there are probably some kids that would have gone to school barefooted without Gene and Vernell's credit.

The McCallas are also stellar Schleicher County citizens in every aspect of the word. They are good neighbors, good people and typical West Texans. They will be missed.

The closing of their store will leave a void that perhaps will never be filled in Eldorado. What other prospective businessman is going to invest in a town whose citizens spend most of their money in San Angelo?

Two years ago we were surprised at the results of a brief survey we performed on prices between McCallas and several San Angelo stores.

Surprisingly the general merchantile type store in little Eldorado did better than hold its own against the big boys and actually won when it came to a pricing check on womens ropers and several other items.

But Schleicher COUNTIANS have the San Angelo habit and after two years of scratching our head we have not been able to figure out a solution.

The advent of the chamber of commerce has been a positive

note for Eldorado and Schleicher County businesses, but even the chamber cannot keep people from heading north on payday.

Of course there are many things that folks need that they cannot get here. However, when they travel to San Angelo to get them they also make other purchases.

Mr. and Mrs. John Doe go up to San Angelo to buy a new car and while they're there they go out to eat, start their Christmas shopping, wash the car, catch a movie and on and on and on.

In short, locals behave just like others do all over the country. People in Midland drive to Lubbock to shop, people in Lubbock drive to Amarillo and folks in Van Horn go to El Paso. What's a mere 240 mile round trip to a shopper?

One of the reasons we have promoted Eldorado as a haven for retirees is the fact that older folks tend to spend more money at home than the younger ones.

McCallas has had a long and successful tenure in Eldorado, but it will be ending soon, pushed a little closer to the brink by those who hop in their autos and head for San Angelo at the break of dawn.

Of course there are those citizens that do shop here, at least first. As a business we appreciate that and as a business undergoing a terrible year, we are thankful for all our support. We're sure Gene and Vernell feel the same way towards their many friends who have made it possible for them to stay in business as long as they have.

Perhaps when locals see the closed and vacant McCallas building they will think twice about making that trip to San Angelo.

Danford was found dead in a pickup truck parked near an oilrig in Crockett County Sunday evening.

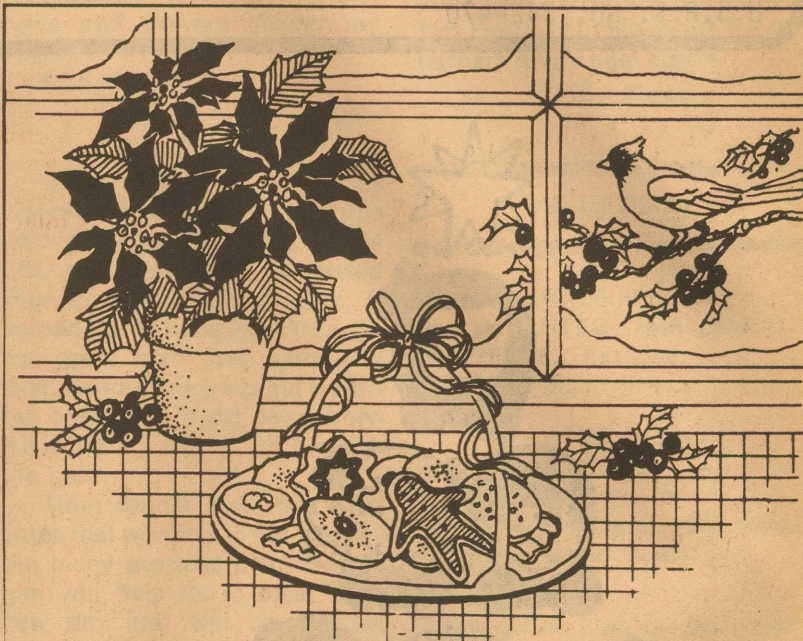
He was born March 8, 1954 in San Angelo, graduating from Eldorado High School and attending Angelo State University. He was an air jammer for Stalene

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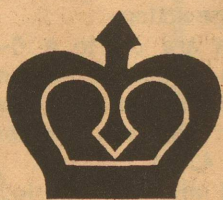

Eldorado MS wins State recognition

The State Board of Education has recognized 629 Texas schools whose students made exceptional scores or high gains on the TEAMS tests.

Nearly twice as many campuses are receiving awards from the State Board for 1987-88 TEAMS performance than received awards for 1986-87 results.

The increase in the number of schools recognized is attributed to more campuses working harder on preparing their students to take the TEAMS tests, Texas Education Agency officials said.

Another reason for the increase is that the board recognized campuses with six or more students, while last year, only campuses with 25 or more students were recognized.

The Board recognized those schools where 90 percent or more of students mastered all sections of the TEAMS tests taken during the 1987-88 school year and those which recorded gains of 30 percent or more from 1986-87 to 1987-88.

Recognized campuses will receive certificates from the State Board of Education.

Eldorado Middle School will be one of the school receiving the certificate from the State board of Education for high score.

Mary Scott Nabers, one of the Texas Employment commissioners, wrote recently in Texas Business Today about illiteracy among the citizens of Texas.

She writes that if the "good new days" are to come, Texas must be ready to compete in high technology, information-oriented industries and in the international arena. But effective competition demands a literate work force—a literate citizenry. And, unfortunately, the literacy picture in Texas is out of focus from every angle.

Texas, third most populous state in the U.S., ranks 47th among the 50 states in citizen literacy. In bottom line terms, that's fourth from the bottom. In human terms, those 3.3 million citizens and workers may never have a chance to develop their full potential or to achieve their life goals.

The Texas Department of Commerce estimates illiteracy costs the state \$17.12 billion a year through lost income, missed tax revenue, unemployment insurance, adult training and education, and the increased cost of crime, welfare and incarceration. It is generally accepted that a high correlation exists between illiteracy and unemployment.

The Texas Department of Corrections shows another correlation—between dropping out of high school and going to prison. Among the inmates in Texas prisons today, 87 percent did not complete high school.

Given the magnitude of the illiteracy problem, solving it will require a working partnership of concerned, involved businesses and organizations, volunteers, foundations and government. Taxpayers should ask about local literacy efforts. Literate, working, responsible citizens are essential components of the new Texas economy.

From the local perspective, we have a strong academic program and effective teachers. We are very fortunate to have the level of community and parent support that we have. Last year, over 1,500 hours of volunteer time was given at the elementary level, at least 46 volunteers taught 18 omnibus classes at the middle school, and many other community members served on advisory committees and in other capacities at the high school. Currently there are approximately 35 persons enrolled in adult GED and English as a second language classes. The local drop-out rate generally fluctuates between three and six percent. A considerable improvement over the past and extremely better than the 25 to 35 percent drop-out rate experienced by many metropolitan areas.

Thank you Schleicher County for expecting good performance from your children and for caring.

HEALTH FAIR RESULTS- CHOLESTEROL

After reviewing the results of the cholesterol screening done at the recent health fair I arrived at some rather surprising and unexpected results. At this time, I have results on 364 Schleicher County residents, 224 females and 140 males. Out of the total of 364 the screening test show that 80 or 22% may have a cholesterol problem that deserves some careful attention.

Many people have come by to talk about cholesterol and a frequent question is "What is a 'normal' cholesterol?". When talking about cholesterol, the word "normal" is somewhat misleading and probably should not be used. The problem is that so many Americans have elevated cholesterol levels that it pushes up the national average to the points where your cholesterol can fall within a "normal range" but still be very undesirable.

Instead, I prefer to think of your cholesterol as being in 3 groups: low risk, moderate risk and high risk. The cut-off figures for deciding what group you fall into vary with age. In general higher cholesterol values are allowed as you grow older. With this in mind I have calculated the results from our health fair as follows:

	FEMALES	MALES
TOTAL	224	140
MODERATE RISK	11%	6%
HIGH RISK	17%	6%
COMBINED MODERATE & HIGH	28%	12%

The surprising and unexpected results was that females in Schleicher County were at higher risk in every age group and in general ran cholesterol levels much higher than the males. The true significance of this statistical finding is not known but it is most interesting. Over twice as high a percentage of females as males had cholesterol in the moderate to high risk range.

If your cholesterol number on the health fair results was circled in red, we urge you to consult with your family doctor to discuss this finding. I plan a future column to discuss how to lower your cholesterol through diet and exercise.

Schleicher County wins State Safety Award again

Schleicher County has received the Texas Association of Counties Occupational Safety Award. The county award was announced in October by the Honorable Jay Johnson, Swisher County Judge and Chairman of the Association's Workers Compensation Self-Insurance Fund Board of Directors at its meeting in Austin.

Schleicher County was recognized for its achievement in reducing the number of employee's on-the-job injuries during 1987. In announcing the award, Judge Johnson stated that "Judge Johnny Griffin and Commissioners Prissy Paxton, Kerry Joy, Ross Whitten and Johnny Mayo Jr. are especially commended for this record, because it appropriately reflects these county leaders' concern for the safety and well being of their employees." Less than 50 percent of the counties participating in the Self Insurance Fund received this recognition.

Besides the savings in human resources, Judge Johnson also stressed that "A reduction in employee injuries reduces the cost that a county must pay for workers' compensation insurance, thereby saving the county and its taxpayers money."

The Texas Association of Counties aggressively promotes occupational safety and assists counties in developing programs promoting safety consciousness among their employees. This award is also the Association's recognition of the contribution from the individual county employee who performed his or her job safely during 1987.

Schleicher County also received this award last year for safe performance during 1986.

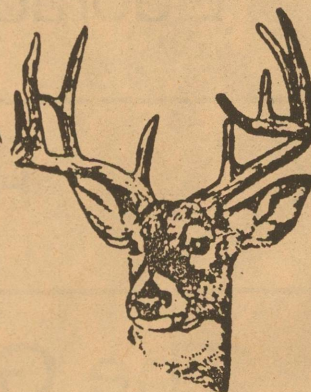
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Years Ago
